

## SAR techs hit the ground at Falls Lake

Guests vacationing at Falls Lake Cottages and Campground recently had the chance to observe some of the Canadian Armed Forces' finest in action.

A group from 413 Squadron, 14 Wing Greenwood, occupied several cabins at Falls Lake for some on-the-ground training. This five-day training exercise was led by Sergeant Jason Mackinnon and Warrant Officer Kevin Bergquist, and the 10 exercise participants included mechanical technicians, administration staff, a the snow on the outside for padre and aircrew.

The purpose of the training was to educate the unit in onthe-ground SAR experiences. During the day, personnel worked diligently, snowshoeing through the forest to gather materials required for the construction of a shelter built from sticks, branches and evergreen boughs. They also constructed a snow shelter. simply piling up snow and allowing it to settle for several hours. Then, an entryway was made south-facing to prevent the prevailing north wind from entering the shelter. Sticks were inserted six inches into

thickness guides when hollowing the inside of the shelter. This structure was not only strong, as demonstrated by the group's ability to sit on its roof, but it also provided a warm and cozy retreat from the winter elements

The personnel then constructed a smoke signal to be located by a passing search and rescue Hercules aircraft. When the sound of aircraft engines could be heard overhead, the fire was lit. Billowing smoke high above the tree line allowed the Hercules crew to locate the crew on the ground. After several passes, the Her-

cules flew over at approximately 250 feet and dropped a communication radio 50 feet from the smoke signal's source. This gave the crew on the ground the ability to communicate with the Hercules crew and relay their condition, as well as notify them of any provisions immediately required.

A Cormorant helicopter then flew to the scene, hovering over the staged rescue site and creating blizzard-like conditions from the turbulence of its rotors. Two SAR Techs were lowered into the scene, preparing to stabilize and evacuate the ground crew.

## Miles add up on military march Greenwood team in training for Nijmegen challenge

Many, many miles will be logged by 14 Wing Greenwood's Nijmegen marchers - before they even tackle the actual challenge in July.

Captain Craig Lewis is the team lead, organizing two dozen hopefuls and five months of training to be ready for the largest international marching event. Canada has participated in Niimegen since 1952, and Greenwood is one of 15 teams representing the Canadian Armed Forces in 2013.

"It's a challenge, an opportunity that comes along so rarely in your military career," Lewis says. Even when it does - and Greenwood last had an entry in 2011 - it is never a guarantee. Lewis was a member of the last team but, at 380 kilometres into that year's training schedule, he had to pull out.

"Heartbreaking.

"This year, we have 25 members of the team, and route of the practice marches, we'll whittle that down so the final team will be 11 personnel.

Fourteen people are rolling the dice, just hoping they outlast the guy beside them. I talked a bit about that experience in January at this year's team briefing, along with injury prevention and how to prepare yourself. But, things happen beyond your control."

(Like Lewis' broken toe, recently stubbed against a footstool in his living room....)

The training is arduous: several fitness sessions, individual distance marches and then a couple of major group marches with a 10-kilogram ruck sack in military boots and kit - every week from March on. The demands build, until the team has completed two 40-kilometre marches in two days - and a total of 880 kilometres.

"It's a mindset: I've done 35 kilometres, and it's a bit of work, 40 kilometres, OK – but then you think of doing that again the next day? You have to find your own motivation."

There is small talk along the some singing and even a simple call of the cadence.

Putting another 10 kilometres under their feet, The 14 Wing Greenwood Nijmegen team didn't let a little drizzle stop them April 11.

The 97th Nijmegen March will be held July 16 to 19. and 45,000 marchers from 50 countries will cover 160 kilometres in four days. Lewis says the Greenwood team is "very anxious to get out on

## Unseen links the strengths in diversity

Your breaking point could be seen as an invisible weakness; it could also be the point at which you challenge yourself.

Two guest speakers at 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine's diversity session April 5 shared their experiences with personal issues, on the theme "invisible disabilities." Irvine said his goal was to introduce stories that demonstrate "nothing good comes without a lot of challenge," and Canadian Armed Forces members – and others - "accept we are who we are – including the broken bits.

"We make our strengths stronger, and we build those broken bits into strengths."

Warrant Officer Robert Dolson refused for several months to realize he was in trouble: the Gagetown infantry school instructor knew he was "supposed to be a tough guy, a member of the 'big boys'

Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry.

"We tend not to admit our

When Dolson stood up in 2006 from a village gathering in Afghanistan and shot the 16-year-old boy who had just sunk an axe into the head of one of his men, Captain Trevor Greene, he set in motion cascading mental health issues that resulted in a diagnosed operational stress injury.

"You're trained to react," Dolson said.

That's on a professional level. Personally, Dolson did not deal well with close encounters with four improvised explosive devices, the pressure he placed upon himself to lead his team on excursions and attacks - "doing my job, I thought;" and the guilt and worry he carried for the lifechanging injuries suffered by

"I broke down," Dolson said. "I mean tears. I did not fail at anything they ever asked of me and this, to me, was failure. with the challenges he's faced,

Superiors pulled him out of the field

"Was I resistant to help? Yes, but I thought, 'I'll go talk, get the check mark and get back to my platoon.' Was in denial? Yes. Ashamed? Damned right."

