Military kids' programs link schools, MFRC

The Military Family Resource Centre, a registered not-for-profit, charitable organization serving 14 Wing Greenwood, has received a grant from the Bell True Patriot Love Fund.

Bell Let's Talk and the True Patriot Love Foundation presented \$25,000 to the MFRC to support a school liaison program. Combined Charities volunteers runs a full slate of fundraising activities every September through December, including a pay allotment program, a mega-potluck, mock jail and dress-with-adifference Fridays. Movember efforts, various food and tov drives and localized initiatives undertaken by offices and branches are also tallied in to the total. The funds raised are a part of the year-long Wing Charities initiative, and are distributed to several dozen community and regional school, youth, health, sports, animal welfare and other causes close to 14 Wing personnels' hearts.

This year's festival was a great success: 14 Wing-sponsored trees raised \$4,425, and community business-sponsored trees raised another \$3,760. The event's raffle tree collected \$574.60 in ticket sales, and the 50/ 50 raised \$316.50. 14 Wing Imaging offered family holiday photo went smooth." thanked the Management of the Management of

With Greenwood Scotiabank contributing \$5,000 through its community matched funding program, and with a number of staff volunteering throughout the event, the day's grand total reached \$14,640.10.

"We beat last year's total by about \$2,000. A huge thanks to all committee members for putting up excellent trees, and for those who volunteered for the work duties - everything went smooth." Murdock also thanked the Military Family Resource Centre Junior Ranks mess for child care during the event, Wing Imaging for the family picture service, bake sale donors and volunteers and Scotiabank for support through its matched

Addictions issues a community concern

Policing puts face on issues

Policing officials are just as concerned with the impacts of alcohol, drugs and gambling.

Kings RCMP Community Policing Officer Blair MacMurtery and Military Police Master Corporal L.P. Yuill shared some of their experiences, from education to awareness to enforcement around the issues.

"Every week – every day, I read the files of what's happening Kings County," MacMurtery said.

He warned the "drug of choice" in communities now is easy to find: prescription drugs, sitting home in your medicine cabinet.

"Good people have drugs in their homes - but you don't know where they're going. These drugs can destroy you and your family.

He advised people to take those drugs and lock them away, watch who they discuss medical issues - even a back ache – with in public, and take advantage of free pharmacy and community drug disposal programs.

Yuill went further, advising Canadian Armed Forces members many prescription drugs impair your ability to drive, operate heavy equipment or fly.

'That's important, and people are breaking the law and don't even know it.'

And a shower, meal and coffee after a night of drinking? "Whatever," Yuill said. "Time is the only remedy for

Ongoing issues both police forces deal with – domestic calls, fighting, impaired drivers - all have "fuels," Yuill said. In many, many cases, it's alcohol.

"We want to be out there stopping things before they happen," he said.

Combined efforts at impromptu road checks, school education programs, intelligence-led police work to investigate drug dealing and more "are making headway," MacMurtery said.

"But pick up the phone and call us."

14 Wing Greenwood and community resources took a step together towards action on alcohol, drug and gambling addictions.

An information session was hosted November 25

by the base's Health Promotions and mental health services agencies. Lieutenant-Colonel Scott Murphy, commanding officer of 413 Squadron and the base's health and fitness "champion," opened with

a caution: addictions can manager (ill for the event). affect anyone from any background: military members, civilians and families.

"As members of the defence team family, we face some pretty unique challenges," he said. "An addictions-free lifestyle is key. As with any mental health issue, there is a stigma attached we need to overcome, and there are many resources here at the wing and in the Valley.

Chief Warrant Officer lan Smith led the discussions on behalf of Lisa White, Health Promotions

He and White present a series of workshops to the defence team every year on addictions, and spent several months timing this evening with National Addictions Awareness Week programs.

"There are reasons people use alcohol, drugs or gamble - and if I asked you, you'd know the answers," Smith said. "It's a drinking culture.

