Greenwood radar upgrade on horizon


The "golf ball" on the Valley horizon, overlooking 14 Wing Greenwood from the North Mountain, is in line for some new radar technology.

West Nova MP Greg Kerr was at the base April 11 to announce \$10.8 million in upgrades, part of a \$75.5 million Royal Canadian Air Force project at seven airfields across the country.

Captain Stephen Vallis, the Wing Telecommunications and Information Services operations officer, says the new technology will improve Greenwood's capability in area surveillance radar and secondary surveillance radar. ASR, used by 14 Wing air traffic control personnel, sends out a signal and brings back information for a display of what aircraft are in the region's air space. SSR collects signals from those aircraft's transponders and feeds further information to the control tower. The improvements will take 1980s-era analog technology and add capabilities, including being able to export data to North Bay for Canadian Armed Forces' NORAD commitments.

"Surveillance radar here in Greenwood is very important for our Air Force and our allies – this base figures very prominently in our allies' work," said Wing Commander Colonel Jim Irvine.

Greenwood's radar improvements will get underway in 2016, closer to the end of an expected three- to four-year project cycle.



First to face the FORCE 14 Wing command team steps up for new fitness challenge

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine led the way, as his command team went through an initial run of the new Canadian Armed Forces' fitness test April 8.

What's the verdict after the four skills in the new FORCE test?

"I passed – and I can always do better!

"That's a good workout, that's for sure. It's a challenge."

Personnel Support Program staff at Greenwood's Fitness and Sports Centre organized the commanding officers' briefing and trial test following two weeks of familiarization scheduled through March. Another week at the end of April, and then likely monthly opportunities through 2013, will give all 14 Wing personnel the chance to try their fitness levels against the new standards before they become official in April 2014.

"We're way ahead of the game here in Greenwood," Fitness and Sports Centre director Fred Williams said. "We're ready to go. This is a busy year ahead: we have 1,600 people who will attempt the new test, and we will also use the old test (EXPRES) for people who won't make the new standard – and we'll have all the classes and remedial classes on the go to have people ready."

Williams said, until 2014's implementation, though, the goal is education.

"Our goal at the end of this is 100 per cent success."

Williams was particularly pleased to see Greenwood's leaders step up to the plate in the April 8 run-through.

"You are coming out and doing it, and it's great you're all buying in. It makes our job easier when you back us, and it shows your troops, 'If they can do it.' I can do it.""

FORCE in action

Project FORCE tasks reflect the most common physical tasks of a fully deployable CAF member:

- picking and digging
- · escape to cover
- · pickets and wire carry
- sand bag fortification
- · stretcher carry
- · vehicle extrication

The FORCE test simulations are predictors of the common tasks:

- a sand bag lift (in three minutes, 30 seconds, lift a 20-kilogram sand bag and touch a point on the wall 91.5 centimetres off the ground; take a side step, do it again – a total of 30 lifts
- · intermittent loaded shuttle (carry a sand bag 40 metres walking, drop it and run or walk the next 40 metres; pick up the sand bag and do it again four times in under five minutes 21 seconds)
- sand bag drag (without stopping, drag 90 kilograms of sand bag weight 20 metres)
- 20 metre rushes (in under 51 seconds, start from a prone position, sprint 10 metres, drop to the prone position; repeat every 10 metres over an 80 metre distance. Hands must come off the floor in each prone position)

of Canadian Armed Forces Employment) is the first major overhaul of the CAF fitness standard in 30 years. Greenwood PSP manager Mike Taylor said this is the fourth protocol he's seen - as a former CAF member, a national fitness manager and now PSP supervisor – in his career.

"Project FORCE is a scientific standard, it takes about 400 military tasks and pares them down to six common capabilities – and this test will test for those," Taylor said.

"All elements – Navy, Army, Air sions and sending the feedback to

Force – will all be doing the same the national office for analysis. There test, and that's one of the best things seen about this new test."

Another big change: there are no age- or gender-based adjustments to the FORCE test. The challenge will be there for older or smaller CAF members, certainly, but Taylor reminded Greenwood COs successful participants in these categories will be "demonstrating tremendous relative strength."

Williams' staff is collecting information from all Greenwood personnel trying the familiarization seshave already been a few tweaks to the test, and Williams expects there could be more before the April 2014 implementation.

In the meantime, PSP staff members are keen to advise CAF members at 14 Wing on personal fitness goals, even beyond the FORCE testing changes. Certified fitness instructors, the well-equipped Fitness and Sports Centre, branch PT, individual program counselling and the national Dfit.ca web resource make up an "exercise prescription." Taylor said.

Premier essai de l'évaluation FORCE

L'équipe du commandement de la 14^e Escadre relève le défi du nouveau test d'aptitude physique

Le Colonel Jim Irvin, commandant de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, a ouvert la voie avec son équipe de commandement en faisant l'essai du nouveau test d'aptitude physique des Forces armées canadiennes (FAC), le 8 avril dernier

Quel est le verdict après les quatre épreuves de l'évaluation FORCE?

« J'ai passé – et je peux faire mieux! C'est un bon exercice, c'est certain. C'est un défi. »

Les employés du Programme de soutien du personnel (PSP) du Centre de conditionnement physique et de sports de Greenwood ont organisé la séance d'information et le test d'essai de l'équipe de commandement après deux semaines de familiarisation en mars. CAF renewal opportunity to do military business better

The Canadian Armed Forces has done its part to reduce the federal deficit in recent years, through several rounds of budget evaluations and reductions.

Now, members of the CAF and Department of National Defence are asking their own questions about how to spend the budget they have better.

The reward? Think efficiencies, think non-duplication of efforts and programs, think saved dollars for new priorities and equipment, training and operations, infrastructure improvements.

"What's important is for us to be part of the process," 14 Wing **Greenwood Commander Colonel** Jim Irvine urged an audience of his personnel April 9, as the Defence Renewal Team hosted a town hall and a series of focus groups to gather feedback on what would make the CAF faster. better and stronger.

"We're not talking about cuts, but, rather, efficiencies," Irvine said. "If we can find ways to reduce things that don't make sense, or do our business smarter, that's a great thing."

The Defence Renewal Team's co-leads - Kevin Lindsey, the chief financial officer for the Department of National Defence, and Rear-Admiral Andrew Smith, former chief of military personnel - spent the day at 14 Wing, their second stop of a 12-base tour across Canada.

Smith and Lindsey both agree the federal government is committed to the work of the CAF and DND; whether that work is being done in the best, most costeffective manner is a "lingering, nagging concern," Smith said.

"We want to enable the confidence of government in what
