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'Crash' training meets goals

"It's the details that get you," Captain Dave Nelson knows all too well: as he prepared for the October 31 14 Wing Greenwood airfield emergency exercise, he knew he had to ensure as many base personnel as possible got what they needed from the simulation.

"There are 1,000 things that have to be done before something like this goes ahead, but this went pretty well. We want to make sure people have the training opportunities and get the chance to articulate their objectives in an exercise. Many of the partners, this may be their personnel's first year in Greenwood, or they don't know their counterparts in other branches."

Parking a "crashed" CC130 Hercules at the end of the runway, Nelson cast a debris field of carefully labelled items around the plane, and put "victims" that needed to be treated on the ground. The event put into motion airfield controllers, fire response crews, wing flight safety teams, medical responders from the base and provincial systems, environmental monitors, Military Police and many others: about 70 people were involved in the exercise, including a number of "white cell" observers.

"The feedback from the event was good: people got what they needed and met that constant training challenge," Nelson said. "Command and control – there is always work to be done there," but he did say electronic communications were much improved over past exercises.

"I now put a post-exercise report together for the wing commander, and then we start looking at next year's syllabus for training, with the first activity in January. We try to keep something related to training and emergency response going all the time."

Arctic SAREX a test of the elements

Three members of 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron have just returned from the Arctic Joint Search and Rescue exercise in Alaska, the latest exercise conducted October 28 through November 2 by the Canadian Joint Operations Command to foster international interoperability.

The exercise was a large undertaking, involving over 100 Canadian Armed Forces personnel from 19 Wing Comox, 17 Wing Winnipeg, 8 Wing Trenton and 14 Wing Greenwood, as well as United States military and Coast Guard personnel from Alaska and

as far south as Portland, Oregon. The scenario was designed to exercise the capabilities of Arctic search and rescue organizations and agencies through a simulated major air disaster in a remote Arctic environment. 435 Squadron was tasked with providing the fixed wing search and rescue platform, with a Cormorant helicopter deployed from 442 Squadron in Comox and a C130J departing Trenton with the Major Air Incident Disaster (MAJAIID) Kit.

Once the call came October 29 a 737 airliner had crashed in a remote part of the Arctic, the simulated rescue coordination centres and command levels

all started moving assets in to place to effect a search. Once the crash site was found, the rescue plan was initiated. Eleven search and rescue technicians were the first to parachute in to this remote drop zone. The U.S. pararescuemen from Portland and Alaska then followed. The technicians immediately understood what had to happen and worked efficiently, attending to the wounded and setting up the overnight camp.

The U.S. and Canadian MAJAIID kits are similar and, once everything was airdropped to the simulated crash site, all the equipment was easily set up into a workable field hospital. Extrac-

tion was planned for the next day using 2 HH60 Pavehaws, the Cormorant and a C-47 Chinook but, due to actual weather, only two helicopters were able to get to the site. It took the CH149 and HH60 crews numerous trips to a forward operations airfield (a short 20-minute flight away) to extract all exercise participants before the weather deteriorated.

This exercise was a major undertaking and afforded CAF and U.S. forces a great opportunity to work together in a remote and challenging environment. The next major disaster exercise is now in Canada's hands, and will be planned in conjunction with Op Nanook next year.

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
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Let's talk about addictions

Base partners reaching out to military, families, community November 25

Lisa White and Ian Smith hope to extend the network of support they belong to into the wider community.

White, as 14 Wing Greenwood's Health Promotions manager, and Smith, a chief warrant officer and one of White's co-facilitators, are teaming up to offer an information session on alcohol, drugs and gambling issue awareness November 25 in Greenwood for military members, defence team members, their families and community friends.

"We get mostly military members in the official courses and briefings I offer here at the wing," says White, even though many of the programs are open to military and defence team members and their families (over age 18). "But, we know there are more people out there - we hear from them."

Smith is committed as a health promotions partner for personal reasons, but also sees the value in having a military member of rank in the chain of command talking about these issues and playing a part in the

resources available to his peers and co-workers. He pursued an independent degree in psychology, and provides aftercare through the wing's social workers to people who may be facing their own challenges.

"We know 10 per cent of people have addiction issues, but that impacts on 90 per cent of the other people - and themselves," he says. "I'm concerned for them as people, but, as a leader, there's also an economic and operational cost to having people struggle."

