# Irvine leaves Greenwood ready

The "base that made me," says Colonel Jim Irvine, has again been good to him over the past two years.

"This was the first base I was posted to as a pilot in 1991, I came into maturity as an officer here, I held every position a pilot could hold on base - I was very lucky. It has been a dream job to

be wing commander "

Irvine turns command of both 14 Wing and CFB Greenwood over to Colonel Iain Huddleston July 18. Leaving is bittersweet: it will likely be his last post at an operational wing, but he's confident the work accomplished by base and wing personnel through his term leaves Greenwood well-positioned for continued day-to-day mission

"I never look back; I look for-

ward to the next goal but, if I was operational focus, anti-submarine a young pilot on crew right now. I'd think it would be a very interesting time. These folks are going to learn how to fight this plane."

He's referring, of course, to the CP140 Aurora, the focus of his and two previous commanders' terms. Block III upgrades are not "evolutionary - they're revolutionary.

"We're taking an aircraft designed for a relatively narrow

warfare, to being able to do over land operations, radar imaging, electronic warfare, overland strike coordination - and antisubmarine warfare. The Aurora has always been multi-role, but now it has the sensors to be better than world class.'

Irvine points to Operation MO-BILE, in 2011, when Aurora crews spent several months in Italy flying in support of NATO missions

in Libya.

"This was a mission that demonstrated the Aurora and the crews that fly her are both extremely relevant and exception- and corporate knowledge, but ally agile - and that was with the quite often you get fresh eyes, legacy airplane, so imagine what we could do with the modernised version? We got the mission done, but we had a call at the end of it to extend - and we said ves. for as long as the government wished us to do it. We demonstrated our ability to be ready. Our force did it.

"Now it's our job to keep that momentum and awareness of great capability going.'

Block III developments have been an on-going project, but Irvine has also overseen the implementation of the Defence Resource Management Information System (DRMIS), transition of first line maintenance from 14 Air Maintenance Squadron to 405 Squadron, final construction of the base's new health centre and its opening, some serious decisions around budgets and a myriad of community-related issues, including the multi-year base potable water challenge.

"I get presented with a lot of things I never expected I'd see - this has been a lot like being the mayor of a small town. Some decisions are fairly easy and some are harder: they affect your people, and the base's image in the local community."

arrival in 2011, close to half of the command team turned over as well

"There is a loss of momentum and there's never a chance to get stagnant. We've been a tight-knit team of COs, a great group of people. There's never been a moment of discord, and we've had a great working relationship.

Irvine doesn't see a "legacy" aspect coming from his term in command: "it's more of a continuity of changes and improvements. No one has the time, the people or the resources to do it all at once."

Personally, Irvine was pleased to have an opportunity to fly with 413 Squadron and show crews he could pilot a C130 Hercules and a Cormorant - "I think they were pleasantly surprised the old man could fly!" He had to let go of his own goal to reach 6,500 military flying hours: his last flight was July 2, and he was short of that goal by just 12.3 hours.

"I was a little bit sad as I rolled up on final approach during my last flight – it was a momentous day, and I'll remember it forever. Someone told me once, 'find something you love and then try to find a way to be paid to do it," and I did.

"Beyond this, there's a lot of desk work and office work in Ottawa. I'll be quite busted up when I leave Greenwood. I've been emotionally invested in this wing,



# Greenwood marches on

With many miles underfoot, 14 Wing Greenwood's Nijmegan march team is ready for its final challenge July 16 to 19.

""Remember, there will be times when you think, 'What am I doing?" said Wing Commander Colonel Jim Irvine July 5, meeting with the core team before one of their final training

"You are marching in the footsteps of giants – remember their motivation, and what they were doing. Do the wing and the Air Force proud."

