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Forty years | 'Little bit of everything, lot of fun'

Max Pennell says he'll see how the summer goes as he enters retirement: so far, judging by a deep tan and 20 rounds of golf in by the end of May, things are going well.

Pennell retired from the Canadian Forces in March after a 40-year career.

"How do you last 40 years in the military?" he asks. "With a few exceptions, I always enjoyed my job."

Pennell is a Newfoundlander. At 17, the military wasn't on his list, but he and three buddies joined up together in March, 1970.

"I lasted the longest."

He had been an Air Cadet

for three years, but there is no military background in his family. His objective: a job, and travel out of Newfoundland.

"It was almost a joke when we joined. I picked my trade by how fast you could get in. Three weeks, and I was in as an air weapons technician."

Since then, it's been a "little bit of everything, and a lot of fun stuff." Pennell says he always had good jobs – air shows in the summer, dragging targets around behind a T-33 for the Navy to shoot at, time in the last days of the Argus, then F-18s (working on seven or eight air frames altogether), and close to 10 years in ordinance disposal.

"That was a lot of fun – until the first time it's not training

anymore!"

His first real call was here in the Valley, while posted on one of four terms in Greenwood: a high school kid was making a bomb in a back shed, and it went off and injured him.

"The parents had no idea what he was doing. When we got there, there were three more bombs ready!"

Pennell really enjoyed the F-18 time, particularly four years with the planes in Germany. His family loved the international posting, and he thrived in the fast-paced, weapons oriented environment. He accompanied the planes through Gulf War missions, worked with NATO support-

Day at the lake turns into fire duty for 14 Wing firefighters

A day on the lake with buddies from work turned into a professional call to duty for six 14 Wing Greenwood firefighters June 12.

Master Corporal Ron Williams had five Green Crew peers out for the day on his boat for a BBQ and jaunt around Aylesford Lake, including corporals Ryan Muck, Brendan Howe and Troy Windbank; and privates Tim Hebb and

Colin Orchard. They also joined an effort to tow a floating dock across the lake to Camp Brigadoon, when a fellow travelling on the dock noticed smoke on a nearby wooded island.

"It looked like it was going pretty good, lots of smoke," Williams says. We knew as firefighters, on a 24 or 25 degree day with lots of wind, you shouldn't be burning brush."

The men dropped off the dock and returned to the island, com-

ing within 30 metres of it – the closest they could get because of the boat's draft.

"We all jumped over and swam in – I'm not going to lie, it was cold," Williams says.

Half the island was on fire, and the men were wearing typical day-on-the-lake clothes: shorts, sandals and T-shirts.

"If you're not a firefighter, that's definitely not advisable to do," Williams cautions.

They kicked in the door to a

shed on the island and found tools and buckets. One man returned to the boat to call 911 and get area volunteer fire departments on the road from Kentville and New Minas. He used the boat's GPS to pinpoint where on Aylesford Lake the island was.

"The guys did what they're trained to do: we cut roots, threw dirt and water around and worked the fire," Williams says. The fellows least protected worked the lake-end of a daisy chain, moving

water in to the men closest to the fire. It burned to within a couple of feet of the shed, full of gas and propane.

"The guy's camp could have lost everything. We put it out – it was just smouldering by the time the fire departments arrived" an hour-and-a-half later.

The men were beat, Williams says and, after turning the scene over to the fire departments, headed home.

"You would have no idea how

often it happens that we're on a day off and something like that happens," Williams says, describing accidents and medical emergencies he's used his professional training to respond to as one of the first on the scene.

The Department of Natural Resources was also involved in the incident, investigating the cause of the fire and determining it was a controlled burn the weekend before that had not been properly extinguished.

ing ship movements in the region and was a peacekeeper in Italy. He travelled through the South Pacific, Iceland and the Caribbean. He didn't get to Afghanistan, Canada's latest major involvement.

"You train for years, and then you get a chance to prove what you've learned. Everyone wants to do that – and do a good job. What do you want for a challenge? I've made nine moves in 40 years: three years in a job, and I've had enough. The first year is learning, the second year is putting it into effect and the third year is routine. The fourth year – boring.

"I wanted to travel and did a fair bit in my time – if you ask my wife."

He knows most of his trips and postings were of the shorter variety: it's the longer stretches that test a military couple's ability of "do that see saw, and be able to balance.

"Your family's got to be able to survive on its own. The downsides are the moves, the housing changes, the pressure on your family when you're away."

For all that, though, Pennell says travel and exposure to the world through the CF has been eye-opening.

"People here may complain about the price of gas. You can shake your head at the range of cultures, religions and ways of life – they're almost unbelievable until you see it. The world is absolutely different."

