







Making invisible known Wing commander's diversity

session focuses on unseen issues

An open discussion on issues not often seen is the goal of 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine's diversity session April 5, at 1 p.m. in the Annapolis Mess.

"Please make this a priority in your busy schedules. I think it will prove to be worth your time," says Irvine.

This is the third year for the initiative, and Irvine is presenting an afternoon with dynamic guest speakers and information on the theme, invisible disabilities. This professional development session is open to the base community.

14 Wing Honorary Colonel Barb Stegemann will share her own story of living and working with an invisible disability: an undiagnosed hereditary hearing impairment. She discovered the impairment at age 21, but refused to get hearing aids until she was 36. She now understands how family poverty prevented an earlier diagnosis, how her own reasons for waiting to get help affected her life

and career and how facing the challenges and accepting her impairment has made a difference – and can actually be seen as a unique "gift" as she continues to face personal and business challenges.

Warrant Officer Robert Dolson, an instructor at the Gagetown infantry school, was featured in the "Be the Difference" video, and has had his own journey with an invisible disability through his military experiences and deployment.

14 Wing's own combined advisory group, through the employment equity office, is

supporting the wing commander's presentation, part of its work to "champion" issues facing women, Aboriginals, people with disabilities and around racial discrimination. Employment equity officer Lori Gordon says invisible disabilities are a bigger issue than people think: "because they're invisible.

"People are reluctant to talk about their impairments, but it's important it happens: it's all about education, education, education."

The Employment Equity Act considers an invisible disability one that is long-term or recurring, and which an individual feels puts them at a disadvantage – or could be seen as a disadvantage by an employer.

"The Canadian Armed Forces has its own universality of service standards, but it really works well with the Employment Equity Act, and the CAF's own Integrated Personnel Support Centres and Joint Personnel Support Unit programs.

"It's a network of partners."

Affordable housing accommodations for CAF members in Ottawa

While the summer months are clean affordable housing to jugenerally quiet throughout the Canadian Armed Forces community, not everyone benefits from the relative downtime.

For military housing organizations, the posting season is the busiest time of the year. This has certainly been the case for the Self-Help Housing Organization (SHHO), managed by Personnel Support Programs (PSP) Ottawa, which has been working this past season to help local CAF personnel in their change of residence.

With its mandate to provide

nior-ranked military personnel, Self-Help Housing oversees 545 Residential Housing Units consisting of 519 townhouses and 26 bungalows, located at Uplands.

Despite the demand, units are still available to CAF members being posted to the National Capital Region. Eligible members must be master corporal and below, OCdt, 2nd Lieutenant, or lieutenant (not including Navy). Class B or C Reservists are also eligible, provided they are in possession of a year or more contract at the

time of application.

Housing priority is given to military families (which includes single members with dependants). Single members are placed on a separate waiting list and are offered housing when all the family housing requirements have been met. SHH is also currently accepting application from sergeants/ petty officer 2nd class on a temporary basis.

Greenwood hosts Atlantic squash championship

The nine-member teams consisted of four open players, a master player, a senior player, an under-30 player and two female players. An individual competition took place Wednesday afternoon through Friday to determine the Atlantic team which will compete at the national squash championship at CFB Borden May 4 to 10. The overall result is an excellent Team Atlantic that should represent the region strongly, as they attempt to re-capture the national title for the fourth time in seven years. Event marks Anson's new digs

The Anson aircraft is the star of the show, as the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum holds a "house warming" April 5 at 3:30 p.m.

The museum moved its first restoration aircraft project into a new extension of the ${\sf CANEX}$ complex in December, and Brigadier-General Bruce Ploughman, Deputy Commander of 1 Canadian Air Division, will cut the official opening ribbon.

The expansion really marks another milestone in the evolution of the museum," says Brian Handley (retired colonel), a former 14 Wing Greenwood base commander and now president of the museum's volunteer society. "There are big plans here."

The Anson Mk II, primarily used as a pilot and navigator trainer, flew Greenwood skies during the Second World War. This plane was the first restoration project completed in 2009 by museum volunteers, after five-and-a-half years and 16,528 hours of work. Because of its cloth and wood construction, it can not be displayed in the museum's outdoor air park. Plans started even before 2009 to create a home for the Anson, and funding became available in just the past couple of years. Construction started last summer, and the Anson moved in a complicated procession from storage in a 14 Wing hangar in December to its new home. The extension will eventually also house the museum's Bolingbroke restoration project, now underway, and a 1946 Willys