The information session will be held at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre, and Wing Commander Colonel Iain Huddleston and Kings West MLA Leo Glavine, the new provincial health minister, will co-open the event with shared remarks. White will describe some of the 10 resource programs Health Promotions offers regularly, and highlight safe party hosting at a time of year when festivities and holiday gatherings are common. Smith plans to speak about addictions issues, before representatives from the Kings RCMP and 14 Wing Military Police share some of their experiences around community calls and the

law. Representatives from 26 Canadian Forces Health Services will describe their programs, and Alcoholics Anonymous and Al-Anon leaders will present a few stories. There will be tonnes of information people may take home, from Health Promotion program brochures to community support groups to books for families.

"This is an event we hope will reduce stigma, and help people see they can seek help without stigma," Smith says.

White hopes people who may be suffering from addictions, or know people who are, will attend and find information that may help.

"The effects of addictions are huge," Smith says. "If a person with issues doesn't get help, everyone is suffering around them. We want to give people the tools to recognize what's going on, and get them to resources."

The information evening is open to all, free of charge, and will take place at 6:30 p.m. at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre on Church Street Monday, November 25. For information, on this event or Health Promotion services, contact 765-1494 local 5388.

Parlons de dépendance

Le 25 novembre, des partenaires de la base vont à la rencontre des militaires, de leurs familles et de la collectivité

Lisa White et Ian Smith souhaitent étendre le réseau de soutien auquel ils appartiennent à l'ensemble de la collectivité.

Lisa est gestionnaire des Services de promotion de la santé à la 14^e Escadre Greenwood, et Ian est adjudant-chef et compte parmi les co-intervenants de Lisa; leur équipe offrira une séance d'information sur les problèmes d'alcool, de drogue et de jeu le 25 novembre à Greenwood à l'intention des militaires, des membres de l'Équipe de la Défense, de leurs familles et de leurs amis dans la collectivité.

« Ce sont surtout des militaires qui assistent aux cours et aux séances d'information officiels que je présente ici, à l'Escadre », affirme Lisa, soulignant que bon nombre des programmes s'adressent aux militaires et aux membres de l'Équipe de la Défense ainsi qu'aux membres de leurs fa-

milles (âgés de plus de 18 ans). « Mais nous savons que beaucoup plus de gens pourraient y participer – nous en entendons parler. »

Ian s'est engagé à titre de partenaire dans la promotion de la santé pour des raisons personnelles, mais il reconnaît aussi l'utilité qu'un militaire du rang dans la chaîne de commandement parle de ces problèmes et fasse partie des ressources à la disposition de ses pairs et de ses collègues. Il a obtenu de façon autonome un baccalauréat en psychologie, et il offre un suivi par l'entremise des travailleurs sociaux de l'Escadre aux personnes qui ont des difficultés à surmonter.

« Nous savons que 10 % des gens ont des problèmes de dépendance, mais ces problèmes ont des répercussions sur 90 % de leur entourage, y compris eux-mêmes, précise Ian. Je m'inquiète pour eux, en tant qu'êtres humains, mais, en ma qualité de chef, je m'inquiète aussi du coût économique et

opérationnel associé à des gens en difficulté. »

La séance d'information aura lieu au Centre communautaire de la 14^e Escadre Greenwood. Le colonel Iain Huddleston, commandant de l'Escadre, et Leo Glavine, député provincial de Kings West et nouveau ministre provincial de la Santé, ouvriront conjointement l'événement en prononçant chacun quelques mots. Lisa décrira certains des 10 programmes d'aide que la Promotion de la santé offre régulièrement, et elle attirera l'attention sur les mesures à prendre pour être un hôte responsable en cette période de l'année où les festivités et les réceptions des Fêtes sont fréquentes. Ian prévoit aborder les problèmes de dépendance, avant que des représentants de la GRC du comté de Kings et de la police militaire de la 14^e Escadre parlent d'expériences qu'ils ont vécues en répondant à des appels dans la collectivité et en appliquant la loi. Des représentants du 26^e Centre des

Services de santé des Forces canadiennes décriront leurs programmes, puis des responsables des Alcooliques anonymes et d'Al-Anon présenteront leurs témoignages. Les gens retourneront chez eux avec une tonne de renseignements, qu'il s'agisse de brochures sur les programmes des Services de promotion de la santé, d'information sur des groupes de soutien communautaire ou de livres pour les familles.

« Nous espérons que cet événement permettra de réduire la condamnation sociale et amènera les gens à comprendre

qu'ils peuvent demander de l'aide sans être montrés du doigt », souligne Ian.

