







## Head of RCAF wants more Visit chance to share flying future

Lieutenant General Yvan Blondin, commander of the Royal; Canadian Air Force, was all business on his second visit to 14 Wing Greenwood October 22.

"It was time to go around the wings and talk to the people about their challenges – but also what I have in mind." he said.

The long-awaited CP140 Au-

"The CP140 is becoming a key asset for the Air Force – much more than just a maritime patrol aircraft."

The money, manpower and resources that have gone into the aircrafts' overhaul in the past decade are proving worth it.

"Block III is on track - and more. I don't have enough, and I can't have it quick enough," Blondin said.

While talking with Myers, I could see in his eyes his experience was stitched deep into his heart. He arrived at Camp Hill Hospital earlier this spring and has had a difficult time adjusting to living in a new environment.

"It was really hard at first," he said. "After you get to know the people who live here, and the nurses, they deserve a medal right here for everything they do!" Myers said, as he motioned to his chest.

### Aboriginal CAF candidates get a taste of Army, Air Force careers

October 18, 26 candidates on the Canadian Armed Forces Aboriginal Entry Program from Camp Aldershot arrived at 14 Wing Greenwood to attend an Air Force-themed day.

Candidates have been

recruited from around the country to attend this pre-Basic Military Qualification course, and are exposed to different aspects of the military and Aboriginal cultural activities. Candidates take the Canadian Armed Forces Aptitude and physical training tests, receive first aid training, drill lessons and classes on military ethics; and gain an idea of which trades they may like, or be eligible, to enter should they decide to join

the forces. The orientation day at 14 Wing was designed to expose them to the many different components of the Air Force, and capture their attention.

The day began with a briefing about Greenwood base and the range of resources it offers, from the medical facility to bowling to the gym.

At 14 Air Maintenance Squadron, Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Pierre Haché described what exactly a CO does.

In four groups, the candidates then toured 10 Hanger, receiving briefs from Periodic, the Air Combat Systems and Component shops, Non-Destructive Testing, Engine Bay, Aviation Life Support Equipment and the air traffic control tower. Each brief was well done and informative, with a lot of equipment on display and interesting questions asked.

At 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron, the group received a brief on the history of the squadron, its capabilities and area of responsibility before splitting off into two groups. The first group headed over to the Aurora, Cormorant and Hercules static displays to be greeted by crews and given a tour. The second group was briefed on what a search and rescue technician does, and the training involved in becoming one, while being given a tour of the facilitates available to SAR Techs, including equipment shelves, the rock wall and medical room. As they were on the flight line leaving

The museum's displays span over 70 years of aviation history, and each volunteer added their own personal touch to the tours.
