Wing 'show and tell' for community leaders

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine hosted a "show and tell" May 29 for Valley VIPS, including a host of local and regional politicians.

"It's been a great idea as a tradition to invite as many people as possible to the base, so folks can have an opportunity to do an exchange, meet each other and talk about what we do," Irvine said, as he welcomed over a dozen guests to a lunch at the Annapolis Mess, followed by drop-ins at 413 and 405 squadrons, and a visit to the simulator at 404 Squadron. The day also included an "open house" at one of the Residential Housing Units.

Irvine said the base as a whole values the community relationships it has with the Valley.

"14 Wing appreciates the community, and your support of the base and the personnel who live on it."

He took the opportunity to present a cheque worth \$127,500 to the group, reflective of the many communities who will benefit from a portion of the 2012 achievement of Combined Charities, the base's

charitable arm.

"There are lots of things we do to support the local community – charities, various fundraising initiatives such as Terry Fox and the Relay for Life, and the numbers of volunteers – it's pretty amazing, and we're proud to take part in the activities that raise these funds."

Combined Charities includes several dozen organizations and causes close to 14 Wing personnel, from youth sport and schools to health causes and safety programs. Seventy to 80 per cent of the funds are put directly into the local

community.

Irvine introduced Lieutenant-Colonel Brian Richardson, the commanding officer of Wing Logistics and Engineering, as his "go to" representative as groups, the business community and others are looking for information about the base.

"He is a resource for you folks, here to help you and someone you will know if you have a question."

Richardson took over the session, providing guests with an overview of the base's day-to-day operations and roles within the Canadian

Armed Forces. He reiterated Irvine's comments regarding the base's role in the community, and backed it up with some numbers.

"14 Wing is the Annapolis Valley's largest single-site employer, with 1,623 Regular and 202 Reserve forces members, and 450 civilian employees – that's 2,275 people," Richardson said. "These are well-trained and competitive people, well-travelled – and will travel where the goods are, even groceries. Their salaries represent buying power."

He listed the economic potentials of base operational

spending, infrastructure work and payments in lieu of taxes.

Valley Chamber of Commerce member and Middleton businessman John Bartlett asked, if 40 per cent of contractors who do pick up base work are from the Valley, how do they get that work?

"It is an automated process, and it's on the shoulders of folks to tap into that with Public Works. There is likely some work we can do with potential suppliers, perhaps through the chamber of commerce, to let them know the process."

Judy Rafuse, a chamber of commerce staffer, asked about

the ratio of military personnel living on base versus the wider community.

Lieutenant-Colonel Heber Gillam, wing administration officer, said the base's Residential Housing Units appear to be running about 95 per cent occupancy, housing about 570 families. That means another 1,000 or so families are living off base, generally between Middleton and Aylesford.

Irvine said, one of the main reasons for that – and he's in the same position, as families posting in from other parts of Canada are facing unfriendly real estate markets: "most

Puttin' on the green Camp challenge a prize worth trying

Any known allergies to smoke?

The pain will be gone tomorrow.

And, a warning: the simulated ammunition could "sting."

But it was all part of the fun for Greg Trefry, a New Minas businessman who bought himself a day of army "fun" at Camp Aldershot June 2.

Camp Aldershot put up the prize during the Our Community, Our Health fundraising gala dinner earlier this spring, and Trefry was the highest bidder. Escorted into camp, Trefry was outfitted in fatigues and led through a rifle and machine gun shoot, an urban assault simulation and other Army actions, transported in a LAV along with radio personality Hunter Brule in the camp's first "Commando Challenge."

"We've hosted the gala before, and really appreciate Mr. Trefry's support," said Major Troy Kennedy, as he welcomed combatants to Camp Aldershot.

"This is all in fun, and we want you to enjoy yourself and have a little bit of the experience of what we do here."

More down to business, though, Kennedy had a few cautionary words: "Pay really close attention to the folks in the

real green: all of the stuff we're going to be asking you to do, it's for your safety. And, if they ask you urgently, do it quickly."

Representatives from the Valley Health Foundation and Trefry's wife were also on hand for the afternoon's adventure, put together by about 25 camp personnel manning the various exercises around the facility.

"I've been in the camp before over the years, for events and Rotary things," Trefry said. "I used to hunt, shooting shot guns and rifles, and I shot handguns competitively, but I've never had any involvement with the military.

"This is quite a different perspective!"

