Training, testing for emergencies

A morning in class is the price to be paid to ensure 14 Wing Greenwood responders are ready in case of an emergency.

September 26, the base's emergency response program hosted a set of seminars, covering everything from fire services to damage control at a scene to partnerships with non-military paramedical and communications agencies.

"We have to make sure we maximize this program," said Lieutenant-Colonel Scott Latter, commanding officer of Wing Operations and in charge of the A3 Readiness and Evaluation team

"It's my insurance policy for what may or may not happen on or off the base and I hope it never happens. This training is our payment of this policy.

Latter said the level of training, whether it is through online directories, table top exercises or fully staged emergency scenes: "makes me comfortable.

"Our emergency response program is well-lauded within the Canadian Armed Forces, due to a lot of work."

The readiness team regularly gathers and updates all the information on contacts, equipment and personnel the base has at hand and in the surrounding community.

"It's a collaborative effort," said Captain Dave Nelson, the training day organizer. "Once a plan is developed – and there are 26 chapters in that document - a lot of input has to come in from wing contributors to make the file work. We always want to try and make it better."

And, because "there is not much point in a plan if you don't actually test it, you make sure it actually works."

There are regular tests of the plan at 14 Wing, at various levels and scales: coming up October 31, a full airfield scenario will be re-enacted, meaning the plan's multiple elements will be called upon to move.

"The results from events like that will help us redevelop the plan if required. It's a living document.'

A quiet 60 years Lone visitor marks Lancaster crash anniversary

Myles Meed, 81, marked a quiet 60th anniversary tragedy at 14 Wing Greenwood October 9, with a solitary visit he's made from the Second World War

in 1953.

Then, he was a young airman, working in aircraft radio repair on RCAF Station Greenwood's Lancaster bombers, leftovers

several times since a fateful day being used for coastal patrols. frame or aero engine systems. After every 1,000 hours of flight, the planes were torn apart and inspected, rebuilt and ready for a test flight. Ground crew were taken along to check for any problems with radio, radar, air-

"I was being paid \$87 a month, and any of the ground crew who could get eight hours' flying time in a month received \$30 more," Meed says. "This created a race: every time there


was a test flight, the overtime might be five or six hours - but no one got up to eight."

A new "rule" was made: in future, a list would be posted in each section of whose turn it would be to do all the flying that month, so at least one person would get the \$30. Then, their name would return the bottom of the list to work its way back

October 1953 was Meed's "lucky" month in the aircraft radio repair shop: it was his turn for the month's test flights. October 9, a Friday, there were no scheduled test flights, so Meed asked for the afternoon off. He took what time he could to catch the Digby ferry home to Bristol, New Brunswick and visit his parents, as his mother was ill.

"Around 1 o'clock that afternoon, when I was on the ferry, someone in one of the hangers changed their minds and decided to do a test flight, so they called down to the section and asked for me, but I was away. A chap named Green jumped at the chance to go," Meed recalls.

The aircraft had just lifted off when it lost power on both left side engines, while both right side engines were running full throttle for takeoff. The plane immediately turned left, the left wing dropped and the plane crashed between the main station and the married quarters.



RCAF unveils new badge

Following the national Battle of Britain ceremony, held in Ottawa September 15, Lieutenant-General Yvan Blondin unveiled the Royal Canadian Air Force's new badge before a crowd of veterans, Royal Canadian Air Force personnel and guests.

Two Cadets from 742 Squadron, located in Ottawa – Flight Corporal William Lambert, 14, and Leading Air Cadet Anne-Florence Lambert, 12 - assisted. The brother and sister knew they were participating in a significant and historic event.

It was "amazing," said agreed, saying, "I was very proud."

"While we are the youngest of the three services," said Blondin, in a message to RCAF personnel earlier this year, "we have a unique military history, proud traditions, powerful symbols and a strong sense of community.

"Now is the time for us "National Capital" Air Cadet to build upon our heritage, to strengthen the unique identity of the modern RCAF history."

The design of the new badge recalls the pre-unification badge design and shows an eagle flying with its wings outstretched. It replaces the Air Command badge that came into being following the unification of the Canadian Forces in 1968 and that dis-Canadian astral crown.





Greenwood team wins Blake Memorial challenge
