Sharing flight safety know-how

The career experience, knowledge and hands-on thinking that make up comprehensive flight safety standards needs to be shared.

Colonel Yvan Choiniere and

Bolduc from the Royal Canadian Air Force's Directorate of Flight Safety were at 14 Wing Greenwood April 16 through 18, making presentations on recent incidents and investigations, but also to bolster the idea of coaching and supervision.

"Our Air Force is young, Master Warrant Officer Vince many of our people have a lot of

experience under the pressures of combat time," Choiniere said. "Forty per cent of our people have 10 years or less left, and our young people are keen - and they need guidance."

He urged senior RACF personnel to "pass that experience along so they don't make our mistakes.'

Even further, though, Bolduc said age and experience don't munity Centre staff are inviting to come out and support our matter if someone - anvone spots a flight safety issue.

"It could be knowledge from a private to a sergeant, from someone in your crew who is a subject expert to the newcomer," Bolduc said. "Knowledge has to be shared."

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Partager le savoir-faire en matière de sécurité des vols

L'expérience professionnelle. les connaissances et la conception pratique, qui contribuent à l'établissement de normes de sécurité des vols complètes, doivent être partagées.

Le colonel Yvan Choiniere et l'adjudant-maître Vince Bolduc, de la Direction de la sécurité des vols de l'Aviation rovale du Canada (ARC), étaient à la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, du 16 au 18 avril, pour faire des exposés sur les récents incidents et enquêtes de sécurité, mais également pour soutenir les idées d'encadrement et de supervision.

Flight safety ...

The men said focusing on supervision through 2012 may have something to do with a decrease in personnel- caused flight safety incidents. The directorate was called in to 14 Wing three times in the last three years, looking into incidents "and learning a lot," Choiniere said.

What's reportable? Flight maintenance concerns to personnel injuries on the ground or in the air – whether they actually happen, or could have.

"The intent is for people to report so we can all learn about it and keep it from happening again," Choiniere said.

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


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Clean the grill for taste and hygiene