L'Escadre en vitrine pour les dirigeants communautaires

Le commandant de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, le colonel Jim Irvine, était l'hôte le 29 mai de personnalités de marque de la Vallée, y compris de nombreux politiciens locaux et régionaux.

« C'est une belle idée et une belle tradition que d'inviter autant de personnes que possible à la base, de façon à ce que les gens aient l'occasion d'échanger, de se rencontrer et de parler de ce que nous faisons », a expliqué le Col Irvine, qui recevait plus d'une douzaine d'invités pour le repas du midi au mess Annapolis, suivi de brèves visites des 413^e et 405^e Escadrons, et une démonstration du simulateur au 404^e Escadron. La journée incluait aussi une activité « portes ouvertes » à l'une des unités de logement résidentiel.

Le Col Irvine a déclaré que la base dans son ensemble considère comme précieuses les relations communautaires qu'elle entretient avec la Vallée. « La 14^e Escadre apprécie la communauté et l'appui que vous accordez à la base ainsi qu'au personnel qui y vit. »

Il a profité de l'occasion pour présenter un chèque d'une valeur de 127 500 \$ au groupe, lequel était représentatif des nombreuses communautés qui profiteront d'une partie des fruits du travail en 2012 des Oeuvres de bienfaisance, l'entité charitable de la base.

« Nous faisons beaucoup de choses pour appuyer la communauté locale – des œuvres caritatives, diverses initiatives de collecte de fonds telles que la course Terry Fox et le Relais pour la vie et les nombreux bénévoles – c'est assez extraordinaire, et nous sommes fiers de prendre part aux activités qui permettent de recueillir ces fonds. »

Les œuvres de bienfaisance englobent plusieurs dizaines d'organisations et de causes chères au personnel de la 14^e Escadre, des sports pour les jeunes et des écoles aux causes liées à la santé et aux programmes de sécurité. Soixante-dix ou quatre-vingt pour cent des fonds sont versés directement à la communauté locale.

Le Col Irvine a déclaré que la base dans son ensemble considère comme précieuses les relations communautaires qu'elle entretient avec la Vallée.

« La 14^e Escadre apprécie la communauté et l'appui que vous

accordez à la base ainsi qu'au personnel qui y vit. »

Le Col Irvine a présenté le lieutenant-colonel Brian Richardson, commandant de la Logistique et du Génie de l'Escadre, comme « la » personne à qui les groupes, la communauté des affaires et les autres peuvent s'adresser pour obtenir de l'information sur la base.

« Il est une ressource à votre disposition, messieurs dames, il est ici pour vous aider et une personne à qui vous pourrez vous adresser si vous avez une question. »

Le Lcol Richardson a alors pris la parole, et a donné aux invités un aperçu des opérations quotidiennes de la base et de ses rôles dans les Forces armées canadiennes. Il a réitéré les commentaires du Col Irvine concernant le rôle de la base dans la communauté, chiffres à l'appui.

« La 14^e Escadre est le plus grand employeur en un seul emplacement de la vallée de l'Annapolis, et compte 1 623 membres de la Force régulière, 202 membres de la Réserve et 450 employés civils – cela représente 2 275 personnes », de dire le Lcol Richardson.

« Ce sont des personnes bien formées qui ont l'esprit de compétition, qui ont beaucoup voyagé – et qui vont là où les marchandises se trouvent, même l'épicerie. Leurs salaires représentent un important pouvoir d'achat. »

Il a fait état du potentiel économique des dépenses de fonctionnement de la base, des travaux d'infrastructure et des paiements en remplacement d'impôts.

John Bartlett, un membre de la Chambre de commerce de la Vallée et homme d'affaires de Middleton, a posé la question suivante : si 40 pour 100 des entrepreneurs qui reçoivent du travail de la base viennent de la Vallée, comment obtiennent-ils ce travail ?

« Il s'agit d'un processus automatisé, et il incombe aux gens d'en explorer les possibilités avec Travaux publics. Il y a probablement du travail que nous pouvons faire avec les fournisseurs potentiels, peut-être par l'entremise de la chambre de commerce, pour leur faire connaître le processus. »

Judy Rafuse, un membre du personnel de la chambre de commerce, a demandé quelle est la proportion de militaires qui vivent à la base par rapport à la communauté en général.

Le lieutenant-colonel Heber Gillam, officier de l'Administration de l'Escadre, a expliqué que les unités de logement résidentiel de la base sont occupées à environ 95 pour 100 de leur capacité, et hébergent environ 570 familles. Cela veut dire que quelque 1 000 familles vivent à l'extérieur de la base, généralement entre Middleton et Aylesford.

