Head of RCAF wants more Visit chance to share flying future

Lieutenant General Yvan Blondin, commander of the Royal Canadian Air Force, was all business on his second visit to 14 Wing Greenwood October 22.

On a visit last year, he toured a range of personnel and family support programs. This time, it was all operations.

"It was time to go around the wings and talk to the people about their challenges – but also what I have in mind," he said.

That includes doing more with the same – or less, and doing it better.

The long-awaited CP140 Au-

rorra Block III structural and technological upgrade is coming into its own, deployed overland in surveillance and reconnaissance in Libya in 2011 and being exercised all over the world.

"The CP140 is becoming a key asset for the Air Force – much more than just a maritime patrol aircraft."

The money, manpower and resources that have gone into the aircrafts' overhaul in the past decade are proving worth it.

"Block III is on track – and more. I don't have enough, and I can't have it quick enough," Blondin said.

Reserve role makes a difference at 14 Wing

Major Richard LeBlanc says maintaining the strength of 14 Wing Greenwood's Air Reserve Flight is a "juggling act," between the essential role Reserve personnel fill and the funding to make it happen.

The flight's commanding

officer held a town hall session October 16 for the wing's 206 Reserve personnel, a chance to review the section's work, success, challenges and more.

"We are the 'flexible, responsive and reliable contribution' to Royal Canadian Air Force capability," LeBlanc said, referring back to the Air Reserve's core mission. "We have Air Reserve

members embedded in almost every segment of the wing, and you punch well above your weight when you compare the contributions you make and the experience you bring with the Regular force members working side by side with you."

Nationally, the Air Reserve is down in numbers, under 2,000 members from 2,200 just a

couple of years ago. The biggest factor is recent pension changes that affect Reservists working in different class positions. Still, newcomers are being added to Reserve ranks, from new-to-the-forces individuals to Regular force retirees who have skills to contribute.

"And," LeBlanc reminded Reservists, "we're not hiring you

to give you a job: we're hiring to fill a mission need.

"In Greenwood, we have a great pool of people happy with the local area and who have the expertise. You're one of the reasons this wing is a 'go-to wing.'"

Reservists fill a myriad of support and technical trade roles at 14 Wing, and come into play as Regular force members step out

for maternal and parental leaves, for example, or are called upon for operations, deployments or training requirements.

"Your respective chains of command have shown excellent support for you folks, your work demands and the opportunities that we have for Reservists.

"Keep doing what you're doing."

SAR Techs airlift injured man

Two aircraft – a Hercules and a Cormorant – from 14 Wing Greenwood's 413 Squadron were called out just before noon October 22 to conduct a medical evacuation from a vessel, the Atlantic Preserver, 60 miles south of Yarmouth.

A 52-year-old male fisherman was experiencing a medical emergency. He had apparently hurt his back and

had no feeling in his legs. Search and rescue technicians aboard the Cormorant conducted a hoist, extracting the patient, and transported him to Shearwater. He was released to an Emergency Health Services ambulance at the airport.

The Hercules aircraft and crew provided top cover throughout the mission.

Ill fisherman hoisted in 413 call

14 Wing Greenwood's 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron responded October 15 to a call for help from a fishing vessel in the vicinity of Sable Island.

The on-call crew was tasked to assist a 29-year-old man aboard the Atlantic Sunset suffering from nausea and abdominal pain. On scene,

SAR Techs lowered to the boat from the Cormorant helicopter by hoist, to find the patient in weak condition. They lifted him back aboard the Cormorant with the rescue basket and continued monitoring his condition en route to Sydney. The patient was then handed over to Emergency Health Services at the Sydney airport.

Day of thanks with Canadian vets

Giving some extra thanks this past Thanksgiving weekend was not an easy task.

In fact, it was downright challenging for 14 Wing

Greenwood personnel who volunteered to spend an afternoon October 12 with veterans at Camp Hill Veterans Hospital in Halifax. Heart wrenching wounds from battles long ago remain fresh for our veterans:

Juno Beach, the Battle of the Bulge, Vietnam - to name a few intense experiences. The veterans who live at Camp Hill have the physical and emotional scars - and the medals - to prove they lived through

difficult times.

