Training for unpredictable eventuality

F-1-11 parachute canopy fabric makes a very unique sound, changing from a high-pitched to low-pitched roar as it decelerates the fall of Search & Rescue Technicians against air resistance and gravity. This roar was heard throughout the morning of March 24, as wave after wave of equipment laden SAR-Techs descended upon a mock aeronautical incident in a remote wooded area of Granville.

Despite the simulated and carefully controlled nature of this training scenario, an actual Major Air Disaster (MA-

JAID) was mirrored: it typified the need for an immediate response to large numbers of people in distress in Canada's North. It also exercised the conduct of integrated medical and evacuation procedures, allowing 14 Wing Greenwood personnel to hone their skills.

With northern air and sea traffic increasing, "this was an excellent opportunity to practice a SAR response and demonstrate the squadron's ability to provide a coordinated, large passenger casualty evacuation," Warrant Officer Conrad Cowan, a 413 SAR-Tech, said.

A dozen SAR-Techs parachuted to the simulated airplane crash, where they were met by mock casualties and fatalities with simulated bro-

ken limbs and splattered-on wounds. Once on the ground, technicians were supported by additional aerial delivery of lifesaving supplies by CC130 Hercules crews and medical evacuation by CH149 Cormorant aircrew. The exercise culminated with SAR-Techs providing emergency care for survivors, aircraft rescue and delivery of patients to a suitable medical facility. It also familiarized all participants with the MAJAID concept of operation, with respect to how it is coordinated and the amount of resources employed.

All this was also accomplished with zero impact on 413 Squadron's operational obligations or ability to respond to actual SAR missions.

Spring pick-me-up good for community, Earth

Bags and gloves for clean-up participants will be available at the two meeting sites,

with roll-off containers for collected litter. Designated clean-up areas will be available, but participants are welcome to tackle their own favourite community locations and even road frontage along their own properties now that winter's snow has retreated from ditches and fence lines.

Along with the litter pick-up, Scotia Recycling will bring its big paper shredding truck to the Kingston site, where people may have personal papers shredded. There will also be a drop-off for household alkaline batteries and unbroken CFL lightbulbs. Valley Waste will ensure the batteries and

bulbs are safely and properly recycled, says operations manager Ken Redden. Enter to win a new wheelbarrow, or a load of compost from Northridge Farms.

When the day's work is done, participants are invited back to the central areas for a hot dog and beverage.

