# Catching on to cold High Arctic training could be key to survival

Kneeling in a trench, with bitter winds and snow blowing into my eyes and face, I could barely see a few metres in front of me. To say it is very cold in the high Arctic would be an understatement! It is so cold, Fahrenheit surpasses Celsius! It is so cold, there are no trees to shelter you, or burn to keep you warm! How on earth is anybody expected to survive up here?

With my head in a snow trench and saw in hand, my job was to make bricks of snow for our shelter - the only thing I could do to keep myself warm. My other two crew members had jobs to keep them warm: one was tasked with building the shelter (an igloo), the other with bringing the newly cut blocks to the build site. Making a fire was out of the question, with gale force winds blowing us around. Our igloo was about 75 per cent complete, and it had taken us over six hours to get this far, when we heard a horri-

ble sound, like somebody had jumped into a large bathtub full of bricks and Styrofoam. I didn't want to look up: I knew exactly what had happened. After what seemed to be ages, I found the strength to look at what damage had been done. Our shelter fell to about one-quarter of its size, with one of my crew sitting in the middle of the carnage, quite literally in shock. This was our only shelter from the elements. Our salvation from the cold! Needless to say, my two crewmembers were furious and exhausted, not knowing if we'd have a shelter built in time for nightfall. I suggested they take a break, go for a walk, find some food and get their minds off of the disaster that was our shelter.

I walked up to the mess and stared at it for the longest five minutes of my life, trying to find... something. Was there any hope? Could we salvage this? Did we need to start from scratch? Night was fast approaching. Where were we

## Catching on to cold...

going to sleep? There were 20 or so blocks of snow about three feet by two feet by one foot, weighing about 30 pounds apiece, all in a large pile in the center of our now semi-half shell (like a round lean-to). The blocks were half broken, maybe half salvageable. Piece by piece, I placed the salvageable blocks carefully aside. I took the rest of those blasted broken blocks and hurled them as far as I could out of the center of my igloo! I needed a clear working space. (Not to mention, this kept me warm!)

We eventually got that igloo up. Thankfully, we also had Canadian Forces instructors and Inuit Rangers watching over us the whole time, making sure we would be OK. We were part of the first Aircrew Arctic Survival course held by the Canadian Forces School of Survival and Aeromedical Training in over 17 years. This particular course is designed to instil confidence in our personal equipment, and give us the tools to survive should our aircraft ever go down in an extremely cold environment.

This course branches off from the original Basic Land Survival and extends knowledge of survival in the high Arctic. The school uses subject experts, the Inuit Rangers, to teach the ways of the North: how to navigate in the Arctic, how to build shelters from little more than snow and ice and, most importantly, how to deal with the cold (both physical and psychological cold). There is an art in dressing yourself properly so you do not overheat. If you put too many layers on, you could begin to sweat as soon as you start anything (walking, cutting, building, etc). Or, the opposite: you underdress and feel an urge to breathe into your jacket or onto your hands to quickly warm yourself. You can't do that: doing so causes the condensation from your breath to freeze onto your jacket or hands, making you colder.

The single most amazing thing I found out in this course was we acclimatize to the cold in a short time. I transitioned from wearing a balaclava and scarf, with my jacket fully done up and goggles, to only wearing a toque and having an open jacket. I found out temperatures reached -58 with the wind-chill. I also found our sleeping bag, as tangled up as it became, and how small it was for a large man like myself to sleep in; was able to keep me warm in nothing more than my standard issue underdrawers.

I highly recommend this course for any crew working overtop the Arctic. It has given me the tools to survive and confidence in the equipment I carry. I hope you experience this cold for the first time in a training environment, and not whilst trying to survive!

# To the north | Aurora Block III initial testing complete

The Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit (MP&EU) are responsible for the operational testing and evaluation of the Aurora Block II and Block III and its equipment. The unit currently has many concurrent test programs underway.

