







Boomer's riders ready for the road

Major Derek Salley figured signing up for the 180-kilometre Boomer's Legacy cycling ride in 2011 was "just another ride.

"I really didn't understand it. When I put the card of one of Canada's fallen soldier on my bike, I thought, 'Oh, it's going to scratch my bike's paint.' And the Boomer's jersey wasn't as cool as mine – it was all I knew."

Now, just two rides later, and Salley says the event can be overwhelming. Boomer's Legacy started in British Columbia 2006 as a local way to remember the death of medic Corporal Andrew "Boomer" Eykelenboom in Afghanistan that same year. Riders complete day's ride, and funds pledged and donated along the way go into the legacy fund soldiers use to fund schools, community projects and other special needs they come across while deployed at home in Canada and around the world.

"This is 'boots on the ground' help," says Salley. "It's a way of giving back."

"I was riding, and I saw all the other riders on the road with me, and then we arrived at the Mess in Halifax and some of the family members of those soldiers on the cards were there: their faces were so earnest, they were looking for us and those cards, and

they wanted to talk to us. That brings it home that this ride is bigger than just you."

14 Wing Greenwood will run its third annual Boomer's Legacy event September 14, with an 8 a.m. start from the base. Salley and Captain Michelle Guertin, both military personnel at 14 Wing, are organizing all the details: registration, route planning and police escorts, food and support for riders, contacts with communities and Legions along the way, transport for riders and their bikes from Halifax the night before the ride or the day after. They're hoping for 100 riders.

"The first year, we had about 50 riders. With ridership comes awareness, and more funds raised."

Salley says the Greenwood to Halifax ride sounds daunting, but "we've had people who said the most they'd ever ridden in a day was 30 kilometres – and they've all made it. We take it nice and slow, there's food along the way, lots of stops and we have 'shepherds' to keep an eye on everyone else.

"Anyone can ride this."

Boomer's Legacy Fund supports schools in Kimpoko

As newly-procured school desks were off loaded in July from the United Nations cargo vehicles, the children and villagers of Kimpoko began to chant a traditional Congolese song, thanking the Mundèle (the white travelers) for giving them a helping hand.

It quickly became evident the Boomers Legacy Fund had once again changed the lives of those less fortunate. The village of Kimpoko is situated approximately 45 kilometres east of Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and houses 100 civil-war widows and their children. In 2006, Canadian DRC recognized the requirement for assistance in the village. Since then, various desks for the three Kimpoko

projects have been initiated schools. Maximizing the huconstruction of water wells and 40 homes. More recently, financing of the education of the children of Kimpoko by paying \$8,000 in tuition costs per year.

During a recent visit, Op CROCODILE Task Force members identified the need for classroom desks, as many students were either sitting on the dirt floor or were crowded three to five children on one bench - originally constructed for two children. Remembering the work completed under the auspices of the Boomer's Legacy Fund, a request was submitted to assist in the purchase of Armed Forces members in the school desks. About \$10,000 was generously allocated, allowing us to purchase 150

and completed, including the manitarian assistance, the desks were purchased from a technical college for teenag-CAF members assisted in the ers and young adults, funded through private donations. Not only has the Boomer's Legacy Fund assisted Kimpoko schools, but also has assisted approximately 325 students of this technical college, who will continue to learn the academic and technical skills required to prosper in the DRC.

Unbeknownst to us, a formal ceremony was hosted by the villagers and the various school children following the delivery of the desks. A principal of one of the schools tearfully said, "we cannot put into words the joy and the good that you Canadians have been able to accomplish in Kimpoko, and we will forever be indebted to Canada for your

MFRC excited with preschool potential

New school friends, lessons and fun are in the works for children registering for programs at the Greenwood Military Family Resource Centre's "new" preschool.

The MFRC takes over care and management of the AVM Morfee Annex this fall, making use of the facility and equipment long-known as the Morfee Annex Preschool. Changes accepted by 14 Wing Greenwood command have now integrated children's services and programs under one agency: the MFRC.

"We're not new to this," says Michelle Thibodeau- Wagner, MFRC operations manager. "We had a preschool program for about 10 years, but about three years ago, we decided we didn't Morfee program was offering."

The MFRC facility and Morfee space are a few hundred feet apart, and the School Road centres are well-known in the military and general community as the place to go for family services.

"We can now offer a seamless, full day of care," says Thibodeau-Wagner, between casual childcare programs at the MFRC itself, and the pre-school. Staff will simply accompany children back and forth, depending on the morning, afternoon or day programs they're enrolled in.

MFRC's director of children's programs, is very excited to have the preschool back in the MFRC "family.

"Now we're all under one umbrella."

