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Vimy tour a chance to remember

Kaleb Perry's personal interest in the Canadian military covers the past, present and future.

He has an opportunity in August, one of 13 young Canadians, to represent the Vimy Foundation in Europe, "following in the footsteps" of Canadian soldiers through the first and second World Wars. For the past few weeks, as a staff officer at Gagetown, he has been leading young Army Cadets through general training. When he returns from the Vimy tour, he's determined to use his experiences to help Canadians remember military sacrifice, achievement and honour.

"When people say, 'Lest we forget,' I don't think it's as enforced like I would like to see it," Perry, 16, says. "I do want to see all this passed along."

The Berwick youth, a student at West Kings, wrote an essay through Cadets - he's a sergeant with the 2444 Kings County Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps at Camp Aldershot – last year to win a place at an Encounters with Canada

program in Ottawa earlier this remember. year. It so happened the week focused on Vimy commemoration, and 40 of the youth took a second essay-writing opportunity to apply for the Vimy Foundation's August battlefield trip. Perry was one of six selected for a further interview, and was successfully chosen to participate in the event.

"This has been something I've wanted to do forever. It's a personal interest for me watching Remembrance Day services, anything with people in uniform, the Legion's Call to Remembrance challenge. I had family who served, but none were killed. I always want to learn more."

From August 7 for two weeks, Perry and the Vimy tour youth will travel Europe. A highlight for him will be a stop in Arras, France, where Frederick Middleton Abbott is buried.


"I have to do a presentation on a person, a place and a soldier killed overseas," says Perry. He has selected the Dieppe raid and First World War French President Georges Clemenceau, but found Abbott as he was searching for just the right Canadian soldier to tion's 'Bringing the Boys Home'

"He's not really recognized as a 'hero,' he wasn't a big figure he was a painted from Wolfville, so he's local; he joined the 85th Battalion when it formed in 1915 and did his training in Aldershot – where I have my Cadets today. The connections just came."

Abbott was killed September 25, 1918 – the same month he received the Military Medal for "conspicuous gallantry," when two section commanders had become casualties and the sections disorganized. Abbott reorganized them and placed them in the outpost line and within 80 yards of the enemy so, when the attack commenced, he was able to rush two machine guns and put them and their crews out of action before they could fire a shot. It was also one month before the end of the war.

"To come so close...," Perry says, adding Abbott had a wife and two daughters home in Wolfville. Abbott was 32.

"I'll give my presentation at his gravesite, and then I'll take a rubbing of his headstone - it's part of the Vimy Founda-

Maple Flag a Block III showcase

405 Squadron's Crew 4 recently returned to 14 Wing Greenwood from two weeks at CFB Cold Lake, where it participated in Exercise Maple Flag, the "premiere air-power exercise of the Royal Canadian Air Force." Participation in this exercise was a milestone, the first time a fully qualified, operational crew flew a Block III doubles during the exercise.

CP140 Aurora, showing off the new capabilities the upgraded platform brings.

Exercise Maple Flag, an annual event in Cold Lake, is an advanced aerial combat training exercise that attracts participation from nations around the globe. Those attending this year included the United States, Singapore, Colombia, Great Britain and Belgium, to name a few. The number of personnel at CFB Cold Lake effectively

Maple Flag was an ideal venue for 405 Squadron to showcase the Block III capabilities, with the crew flying in the thick of the action alongside fighter aircraft, air-to-air refuelers and tactical helicopters, 405 Squadron's role was to employ the Block III's upgraded suite of sensors to assist both fighter and army assets in conducting overland and aerial operations,

radar on the aircraft allowed the operators to accurately capture imagery of ground targets, used by analysis experts and army personnel to pinpoint threats and plan future movements on the ground. These missions were carried out while simulated ground surface-to-air missile sites and enemy fighter aircraft attempted to knock

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SAR experience professional, personal for Leblanc

Lieutenant-Colonel Guy Leblanc knew he had a lot to learn about search and rescue as he took command of 14 Wing Greenwood's 413 Squadron in 2011. In March 2012, he experienced firsthand a mission he'll remember all his life: His crew rescued three occupants from a distressed yacht. Three others were lost at sea.

"During the Tabasco II rescue, I was directly involved as first officer of the helicopter. We lost a couple of people, but we saved a couple of people."