"We picked up enough memories to last a lifetime," veteran Reid Byron Myers told us. He enlisted in 1943 and served in the 4th Canadian Armoured Division. On the website <http://www.thememoryproject.com/stories/1695:reid-byron-myers/>, Myers, in words and pictures, describes "the carnage, the wreckage, the stench, the dead bodies, human and animal: it was unreal."

While talking with Myers, I could see in his eyes his experience was stitched deep into his heart. He arrived at Camp Hill Hospital earlier this spring and has had a difficult time adjusting to living in a new environment.

"It was really hard at first," he said. "After you get to know the people who live here, and the nurses, they deserve a medal right here for everything they do!" Myers said, as he motioned to his chest.

14 Wing's Corporal Terri-Lyn Connors spent some time with Myers as well, and learned of his two proud sons living in Halifax, who come to

visit him often. He mentioned to her he had earned the rank of sergeant while in the field overseas. He also came back with a German Iron Cross and a German Mother Cross he had found while serving.

Giving thanks to veterans like Myers was rewarding for all 14 Wing volunteers who attended. There was a lot of laughter, food and generosity,

with stories and memories flowing all afternoon. The bus ride to the hospital that morning was quiet and long, the time we spent at Camp Hill was gone in a flash and bus ride home was full of the chatter of shared, new memories. If you haven't had the chance to spend time with our veterans, you are missing out on a privilege that is fading fast.

Get your flu shot, free

It's flu season.

Annapolis Valley Health reminds residents of the importance of getting their annual flu vaccination. This year's vaccine will protect against three strains of seasonal flu predicted to circulate, including H1N1. Flu shots are available at most pharmacies and at your family physician's office. The flu shot, whether received

from a care provider or pharmacist, is free for Nova Scotia residents under MSI.

Several open flu shot clinics will be held in the Valley:

Western Kings Memorial Health Centre, Berwick (walk-in at Dr. Yury Stubeda's office): October 29, 30 and 31, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Mud Creek Medical Co-op, Wolfville (by appointment

only: 542-3663): October 29, 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.; November 1, 8, 15, 22, 29 3 p.m. to 4 p.m.; and November 12, 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

In addition to getting a flu shot, there are other ways to prevent catching and spreading the flu:

- Wash hands often with soap and water, especially after a sneeze or cough. When soap and water are not handy, alcohol-based hand sanitizers are an acceptable alternative.
- Cover your cough and sneeze.

- Limit touching eyes, nose and mouth.
- Do not share drinking glasses, or eating utensils, water bottles, mouth guards, or cosmetics.

Aboriginal CAF candidates get a taste of Army, Air Force careers

October 18, 26 candidates on the Canadian Armed Forces Aboriginal Entry Program from Camp Aldershot arrived at 14 Wing Greenwood to attend an Air Force-themed day. Candidates have been

recruited from around the country to attend this pre-Basic Military Qualification course, and are exposed to different aspects of the military and Aboriginal cultural activities. Candidates take the Canadian Armed Forces Aptitude and physical training tests, receive first aid training, drill lessons and classes on military ethics; and gain an idea of which trades they may like, or be eligible, to enter should they decide to join

the forces. The orientation day at 14 Wing was designed to expose them to the many different components of the Air Force, and capture their attention.

The day began with a briefing about Greenwood base and the range of resources it offers, from the medical facility to bowling to the gym.

At 14 Air Maintenance Squadron, Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Pierre Haché described what exactly a CO does.

In four groups, the candidates then toured 10 Hanger, receiving briefs from Periodic, the Air Combat Systems and Component shops, Non-Destructive Testing, Engine Bay, Aviation Life Support Equipment and the air traffic control tower. Each brief was well done and informative, with a lot of equipment on display and interesting questions asked.

At 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, the group received a brief on the history of the squadron, its capabilities and area of responsibility before splitting off into two groups. The first group headed over to the Aurora, Cormorant and Hercules static displays to be greeted by crews and given a tour. The second group was briefed on what a search and rescue technician does, and the training involved in becoming one, while being given a tour of the facilities available to SAR Techs, including equipment shelves, the rock wall and medical room. As they were on the flight line leaving

413 Squadron, a Cormorant came in to land. As this was the first time many of them had been on a flight line, let alone near aircraft, it was very exciting.

The day finished with a visit to the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum, divided into four smaller groups and toured throughout the facility by knowledgeable and enthusiastic museum volunteers. The museum's displays span over 70 years of aviation history, and each volunteer added their own personal touch to the tours.