Le Col Irvine a dit que l'une des principales raisons pour cela – et il est dans la même position – est le fait que de nombreuses familles qui arrivent en affectation d'autres parties du Canada se trouvent dans

des marchés immobiliers peu favorables, « et la plupart d'entre elles ne peuvent pas vendre la maison qu'ils sont sur le point de quitter. » La population des ULR est par conséquent plus âgée. De l'autre côté, « les gens qui arrivent en affectation achètent des maisons ici. »

Le député provincial de Kings North, Jim Morton, a demandé quelle est l'association de la 14^e Escadre avec le Camp Aldershot. Le Col Irvine a répondu que la responsabilité de la base est celle d'un propriétaire : « Nous avons la responsabilité de l'infrastructure – le chauffage, l'éclairage, les commissionnaires. Le Secteur de l'Atlantique de la Force terrestre s'occupe de tout l'entraînement qui s'y déroule. »

Le fardeau de l'infrastructure est lourd, de répondre le Col Irvine à une question du député provincial de Kings West, Leo Glavine, à propos de l'accès au secteur des opérations de la 14^e Escadre par l'entrée arrière.

« Les membres du personnel qui vivent à Aylesford, Berwick et Kentville comptent vraiment sur cette entrée arrière pour se rendre au travail – cela peut ajouter de 10 à 15 minutes à leur journée s'ils doivent faire le tour. Les exigences de sécurité à cette entrée sont élevées en raison de nos rôles du NORAD – il doit y avoir quelqu'un qui la contrôle si elle demeure ouverte, et des réductions ont été faites au budget que nous avons pour cela. »

Le Col Irvine a décidé récemment de fermer l'entrée, à compter du 1^{er} juillet, pour absorber les réductions budgétaires : « Si je ne coupais pas l'entrée arrière, je devrais couper ailleurs. »

of them can't sell their home from where they're coming from." The RHU population is, reflectively, older. On the other hand, "new people posting in are buying homes here."

Kings North MLA Jim Morton asked about 14 Wing's association with Camp Aldershot. Irvine replied the base's responsibility is that of a landlord: "we're responsible for the infrastructure – the heat, the lights, the commissioners. Land Force Atlantic looks after all the training that takes place there."

The burden of infrastructure is heavy, Irvine added in response to a question from Kings West MLA Leo Glavine about 14 Wing's back gate access to the operations area.

"Personnel who live in Aylesford, Berwick and Kentville really rely on that back gate to get to work – it can add 10 to 15 minutes to their day if they have to come around. Security requirements at that gate are high due to our NORAD roles – it has to be manned, and there has been a cutback in how much money we have for that."

Irvine made a recent decision to close the gate, effective July 1, to take in budget restraints: "I either cut the back gate, or somewhere else."

First serial of Block III conversion training complete

After a long period of design, development and delivery, the first serial of CP140M conversion training (CT) was completed following a final check ride June 7.

The training, conducted by the 14 Wing Block III Implementation Flight (B3IF) is the culmination of a significant effort by a small team of highly-dedicated and committed individuals who have been a key part of Block III Combined Test Force (CTF), operational evaluations and system testing.

The course consisted of three training phases for AESOP and ACSO students: distance learning, ground-based simulation and flying. Students were formed into two crews, the first being a standards and training crew consisting of highly-experienced members of 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training)

Squadron, 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron, 14 Software Engineering Squadron and LRPSET; and the second a line crew from 405 Squadron. For pilots and flight engineers, the conversion was much shorter in duration and allowed for many more students to be trained concurrently. In fact, 75 per cent of pilots and all flight engineers from 404 Squadron are now qualified to operate the CP140M.

The standards and training crew will be called upon to continue to develop and improve conversion training while augmenting the Block III Implementation Flight (B3IF), as CT 1 is expected to commence July 8. In the meantime, the current B3IF members will get back to work on their own proficiency, as well as preparing for the next training serial.

CT 1 will consist of two crews of 404 Squadron instructors, thus leading to the majority of 404 Squadron being CP140M

qualified and ready to develop a Block III Multi-Mission Operational AircREW Training (MOAT) course.

Now fully qualified, the first 405 Squadron line crew is headed out the door to Cold Lake to participate in Exercise MAPLE FLAG. Labelled the "premier air-power exercise of the RCAF," MAPLE FLAG will provide an ideal venue to showcase many of the CP140M capabilities, while further sharpening and enhancing newly acquired skill sets from CT.

