A Royal Canadian Air Force CP140 Aurora aircraft from 14 Wing Greenwood's 404 Squadron had the honour of representing the Canadian Armed Forces October 5 at the Royal Australian Navy's (RAN) International Fleet Review in Sydney, Australia.

The CP140 Aurora took part in a multi-nation fly-by with three Australian AP-3 Orion and one Pakistani P-3C Orion, all maritime patrol aircraft which

The RAN invited more than 50 countries to send warships, tall ships and aircraft to participate in the event, October 3 to 11, to mark the 100th anniversary of the first time the flagship Her Majesty's Australian Ship (HMAS) Australia sailed into Sydney Harbour in 1913.

The first Australia Naval Fleet arrived October 4, 1913. The review is the largest commemorative event ever undertaken by the RAN, and more than 8,000 Australian and visiting personnel were expected to be viewed

Distinguished guests, leadership of the Royal Canadian Legion, comrades, veterans, ladies and gentlemen, men and women on parade: Chief Warrant Officer Stanley and I are very pleased to be here this afternoon in this wonderful setting on behalf of 14 Wing Commander Colonel lan Huddleston and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Pierrot Jette. Quite honestly, I leapt at the opportunity to venture to this corner of Nova Scotia, to witness, on this very special day, the rededication of this monument to those tremendously courageous men who came before us, who served their king and country and, ultimately, gave their lives in the defence of the empire, the defence of Canada, the defence of Nova Scotia, of their county their families and their friends.

The names on this cenotaph recall those from this part of Cumberland County who made the supreme sacrifice serving their country during the two world wars. There is tragedy enough in any death, but there is real poignancy here. Beldon, Burton and Stanley Treen -- if not brothers then, certainly, cousins; and Private Murdock A. Seaman, who died 15 days after the war in Europe had ended.

There is also history here, proud Canadian and Nova Scotian history: Passchendaele, Vimy Ridge and, in the case of Private Andrew Davidson, who served with the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment, the capture of the port of Boulogne.

And there are links today. The 106th Battalion arrived in England, only to be broken up to provide reinforcements to regiments already in the thick of fighting. Most went to the 25th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, more popularly known as the Nova Scotia Rifles, which today is perpetuated by 1st Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders. Their motto, "Siol Na Fear Fearail," translates into "Breed of Manly Men," which, I think you will all agree, describes the soldiers whose names are inscribed on the cenotaph we are honouring today, and in the days ahead.

Be it the Royal Canadian Navy, the Canadian Army or the Royal Canadian Air Force, I would submit the Canadian Armed Forces of today has been shaped by the men and women who, in their day, dedicated themselves to their country both at home and abroad. As it was before us, those who took up arms - whether it was a four-year stint, a decade-long hitch or an entire career; would not have been able to do their job - to accomplish the mission - if it were not for the support of their community and families back home.

I would further suggest this cenotaph is not simply a monument with the names of the fallen etched into its stone sides. Every name represents a regiment, a unit rich in history and heritage. Every name is a town rich in culture. Every name is a family rich in memories, both happy and sad. To touch and trace the names is to recognize the battles, both horrific and glorious. To touch and trace the names is to know the towns and villages where the young men grew up and from which they left to fight on foreign soil. To touch and trace the names is to know the families who loved and waited for their husbands, sons, uncles and cousins to return; to return back to the hills and vales of Cumberland County and this beautiful province of Nova Scotia.

Malagash monument renewed

The re-dedication of the Malagash community cenotaph October 5 was deemed a success by event organizers, thanks in large part to the participation of 14 Wing Greenwood representation.





Talk to your children about what they are doing online and teach them how to deal that they may come across. Talk to them about the con-