Lisa espère que les personnes qui souffrent d'une dépendance ou qui connaissent quelqu'un qui fait face à ce genre de problème assisteront à la séance et y trouveront des renseignements utiles.

« Les conséquences d'une dépendance sont énormes, souligne Ian. Lorsqu'une personne en difficulté ne demande pas d'aide, c'est tout son entourage qui en souffre. Nous voulons outiller les gens pour les aider à reconnaître ce qui ne va pas

et leur fournir des ressources. »

Canadian military, equipment aid Philippines

A Royal Canadian Air Force aircraft carrying personnel and equipment deploying as part of the Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) to the city of Iloilo in the Philippines left November 11 from 8 Wing Trenton, part of Operation RE-NAISSANCE 13-1.

The Canadian Armed Forces will support the Department of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Development, leading Canada's response to November 8's Typhoon Haiyan. Significant loss of life, a large number of injuries, as well as destruction of property has been reported. Nearly 4.3 million people are

reportedly affected, and although needs assessments are ongoing, humanitarian needs are expected to be substantial. The government has pledged \$5 million in aid, and committed to match every dollar donated by Canadians.

A CC-177 Globemaster III aircraft was loaded with engineering vehicles and equipment to support DART activities and 43 DART personnel. It is destined for the city of Iloilo at the request of the Government of the Philippines. Located on the island of Panay, Iloilo is a location where numerous people have been heavily affected.

Canada's Interdepartmental Strategic Support Team was already in the Philippines and assessing needs on the ground. The decision to deploy to Iloilo is based on the assessment and recommendations of the team, and a request by the Government of the Philippines.

The DART is a multidisciplinary military organization designed to deploy on short notice in response to situations ranging from natural disasters to complex humanitarian emergencies. The DART is equipped to conduct emergency relief operations for up to approximately 40 days to bridge the gap

until national and international aid agencies arrive to provide long-term help. Working alongside local authorities and other international organizations and agencies, DART acts as a stabilization measure until regular services are restored.

Nineteen CAF personnel from the Humanitarian Assistance Response Team (HART) have also deployed with the ISST. Made up of headquarters staff and a reconnaissance element, the HART liaises with the ISST and the headquarters of Canadian Joint Operations Command to prepare for the arrival and employment of follow-on CAF assets.

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
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Rescue 912 crew wins Cormorant Trophy, rescue award

The Royal Canadian Air Force crew of search and rescue helicopter Rescue 912 has won both this year's Cormorant Trophy from AgustaWestland and the Prince Philip Helicopter Rescue Award from the Guild of Air Pilots and Air Navigators (GAPAN).

"The February winter storm 'Nemo' presented challenges to our crew during the rescue that tested every aspect of our training and saw the helicopter and crew pushed to their limits," said Noble. "I'm proud of my crew for the courage and professionalism they displayed during the mission and am glad that we were able to return the three stranded hunters in distress to their loved ones."

The Prince Philip Helicopter Rescue Award citation from United Kingdom-based GAPAN says the crew of Rescue 912 "demonstrated remarkable professionalism and achievement that led to the saving of three lives."

This was echoed in the Cormorant Trophy citation, which noted their "courage, expertise and resourcefulness" and said their "skill and exceptional crew coordination ultimately led to the saving of three lives."

Both award juries selected the crew for their outstanding rescue February 3, 2013, of three hunters from a New-

foundland ice floe in blizzard conditions: winds were so strong, the helicopter flew the final two miles to the rescue point backwards.

All were with 103 Search and Rescue Squadron, 9 Wing Gander, in February 2013 during a harrowing rescue call.

launched, Noble was faced with flying the Cormorant helicopter through "a full-on winter blizzard" with 40 centimetres of snow accumulating and wind gusts up to 75 kilometres per hour. They immediately hit icing conditions. While flying in extremely low visibility through rugged terrain, navigating many islands and a narrow inlet, the Cormorant was pounded from the rear by 80 kilometre per hour winds and severe turbulence off 100-metre hills. Conditions were so severe Noble twice considered calling off the rescue.

With two miles to go to the rescue location, Noble performed an impromptu "out of the box" manoeuvre, turning the helicopter 180 degrees and flying backwards to gain stability. The other crew members scrambled to different positions and duties: Groten on the map, Hiscock in the rescue door, Warden in the left spotter window and Vokey at the tail. All were spotting and guiding Noble to the hunters' last known position.