MP&EU has just completed the initial test and evaluation of the Aurora Block III aircraft. This required a whole series of tests from Greenwood over the last 12 months, cold weather testing in Yellowknife, as well as detachments to major exercises (Ex Joint Warrior, Scotland, and RIMPAC, Hawaii). This test program was designed to give the aircraft a

limited operational clearance so crews could conduct the most frequently demanded missions required by the Department of National Defence. The release of the test report will allow the wing to start conversion training in the near future.

MP&EU is also carrying out an initial operational assessment of a system that could allow the Aurora to transfer video and other data world-wide by satellite. Although local flights have been conducted to

test this system, they do not give an indication of reliability throughout Canada. A crew from MP&EU will deploy in the first week of February to determine the connectivity available throughout the Canadian operating area.

Follow-on operational testing and evaluation will expand on the initial test points required to allow the Block III to be cleared for operational use. Test points will include complex scenarios, including overland and anti-submarine warfare missions that will ensure the new mission sensors are able to operate in the most demanding environments.

This year is sure to be busy at MP&EU. We will keep you posted with our progress.

# Mise en garde : Rallonges électriques à enrouleur

Un danger a été détecté récemment au sein du 413<sup>e</sup> Escadron, alors qu'une rallonge électrique à enrouleur avait été utilisée sans être correctement déroulée.

Une rallonge d'environ 33 metres, dont à peu près sept metres avaient été déroulés et 26 metres laissés enroulés, était utilisée pour alimenter un radio portatif dans la zone C du hangar 14. Lorsque le technicien qui l'avait utilisée a voulu réenrouler les sept metres qui avaient été déployés, l'enrouleur ne tournait plus et a été rapporté au magasin à outils en tant qu'outil inutilisable. Un examen ultérieur a permis de constater que la chaleur produite par le câble demeuré enroulé avait fait fondre le plastique à l'intérieur du compartiment de l'enrouleur. Demeurée branchée et sans surveillance, cette rallonge aurait pu être un risque d'incendie et causer un incident très sérieux entraînant des dégâts matériels au bâtiment et à l'équipement.

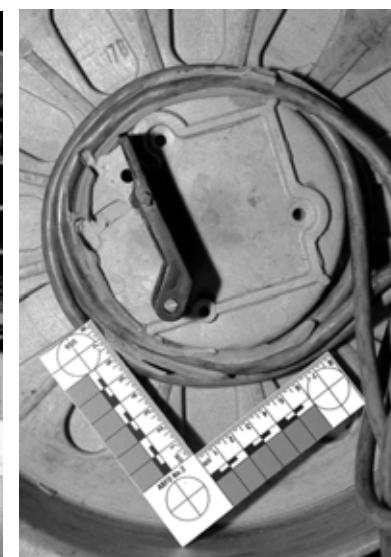
Toutes les rallonges électriques à enrouleur doivent être déroulées complètement avant



l'utilisation afin que l'extrémité mâle qui part du centre de l'enrouleur puisse être branchée à la prise murale conformément aux recommandations du fabricant. Le non-respect des recommandations peut entraîner la production d'une chaleur excessive dans la partie enroulée de la rallonge, qui pourrait faire fondre la gaine de la rallonge à l'intérieur de l'enrouleur. L'utilisation d'une rallonge non déployée comporte également un risque de choc électrique pour l'utilisateur.

Étant donné que de nombreux appareils de ce type sont en service dans l'ensemble de la 14<sup>e</sup> Escadre et peuvent être utilisés dans les résidences privées, veuillez prendre connaissance des conseils ci-dessous pour une utilisation adéquate des rallonges électriques à enrouleur et des rallonges électriques classiques.