"Most people, when I ask

drink, it was when you were young, you snuck a beer that's experimenting. But, you learn from experience and it's not a thin line to cross. A lot of people have a hard time wrapping their heads around that. It's stigma that it's willpower, that, 'you're a smart guy, you'll pull up your

socks and just stop. "Dependence is when you're willing to pay the price: your money, your wife,

Captain Kim Grondin, the 14 Wing social worker, said many of his patients selfrefer, which is encouraging: "The Canadian Forces message is getting out there. that 'Maybe I should take a look at my behaviours and seek help."

"We want them to come in. Canadian Forces programs are not mandated. they're offered. How can we help?"

Give safety, security a thought through holiday season

The holiday season is a time for giving, sharing and enjoying family and friends. The seasonal spirit, along with busy schedules, may also increase the opportunities for criminal activity: property crime, identity theft and impaired driving. 14 Wing Greenwood's 31 Military Police Flight personnel suggest simple safety and in the ignition.

security tips to assist you in having a safe and happy holiday season:

1. Be alert and aware of your surroundings. Pay attention to who is around you and what activities are going on nearby. Trust your instincts: if you feel uncomfortable with a place or person(s), leave. When shopping, park in a well-lit area and never leave your car unattended with the motor running or with the keys

Use credit card smarts. Don't carry extra credit cards or large amounts of cash. Keep a master list of all cards in a safe place in the event your wallet is lost or stolen. Never leave your wallet or purse unattended in a change room or shopping cart. Investigate the legitimacy of charities before donating.

- 3. Don't leave valuables, in plain view, in your vehicle. Parking lots are target-rich environments for thieves. Never leave your purse, wallet, cell phones, garage door openers or personal information in your vehicle. Thieves are always looking for easy targets. Locking your valuables in the trunk may deter them from choosing your car. Remember to lock your car.
- 4. Away from home during the holidays? Arrange to have your driveway cleared of snow. Cancel all deliveries

2. Don't get scammed. and arrange for a neighbour to pick up any flyers/ mail. Discard the packaging from major ticket items carefully in order to conceal the nature of their contents. Consider using automatic light timers and leaving on a TV or radio to make your home seem occupied. Remember to lock your residence.

> 5. Driving during the holidays. Prepare for winter driving conditions and ensure your vehicle is properly maintained and equipped with the appropriate tires and cold weather emergency supplies. Buckle up and be a patient and courteous driver this busy holiday season. Always plan ahead and arrange for a designated driver, use shuttle buses when available, have funds for a taxi or use other local programs, such as Operation Red Nose, when attending social events. Don't drink and drive.

Five things everyone should know about impaired driving

- Once you've had "too much," no amount of coffee, fresh air or cold showers will help you get sober. The only cure is time. It takes about six hours for your body to eliminate all the alcohol from a blood/ alcohol reading of .08 (the legal limit)
- Impaired driving is the leading criminal cause of deaths in Canada
- Impaired drivers face penalties ranging from seven-day roadside prohibitions, vehicle impoundments, one-year driving prohibitions, criminal charges, fines and jail time
- Driving while impaired voids your vehicle insurance, which means you could be responsible for paying for any damages or injuries that result from an accident
- Party hosts could be held legally liable for damage caused by a guest's impaired driving. If you are hosting a holiday party, protect yourself from vicarious liability by offering non-alcoholic options, monitor your guests' alcohol consumption and be prepared to assist with cab fares, arranging rides or offering overnight accommodations.

Do your part to help keep the community safe. If you see or suspect someone of driving under the influence this holiday season - or at any time of year - call 911 or Military Police at 765-1494 local 5333 and be ready with a description of the make/ model/ color of the vehicle, the vehicle's location and direction of travel and, if possible, the license plate number.

Military Police will be conducting random roadside checks throughout the 14 Wing Greenwood community, aimed at ensuring everyone enjoys a safe and festive holiday season.

"It's great to have this event so close," club coach Cheryle Gaston says. "More skaters will attend, and family and friends can come and cheer them on!"