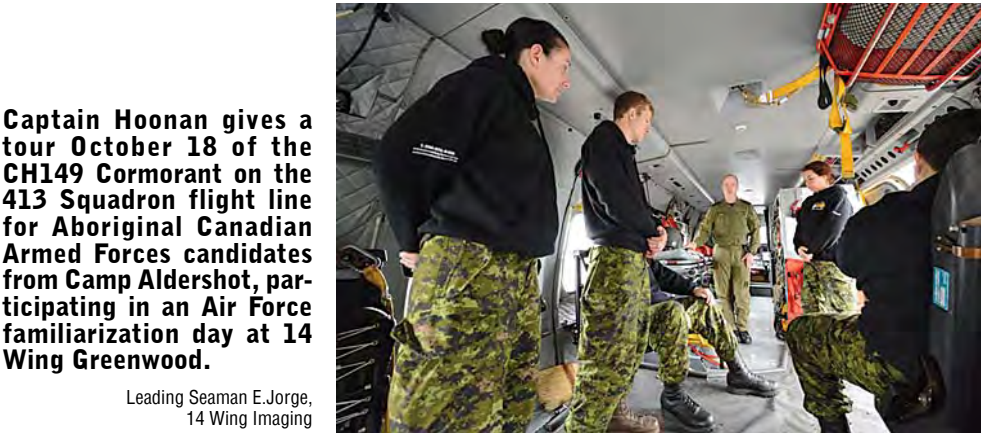

Rodent nests detected at Morfee Centre

Following an investigation of bad odour at the Morfee Centre, 14 Wing Greenwood Construction Engineers discovered mice and shrew nests in the insulation within the walls.

It is likely the rodents are accessing the walls through the outside siding. The affected areas appear to be limited to two rooms, and WCE is aggressively working on the affected areas.

As the rodents have not gained access to the centre beyond the walls, 26 Health Services preventive medicine technicians and WCE have determined there is no harm to the occupants of the building. However, should anyone see any rodents inside the centre, you are asked to call WCE at 765-1494 local 5207.

Over the coming days, preventive medicine technicians and WCE will be conducting a full survey of the centre, including air quality checks, and repairing any further areas where rodent nest are found. Pest control specialists will also set live traps to capture the rodents. WCE will also make the necessary repairs to the exterior siding where there are possible areas rodents could gain access into the walls.

Au cours des prochains jours, les techniciens de la médecine préventive et l'AG Ere mèneront une étude complète du Centre pour inclure la qualité de l'air et réparer toutes les autres zones où se nichent les rongeurs. Spécialistes de la lutte antiparasitaire poseront également des pièges pour capturer ces rongeurs vivants. L'AG Ere va également effectuer les réparations nécessaires au revêtement extérieur où il y a des endroits où les rongeurs pourraient éventuellement avoir accès dans les murs.

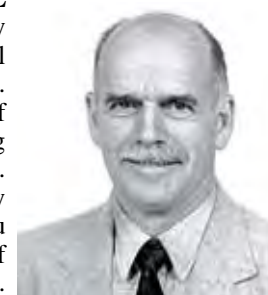

The current 18 RCAF CP140s will be reduced to 10 Block III models; Blondin would like to see 14 in the fleet, and is awaiting federal direction on that request.

"We can fly these now to 2030. There is no other aircraft superior to this in the world. We've got an asset, and other countries are looking at the way we've modernized our planes, and the fact we have not bought new."

The replacement for the CC130 Hercules, one of Canada's fixed-wing search and rescue aircraft, is another story. Targeted for a 2017 change, Blondin says he's not in the acquisition business.

"I will use what I have, and we'll fly it until the next airplane comes in. If it's early, great; if it's late, we can keep it flying. It won't be cost effective, but we can do it – it's already been 20 years since we said it needed to

be replaced."

Infrastructure throughout the Air Force's wings is in the same waiting game: Blondin says the Department of National Defence is being asked to do its share in federal budget reductions. The Air Force's biggest solution, and what he came to 14 Wing to specifically speak to aircrew members about, is increased simulation flying time.

"How do I get the best operational capability? I can get better results with a simulator: there is less operational cost, less of a carbon footprint, longer life for aircraft, more time for more people to train and more hours in the air for when I need them."

What he needs from Greenwood, he said, is "more."