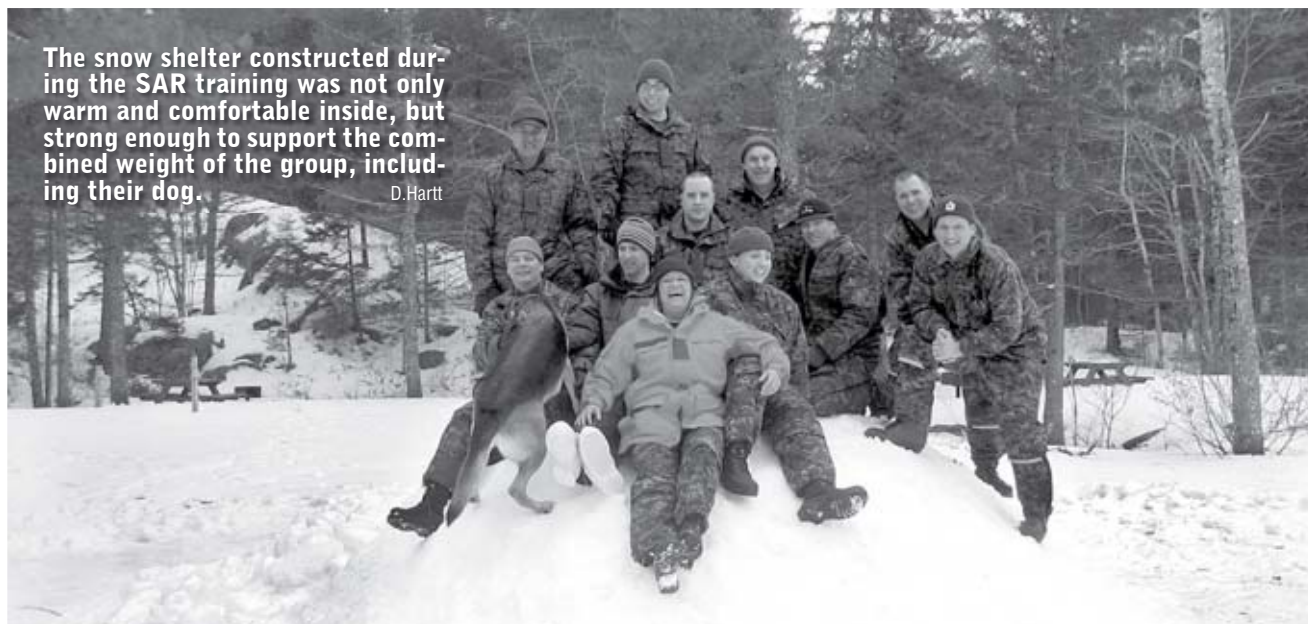

SAR techs hit the ground at Falls Lake

Guests vacationing at Falls Lake Cottages and Campground recently had the chance to observe some of the Canadian Armed Forces' finest in action.

A group from 413 Squadron, 14 Wing Greenwood, occupied several cabins at Falls Lake for some on-the-ground training. This five-day training exercise was led by Sergeant Jason Mackinnon and Warrant Officer Kevin Bergquist, and the 10 exercise participants included mechanical techni-

cians, administration staff, a padre and aircrew.

The purpose of the training was to educate the unit in on-the-ground SAR experiences. During the day, personnel worked diligently, snowshoeing through the forest to gather materials required for the construction of a shelter built from sticks, branches and evergreen boughs. They also constructed a snow shelter, simply piling up snow and allowing it to settle for several hours. Then, an entryway was made south-facing to prevent the prevailing north wind from entering the shelter. Sticks were inserted six inches into

the snow on the outside for thickness guides when hollowing the inside of the shelter. This structure was not only strong, as demonstrated by the group's ability to sit on its roof, but it also provided a warm and cozy retreat from the winter elements.

The personnel then constructed a smoke signal to be located by a passing search and rescue Hercules aircraft. When the sound of aircraft engines could be heard overhead, the fire was lit. Billowing smoke high above the tree line allowed the Hercules crew to locate the crew on the ground. After several passes, the Her-

cules flew over at approximately 250 feet and dropped a communication radio 50 feet from the smoke signal's source. This gave the crew on the ground the ability to communicate with the Hercules crew and relay their condition, as well as notify them of any provisions immediately required.

A Cormorant helicopter then flew to the scene, hovering over the staged rescue site and creating blizzard-like conditions from the turbulence of its rotors. Two SAR Techs were lowered into the scene, preparing to stabilize and evacuate the ground crew.

Le Jour de la Terre est le 21 avril, et Valley Waste Resource Management coordonne un ramassage de rebuts dans l'ensemble de la collectivité. Les employés de la base de Greenwood, leur famille et la population en général sont invités à y participer entre 11 h et 14 h. La zone de rassemblement à Greenwood sera située au feu de circulation menant à la base, près de Greenwood Auto Sales; les participants de Kingston pourront se rassembler à G.W Sampson's sur Main Street.

« L'escadre fournit certains services de logistique, une tente, et le commandant de l'escadre a offert son soutien dans le cadre de ce partenariat », a indiqué Al Pearson, officier des matières dangereuses de l'escadre.

Des sacs et des gants seront distribués aux personnes participant au nettoyage aux deux endroits prévus pour le rassemblement, ainsi que des conteneurs de grande capacité pour déposer les rebuts ramassés. Des zones de

nettoyage désignées pourront être assignées, mais les participants sont libres de s'attaquer à leurs coins préférés de la collectivité et même à la façade donnant sur la route le long de leur propriété, maintenant que la neige a fondu dans les fossés et près des clôtures.

Lors du ramassage de rebuts, un gros camion de déchiquetage de papier de Scotia Recycling sera stationné à la zone de rassemblement de Kingston et mis à la disposition des gens qui désirent faire déchiqueter des papiers personnels. Il y aura également un endroit pour déposer les piles alcalines domestiques et les ampoules à incandescence non brisées. Valley Waste s'assurera que les piles et les ampoules sont recyclées de façon sécuritaire et appropriée, a indiqué Ken Redden, le directeur des opérations. Vous pourrez également participer à un tirage et tenter la chance de gagner une brouette neuve ou un chargement de compost offert par Northridge Farms.