The Nijmegan march began in 1909, and is a four-day, 160 kilometre military team march, with participants carrying a 10 kilogram rucksack load through the Netherlands. During the Second World War, Canadian soldiers liberated the area around Nijmegen, and there is a large Canadian military cemetery in nearby Groesbeek. It serves as the final

resting place for over 2,300 Canadian soldiers and airmen. The cemetery is on the route of the third day, and all military marchers halt and hold remembrance services. Canadians have participated since 1952: the march draws over 40,000 marchers from 50 different nations and is witnessed by over 1 million spectators each year.

Lieutenant Gillian Kelland is 14 Wing's team leader, and says the training, since early spring and involving about 800 kilometres of accumulated marching, has been a challenge.

"We had a very good crew right from the beginning, and everyone gave it their best effort. Some had to go with postings, or strain, but we have a really good team now."

The final selection was done a couple of weeks ago, and there are 12 Greenwood personnel going to Nijmegan July 12: 11 as the 14 Wing contingent, and another as a pick-up member of a London, Ontario ning skits, part of the interna-

# Irvine laisse Greenwood bien préparé

La « base qui m'a fait », dit le colonel Jim Irvine, a encore été bonne avec lui au cours de deux dernières années.

« C'est la première base où i'ai été affecté comme pilote en 1991; je suis devenu officier ici; j'occupé tous les postes qu'un pilote peut occuper sur la base – j'ai été très chanceux. Ça a été un emploi de rêve d'être commandant de l'escadre ».

Irvine passe le commandement de la 14e Escadre et de la BFC Greenwood au colonel lain Huddleston, le 18 juillet. Le départ laisse un goût aigre-doux : ce sera probablement sa dernière affectation à une escadre opérationnelle, mais il est confiant que le travail accompli par les personnels de la base et de l'escadre au cours de son mandat laisse Greenwood en bonne position pour maintenir l'état de préparation des missions quotidiennes.

« Je ne me reporte jamais en arrière; je regarde le prochain objectif, mais si j'étais présentement un jeune pilote de l'équipage, je me dirais que c'est une période très intéressante. Ces personnes vont apprendre à apprivoiser cet avion ».

Bien entendu, il fait allusion au CP140 Aurora, l'objet de son attention et l'objectif de ses deux précédents mandats de commandant. Les modernisations du Bloc III ne sont pas une « évolution », mais plutôt une « révolution ».

« Il s'agissait d'une mission qui a démontré l'Aurora et les équipages qui lui sont extrêmement utiles et exceptionnellement agile - et ce fut avec l'avion héritée, alors imaginez ce que nous pourrions faire avec la version modernisée ?Nous avons rempli la mission, mais à la fin, on nous a appelés pour nous demander de prolonger – et nous avons dit oui, tant partie de sa réussite est et aussi longtemps que le gouvernement souhaiterait qu'on le fasse. Nous avons démontré notre disponibilité opérationnelle. Notre force l'a fait. Maintenant c'est à vous qu'il appartient de maintenir cet élan et cette conscience ».

Les modernisations du Block III sont un projet actuellement en cours, mais Irvine a également supervisé la mise en œuvre du Système d'information de gestion des ressources de la Défense (SIGRD), le transfert du premier échelon de maintenance du 14e Escadron de maintenance (Air) au 405e Escadron, les travaux de construction finaux du nouveau centre de santé de la base et son inauguration ainsi que certaines décisions importantes concernant les budgets et de nombreuses

de l'eau potable auguel la base est confronté depuis plusieurs années.

« On me présente de nombreuses choses auxquelles je ne m'attendais jamais – ce rôle ressemble beaucoup à celui du maire d'une petite ville. Certaines décisions sont relativement faciles, et d'autres plus difficiles : elles touchent los effectifs et l'image de la base dans la collectivité locale ».

Selon Irvine, une grande attribuable à son équipe de commandants. Dès son arrivée en 2011, près de la moitié des membres de son été remplacée.