Should he have been? Probably not, he realizes now.

"It took me a long while to accept the fact that I needed help.'

Today, Dolson credits his mental health, continued CAF career - and "even that I'm here today" - to a letter he received from Greene, thanking Dolson for saving his life. When Greene wrote a book about his injury and recovery, he presented Dolson's daughter with a signed copy, inscribed to remind her "how your Dad is a hero.'

Barb Stegemann, a businesswoman and 14 Wing's honorary colonel, also uses Greene as a touch point: he's her best friend, she was his best man and, if he can cope

"I failed a hearing test – but my life suddenly made sense," Stegemann said. Brought up in poverty, her hearing problems were never diagnosed. She was thought stupid, when she couldn't hear instructions; she she knew she needed to "get was thought to be intense,

honest, embrace" her hearing when she was actually trying read lips; she's loud, "but I think everyone else is deaf, too.'

> As she leaned in to hear Greene whispering to her during his recovery, she realized she couldn't hear him, couldn't see his lips moving – "and he was really struggling.

"I bit the bullet at age 36 and got hearing aids. Aren't we stubborn?"

Stegemann said she's not sure why people "beat them-

'Sometimes you feel like a failure, but God pushes you against a wall. It is important I accept my hearing impairment as a gift, and push harder.'

# Des handicaps invisibles qui font la force dans la diversité!

## 14 Wing Greenwood: a leader in technology development

Hollywood or reality?

Day or night, over land or sea, near or far, a CP140 Aurora streams live video of a contact in a remote area of interest to a distant commander or data analyst. Answer - this is now reality, right here at 14 Wing Greenwood.

Maritime Patrol and Evaluation Unit (MP&EU) has recently taken the prototype 14 Software Engineering Squadron constructed, and proven through in-flight testing the concept works.

For years, the Aurora has been providing electro-optical/infrared (EO/IR) video recordings of various missions, which have been processed and analyzed post-flight for

transmission to commanders and analysts. The Aurora has also been able to provide on-scene commanders with a live video tactical common data link (TCDL) downlink, through the overland equipment mission suite (OEMS) project (of which 14 SES was also the main software integrator).

rent capabilities have many obvious advantages, the limitation of intelligence latency due to the requirement for post flight processing and transmission is significant. And, while TCDL offers a significant improvement to this ability to downlink to a theatre commander, its line-of-sight (LOS) limitation is very restrictive. Line-ofsight limits the supportable operations areas and locations where operations may be conducted, and where the commanders and analysts must physically operate from. These disadvantages are quickly being overcome by the new beyond line-of-sight

Although both of these cur- (BLOS) system developed in large part by 14 SES, and created by 14 SES interface proven through testing by MP&EU Squadron.

The purpose of BLOS is to provide full motion video and data communications capability to the CP140 fleet via a commercial satellite communications uplink, and provide that video and data as a real time feed to a commander or analyst in their operations centre. The main advantages to the commander are they do not need to deploy, and they are able to use home ops centre and staff conveniently and in a secure location for any operational decisions pertaining to the live information being received.

The software algorithms with the new equipment to provide the aircraft's navigation data, which is then used to assist in satellite antenna aiming and stabilization, as well as maintaining signal strength.

There are numerous recent international examples of both overland and over water roles where this capability would have been beneficial for the Canadian Armed Forces, including recent support to the United Nations Support mission in Libya and, prior to that, CAF operations over Bosnia, the former Republic of Yugoslavia and Afghanistan. Domes-

tically, with Canada regularly hosting major international events such as G8 summits and world sports competitions (the 2010 Vancouver Olympic Games), there is an obligation to protect quests from harm. This capability could also be used for internal security. These, and other scenarios, are all possible roles where a live video and data feed to a remote commander via satellite link could greatly improve currency and quality of information, enhancing the existing OEMS capability by providing BLOS range along with an alternate communication method to the current TCDL.

All of this, of course, can be done in both day and night operating conditions, and across all climactic conditions - from Arctic operations to tropical or even desert environments; at altitudes ranging from sea level to the service ceiling of the aircraft.

The biggest advantage to BLOS will be the improved range - almost world-wide coverage! We are now entering a new age of technology, and 14 Wing Greenwood is proud to be a leader.

## Anson addition highlights museum's commitment to Air Force history

Frank Honey (chief warrant officer retired) wore his RCAF uniform, living history on hand as the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum officially opened the new indoor home for its restored Anson aircraft April 5.

"This was the first airplane I flew in the military in 1942 in Ontario, and I'm proud to be here today," he said.

Representing today's RCAF, 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine was joined by special guests Brigadier-General Bruce Ploughman, deputy commander 1 Canadian Air Division, and Warrant Officer Caelam McHaffie, 154 Anson Squadron Royal Canadian Air Cadets, of Amherst; as Ploughman and Honey cut the museum addition's opening ribbon.

The extension will also eventually house the museum's restoration-in-progress, a Bolingbroke aircraft.