Once Warden spotted the hunters' lights and flares, Vokey was hoisted down to start the rescue, fighting

through the storm, fierce rotor wash and static electric shock. The three hunters were hoisted aboard suffering hypothermia and were taken to hospital in Gander for treatment.

"This is another outstanding rescue effort by dedicated Royal Canadian Air Force members who had the confidence to push themselves and their aircraft to the extreme to ensure that lives were saved," said Jeremy Tracy, head of region - Canada for AgustaWestland.

As the Rescue 912 crew are now on duty with different squadrons across Canada, the Cormorant Trophy will be

presented at a later ceremony with a crew reunion. The crew received the GAPAN award in London, England, October 23. The Cormorant Trophy is presented annually to a Canadian civilian, government or military helicopter crew performing the most demanding helicopter rescue of the year. The Prince Philip Helicopter Rescue Award is presented annually by the GAPAN to an individual or crew of a helicopter or helicopters for an act of outstanding courage or devotion to duty in the course of land or sea search and rescue operations.

Comment éviter les coûts élevés des voyages durant les Fêtes

(EN) - Le temps des Fêtes n'a pas la même magie et le même attrait pour tous. 



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Partners put community first in restorative justice process

The week of November 17 to 24 is Restorative Justice Week. The designated theme this year is "Inspiring Innovation," a phrase that aptly describes the work the Nova Scotia Restorative Justice (NSRJ) program has been doing since 1999.

The NSRJ program accepts referrals from any point in the criminal justice process: police, Crown attorney, judge or corrections; for youth between the ages of 12 and 17 who have come into conflict with the law - and the victims of these offences. Being solidly entrenched in the conventional justice system has earned the program distinction worldwide. Don Clairmont, Professor Emeritus, Department of Sociology & Social Anthropology at Dalhousie University and Director of the Atlantic Institute of Criminology, has been quick to point out the NSRJ program is poised to be considered a "world leader" in restorative justice.

The NSRJ program is comprised of nine non-profit, community-based agencies covering the entire province.

Each agency is governed by a board of directors, allowing the program to adapt to the individual needs of community it serves. Funding is provided through the Department of Justice.

Valley Restorative Justice

(VRJ), with an office in Kentville, covers Annapolis, Kings and West Hants counties. First Nations youth are referred to the Mi'kmaw Legal Support Network (MLSN) for a more traditional process.

The four main goals of the program are to reduce recidivism, increase victim satisfaction, strengthen communities and increase public confidence in the justice system as a whole. These goals are achieved by holding youth accountable for their actions through meaningful consequences that take into account the needs and wishes of the victims. Victims of crime are given the option of meeting face-to-face with the youth, in order to allow them the opportunity to tell their story and impact what the youth will have to do to make amends. Victims often feel being allowed to tell their story in detail and explain how the incident has affected them gives them satisfaction. The outcome is the Restorative Justice Agreement, which lists the steps the youth must take in order to make amends for

his/ her actions. Volunteers in each county are trained to help co-facilitate the sessions. Facilitators are neutral, and merely aid the parties involved in coming to an agreement.

The 14 Wing Greenwood Military Police feel the program is especially helpful in their closely-knit community. In a community that blends military and civilian members, both at work and at play, having the option of helping community members through the restorative justice process is beneficial. Military Police recognize the restorative approach, which includes elements of deterrence and rehabilitation, adds a restorative dimension and offers greater potential for healing than the conventional justice system.

Recent innovations in Nova Scotia include using restorative options to handle conflict in the workplace, in universities, through the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission and in schools. The Restorative Approaches In Schools Project (RAISP), which combines the efforts of the Depart-

ment of Education and the Department of Justice, aims to help youth learn how to maintain healthy relationships and manage conflict. Benefits include reduced stress, greater sense of belonging and lower suspension rates. The project is being piloted in several areas in Nova Scotia, including West Kings District High School and its feeder schools. A significant number of students at West Kings come from military families posted to 14 Wing Greenwood. The RAISP is yet another innovative example of how restorative practices can bring together communities for the greater good.

Les partenaires place la communauté au cœur du processus de justice réparatrice

La Semaine de la justice réparatrice se déroule du 17 au 24 novembre. Cette année, le thème choisi est « Au cœur de l'innovation », une expression qui décrit bien le travail accompli par le programme de Justice réparatrice de la Nouvelle-Écosse (JRNE), depuis son instauration en 1999.