Après cette journée de travail, les participants sont invités à revenir aux zones de rassemblement où on leur offrira un hot dog et une boisson.

Miles add up on military march

Greenwood team in training for Nijmegen challenge

Many, many miles will be logged by 14 Wing Greenwood's Nijmegen marchers – before they even tackle the actual challenge in July.

Captain Craig Lewis is the team lead, organizing two dozen hopefuls and five months of training to be ready for the largest international marching event. Canada has participated in Nijmegen since 1952, and Greenwood is one of 15 teams representing the Canadian Armed Forces in 2013.

"It's a challenge, an opportunity that comes along so rarely in your military career," Lewis says. Even when it does – and Greenwood last had an entry in 2011 – it is never a guarantee. Lewis was a member of the last team but, at 380 kilometres into that year's training schedule, he had to pull out.

"Heartbreaking.

"This year, we have 25 members of the team, and we'll whittle that down so the final team will be 11 personnel.

Fourteen people are rolling the dice, just hoping they outlast the guy beside them. I talked a bit about that experience in January at this year's team briefing, along with injury prevention and how to prepare yourself. But, things happen beyond your control."

(Like Lewis' broken toe, recently stubbed against a footstool in his living room....)

The training is arduous: several fitness sessions, individual distance marches and then a couple of major group marches with a 10-kilogram ruck sack in military boots and kit – every week from March on. The demands build, until the team has completed two 40-kilometre marches in two days – and a total of 880 kilometres.

"It's a mindset: I've done 35 kilometres, and it's a bit of work, 40 kilometres, OK – but then you think of doing that again the next day? You have to find your own motivation."

There is small talk along the route of the practice marches, some singing and even a simple call of the cadence.

"You turn your brain off altogether, and it's one foot in front of the other. It's different for everyone, and each individual finds it for themselves."

Beyond the training regime is the time commitment: all marchers have regular duties at their home sections at 14 Wing, and it says a lot about the chain of command here they are released to take on the Nijmegen challenge.

"Greenwood supports us – someone else is doing your

job while you are gone, and we have shift workers and people in physical trades," Lewis says. A few people have already left the team because of unavoidable training and operational requirements.

The 97th Nijmegen March will be held July 16 to 19, and 45,000 marchers from 50 countries will cover 160 kilometres in four days. Lewis says the Greenwood team is "very anxious to get out on the road."

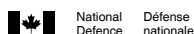

Unseen links the strengths in diversity

Your breaking point could be seen as an invisible weakness; it could also be the point at which you challenge yourself.

Two guest speakers at 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine's diversity session April 5 shared their experiences with personal issues, on the theme "invisible disabilities." Irvine said his goal was to introduce stories that demonstrate "nothing good comes without a lot of challenge," and Canadian Armed Forces members – and others – "accept we are who we are – including the broken bits."

"We make our strengths stronger, and we build those broken bits into strengths."

Warrant Officer Robert Dolson refused for several months to realize he was in trouble: the Gagetown infantry school instructor knew he was "supposed to be a tough guy, a member of the 'big boys' club" as a soldier with the

Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry.

"We tend not to admit our faults."

When Dolson stood up in 2006 from a village gathering in Afghanistan and shot the 16-year-old boy who had just sunk an axe into the head of one of his men, Captain Trevor Greene, he set in motion cascading mental health issues that resulted in a diagnosed operational stress injury.

"You're trained to react," Dolson said.

That's on a professional level. Personally, Dolson did not deal well with close encounters with four improvised explosive devices, the pressure he placed upon himself to lead his team on excursions and attacks – "doing my job, I thought;" and the guilt and worry he carried for the life-changing injuries suffered by Greene.

"I broke down," Dolson said. "I mean tears. I did not fail at anything they ever asked of me and this, to me, was failure. Not acceptable."

Superiors pulled him out of the field.

"Was I resistant to help? Yes, but I thought, 'I'll go talk, get the check mark and get back to my platoon.' Was I in denial? Yes. Ashamed? Damned right."

Should he have been? Probably not, he realizes now.

"It took me a long while to accept the fact that I needed help."

