Flight engineer reaches 10,000 flying hours

Warrant Officer George Jamieson. 404 Squadron

There is always much fanfare when a new flight engineer receives his wings and, years ago, there was always a big deal as older flight engineers hit certain milestones: 1,000, 2,500, 5,000 or one year in the air (8,760 hours). Very few then - and even fewer now - achieve the incredible marker of 10,000 hours (one vear, one month, three weeks and 14 hours) of flight time.

Master Warrant Officer Karl Derhak of 404 (Long Range at 14 Wing Greenwood is one of these special people.

Derhak began the flying portion of his career as a young, eager flight engineer on the CH 124 Sea King helicopter in 1980. After logging 1,266.7 hrs with 406 Squadron, he moved on to the CP 140 Aurora and started flying with 415 Squadron in May 1985. Over the next 13 years, along with a posting to 404 Squadron, he amassed an amazing 5.538.1 hours on the Aurora. Newly go to get 10,000 hours on the promoted to master warrant of- Aurora!"


ficer and anxious to accept a new challenge, he transferred over to the CH 146 Griffon helicopter and flew another 431 hours. He was transferred back to the Aurora with 405 Squadron, continuing from there to 404 Squadron until his retirement from the Regular

After a few short months, Derhak came back in the guise of a Reserve member, and continues to fly and instruct new flight engineer students at 404 Squadron. As of April 19, he had flown 2,765 hours to bring his total up to 10,000.8.

During the milestone flight, Patrol & Training) Squadron here Derhak was presented with a special patch the flight engineers section had made for this occasion by Captain Mary Cameron-Kelly, a colleague and 404 Squadron pilot ilnstructor. Derhak and crew were met on the ramp in Greenwood by many of his friends and co-workers with congratulations, all to help him celebrate this great achievement.

The event annually draws over 40.000 marchers from 50 different nations and is witnessed by over one million spectators.







Familiar faces change **WNSR** roles

Members of the West Nova Scotia Regiment who witnessed a change of command ceremony April 13 at Camp Aldershot didn't see many new faces.

Out-going commanding officer Lieutenant-Colonel George Thomson, after 27 years with the regiment, was replaced by Lieutenant-Colonel Todd Harris, who joined the regiment just one year later.

"I stand here today sad, after 27 years in this uniform, but happy because I leave my regiment in such great shape I'm proud of everything you have accomplished, and I was a part of," Thomson said, with obvious emotion. "Command of soldiers is the highest honour anyone can bestow, and some of the very best are here today. In my military career, I was never so proud as when I was talking about you."

the Annapolis Valley Regional School Board and an Aylesford resident, has enjoyed every leadership position in the WNSR throughout his years with the unit.

Taking over from him is Harris, the acting CO through 2012 while Thomson was deployed with Operation Hamlet in Haiti. Harris thanked the Reserve regiment members for supporting him in that role, "rising to the occasion when we put more on you."

He acknowledged his long relationship with Thomson, and said their combined training, leadership experiences and focus on the regiment will ensure an easy command transition. Training will continue to be a high priority: "the next domestic operation could be right around the corner and, while Canada is pulling out of Afghanistan, we could be needed somewhere else in a moment."

Colonel James Camsell, commander of 36 Canadian Brigade Group, was the parade's reviewing officer. May 11, Thomson will be installed in Camsell's place.

Bending steel to build new skills

"Deployment for training" (DFT) is not new to the members of 14 Construction Engineering Squadron (14 CES), as they have participated in numerous such exchanges to the United States over the past 15 years. Members of 14 CES have taken on construction projects in Arkansas, California, Georgia, Texas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Florida, Pennsylvania and Arizona. 14 CES last deployed to North Carolina in 2011.

So it was sort of "routine" when 26 members, along with two firefighters from 14 Wing Greenwood and one captain from 192 Construction Engineering Flight, Aldergrove, BC; deployed via military airlift to Stanly County, North Carolina March 11. There were three projects in support of the 145th Civil Engineer Squadron (145 CES) of the North Carolina Air National Guard (NCANG), and the 14 CES team took over the work initiated by a team from 3 Wing Bagotville. 145 CES is a unit of the 145 Airlift Wing of the NCANG. There are a number of ambitious and ongoing construction projects to enhance the training capacity and capabilities of the 145 CES Regional Training Site (RTS). The North Carolina RTS is one

USAF. Air National Guard and US Army Special Forces.

A new two-storey barracks ("double decker Hooches" is the suggested American nomenclature) will house 40 personnel when completed. The 14 CES team completed the majority of the electrical, insulation, flooring, ventilation and finish works. Final works will be conducted by an ANG

The team from 3 Wing was able to erect the walls and install the doors of a 30 foot by 60 foot two-storey, steelframe, metal clad building prior to the arrival of the 14 CES team. A small team of per-

USA, used for training by the the roof and the overhead door mechanism, 145 CES intends to complete the remaining work by using the skills of an ANG CES at a later date. The building, once completed, will be used as a large fire training classroom.