Le programme de JRNE accepte les renvois provenant de n'importe quel point de la structure du processus de justice pénale – police, procureur de la Couronne, juge ou services correctionnels – pour des jeunes âgés de 12 à 17 ans qui ont eu des démêlés avec la justice et pour les victimes des infractions commises par ces jeunes. Du fait qu'il est solidement enraciné dans le système de justice conventionnel, le programme s'est démarqué dans le monde entier. Don Clairmont, professeur émérite au département de sociologie et d'anthropologie sociale de l'Université Dalhousie et directeur de l'*Atlantic Institute of*

Criminology s'est empressé de souligner que le programme de JRNE est en voie de devenir un « chef de file mondial » dans le domaine de la justice réparatrice.

Le programme de JRNE est composé de neuf organismes communautaires sans but lucratif qui desservent l'ensemble de la province. Chaque organisme est régi par un conseil d'administration, ce qui permet au programme de s'adapter aux besoins individuels de la communauté qu'il dessert. Le financement est obtenu par l'entremise du ministère de la Justice.

Le Programme de justice réparatrice de Valley, qui a un bureau à Kentville, dessert les comtés de Kings, d'Annapolis et de East Hants. Les jeunes des Premières nations sont aiguillés vers le Mi'kmaw Legal Support Network (MLSN) où ils peuvent bénéficier d'un processus plus traditionnel.

Les principaux objectifs du programme sont les suivants :

réduire la récidive, accroître la satisfaction des victimes, renforcer les collectivités et rehausser la confiance du public à l'égard du système de justice dans son ensemble. Ces objectifs sont atteints en tenant les jeunes responsables de leurs actes par la prise de mesures offrant des perspectives positives, tout en tenant compte des besoins et des souhaits des victimes.

Les victimes d'actes criminels se voient offrir la possibilité de rencontrer le jeune en personne, de façon à leur donner l'occasion de raconter leur histoire et d'avoir une incidence sur ce que le jeune devra faire pour réparer ses torts. Souvent, les victimes estiment que le fait de pouvoir raconter leur histoire en détail et de pouvoir expliquer de quelle manière l'incident les a touchées leur procure de la satisfaction. Le résultat est l'entente de justice réparatrice, qui énumère les étapes que doit suivre le jeune pour faire

amende honorable pour ses actes. Dans chaque comté, des bénévoles sont formés pour aider à coanimer ces séances. Les animateurs sont des personnes neutres et aident seulement les parties concernées à en arriver à une entente.

Les membres de la Police militaire de la 14e Escadre de Greenwood estiment que le programme s'est avéré particulièrement utile dans leur communauté tissée serrée. Au sein d'une communauté qui regroupe des militaires et des civils, tant au travail que dans les loisirs, le fait d'avoir la possibilité d'aider des membres de la communauté à suivre le processus de justice réparatrice est bénéfique. La Police militaire reconnaît que l'approche de la justice réparatrice, qui comprend des éléments de dissuasion et de réadaptation, ajoute une dimension « réparatrice » et offre de meilleures perspectives de guérison que le système de

justice conventionnel.

Les innovations récentes en Nouvelle-Écosse comprennent l'utilisation des options de la justice réparatrice pour gérer les conflits en milieu de travail, dans les universités, par l'entremise de la Commission des droits de la personne de la Nouvelle-Écosse, et dans les écoles. Le Restorative Approaches In Schools Project (RAISP) [projet d'approches réparatrices dans les écoles], qui combine les efforts du ministère de l'Éducation et du ministère de la Justice, vise à aider les jeunes à apprendre comment maintenir des relations saines et comment gérer les conflits. Au nombre des avantages, mentionnons la réduction du stress, un sentiment d'appartenance accru et des taux de suspension moins élevés. Le projet est mis à l'essai dans plusieurs régions de la Nouvelle-Écosse, notamment à l'école secondaire West Kings District et dans les écoles dont proviennent

ses élèves. Un grand nombre d'élèves de West Kings proviennent de familles de militaires affectés à la 14e Escadre Greenwood. Le RAISP est un autre exemple innovateur de la façon dont le recours aux pratiques de justice réparatrice permet de rassembler les communautés pour le bien commun.

Le Programme de justice réparatrice de Valley aimerait profiter de l'occasion pour remercier tous ses bénévoles, ainsi que les membres du conseil d'administration, pour leur soutien continu.