Working behind the scenes, often putting in extra hours to get the course ready, were many members who, over the past three years, were hand-picked to carry out this key transitional task: Captain Jeff Hallam, deputy flight commander/ tactical navigator; Captain Paul Janes, pilot and LRPCC; Flight Lieutenant Rich Jones, tactical navigator and LRPCC; Captain Jan Douglas,

NavCom and LRPCC; Captain Phil Thomas, tactical navigator instructor; Captain Marc Battram, NavCom instructor; Captain John Bernardi, NavCom instructor; Captain Bruce Jarvis, pilot and LRPCC; Captain Andy Holden, lessons learned/ reports; Warrant Officer Rob Butt, lead AESOp/ instructor; Warrant Officer Duane Osmond, acoustic instructor; Sergeant Paul Bourgoin, flight engineer instructor; Sergeant Stu Greenslade, AES Op instructor; Sergeant Alan Marjoribanks, acoustic instructor; Sergeant Bob Legere, AES Op instructor; Sergeant Jeff Brown, AES Op instructor. Posted out before the training

could be conducted, but still a key part of the transition, was Captain Martin Labb  , acoustics and deputy flight commander.

The maintenance team has been a critical part of ensuring technician training and system support is in place to ensure the CP140M is employable. The current team entails: Major Gord Colwell, Master Warrant Officer Rob O'Brien, Warrant Officer Al Verstichelen, Sergeant Kenny Caldwell and Charlie Ross. Posted out or retired before training commenced were Major Ken Kohler, Major Al Baillie and Warrant Officer Bob Trimm.

D-Day and the Royal Canadian Air Force

It was a maximum effort for the crews of Bomber Command's No. 6 (Royal Canadian Air Force) Group on the night of June 5 and 6, 1944.

A force of 190 aircraft comprised of Avro Lancaster and Handley Page Halifax four-engine heavy bombers flew 230 sorties in support of pre-D-Day invasion operations. A large number of targets were struck, with particular attention to the German coastal

artillery emplacements on the beachhead. In all, over 870 tons of high explosives were dropped for the loss of one Canadian Halifax.

RCAF fighter and fighter-bomber squadrons went into action providing support to the Canadian ground forces as the invasion kicked into high gear. The deafening sounds of the aerial activity over Normandy resembled clouds of locust: the planes just kept coming and coming. An estimated 1,000 aircraft from 39 of the 42 Royal Ca-

nadian Air Force squadrons stationed in England took part in the aerial support of the invasion, with roles ranging from bombing and air superiority to ground attack and photo reconnaissance. The RCAF lost a Vickers Wellington G.R. Mk. XIV (L/L), a Supermarine Spitfire Mk. IX, a Hawker Typhoon Mk. Ib and a North American Mustang Mk. I, for total of 14 dead. A further 23 RCAF members serving with Royal Air Force squadrons were also killed in D-Day action.



The airspace in Greenwood's Residential Housing Units sucks this spring.

Well, if you're lucky enough to live in one of the homes included in a sustainability initiative, testing the "tightness" of the different RHU models.

"We're beginning to assess the work done in the last three years in the RHUs – and we'd like to continue," says Ken Smiley, the coordinator of environmental services for Defence Construction Canada at 14 Wing Greenwood.

"We're always looking for ideas, programs – and numbers."

Working with Canadian

Forces Housing Agency, student placement worker Logan Stronach has tested close to a dozen RHUs over the last couple of weeks. The Nova Scotia Community College energy sustainability engineering technology student sets up his portable, collapsible door frame, hangs a tarp over it and then sets a fan in place to draw air from the home.

Software regulates the fan, measures exterior and interior air pressure and calculates the differential to come up with a "flow rate."

"We've been looking at RHUs that have not been renovated, and some with minor recaps and full recaps,

some with new windows, some without; to establish

a baseline for the different styles," Stronach says.

A typical R2000 home could see an air exchange rate of 1.5 in an hour. The most recent full renovation of Greenwood's RHUs was the recap at 26 Ivy Street: this air flow test determined an air exchange rate of 1.4.

"Five to 10 as a rate is medium. Below 5 is good – anything over 10 is a sieve," says CFHA technical services chief Wayne Elliott. "Every year, there have been new and better ways to improve energy use and efficiency, and we try and keep on top of these in our recaps."

Not only is the project a good data collecting tool to help CFHA determine its best-

bang-for-the-buck renovations, but any improvements in energy use helps 14 Wing Greenwood, and the larger Department of National Defence initiative to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The plus: interested RHU occupants who also feel like they have a role to play as a family and tenant in "greener" living.