At the 35-year mark, Pennell was offered a promotion to chief warrant officer, and a move to Cold Lake. He describes it as a tough decision; up until this time, retirement was off in the distance, "whenever I'm not having fun anymore." But with a home, family and friends here in Greenwood, he opted to retire, and then joined the Reserves. He worked with Wing Flight Safety, a good fit with his years of experience in aircrafts of all kinds, in many places and in varying conditions. He's not sad to be leaving the CF now at 60, but says he'd sure rather be staying if working to age 65 was an option.

"I've been very fortunate. I had a good run for 40 years."

Pulling for food

Look for teams determined to make a difference in 14 Wing Greenwood's 3rd Pull the Pumper event June 22.

Greenwood firefighters are spearheading the food bank challenge, which takes place at 11 a.m. in the CANEX parking lot. Fans - and food bank supporters - are welcome to come out and watch the action.

"This is the third year for the event, and there has been lots of interest," says Warrant Officer John Pereira, adding teams have been calling most recently for training tips on

what they could be facing on the challenge course.

"They'll be pulling the fire truck first" – 14 Wing's largest, the 46,000-pound combination ladder truck – "then they'll go through the next six events, and whoever finishes first in timing, wins."

There's a mix of old and new challenges this year, including a pike poke, hose rolling, a rope pull, bucket brigade, hose hooking and bunker gear dressing challenge – all done with participants bearing the weight of a firefighter's breathing

apparatus. The six-member teams may use all bodies to pull the truck, but will then divvy up responsibilities in the smaller challenges.

Spectators are welcome to cheer on the teams, bring in final donations and enjoy a BBQ.

Pereira credits the support of base teams returning to the event, or just joining in for the first time; community and business partners and base leadership support for the growing success of the event. In year one, 2,000 pounds of food was collected, and about \$300; Last year, the 2,000 pounds of food was enhanced with over \$800 in cash. Base sections, and the wider community, are encouraged to take up the challenge to do even more this year. All food and cash donations are presented to the Upper Room Food Bank in Kingston, a Feed Nova Scotia partner.

Local vets receive commendation

Fifteen citizens from Atlantic Canada were honoured June 10 for their commitment and dedication to veterans. Two Kingston men were among the recipients.

Steven Blaney, Minister of Veterans Affairs, presented these individuals with the Minister of Veterans Affairs Commendation in Halifax.

Reverend Donald Boudreau is a retired Canadian Forces member and an ordained deacon in the Roman Catholic faith. He volunteers with the veterans at the Soldiers Memorial Hospital Veterans Wing in Middleton. Boudreau drives a handicapped equipped bus to take veterans to medical appointments, luncheons, parades and other local events. He conducts funerals and prayer groups, visits veterans in hospitals and performs Liturgy of the Word Services and many other parish activities. Boudreau also conducts Liturgy of the Word Services at Queen of Heaven Chapel at 14 Wing Greenwood when regular military chaplains are on special assignments.


David Geddes is a retired Canadian Forces firefighter. He is a senior member of the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) and has served as branch president of the RCL Alvin Foster M.M. Memorial Branch #098, Zone 8 commander and District 'D' commander in the Nova Scotia/ Nunavut Command. He is also an active member of the Veterans Organizations Services Committee. As RCL Branch #098

president, Geddes initiated and completed a program to refurbish the dressers in the Veterans Wing at Soldiers Memorial Hospital in Middleton. He helped organize and spent many hours working on Branch #098's Welcome Home Troops Appreciation Day in 2011 for returning Afghanistan veterans. He volunteers to drive veterans to and from medical appointments, in particular as the driver of a locally-sponsored shuttle bus. Geddes has also constructed ramps for veterans and their widows who experience mobility difficulties.

The commendation includes a bar, which can be worn below official decorations on a

recipient's blazer, as well as a lapel pin for civilian wear and a certificate. The commendation is presented to individuals who have contributed to the care and well-being of veterans and to the remembrance of their contributions, sacrifices and achievements. It is intended primarily for veterans, but in some circumstances may also be awarded to non-veterans. Nominations may be submitted at any time and are reviewed annually by an advisory committee. 
It is eighteen months since Chef Scott joined the team at Falcourt Inn and during that time he has branded the restaurant The Perfect Pear Dining Room. He is always



Jackson named to N.S. hall of fame

Another star-filled roster of athletes, teams and builders will be inducted to the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame November 3.

Bridgetown's late Howard Jackson will be enshrined as a builder for his long-time service as a volleyball coach and official.