Today, Dolson credits his mental health, continued CAF career – and "even that I'm here today" – to a letter he received from Greene, thanking Dolson for saving his life. When Greene wrote a book about his injury and recovery, he presented Dolson's daughter with a signed copy, inscribed to remind her "how your Dad is a hero."

Barb Stegemann, a businesswoman and 14 Wing's honorary colonel, also uses Greene as a touch point: he's her best friend, she was his best man and, if he can cope with the challenges he's faced, she knew she needed to "get

honest, embrace" her hearing impairment and "share that gift."

"I failed a hearing test – but my life suddenly made sense," Stegemann said. Brought up in poverty, her hearing problems were never diagnosed. She was thought stupid, when she couldn't hear instructions; she was thought to be intense,

when she was actually trying to follow body language and read lips; she's loud, "but I think everyone else is deaf, too."

As she leaned in to hear Greene whispering to her during his recovery, she realized she couldn't hear him, couldn't see his lips moving – "and he was really struggling."

"I bit the bullet at age 36 and got hearing aids. Aren't we stubborn?"

Stegemann said she's not sure why people "beat themselves up."

"Sometimes you feel like a failure, but God pushes you against a wall. It is important I accept my hearing impairment as a gift, and push harder."

Des handicaps invisibles qui font la force dans la diversité!

Vous pourriez voir votre point de rupture comme une faiblesse invisible; mais il pourrait également s'agir du point à partir duquel vous dépassez vos limites.

Deux conférenciers qui ont participé, le 5 avril dernier, à la séance sur la diversité du commandant de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, le Colonel Jim Irvine, ont fait part de leurs expériences et de leurs épreuves personnelles au chapitre des « handicaps invisibles ». Le Colonel Irvine a indiqué que le but de sa séance était de présenter des témoignages qui démontrent que « rien de bon n'en ressort sans une dure épreuve » et que les membres des Forces canadiennes – et les autres – « nous acceptent tels que nous sommes – avec nos imperfections ».

« Nous renforçons nos forces et nous transformons ces imperfections en forces. »

L'Adjudant Robert Dolson a refusé pendant plusieurs mois d'admettre qu'il avait des problèmes. L'instructeur à l'École d'infanterie de Gagetown savait qu'il devait être un dur et un membre du club fermé des hommes en tant que soldat du Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry.

« Nous avons tendance à ne pas admettre nos défauts. »

En 2006, lorsque l'Adjudant Dolson s'est levé en plein milieu d'un regroupement de villageois en Afghanistan et a tiré sur un jeune de 16 ans qui venait tout juste de planter sa hache dans le crâne d'un de ses hommes, le Capitaine Trevor Greene, cela a enclenché chez lui une série de troubles de santé mentale qui ont fini par être diagnostiqués comme un traumatisme lié au

stress opérationnel.

« On nous entraîne à réagir », a mentionné l'Adjudant Dolson.

C'est une réaction du point de vue professionnel. Du point de vue personnel, par contre, l'Adjudant Dolson n'a pas bien composé avec les faces à faces à quatre engins explosifs, la pression qu'il s'imposait pour diriger son équipe lors d'excursions et d'attaques – « je pensais que je faisais tout simplement mon boulot » – ni avec la culpabilité et l'inquiétude qu'il ressentait à l'égard des blessures qui ont changé à tout jamais la vie du Capitaine Greene.

« J'ai craqué; je veux dire éclater en sanglots. Je n'avais jamais échoué; j'avais fait tout ce qui était demandé de moi. Mais cet effondrement était pour moi un échec; ce n'était pas un comportement acceptable. »

Ses supérieurs l'ont retiré du terrain.

« Ai-je résisté à l'offre d'aide? Oui, mais je me disais : Je vais retourner leur parler, obtenir l'autorisation de reprendre le service et rejoindre mon peloton. Étais-je en déni? Oui. Est-ce que j'avais honte? Et comment! »

Aurais-t-il dû avoir honte. Probablement non; il le reconnaît maintenant.

« J'ai mis un certain temps à accepter que j'avais besoin d'aide. »

Aujourd'hui, l'Adjudant Dolson attribue son état de santé mentale, la carrière qu'il a poursuivie dans les FC et sa présence ici même à une lettre qu'il a reçue du Capitaine Greene pour le remercier de lui avoir sauvé la vie. Lorsque le Capitaine Greene a écrit un livre au sujet de sa blessure et de sa récupération, il en a présenté un exemplaire signé à la fille de

l'Adjudant Dolson dans lequel il avait écrit [Traduction] « Ton père est un héros », pour qu'elle ne l'oublie jamais.