"Before this, a place could feel warmer or tighter after a renovation – but, without numbers, is it?" says Smiley. "With numbers, you can compare."

Elliott says he's "been really happy with the numbers we're seeing.

"Now we know what we can achieve, and build projects right into our specs. We're heading in the right direction."

Circulation de l'air Des tests d'efficacité dans les ULR

Beaucoup d'air circule dans les unités de logement résidentiel ce printemps.

En fait, cela est vrai si vous avez la chance de vivre dans l'un des logements visés par une initiative de développement durable, qui met à l'épreuve « l'étanchéité » des divers modèles d'ULR.

« Nous commençons à évaluer le travail fait au cours des trois dernières années dans les ULR – et nous aimerais continuer », explique Ken Smiley, le coordonnateur des services environnementaux pour Construction de Défense Canada à la 14^e Escadre Greenwood.

« Nous sommes toujours à la recherche d'idées, de programmes – et de données. »

De concert avec l'Agence de logement des Forces canadiennes, l'étudiant stagiaire Logan Stronach a mené des tests dans près d'une douzaine d'ULR au cours des quelques dernières semaines. L'étudiant en technologie et génie de l'énergie et du développement durable au Nova Scotia Community College a monté une sorte de cadre de porte portatif et pliable, y a accroché une bâche pour le couvrir et a mis en place un ventilateur pour tirer de l'air de la maison. Un logiciel régule le fonctionnement

du ventilateur, mesure la pression d'air à l'extérieur et à l'intérieur et calcule la différence pour trouver le « débit d'écoulement ».

« Nous avons examiné des ULR qui n'ont pas été rénovés, certains qui ont eu de petites rénovations et toutes les rénovations, certains avec de nouvelles fenêtres, d'autres sans, afin d'établir une base de référence pour les différents styles », explique M. Stronach.

Une maison R2000 type peut avoir un taux d'échange d'air de 1,5 en une heure. Les plus récentes rénovations complètes d'ULR à Greenwood étaient celles du 26, rue Ivy : le test de débit d'air a déterminé que le taux d'échange d'air était de 1,4.

« Un taux de 5 à 10 est moyen. Un taux de moins de 5 est bon – en haut de 10, vous avez une passoire », explique le chef des services de l'ALFC Wayne Elliott. « Chaque année, de nouvelles et de meilleures façons de réduire la consommation d'énergie font surface, et nous essayons de les intégrer dans nos rénovations. »

Le projet est non seulement un bon outil de collecte de données pour aider l'ALFC à faire des choix optimaux lors de ses rénovations, mais toute



réduction de la consommation d'énergie contribue à la réduction de l'émissions de gaz à effet de serre à la 14^e Escadre Greenwood et dans l'initiative à plus grande échelle du ministère de la Défense nationale. L'avantage : des occupants des ULR intéressés qui estiment aussi qu'ils ont un rôle à jouer en matière d'écologie en tant que familles et locataires.

« Avant cela, un logement pouvait donner l'impression d'être plus chaud ou plus hermétique – mais sans données, comment vraiment le savoir? », explique M. Smiley. « Avec les données, il est possible de faire des comparaisons. »

M. Elliott dit qu'il est « très content des données que nous voyons. Maintenant, nous savons ce que nous pouvons accomplir, et nous pouvons mener des projets selon nos spécifications. Nous allons dans la bonne direction. »

Hams set for field day challenge

The Greenwood Amateur Radio Club (GARC) will be participating in the annual ARRL Field Day Exercise Saturday and Sunday, June 22 and 23, out of 107 Wing V, Greenwood.

Using only generators, batteries and solar power, the "hams" construct and erect emergency radio stations in parks, shopping malls and back yards to test their skills under all situations. The slogan, "ham radio works when systems don't," is more than just words: on the field day, hams prove they can send messages in many forms without the use of phones, the internet or any infrastructure that may be compromised in a crisis. More than 30,000 amateur radio operators across North America participate in field day each year.

Come out and see for yourself.

"This is not your grandfather's radio," says Roger, VE1VK. "It may be called

"amateur radio" because we are unpaid, like amateur volunteer firefighters - that does not mean hams are backward!

Over the 24 hours of the contest, hams will be using various modes of communication: single sideband (SSB) FM, digital modes and Morse code.

It was from their practical experience as hams many electrical engineers went to develop the marvels of today's communications.