While there are a number of regulations and standards set by want to overlap with what the the provincial government and

Community Services regarding preschool programs, Virtue-Ellis is looking forward to seeing Reggio-inspired curriculum put in motion for Greenwood families.

"Children take a role in their learning: if they want to know about butterflies, they look at butterflies, they make a list of questions, they figure out how to find the answers. It's very handson. If they are learning about fruits and vegetables, they'll plant their own garden. This is an amazing way of learning."

Families will receive two prog-Brenda Virtue-Ellis, the ress reports throughout the program, and special work will be collected by the staff for an-end-of-year profile for each participant. Beyond that, "we have an open door policy.

> "Parents are welcome to pop in and see what's going on," Virtue-Ellis says.

The program will offer classes

for three-year-olds Tuesdays and Thursdays, and four-year-olds Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. From 9 a.m., when they arrive, it's a busy morning of play, program, healthy snacks, outdoor fun and skills until, "before you know it, it's 11:30 a.m. and time to go!"

The preschool has a full French immersion offering, and the other big highlight is on its accessibility policy: families and children with special needs and accommodations are encouraged to find out how they can join in the program.

The preschool officially opens September 3, but registration is on-going - and will continue as space allows. Morning and afternoon classes will be offered as registration demands. An open house will be held August 23 at 10 a.m., with children's activities,

Des nouveaux camarades de classe, des leçons et des activités amusantes attendent les enfants qui s'inscrivent aux programmes offerts au nouveau centre préscolaire du Centre de ressources pour les familles des militaires (CRFM) de Greenwood.






In the skies above Dieppe, 1942

veterans, those fighter pilots and bomber crews who knew what it was like the night before a "big show." Others, new to the idea of going into combat, likely tossed and turned, thinking of the thousand and one details that had been briefed the day before or...trying not to think at all, least their thoughts stray to the unthinkable. It did not matter now. Fresh or tired, the crews donned their goggles, gloves, boots and Mae Wests as they made their way to their squadron areas. Perhaps someone made an oft-heard joke about how the life preserver owed its nickname to the buxom movie star. Others may have spoken boastfully to their comrades of deeds to come, while others enjoyed the moments before dawn in thoughtful silence awed in part by what they had been told the day before. It was August 19, 1942 and Operation JUBLIEE was about to commence.

The aircrew had been told JUBLIEE was to be "raid in force" involving over 6,000 soldiers and commandos, supported by naval and air forces, and the target was the French port of Dieppe in Occupied France. It was to be a hit and run operation; a chance to "poke Jerry in the eye." There were broader strategic and operational considerations, but if the airmen had been told JUBLIEE would divert German attention from the beleaquered Russians on the Eastern Front, or acquire intelligence information and equipment, these considerations were well above their pay grade. These lofty considerations were for the likes of Air Marshal Leigh Mallory, the Royal Air Force (RAF) officer commanding 11 Group and their "boss" for JUBILEE. For the young men who would shortly climb into their Spitfires, Mustangs, Boston and Blenheim bombers, the focus was hit the target, dominate the airspace, protect the assault force and "have a go at Jerry."

Aircrew tasked to fly the first

Some had slept. Probably the as the ground crews purposefully went about making final checks. The airmen knew they had to be over the beaches by 0500 hours, the time of the initial assault. Engine after engine sprang to life, shattering the early morning with aviation noise. Seventy-seven fighter and bomber squadrons had been assembled for JUBLIEE almost 1,000 aircraft manned by men brought together to defeat a common enemy. There were Poles, Czechs, French, Norwegians and others from German occupied lands. There were Americans whose fighter

and bomber units had finally arrived in England and some, who came to the party early, in the uniforms of the RAF and Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF).

Then there were the Canadians. Nine RCAF squadrons (400, 401, 402, 403, 411, 412, 414, 416 and 418) would take part in JUBILEE but, as was always the case, there were many more Canadians scattered amongst the RAF units. For these pilots, gunners and observers, JUBI-LEE had a more personal feeling as their countrymen, most from the 2nd Canadian Infantry Division, made up the bulk of the invasion force.

The first aircraft arrived over Dieppe just as dawn was beginning to break. A clear sky, deceptively calm, greeted the airmen. However, as the squadrons began their deadly tasks, the sky quickly filled with aircraft darting hither and yon, puffs of sorties climbed into their aircraft smoke from detonating anti-

where they should go.

Each airman, according to their aircraft and mission, would have had a very different impression of that day. Although surrounded by their comrades, each Spitfire pilot was alone, cocooned in his aircraft with only the roar of the engine and his own thoughts to keep him company. Occasionally a voice over the wireless (radio), sometimes calm, sometimes excited, sometimes frightened would interrupt these thoughts. Calm and excited voices were to be acknowledged or obeyed; frightened voices were to be ignored with a "thank God it's

Depending on fuel and distance, actual time in the vicinity of Dieppe was often measured in minutes but, when German fighters appeared, each minute seemed like an eternity. Combat was brief, vicious and demanding on both body and mind.