Jackson was still playing volleyball when he decided to become an official in 1970. When he received international

level certification in 1983, he was one of only 12 Canadians to hold that accreditation at the time. He went on to officiate in a number of major international competitions, including the World University Games and the Pan American Games. As a member of Volleyball Canada's National Referee Committee, he was a supervisor and evaluator, becoming instrumental in the development of Canadian referees. Over the course of 40

years, Jackson made a significant impact in volleyball as an official, coach and educator at national and local levels as well. He coached at the Canada Games and at Dalhousie and Mount Saint Vincent universities, leading clinics and development camps for many years. Also an accomplished track and field competitor and official, he was inducted as an athlete to the Bridgetown Area Sports Hall of Fame in 2010.



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Fun for all | Community survey IDs recreation needs

Build it, host it, organize it – and they will come.

The 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre already offers a range of special events, clubs and programs – but what more could it do to meet the needs of the community?

A survey through April answered just that questions, with some of the most extensive data ever collected from military families in the area.

“It’s the first time we’ve ever done an on-line survey,” says community recreation director Jill Jackson. “It worked really well: 284 surveys were done.”

The community needs assessment is part of a national effort by Canadian Forces Personnel and Family Support Services to ensure its dollars support local programs people want. Recent changes to funding agreements means an annual assessment must keep close tabs on programs, and survey results can guide a base commander in setting her priorities.

Jackson says Greenwood has done a good job following the interests of the community in the past, but the latest results from the on-line survey raised some particularly good responses.

“We like to look at our community’s needs

every so often, and see how we’re doing with the programs and services we offer – we want to offer what people want to do.”

Good news for Greenwood: survey respondents this time ranked Personnel Support Programs’ success with a four out of five.

“It reaffirms what people think, that we are doing a good job – and we are,” Jackson says. “What we are offering, we want to do more of.”

The survey identified some barriers families find accessing community recreation, including program timing, childcare challenges and finding programs they’re interested in. Jackson says top-three priorities for her centre now include meeting some of those needs with subsidized programs and facility access for children and families, and increasing the range of programs and timings available for adults. Programs for seniors is another opportunity, as the Canadian Forces makes efforts to serve its retired members. Suggestions for upgrades to community facilities should be addressed in infrastructure planning over the next few years. She is also very much aware the Greenwood Community Centre, while a base-oriented facility, serves the local population just as valuably: non-military participants add numbers and registration revenue to keep programs on offer for all, and opening programs to military and non-military participants ensures CF families

feel at home while in Greenwood.

“The challenge for us now is to meet the needs of our community but, at the same time, use the resources and staff we do have. If we can find the instructors, or offer a class identified by someone who is interested, we want to do it,” Jackson says. “There’s potential – we can pretty much do anything.”

Survey says...

- 66.4 per cent of survey respondents were male; 33.6 per cent were female
- 34 per cent were between age 41-50; 1.1 per cent were 65-plus
- 65.1 per cent were regular CF members
- 54.4 per cent live between five and 10 kilometres from 14 Wing Greenwood
- 92.6 per cent say English is their language of choice
- 90 per cent have used PSP community recreation programs in the past 12 months; 24.9 per cent used municipal recreation services
- 76.4 per cent said they take in special events (Canada Day, cultural fairs, etc)
- Special interests (games and leisure hobbies, education and language, fine and performing arts) ranked high on the “would like to” wish list
- Respondents used PSP facilities (gym, weight room, cardio room, running track, racquet courts) in over 85 per cent of surveys
- 47.7 per cent suggested email communications about programs and events would be effective

Du plaisir pour tous | Un sondage auprès de la collectivité fait ressortir les besoins en loisirs

Si vous le construisez, si vous le tenez, si vous l’organisez – ils viendront.

Le Centre communautaire de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood offre déjà toute une gamme d’événements spéciaux, de clubs et de programmes – mais que pourrait-il faire de plus pour servir les besoins de la collectivité?

Un sondage mené en avril a permis de répondre à cette question même, grâce aux données parmi les plus complètes jamais recueillies auprès des familles militaires de la région.

« C’était la première fois que nous faisons un sondage en ligne », explique la directrice des loisirs communautaires Jill Jackson. « Ça a très bien fonctionné : 284 questionnaires ont été remplis. »

L’évaluation des besoins de la communauté fait partie des efforts nationaux déployés par le Service de soutien au personnel et aux familles des Forces canadiennes afin de voir à ce que ses fonds soutiennent des programmes locaux que les gens veulent. Des changements récents apportés aux ententes de financement font en sorte qu’une évaluation annuelle doit être menée pour suivre de près les programmes, et les résultats d’un sondage peuvent aider un commandant de

base à établir ses priorités.

M^{me} Jackson constate que Greenwood s’est bien débrouillé par le passé pour suivre les intérêts de la collectivité, mais les récents résultats du sondage en ligne ont permis de recueillir des réponses particulièrement intéressantes.