« Il y a une perte d'élan et de savoir collectif mais, très souvent, vous obtenez un regard nouveau et il n'y aucune chance d'être stagnant. > Personnellement, Irvine était heureux d'avoir eu l'occasion de voler avec le 413e Escadron et de montrer aux membres d'équipage qu'il était capable de piloter un avion C130 Hercules et un hélicoptère Cormorant - « Je pense qu'ils ont été agréablement surpris de voir que le vieil homme pouvait encore piloter! ». Malheureusement, il a dû abandonner son objectif d'atteindre 6,500 heures de vol à bord de l'Aurora : il avait effectué son dernier le 2 juillet et était à environ 12.3 heures en dessous du jalon.

« J'étais un peu triste en éguipe de commandement a consignant le résultat final de mon dernier vol - c'était un jour d'une grande importance, et je m'en souviendrai à jamais. Une personne m'a dit un jour : " trouve quelque chose que tu aimes faire et essaie d'être payé pour le faire", et je l'ai fait ».

> « Au-delà de l'escadre, il y a beaucoup de travail de bureau à Ottawa. Je serai vraiment usé quand je quitterai Greenwood. Je me suis investi émotionnellement dans cette escadre, ma famille a vécu ici pendant 14 années de ma carrière - quelle équipe remarquable! ».



## Top reads

New additions to the 14 Wing Greenwood collection of leadership resources include donations of books from the handful of 2013 out-going commanding officers.

Major Christine Drab, 26/27 Canadian Forces Health Services, presented "Leadership 101," a collection of management tips from the Harvard Business Review, and "Little Book of Leadership."

On behalf of Lieutenant-Colonel Heber Gillam, Major Tom Bell presented "Drive," which uses science - and not the carrot and stick method - to describe motivational leadership practices that encourage people to do their best; and "Primal Leadership," a guide that backs making an emotional connection with your people.

Colonel Jim Irvine set some heavy tomes on the table as his picks: the big, fat paperbacks "Once an Eagle," a fictional melding of characters and history that covers American military moves through the 1950s and 1960s that

led them awry; and "Manstein," a biography of the Second World War German field marshal who grew from a modest background to the highest ranks - but to whom the mission became more important than people, and leadership became perverted.

Major Sarah House presented "Why the Best Man for the Job is a Woman," a read describing why some qualities women have work well in leadership roles.



Lieutenant-Colonel Guy Leblanc likes adventurist and businessman Richard Branson's "Like a Virgin" for its advice on getting people to support you because you support them; and "Start with Why," a challenge to common

wisdom for people who want to move forward and see opportunities rather than obstacles.



Major Kurt Lalonde says, reading "The One Thing you Need to Know" quickly indicates there is more than one thing to be known about leadership. This book about the basics has simple ideas on achieving personal excellence -



but also how to "sharpen your sword" for the role.

Lieutenant-Colonel Christian Oullette says "The Five Levels of Leadership" starts by defining leadership as invested in a person simply because of their position, but there's more to getting people to follow you. "Ultimately, it's about respect."



The catchy yellow covers initially caught Lieutenant-Colonel Pat Thauberger's eye on the store bookshelf: one of his donations is "The Power of Habit," while the other, he figured would be "twice as good" a read, "Work Happy."







## **Greenwood team** takes on EPIC event

Captain John Bernardi, 404 Long Range Patrol and **Training Squadron** 

"Hey John, how'd you like to swim 3.8 kilometres June 30?" "I'll do it! Wait ... what am I getting myself into?"

So began a journey to compete in the team triathlon at Subaru EPIC Dartmouth. The event consisted of a 3.8 kilometre swim in Lake Banook, a 180 kilometre bike ride (split evenly between two cyclists) and a half-marathon (21.2 kilometres). Greenwood Multisport Club (GMSC) president Sergeant Chris MacIntyre of 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron pulled the Greenwood team together. He knew I was strictly a pool swimmer, and more of a short distance and sprint specialist at that. With two and a half weeks' notice, I set a goal of completing a 1,500 metre pool swim (the Olympic triathlon standard). I was happy with my time and, from there, moved on to a first-ever open water swim the following weekend. With a brand new wetsuit, I was able events: the IRON (3.8 kilometo complete 2.2 kilometres at Shubie Beach in Dartmouth with some other members of the GMSC.