Suddenly, the sky would be full of aircraft, some with black crosses, moving at incredible speeds with each trying to close the gap between hunter and hunted to mere yards before firing. Shells from cannons and machine guns streaked through the air like nimble fingers seeking a vital spot in machine or man. And then it was over, the sky empty as the pilot regained his bearings and sought the comfort of his wingman or squadron once again. A quick check of the aircraft to see if there was damage, then back to the airfield for a gulp of water, a hurried meal; and then back for a repeat performance - two. three or four times.

Aircraft were thrown through the

air in manoeuvres that tested the

limits of both flesh and metal.

For aircrew in close support aircraft, the Hurricanes and bombers, their air war was slightly different. Their first attacks were made over pristine beaches and against untouched targets. By late morning, they approached over broken and burning craft, the sprawled bodies of Canadian soldiers and flew into the plumes of smoke that brought with it the bitter taste of defeat. View obscured, they raced through the every present flak with only seconds to attack the designated target before they were through into deceptively welcoming clear skies harbouring enemy fighters. Then it was back to England to do it all over again.

Mustang pilots flew reconnaissance flights far from the battlefield keeping close watch on the approaches to Dieppe. Often with only a solitary wingman for company, they were to fight only as a last resort; knowledge was their primary weapon and speed and stealth their best defence. However, are still debated, in 16 hours

their missions brought them closer to enemy fighters and when "bounced" it was often unexpected, with deadly results. Mustang pilots would suffer the largest percentage of air losses during the battle.

Enemy action was not the only thing to be feared on that day. The fog of war can deliver some

nasty surprises. A 418 Squadron Boston aircraft joined the first sorties of the day, but a mistake by ground crew unfamiliar with this aircraft meant an undercarriage safety bolt was not removed and, when airborne, the aircraft's wheels could not be raised. Aborting the mission, the Boston became easy "meat" for a German fighter and was shot down - fortu-

nately, the crew survived. Not ship damaged (it was later sunk so lucky were pilot officers John Gardiner (23, Ottawa) and Norman Monchier (19, Dartmouth) with 403 Squadron, killed when their Spitfires collided during combat over Dieppe. Flak also claimed its share of victims, such as Flight Sergeant Stirling Banks (19, Poplar Grove, Prince Edward Island), flying a Hurricane with No. 3 Squadron RAF, killed attempting to ditch his damaged aircraft in the sea off Dieppe.

The vast majority of casualties suffered by the Allied air forces that day were inflicted by a determined and skilled Luftwaffe. Although total numbers of combat approximately 106 aircraft were lost by the Allies succeeded in their primary mis-Dieppe and the naval convoy.

Sixty Allied airmen were killed, of which 13 were Canadian serving with RCAF and RAF squadrons. This number would have been much higher except for the often-unrecognized heroism of the Air-Sea Rescue organization. Yet, this number pales in comparison to casualties suffered by the Canadian army at Dieppe. Of the approximately 5,000 Canadian soldiers who took part in JUBILEE, 907 were killed and over 1,900 wounded and captured. The Canadian army units that fought at Dieppe have this name inscribed with honour on their Colours, and so do nine RCAF squadrons.

Military on rider's mind as miles, dollars add up

Every mile and every day, "Belt Drive Betty" finds a reason to keep going.

The motorcycling enthusiast is travelling across Canada this summer in support of several military and veterans' charitable causes on a mission called Bikers United in Remembrance: the road, the bike and the people she's riding for are all close to her heart.

"When I wonder if I should quit, or feel like no one cares, someone comes up and says they're a soldier, you hear their story, they cry.... That and the ride are a peacefulness in my heart, and I know I need to finish what I started. "Soldiers don't quit."

Renee Charbeneau was in the Valley August 9, and passed through Kingston to meet up with several local members of the Canadian Army Veteran Motorcycle Fortress Europe unit. She's had various motorcycle clubs,

her on long stretches of her journey, which started June 18 and will finish September 16. She's chronicling all of it on her website, weekly online motorcycling newspaper and cable show.

Charbeneau says Canada's New Veterans' Charter has affected many veterans, and her ride is a way to draw attention to charter changes. One of the areas she's concerned about is the lack of funding for service dogs for veterans living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder: a third of what Charbeneau raises from her ride will go to Paws Fur Thought, a fundraising walk to Ottawa now underway by Eastern Passage's Medric Cousineau. a former serviceman, to raise money for 50 service dogs; in memory of her friend, Vic Remillard. The other funds will support the Military Police and Veteran's Emergency Transition Services.