« Nous aimons examiner périodiquement les besoins de notre collectivité, et voir comment nous nous en tirons avec les programmes et les services que nous offrons – nous voulons offrir aux gens ce qu’ils veulent. »

Bonne nouvelle pour Greenwood : les personnes qui ont répondu au sondage ont donné au Programmes de soutien du personnel une note de quatre sur cinq.

« Cela vient confirmer ce que les gens pensent, c’est-à-dire que nous faisons un bon travail – et c’est bien le cas », de dire M^{me} Jackson. « Nous voulons accroître encore plus notre offre existante. »

Le sondage fait état de certains obstacles auxquels les familles font face pour accéder aux loisirs communautaires, y compris les horaires des programmes, les questions de garde d’enfants et la tâche de trouver les programmes auxquels elles sont intéressées. M^{me} Jackson indique que les trois grandes priorités de son centre incluent maintenant la satisfaction de ces besoins grâce à des programmes et à un

The pre-schoolers also listened to MacKenzie read


"Froggy Plays Soccer," and then all took turns trying to score on MacKenzie during a shoot out.

Life after CF a joke for visiting comic

June 23 marks the return of a former 14 Wing Greenwood member – to the stage of the Annapolis Mess. He's hoping for a laugh, taking a turn as an up-and-coming stand-up comic. Doors open at 7:30 p.m., and the show start at 8 p.m.

Eric Payne was a master seaman, once part of 14 Wing's administration branch at wing accommodation. On a motorcycle ride in 2005, he and his passenger were struck in a head-on collision on Brooklyn Street three kilometres from the Kentville hospital. Passenger Kyle Tops suffered multiple breaks to his left leg, but Payne's injuries resulted in an above-knee amputation.

"My family and I were really blessed to have incredible support from 14 Wing and the

community at large," Payne says.

He was posted to the HMCS QUEEN CHARLOTTE in 2006, where he completed his 23-year Canadian Forces career. His last year-and-a-half in the CF was busy.

"We had just started the combat mission in Afghani-

stan and policies were being developed and changed to match the wounded injured and ill at the time," Payne says. He was asked to participate in a number of initiatives, including some input with the Assisting Officers Handbook and the moving policy for disabled Canadian members. He joined a team which traveled to Walter Reed Army Medical Centre to look at the traumatic care American soldiers were receiving, and was present at the launch of Canada's Soldier On Program in 2007. This program was instrumental in giving him the message anything is possible. He regained an active lifestyle, which even he admitted had diminished sometime prior to his own accident. He started to three track ski, then play sledge hockey.

Payne was medically released in December 2007. He and his family have now settled near Charlottetown, and Payne works at Veterans Affairs. He sits on the provincial disability action council and manages the sledge hockey program, featured on CBC's Hockey Day on PEI. He is a presenter for Smart Risk, No Regrets, a program for high school students about harm reduction and the consequences of choice.

In March 2011, Payne made the jump to stand-up comedy, something he always wanted to try. He signed up for the open mic at Yuk Yuks in Halifax, got a few laughs and was told by the host he had a pretty good set. He started writing material and looking for opportunities, and his act caught the eye of industry veteran Darren Frost. Payne was able

to tour with him, industry great Kenny Robinson and Kathleen McGee.

Matt Stewart will be joining Payne in Greenwood. A veteran of the Maritime stand-up comedy game, over the past few years Stewart has been climbing the comedy ladder. He was a featured comedian at the 2009 and 2010 Off-Centre Comedy Festivals, and, in 2011, was named Prince Edward Island's "best stand-up act." He has performed with Yuk Yuks, at Joker's Comedy Clubs and as a part of the

Charlottetown Festival. He has appeared alongside Peter White, Nick Beaton and Lorne Elliott and continues to gig across Atlantic Canada.

The show will also include Francois Weber, a past performer at Just For Laughs and the Halifax Comedy Fest, to name a few. He can be routinely found at Yuk Yuks comedy clubs across Canada. Weber most recently joined Kenny Robinson, Darren Frost and Payne entertaining the sailors at CFB Halifax's Fleet Club in April.


red as part of the Support the Troops campaign. Red Support the Troops T-shirts are available for purchase at the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre or CANEX.



The commemorative gardens at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum are found adjacent to the museum's air park.

A beautifully manicured rose garden, with a fish pond, fountain and lovely brick walkways; cairns and monument stones honour Greenwood

squadrons and personnel who have paid the ultimate sacrifice; these are brought together by a life-size bronze statue of a Second World War airman at the centre of the garden.

The walkways are lined with more than 400 commemorative stones, remembering individual members, personnel and their spouses serving or who have served at CFB

Greenwood. The stones express by their very existence fellowship and camaraderie, and a dedication to service. The granite stones (seven inches by 14 inches by three inches) are engraved with the name, unit and hometown of the individual honoured.