- Chercher, sur tous les cordons électriques une marque d'homologation de type CSA International. Cette marque signifie que le cordon est conforme aux normes de sécurité en vigueur.
- Veiller à ce que toutes les instructions du fabricant soient bien passées en revue avant l'utilisation et que les rallonges à enrouleur soient complètement déroulées.
- N'utiliser les rallonges électriques que comme raccordement temporaire.
- Veillez à ce que la rallonge ait une capacité suffisante pour la charge prévue. Pour tout appareil d'intensité supérieure à 7 ampères, utiliser une rallonge de forte capacité à fil no 16 ou no 14 (pour calculer le nombre d'ampères, diviser le nombre de watts par 120).
- Si une rallonge ou une prise chauffe à l'utilisation, elle est peut-être surchargée. La débrancher immédiatement et la remplacer par une rallonge de plus forte capacité.
- Pour les outils électriques,



toujours utiliser une rallonge de forte capacité avec mise à la terre munie de trois fiches.

- Toujours insérer la fiche large de la prise dans la fente large de la prise murale. Ne jamais forcer pour enfoncer une prise à trois fiches dans une prise murale ou une rallonge électrique à deux fentes.
- Entreposer les rallonges électriques à l'intérieur seulement, à des températures supérieures à 0°C (32°F). Les éléments peuvent en-

dommager, à la longue, les rallonges électriques laissées à l'extérieur.

- À l'extérieur, n'utiliser que des rallonges électriques expressément recommandées pour l'utilisation en extérieur.
- N'utiliser les rallonges électriques que dans des lieux secs.
- Toujours débrancher une rallonge électrique lorsqu'elle n'est pas utilisée.
- Ne jamais débrancher une rallonge électrique en tirant sur le cordon.

L'état d'un outil ou d'un appareil électrique dépend de l'état du cordon qui le raccorde à une source d'électricité. Il est très important d'utiliser une rallonge adaptée au travail qu'on doit faire, et de l'utiliser comme il faut. # Hazard alert: reel type electrical extension cords

Recently, a hazard was identified through 14 Wing Greenwood's 413 Squadron involving a reel type extension cord not properly deployed while in service.

A reel type, 100 foot extension cord with approximately 20 feet of cord removed and approximately 80 feet remaining on the reel was being used to power a portable radio in C bay, 14 Hanger. When the technician using the extension cord attempted to reel the 20 feet of cable back in, the reel would not turn and was returned

to the tool crib. Upon further investigation, it was found the heat generated by the cable left inside the reel was enough to melt the internal plastic inside the case. If left plugged in and unattended, this could have been a potential fire hazard, and could have been a very serious event resulting in possible facility and equipment damage.

All reel type extension cords must be fully extended before use, as this will allow the male cord end to be extended from the centre compartment to be plugged into the receptacle, as recommended by manufacturer. Failure to follow recommendations will cause excessive heat

build within the coiled cord inside the reel, and result in fusion of the cord to the interior of the reel. Using reel type extension cords in this way may also cause a shock hazard to users.

As many of these devices are in service throughout 14 Wing and may be used at private residences, please note the tips below for proper use of reel type extension cords as well as standard extension cords:

- Look for a certification mark on all electrical cords, such as that of CSA International. This shows the cord complies with the applicable safety standards.

- Ensure any manufactures' instructions are reviewed thoroughly before use and the cord is fully deployed off the reel.
- Use an extension cord only as a temporary connection.
- Make sure the extension cord is heavy enough for the intended load. For any device that draws more than seven amps, use a heavy-duty cord with No. 16 or No. 14 wire (to determine how many amps a device will draw, divide the wattage by 120).
- If a cord or plug becomes hot when it is plugged in, it may be overloaded. Unplug it immediately and replace it

- with a heavier cord.
- When working with power tools, use a heavy-duty, grounded, three-pronged cord.
- Always match the wide blade of the plug to the wide slot of the outlet. Never force a three-pronged plug into a two-pronged outlet or extension cord.
- Store extension cords only indoors at temperatures above 0° Celsius (32°Fahrenheit). Outdoor conditions can deteriorate extension cords over a period of time.
- When outdoors, use only cords clearly marked for outdoor use.

- Use electrical cords only in dry locations.
- Always unplug an extension cord when it is not in use.
- "Tug by the plug": Never unplug an electrical cord by pulling on the cord.