"That's the challenge I gave to the wing commander: increase capacity with simulation, more training, more qualified crews."

The hitch: Greenwood needs another simulator, and it's an eight-year process to buy one. The challenge is com-

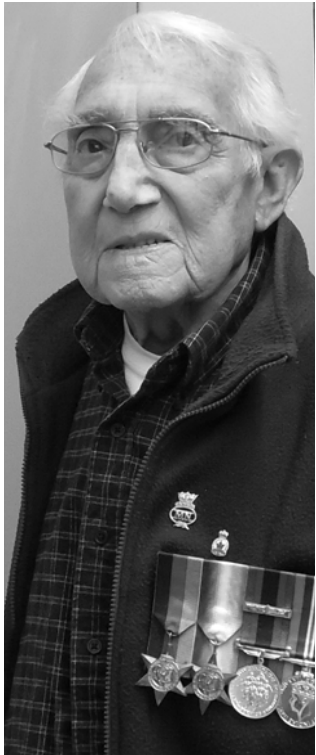

## RAF hockey visitors here for Canadian game

The Royal Air Force's hockey expectations are – and players admit it freely – low.

"We have no expectations," says Chief Technician Andy Harris, in Greenwood for a

week of team training. "We have, probably, well-motivated people, but hockey in the United Kingdom is definitely a specialist sport, compared to the core level of ability we're finding here in the Canadian players."

The RAF Aces represent the

top 20 or so hockey players in the UK, selected after the annual five-station competition and championship to take part in this over-the-Atlantic hockey "road trip." Harris says the team has been to Cold Lake before, and Greenwood was an easy

arrangement to make, as there are a number of RAF personnel on exchange with Canadian Air Force branches they can use as liaisons. Here in Greenwood, it's Flight Lieutenant Daz Williamson, posted with 405 Squadron for the past couple of years as a crew commander and standards officer.

"I've played with these guys on the Aces, I know a lot of them through the tournaments and the championships at home. Hockey in the UK is growing, all the way from professional teams down to the beer leagues. In the RAF, the players are there, but the depth compared to Canadian hockey isn't."

Williamson is a player with

14 Wing's men's team, and appreciates just what the RAF visitors are up against through their week of training and games against 14 Wing's intersection-level teams.

"It was a bit of a jump for me: the learning curve was like this," he says, slanting his hand in the air steeply. "But, the constant, high level of hockey has helped me."

Harris said the RAF players are willing to face that same learning curve.

"Technically, we're not bad, but tactics – that's where we struggle, in pulling it all together. That's endemic in Canadian hockey players," he says.

With an 8-1 loss to the team from Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit the night

before, Harris is realistic about the RAF Aces' odds against teams from 413, 404 or any one of three (!) teams from 405 squadrons the rest of the week.

"While we're not content with losing, we're learning so much. We have a game, we have ghastly results but we take something from every one."

Beyond the rink, the RAF players stayed in 14 Wing's accommodations and had a number of opportunities to mix socially and professionally with their military peers in Canada. 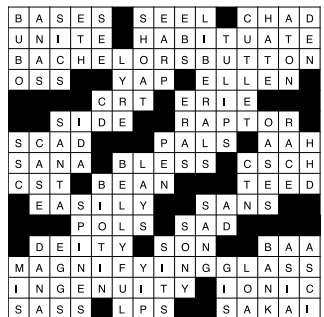

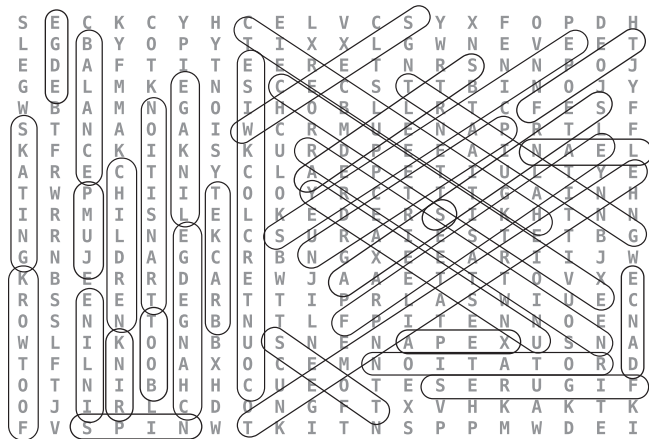