Leblanc stops for a moment, because this memory is powerful.

"Emotions do run high - I helped the crew after landing at the airport, and held one of the survivors in my arms while they offloaded the other man. The third person was lying beside us."

He stops again, and apologizes for his own emotion.

"One of the survivors hugged me - I've never been that involved, and it was a life-changing moment, a personal and professional growth experience for me. We received a very heartfelt letter afterwards.

"I'm going to miss this." Leblanc arrived at 413

training world was changing: where personnel used to report more thoroughly trained, they now show up needing additional work to upgrade to required standards, qualifications and, most importantly, to increase their experience. For example, Leblanc says, a new pilot will take a full two years to become a "full, singing, dancing mission commander directing an

two dozen pilots for the Hercules and Cormorant aircraft 413 flies, all at various stages of training and command qualifications. Every trade has its own timelines and standards for qualification.

Maximizing opportunities for his personnel to fly, train and qualify in their trades has been Leblanc's biggest challenge. Recent demographics mean his experienced crew are close to retirement – or are young. That means younger, less experienced crew increasingly need to train new members. He is concerned, combined with budget cuts, less flying time and aging Hercules aircraft:; a "spiral" of challenge is developing in a field where maturity and experience plays a big role. He knows he's "leaned" on his senior crew to the factors that could affect a need more visibility in the SAR commanding officer.

Squadron as the operational help find the balance, and acknowledges it hasn't been easy.

> "I have a squadron of A-type personalities, and my job is to rein them in and keep them safe," Leblanc says. "This unit has seen a number of crashes in the past few years, and we have people whose close friends have died on calls. When they go, they often go in dire conditions

"Job number one is to bring back a crew and the aircraft we have to protect our assets Leblanc could have close to and our mandate, and make sure people don't jeopardize future readiness. There may be one person to save now, but what about the bigger rescue demand tomorrow?"

> But, he knows, his crew all focus on "saving the person right now. There have to be ways to do that as safely and as effectively as possible."

> To offset experience loss and enhance decision-making skills, aircrew regularly discuss typical SAR scenarios or actual experiences, and 413's potential response. Changes also include implementing an operational risk review, and operations staff publishing full crew lists daily, so people can see who's on duty and ensure crews are "balanced." Every crew, every day, checks


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
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

A little healthy juggling keeps Drab busy

Likely no one at 14 Wing Greenwood has experienced as "moving" an experience during their command years as Major Christine Drab, 26/27 Canadian Forces Health Services

Posted here in 2009 just two months after completing a tour in Afghanistan, she soon witnessed the groundbreaking for a new base health clinic, an extended "700-day build," the final opening in January 2013 and subsequent months of her staff settling in to its new home.

"It would have been hard to leave just on the cusp of seeing it done," she says, knowing a four-year run as CO anywhere is not common. "It was a long process - and we were so busy doing our own jobs.'

Drab, a health services operations officer with 33 years in the Canadian Armed Forces, has lead 14 Wing's health services clinic, along with detachments in Gander, Goose Bay and St.

about a 50/50 mix of military and civilian people: "an awful lot of health care professionals." Drab says, which require unique balancing.

"We don't have the standard operation of 'supply and demand.' We're expensive, multi-faceted with what we do; it's impossible to master - you can't fulfill everyone's expectations. And, you can't just close."

26/27 CFHS is a lodger unit at 14 Wing and the several smaller East Coast bases, which, Drab acknowledges, puts the organization on a bit of a different footing. Her chain of command is not through the local wing commander, but that also means "he doesn't have to worry about our administration or budget – and he doesn't want to!"

She thinks, though, with the high visibility of the new centre's construction and regular interaction between her personnel and the rest of the wing, 26/27 CFHS is more visible.

can't cancel an appointment to attend a coffee break or special event. Every time we do have an opportunity, we do grab it and have some fun with it." (Take, for example, the June wake for the old health centre structure, as excavators were chewing away at the last, gutted walls.)

Juggling daily work, the transition to electronic medical records, facility accreditation and special taskings - it's hurricane season, and Drab now has rotating staff with "go bags" on stand-by, in case there is a call for immediate health care support - also comes with balancing the needs of the patients they see.

"I feel we have too much work for the staff we have: if we have too much, say, for mental health and physiotherapy; we have to outsource. When we have a position go vacant, we go vacant for a long time - staffing is difficult."