Madame Barb Stegemann, femme d'affaires et colonel honoraire de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, a aussi le Capitaine Greene comme modèle. Il est son meilleur ami et elle était son garçon d'honneur. Si le Capitaine Greene a pu surmonter les obstacles auxquels il était confronté, Madame Stegemann a réalisé qu'elle devait être honnête et accepter son handicap auditif, et faire profiter les autres de ce cadeau.

« J'ai échoué à un test auditif – mais, ma vie prenait tout à coup tout son sens », a fait savoir Madame Stegemann. Élevée dans la pauvreté, elle n'a jamais reçu un diagnostic de troubles d'audition. Elle se croyait stupide parce qu'elle n'entendait pas bien

les instructions. On la trouvait intense, alors qu'elle essayait tout simplement de comprendre le langage corporel et de lire sur les lèvres des autres. Elle est bruyante, c'est qu'elle croit que tout le monde autour d'elle est sourd.

En se rapprochant du Capitaine Greene qui lui chuchotait pendant sa récupération, elle a réalisé qu'elle ne l'entendait pas; elle ne voyait pas ses lèvres bouger; il avait tellement de difficulté à parler.

« J'ai ravalé ma fierté et obtenu des appareils auditifs à l'âge de 36 ans. Que nous sommes donc têtus! »

Hollywood or reality?
Day or night, over land or sea, near or far, a CP140 Aurora streams live video of a contact in a remote area of interest to a distant commander or data analyst. Answer - this is now reality, right here at 14 Wing Greenwood.

Maritime Patrol and Evaluation Unit (MP&EU) has recently taken the prototype 14 Software Engineering Squadron constructed, and proven through in-flight testing the concept works.

For years, the Aurora has been providing electro-optical/infrared (EO/IR) video recordings of various missions, which have been processed and analyzed post-flight for

transmission to commanders and analysts. The Aurora has also been able to provide on-scene commanders with a live video tactical common data link (TCDL) downlink, through the overland equipment mission suite (OEMS) project (of which 14 SES was also the main software integrator).

Although both of these current capabilities have many obvious advantages, the limitation of intelligence latency due to the requirement for post flight processing and transmission is significant. And, while TCDL offers a significant improvement to this ability to downlink to a theatre commander, its line-of-sight (LOS) limitation is very restrictive. Line-of-sight limits the supportable operations areas and locations where operations may be conducted, and where the commanders and analysts must physically operate from. These disadvantages are quickly being overcome by the new beyond line-of-sight

(BLOS) system developed in large part by 14 SES, and proven through testing by MP&EU Squadron.

The purpose of BLOS is to provide full motion video and data communications capability to the CP140 fleet via a commercial satellite communications uplink, and provide that video and data as a real time feed to a commander or analyst in their operations centre. The main advantages to the commander are they do not need to deploy, and they are able to use home ops centre and staff conveniently and in a secure location for any operational decisions pertaining to the live information being received.

The software algorithms created by 14 SES interface with the new equipment to provide the aircraft's navigation data, which is then used to assist in satellite antenna aiming and stabilization, as well as maintaining signal strength.

There are numerous recent international examples of both overland and over water roles where this capability would have been beneficial for the Canadian Armed Forces, including recent support to the United Nations Support mission in Libya and, prior to that, CAF operations over Bosnia, the former Republic of Yugoslavia and Afghanistan. Domestically, with Canada regularly

hosting major international events such as G8 summits and world sports competitions (the 2010 Vancouver Olympic Games), there is an obligation to protect guests from harm. This capability could also be used for internal security. These, and other scenarios, are all possible roles where a live video and data feed to a remote commander via satellite link could greatly improve currency and quality of information, enhancing the existing OEMS capability by providing BLOS range along with an alternate communication method to the current TCDL.

All of this, of course, can be done in both day and night operating conditions, and across all climactic conditions - from Arctic operations to tropical or even desert environments; at altitudes ranging from sea level to the service ceiling of the aircraft.

