# Ready to ride (and ride, and ride...)

Six Greenwood military health workers are getting ready to ride. A 24-hour-marathon spin-cycle session February 28 through March 1 will raise awareness and funds for Boomer's Legacy, a Canadian Forces cycling event which marks the death of Corporal Andrew "Boomer" Eykelenboom in Spin Boldak, Afhganistan, in 2006. The ride raises funds for international service projects CF members identify as they're deployed.

"It was one of the best experiences I've had," says Corporal Cori Plante, a 26 Canadian Forces Health Services medical technician who rode the 180-kilometre event from Greenwood to Halifax in 2011. "I was part of something that meant awareness of families in Afghanistan and others who need help. There was an escort, intersections were blocked off for us and people were noticing as we went by."

The CFB Halifax Stadacona gym will host an indoor version of the ride, the 24-hour spin-a-thon, and all funds raised go directly to the Boomer's Legacy Foundation.

"Corporal Eykelenboom was the first med tech lost in Afghani-

# Base, Valley connections add up to 'one community'

A slide show of all 14 Wing Greenwood represents flashed by, as Lieutenant-Colonel Brian Richardson talked about the base's history, roles and responsibilities, economic impact and community involvement.

"Ahh," he said, with a hint of pride in his voice. "Now we get to the good stuff."

Richardson is the commanding officer of the base's Logistics and Engineering branch, a 700-member strong part of what keeps operations going, on the ground and in the sky.

"We have a wide scope of responsibilities, which keeps me hopping. Operational supand, as an operations guy, I like to give that a little plug. We make sure the men and women of the base are looked after to be able to get things done."

# Le CEMD à l'écoute des familles

#### **Faits saillants** du CNFM en 2012

- Le Conseil a rencontré plus de 420 familles de militaires et 570 militaires d'Esquimalt à St. John's.
- Durant le rapport annuel au CFA, le CNFM a mis en avant quatre grands dossiers: la réinstallation, la santé mentale. l'indemnité de vie chère et la nécessité d'uniformiser les programmes et services aux familles des FC. La recommandation globale était de renforcer la responsabilité envers les familles et de faire de la satisfaction des familles un indice de mesure du rendement.
- Le rapport annuel a donné lieu à neuf recommandations du CEMD et du Conseil des Forces armées aux FC. Toutes ces recommandations sont maintenant en cours de mise en œuvre.

> "I signed up because I thought it was really interesting - the best way to effect change is to command levels as high as possible," Couture says.

> Families use many militarybased service providers - the Personnel Support Program, military family resource centres, the Canadian Forces Housing Agency, and have common issues with childcare, pay scales, spousal employment and more. Concerns with local

programs can always be raised, but how high up the various agencies' and partners' chains of command they advance and how they are weighed in the large CF structure – may not always effect change.

"There is lots of value to what we recommend," Couture says. "The council is having an impact, and that's really empowering. It could be years to filter down to the local levels, but the CF mindset is changing and we can have really in-depth discussions about issues at the Armed Forces Council level."

The council knows there are local and regional issues

within CF family life, but it targets action on systemic issues. Sometimes it can find potential solutions within Canadian military communities, or it researches best practices from other countries' military programs.

"Our recommendations are vetted at the highest possible level, so they're not tweaked or changed on the way up from a lower level through many organizations," Couture says.

The council meets four times a year, and makes an annual presentation to the CDS and the Armed Forces Council.

"We've hit our stride now the last few presentations have been very powerful," Couture says. "I wanted to work toward a solution. I wanted to make sure my daughter - if she joins the military or marries into the life, her experience is as different from mine as it was 20 years ago. There is always room for improvement."

## **NMFC 2012** highlights:

- · The council met with over 420 military families and 570 military members from Esquimalt to St. John's
- During the annual AFC presentation, the NMFC highlighted four main issues: relocation, mental health, Post Living Differential and the need for consistency within CF family programs and services. The overarching recommendation was to increase accountability to families and include family satisfaction as a performance measure.
- The presentation resulted in nine recommendations from CDS and Armed Forces Council to the CF, all of which are now work in progress.

available to choose a Payment in Lieu (PiL) for all or part of vour Canadian Forces Severance Pay (CFSP) entitlement before you release or transfer from/ to the Regular or Primary Reserve Force.

#### **Deadline**

If you are a Canadian Forces member - Regular or Reserve - you have until March 13 to submit your election form indicating whether or not you wish to receive a Payment in Lieu (PiL) of your CFSP entitlement.

Your PiL will be based on your years of eligible service. You should have already received an estimate of your years of eligible service. If you have not received your estimate, or believe your estimate to be in error, you must contact your Base/Unit Orderly Room.

Once you have decided to elect a PiL of CFSP and submitted your PiL election option form to your base/ unit Orderly Room, you cannot withdraw your form. There will be no extension to the election period.

#### Options

Depending on your personal circumstances, you have the following three options:

· Elect to receive a PiL of all your accumulated service benefits. Your PiL will be calculated based on your monthly rate of pay at your substantive rank, pay increment and occupation or trade group at the date you benefits.

- of your accumulated service benefits and receiving the remaining amount as CFSP when you cease to serve in the Regular Force or Primary Reserve. Your PiL will be calculated based on your monthly rate of pay at your substantive rank, pay increment and occupation or trade group at the date you ceased accumulating service benefits. Your CFSP benefit will be calculated based on your monthly rate of pay at your substantive rank, pay increment and occupation or trade group at that time.
- Choose to receive all of your accumulated service benefits as a CFSP benefit when you cease to serve in the Regular Force or Primary Reserve. Your CFSP benefit will be calculated based on your monthly rate of pay at your substantive rank, pay increment and occupation or trade group at that time.

#### Processing

Starting April 1, all PiL payments will be processed on an ongoing basis. If you have combined Regular and Reserve Force service, choose more than 50 per cent of your entitlement, or have Reserve Force service, your file will require verification.

#### **Additional information**