Erecting a new steel-shell building was a challenge. The UBM (Ultimate Building Machine) held by 145 CES had not been used in six years, so there were concerns about the internal bending mechanisms and the computer software. Adding to the concerns was the fact the host unit wanted to try erecting a building using a design they had never attempted before. After a day sonnel from 91 CEF (Gander) of trial and error, the team of of only two such sites in the and 144 CEF (Pictou) installed Sergeant Ellis and Corporal

Cook (both of 143 CEF Lunenburg), with the assistance of Lieutenant-Colonel Tim Moran, the commanding officer of 145 CES, were able to work out the software and mechanical bugs. Steel was cut, bent into arches and swung into place at a rapid pace with the entire team working to 2100 on a Friday night. When the time came for 14 CES to leave the worksite, all arches were in place, water and sewer lines had been run and buried and the ground was ready to accept fibre re-enforced concrete for a floor. Completion of the building, which will be fitted out as a gym, will be done by an ANG CES.

While in North Carolina, the team members were housed on-site in eight-person rooms, with a military cook from 3 Wing and three cooks from the NCANG looking after them. Some of the team members took time over the St Patrick's Day weekend to visit some of the local attractions. The Charlotte Motor Speedway (NAS-CAR) drew some attention, as did the city of Charlotte. The humungous Bass Pro Shop in Concord lured in most of the folks at sometime during the deployment.

The team members gained valuable experience in crosstrades training, heavy equipment operations, deployment planning and execution, production and safety supervision, problem solving and all materials made available

working with our American by 145 CES. They worked like counterparts. Valuable lessons were also learned about using RCAF airlift when crossing international boundaries. This was a deployment for "training" and not tied to a production end state. That being said, it was noted by our American hosts the members of 14 CES did dedicate themselves to the construction tasks, using

sled-dogs and had fun.

14 CES is headquartered in Bridgewater and encompasses three semi-autonomous units - 91 CEF (Gander), 143 CEF (Lunenburg County) and 144 CEF (Pictou). Since being stood-up in 1994, personnel of 14 CES have served or trained in every province and territory in Canada. They have also served in over 25 countries.

Valley health care efforts add up

The Valley Regional Hospital Foundation helped to improve health care by committing \$350,000 to support new equipment and services between April 1, 2012 and March 31.

The two largest contributions in the past year were \$137,000 for 46 cardiac monitors and \$130,000 for a new CT (computed tomography) scanner. Additional contributions included \$20,000 for the family practice residency program, \$10,000 for a portable glide scope for the emergency department, sleeper chairs for the intensive care and palliative care units, bereavement supplies for palliative care, vital signs monitor, vaccine fridge and breast pump for maternal child, glucose monitor and otoscope for the diabetes centre, phlebotomy chair for the laboratory and an upgrade to ventilators for respiratory.

The Valley Regional Hospital Foundation continues to work jointly with the Valley Hospice Foundation raising \$8 million for Our Community Our Health, which now stands at \$6.7 million, to support construction of a hospice and palliative care centre and redevelopment projects at Valley Regional Hospital.







Learning to replace a bridge washed-out by a hurricane takes practice - but hurricanes don't happen every day. Fortunately, less critical bridging opportunities do sometimes present themselves.

Students from the Canadian Forces School of Military Engineering (CFSME) at CFB Gagetown recently had the chance to exercise their bridging skills at the 14 Wing Greenwood Golf Club.

From March 15 to 17, combat engineering students from the school's Liri Troop decked, fabricated and installed railings for a new bridge across the Annapolis River, which cuts through the course.

"They gained a real appreciation for attention to detail, the value of concurrent activity and initiative, and possible solutions to problems with bridging they will likely face in the future," said Liri Troop Commander Captain Mackenzie Smith.

Working under the guidance of their course non-commissioned officers and the

construction technicians from Wing Construction Engineering at 14 Wing Greenwood, the 50 students used skills they learned on course, explained Smith. More importantly, they participated in "a real build," which included learning to overcome the missteps and unavoidable pitfalls inherent in any construction project.

In the case of this bridge, massive steel beams had to be reshaped using cargo straps and a hydraulic jack, new holes had to be drilled to attach the vertical and horizontal braces and, when the students arrived, they had to wear hip waders because rain and warm weather combined to overflow the banks of the river and flood the work area with two feet of water.

"The Greenwood Golf Course non-standard bridge (NSB) will not be the last built by the Liri Troop Sappers in their careers," said Smith. "Many of the skills gained in constructing and troubleshooting an NSB are readily transferable to deployed operations. Ask any combat engineer who deployed to Afghanistan in a field troop, and you will hear of an instance of improvised (non-standard) gap crossing."

An added benefit of the build was helping the community. The 14 Wing Greenwood Golf Club is north-east of the main runway at CFB Greenwood. The course was created in 1959 for the military and surrounding community. Today, it is a full-service, 18-hole golf course considered by many to be one of the most challenging courses in the Annapolis Valley. The golf course crosses the Annapolis River twice. The new bridge replaced an old, unstable Hole 8 bridge damaged by years of erosion and no longer able to support any vehicle larger than a golf cart. The new 25-metre bridge is built with steel girders, pressure-treated beams, planks, guardrails and reinforced concrete abutments. Now, instead of shaking under the weight of a golf cart, it can easily support maintenance vehicles weighing up to five tons.

"By undertaking domestic projects, we allow the public to understand the value the military brings in domestic emergencies and overseas humanitarian crises, beyond our primary roles of defending Canada and contributing to international peace and security," said Smith.