Drab knows all about that: "We do see everybody all with little time to research what the time as the health centre, she'd find upon her arrival in John's. That's over 100 people, so we're not cut off, but we Greenwood, she discovered no your life.'

wing surgeon, no military physicians (all away on courses), no clinic warrant and a vacant manager's position.

"That was daunting, but you don't know what you don't have - we were juggling an awful lot of balls in the air. I had no choice but to totally dive in."

It also gave her a unique opportunity to develop closer than traditional ties with other base commanding officers: in the place of a wing surgeon, she acted as a limited conduit between her medical staff and COs regarding a military member's medical status.

"We're always dealing with someone in a crisis, whether it's a medical that could affect their career, or a health issue that affects them personally. It's been challenging, but rewarding.

"It's always hard to leave. Everywhere I go, I always dive in with as much of myself as I have, with the job and the people. Leaving Greenwood is particularly difficult. You make connections, and it becomes

Il est fort probable que personne à la 14^e Escadre Greenwood n'a vécu une expérience aussi mouvementée que celle du major Christine Drab durant ses années à titre de commandant des 26e et 27^e Centres des services de santé des Forces canadiennes.

Affectée ici en 2009, deux mois à peine après la fin de son affectation en Afghanistan, le major Drab a assisté à l'inauguration des travaux de construction d'une nouvelle clinique médicale sur la base et a suivi l'évolution du « chantier de 700 jours », jusqu'à son ouverture, en janvier 2013. Elle était également présente durant les mois suivants, lorsque son personnel a emménagé dans la nouvelle installation.

« J'aurais trouvé cela difficile de partir alors que la construcle major Drab, sachant bien quelle sera la demande. Nous ne

commandant reste au même attentes, et nous ne pouvons jaendroit pendant quatre ans. « Le processus a été long, et en plus, nous étions très pris par nos propres tâches ».

Le major Drab, officier aux Opérations des services de santé comptant 33 années d'expérience dans les Forces armées canadiennes, a dirigé la clinique du Service de santé de la 14e Escadre, ainsi que les détachements à Gander, Goose Bay et St. John's. Cela fait plus de 100 personnes, réparties presque à parts égales entre militaires et civils : « C'est vraiment beaucoup de fournisseurs de soins de santé », a-t-elle ajouté. Elle devait en plus mettre sur pied des équipes équilibrées.

« Nos activités ne s'inscrivent pas dans le cadre de fonctionnement normal basé sur l'offre et la demande. Elles sont plus vastes et comportent plusieurs volets; tion du centre achevait », dit il est impossible de prévoir

mais interrompre nos services. »

Le 26/27 CSSFC est une unité hébergée à la 14º Escadre et dans les autres plus petites bases de la côte Est ce qui, comme l'admet le major Darb, place l'organisme dans une position particulière, car il ne relève pas de la chaîne de commandement de l'Escadre. « Le commandant n'a donc pas à se préoccuper de notre administration ni de notre budget, et il ne veut pas avoir à le faire! »

« Nous voyons tout le monde au centre très souvent alors nous ne sommes pas coupés des autres, mais nous ne pouvons pas annuler un rendez-vous pour faire une pause café ou pour prendre part à une activité spéciale. Lorsque c'est possible de le faire, nous saisissons l'oc-

Le major Drab connaît bien cette réalité : manquant de temps pour faire des recherches sur le personnel qui se trouverait à Greenwood à son arrivée, elle a été forcée de constater que le centre ne comptait pas de médecin-chef de l'escadre, aucun médecin militaire (ils étaient tous à l'extérieur en formation), ni adjudant de la clinique, et que le poste de gestionnaire était laissé vacant.

« Cela représentait un défi de taille, mais vous ne savez pas ce qui vous reste à apprendre. Nous jonglions avec de nombreuses tâches. Je n'avais d'autre choix que de foncer ».

Cette situation lui a également offert l'occasion unique de développer des liens plus serrés commandants de la base : à défaut de pouvoir compter sur un médecin-chef de l'escadre pour faire la liaison entre son personnel médical et les commandants pour des questions liées à l'état de santé des militaires, elle s'est chargée elle-même d'accomplir cette tâche.