At the 7 a.m. race day starting horn, 108 competitors started the swim in Lake Banook. The tricky part was dealing with the choppy waves on the upwind legs - I don't encounter that during my morning swims at the 14 Wing Fitness and Sports Centre. After completing my four lengths in the lake, I could just make out the clock on the beach and sprinted hard to finish in 1:05:18. I then ran to the transition area to hand off my join our Facebook group.

chip timing anklet to MacIntyre for cycling leg.

The windy and rainy day had much more of an effect on the cyclists, but MacIntyre was able to make his 90 kilometre ride in good time. Leading Seaman Shawn Miller of HMCS Charlottetown was tagged in for the 90 kilometre ride back. The GMSC cyclists had the third fastest team cycle, at 5:37:52, with an average speed of 32.0 kilometres per hour.

The half-marathon was up next, completed by Private Shawn Clarke of 14 Air Maintenance Squadron. Clarke ran a course record time of 1:23:52, averaging 3:59 per kilometre, and achieving the fastest run time of the event. His performance was instrumental to the GMSC team's third place overall finish among 26 teams, and being first amongst the fourmember teams, in a total time of 8:07:52.

This was the second running of EPIC Dartmouth, but the first time GMSC has competed, EPIC Dartmouth also has individual tre swim, 180 kilometre bike, 42.2 kilometre run), EPIC (3.8 kilometre swim, 180 kilometre bike, 21.2 kilometre run), or AQUA (3.8 kilometre swim, 180 kilometre bike). The event was well organized, due in large part to race promoter Tim Chesnutt and his team of volunteers. 





# Cadets making their Greenwood summer camp 'footprint'

The influx of blue-T-shirted youth around 14 Wing Greenwood means the Cadet Summer Training Centre camps are now underway.

There are about 530 course Cadets in Greenwood and at the Cloud Lake Survival Site, 95 staff Cadets and 126 adult staff; all here in varying combinations and numbers until August 16's final closing parade.

"We have a pretty significant footprint here on the base," says Captain Liam Mather, with the Regional Cadet Support Unit (Atlantic). Cadets have come in from across Atlantic Canada, with some from Ontario and Quebec, here for camps in music, sports, general training, drill and ceremony and survival training at Cloud Lake.

Mather says Atlantic Canada's Cadet music program has "exploded" in the past couple of years, and he credits Cadets' increased interest to Lieutenant (Navy) Wes MacKey, regional music training officer for Regional Cadet Support Unit Atlantic – known to throw a little Taio Cruz, Lady Gaga and Cascada at the performance parade bands. The camp band, after just a week, was on "stage" twice July 12, for a change of command and the opening of the Nova Scotia Special Olympics.

says, based on their interests and experience. While some pick a different camp every summer, others' first choice may always be music, or they pick programs that will focus them in on a flying license.


"Cadets is a matter of 'what I want to do,' for the most part."

Mather says much of the programming works in partnership with 14 Wing facilities and personnel. Guest instructors are often invited into Cadet courses, and Mather says, 'for the most part, they're keen. Once they start working with a youth program, and make the time for that involvement, they seem to enjoy it."

Along with the day's courses, fitness training and core programs, the Cadets have evening entertainment scheduled, take part in community service projects and "it's camp," Mather acknowledges.

"It's unique, it's far different from other camp experiences: your bed has to be made a certain way. A general person in the public would be thinking, 'a 13-year-old coming to a camp like that must be insane!' But, when vou're thrown into a room with four strangers, you soon decided who does what jobs, who the best bed maker is - it's amazing to see that teamwork start to develop, and it happens quickly.

"And, when they put on the uniform, especially the staff Cadets, I think they see that as being part of the team. Then, the things that people see and what you are considered by are the qualities you bring, the courses you've had, your skills and qualifications.'