The biggest advantage to BLOS will be the improved range - almost world-wide coverage! We are now entering a new age of technology, and 14 Wing Greenwood is proud to be a leader.

RCAF to support joint multinational NATO exercise

More than 900 Canadian sailors, airmen and airwomen of the Canadian Armed Forces departed April 2 to participate in Exercise Joint Warrior, a joint multinational NATO exercise taking place in the United Kingdom from April 15 to 25.

Exercise Joint Warrior is the largest military tactical exercise in Europe and is designed to prepare NATO military forces to work together in a variety of missions from providing humanitarian aid to full-combat operations.

"This exercise presents an excellent opportunity for the Canadian Armed Forces to build and strengthen interoperability and combat effectiveness between Canada's military and our NATO allies," said Defence Minister Peter MacKay.

"Our sailors and aircrew will conduct realistic training to enhance the various tactics, techniques, and procedures that they will employ on behalf of the Government of Canada in a variety of operational scenarios both at home and

abroad."

Exercise Joint Warrior is organized by the United Kingdom and will involve the participation of close to 13,000 military personnel, 55 vessels, and up to 40 aircraft from various NATO nations over a 10-day period.

Her Majesty's Canadian Ships (HMCS) Preserver, Iroquois, and St. John's are accompanied by Royal Canadian Air Force personnel and aircraft, including two CH-124 Sea King helicopters from 12 Wing Shear-

water, on board HMCS Iroquois and HMCS St. John's. In addition, two CP-140 Aurora aircraft from 14 Wing Greenwood and 19 Wing Comox will join the ships in the United Kingdom.

"Exercise Joint Warrior sets the stage for a broad range of evolving crisis and conflict scenarios that could be realistically experienced by our sailors and aircrew in future operations," said Vice-Admiral Paul Maddison, Commander Royal Canadian Navy. "These joint exercises allow participat-

ing NATO forces to become familiar with each other's personnel and platforms, which will pay future dividends as we continue to develop mutual trust and confidence in each other's operational capabilities."

Commodore Darren Hawco, Commander of Canadian Fleet Atlantic, will assume command of one of the main Joint Warrior Task Groups, consisting of six Canadian and United Kingdom warships, demonstrating the Canadian Armed Forces' ability to play a lead

role in international coalition operations.

During the transit of the Atlantic Ocean, the Canadian warships will conduct a series of unit-level and task group-level exercises in preparation for future operations. The high tempo program will provide training and experience to the ships' companies in a wide range of at-sea evolutions, including navigation and seamanship training, helicopter operations, and various simulated combat exercises.

Jeep ownership a museum ‘moment’

14 Wing Commander Colonel Jim Irvine made a series of solemn vows April 5.

Greenwood Military Aviation Museum volunteer Dave Saulnier (retired major), appropriately outfitted in post-Second World War RCAF attire, administered the “Jeep owner’s pledge,” as he presented Irvine

with a 1946 restored Willys Jeep.

Saulnier required Irvine to don white gloves for a mechanical inspection of the antique auto: Irvine, placing his hands on the hood, was requested to raise his right foot and then smartly swing it forward, kicking the tire.

“Will you answer the sacred trust to hold the privilege as owner of this Jeep?” Saulnier asked Irvine.

“You shall never knowingly let it be used as an off-road vehicle.”

Irvine responded – with a slight hesitation – “I do.” “Or kick the Jeep again.”

“I won’t.”
“Or fiddle under the hood?”
“I won’t.”
“You will report to the museum if the museum ever stops leaking oil.”
“I will.”

“You will keep Major Johnson (Wing Heritage Officer) from adding any more decals to the Jeep?”

“I do.”
“You acknowledge that, driving with the windshield down and lips firmly clamped, a June bug at 60 kilometres an hour can still get through.”

“I do.”
“You know this is the best damned example of a restored Jeep in the Canadian Air Force?”

“I do – this is a great Jeep, just wonderful,” Irvine said.

The Jeep was donated by the Ainsworth family and carefully restored by museum volunteers over the past few months. Colin Ainsworth was a driving volunteer force behind the restoration of the Anson aircraft, but died shortly after its

completion in 2009. The fully operational Jeep is a highly anticipated entry in regional parades and auto shows, a work-

ing piece of history that will promote all of the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum’s artefacts and displays.

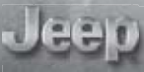