« Nous sommes toujours confrontés à des situations où une personne est en état de crise, que ce soit en raison d'une condition médicale qui pourrait avoir des répercussions sur la carrière du militaire, ou d'un problème de santé qui l'affecte personnellement. Ce fut tout un défi, mais l'expérience a été très valorisante.

« Ce n'est jamais facile de partir. Partout où je vais, je m'investis complètement, tant au travail qu'auprès des gens. Je trouve particulièrement difficile le fait de devoir quitter Greenwood. On tisse des liens et cela devient toute votre vie. »

From September 1939 to the end of 1942, at the height of the Battle of the Atlantic, the full-time strength of the Royal Canadian Navy grew from 1,900 to 50,000 members. This huge growth was not without its personnel and morale challenges, particularly for those who had joined up leaving dependents behind to manage on the pay of ordinary or able seamen.

In 1942, long-discussed plans to create a financial assistance fund for sailors bore fruit and, November 23 of that year, an Order in Council was passed to bring into being the Royal Canadian Naval Benevolent Fund.



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

the impact of heart disease. Her family has been hard hit: her grandfather, grandmother, father and two uncles have all had heart disease.


In the early 1990s, her grandfather, Fred Fiske, suf-

How to fit in at summer camp Tips from Greenwood Air Cadet Summer **Training Centre**

Captain Liam Mather, (Atlantic) Public Affairs

Over 530 course Cadets call Greenwood Air Cadet Summer Training Centre home at any given time this summer, for a grand total of roughly 1,000 Cadets taking part in the many summer opportunities the Air Cadet Program has to offer. It's a rarity all 530 Cadets will be one location for any one time, but we're still a pretty big community - which can leave a lot of newcomers asking themselves, "How do I fit in?"

"For the General Training Course Cadets, we try to combine their activities for the first couple of days. Usually on the first day they're doing 'ice breakers' within their flight and then, the next day, the entire course gets together for a camp-wide scavenger hunt to learn how the camp works," says Lieutenant Evan MacDonald, training coordinator for A Squadron, which looks after the General Training Course – typically a Cadet's first summer camp experience with the program.

These "ice breakers" can be Regional Cadet Support Unit a lot of fun, and MacDonald believes they play a major role in creating that camp community feeling.

> "It's important to create that community, what I call a 'summer family.' GT is really the basis for the friendships you're going to make in Cadets, so it's important to take the opportunities - such as ice breakers - to put yourself out there."

MacDonald's thought process makes sense. If you look at your adventure to a summer training centre, or any summer camp, as an adventure with a new community, it makes sense to get involved. Sometimes that new community can be just as anxious as you are about meeting someone new, but through these initial group activities we're able to reframe the "how do I fit in" question to "how do I want to fit in?"

Danté Hiscock, a course Cadet on the six-week Fitness and Sports Instructor Course from Lewisport, N.L., believes it's all about choice.

"When you come to camp, you have to ask yourself who

you want to be: someone who tries hard and puts themselves out there? Or the opposite of that?"

For Hiscock, the secret to getting involved with your new community is all about teamwork and, most importantly, encouraging others.


"It's the best way, I believe." As MacDonald recommends, "find that small group to begin



The board is always looking for qualified individuals for the position of board member, and encourages those with military experience to apply. The next application deadline is August 31.

Who are we?

We are the independent tribunal that offers an avenue of appeal for disability benefits decisions made by Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC).

What do we do?

We hold hearings and write decisions for our two levels of redress: review and appeal. The review hearing is your first and only chance to appear before decision-makers to speak about your case. The hearing is non-adversarial, which means no one argues against you. If you are dissatisfied with your review decision, you can request an appeal hearing. This is another chance for you, through your representative, to submit new information and arguments in support of your case.

What can we do for you?

Our impartial decision-makers will make a full and fair examination of your file. They will listen to your testimony, ask questions to better understand your case and weigh all the evidence.

How often does the board rule favourably?

The board rules favourably in about half of its review decisions and one-third of its Appeal decisions.

Free legal representation

If you think you may want to bring your case to the board, we suggest you contact the Bureau of Pensions Advocates for advice at 1-877-228-2250. You can also seek representation from the Legion's Service Bureau at 1-877-534-4666. Or, for more general support or information on disability benefits and services, you can visit your local Integrated Personnel Support Centre.
