February is Heart Health Month

"Many unaware of thirdhand smoke's toxic effects"

Smoking, or even exposure to second-hand smoke, has been proven to increase a person's risk of heart disease and stroke. But even after the smoke has left the air, the toxic components can linger on surfaces – an effect known as thirdhand smoke. Yet, a recent study from the journal Pediatrics shows that many people are unaware of this problem. "We know there are parts of this thirdhand smoke which are toxic. The residuals of the cigarette's 250 poisonous metals, chemicals and other components embed into upholstery, drapes, carpets and other surfaces and remain there long after the smoke is gone," says Foundation researcher Dr. Andrew Pipe of the University of Ottawa Heart Institute. "This just once again underscores that exposure to cigarette smoke in any form – first, second or

The study looked at the attitudes of smokers and nonsmokers toward smoking in their homes and other enclosed spaces, particularly around children. Researchers interviewed 500 households in the U.S. They saw that while 95% of nonsmokers and 84% of smokers said that they believed a parent's smoking was bad for their child's health, far less – only 65% of non-smokers and 43% of smokers -knew about thirdhand smoke. "We want to ensure our homes are safe and that there's nothing dangerous to children, but in homes with smoking, there are constant hazards present. Children are crawling on carpets, putting things in their mouths, rolling around on pillows—and these are all places where cigarette smoke clings and leaves its toxic residue," Dr. Pipe says. "Children inhale

more particulate matter than adults. Plus, they are at a crucial point in their development, so smoking in the home can be particularly harmful to kids.

The study suggests that parents have an active role to play in keeping their children safe by preventing smoking inside the home – or in other enclosed spaces. "I think it's important that thoughtful smokers don't want their addiction to harm others. Smoking outdoors on their own property is where their smoking should take place and they should seek to make their homes smoke-free," Dr. Pipe says.

This version of the Silver Dart – Transport Canada registry C-IIGY, is a replica of the original Silver Dart aircraft designed by the Alexander Graham Bell-led team of associates known as the Aerial Experiment Association formed in 1907. In 1909, on Feb. 23rd, the original AEA team of associates designed





McCurdy Biplane

Although neither designed nor built in Canada, J.A.D. McCurdy's biplane played a role in Canadian aviation history. After the dissolution of the Canadian Aerodrome Company, McCurdy joined Glenn Curtiss, but left his corporation in May 1911, forming his own company in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on 20 June. He subsequently designed a biplane with no forward elevator, unusual for the time, and powered by a Gnome engine. McCurdy contracted the Queen Aeroplane Company of New York City to build six of the airplanes.

Three of the biplanes were sold to private hands. G.G. Hubbard II, a relative of Alexander Graham Bell, bought one, as did W.E. Doherty of Buffalo. One of McCurdy's pilot pupils, a Doctor Weidman also purchased one.

Three of the new biplanes were shipped to Hamilton to participate in an air display. The exhibition in Hamilton was held on a farm on the outskirts of the city, from 27 to 29 July. One biplane, which had been tested in New York, was assembled and performed well. On 1 August, McCurdy, Charles Willard and J.V. Martin participated in an unofficial race from Hamilton to Toronto, this being the first intercity flight in Canada. Despite the fact that Willard departed 10 minutes before him, McCurdy won the race, covering the distance of 72 kms (45 miles) in 32 minutes, landing at Fisherman's Island. The next day McCurdy and Willard flew in an exhibition at Donlands Farm northeast of Toronto; however, McCurdy's plane was launched into the air prematurely by the bumpy field, crashed and was destroyed.

The McCurdy biplane goes into the Canadian aviation record as being the only aircraft that was wholly designed by J.A.D. McCurdy, the Canadian aviation pioneer, and as the first airplane to make an inter-city flight in Canada.

Le biplan McCurdy

Malgré le fait qu'il n'a pas été conçu ni construit au Canada, le biplan de J.A.D. McCurdy a joué un rôle dans l'histoire de l'aviation canadienne. M. McCurdy, qui s'était associé à Glenn Curtiss après la dissolution de la Canadian Aerodrome Company, quitte l'entreprise en mai 1911 et crée sa propre entreprise à Pittsburgh, en Pennsylvanie, le 20 juin suivant. Il conçoit alors un biplan sans gouvernail de profondeur avant, ce qui est inhabituel pour l'époque, et propulsé par un moteur Gnome. M. McCurdy engage la Queen Aeroplane Company, de New York, pour construire six de ces avions.

Trois des biplans sont vendus à des particuliers. G.G. Hubbard II, un membre de la famille d'Alexander Graham Bell, en achète un, ainsi que W.E. Doherty, de Buffalo, et un certain docteur Weidman, un des apprentis-pilotes de M. McCurdy.

Les trois autres biplans sont expédiés à Hamilton en vue d'une démonstration aérienne. Cette démonstration se tient du 27 au 29 juillet dans une ferme, en périphérie de la ville. L'un des biplans, que l'on avait testé à New York, est assemblé et donne de bons résultats. Le 1 er août, MM. McCurdy, Charles Willard et J.V. Martin participent à une course non officielle entre Hamilton et Toronto. Il s'agit du premier vol interurbain au Canada. Même s'il part 10 minutes après M. Willard, M. McCurdy gagne la course, parcourant une distance de 72 kilomètres (45 milles) en 32 minutes pour atterrir à Fisherman's Island. Le lendemain, M. McCurdy et M. Willard participent à une démonstration à Donlands Farm, au nord-est de Toronto. Toutefois, l'avion de M. McCurdy, ayant pris son envol trop tôt en raison du sol cahoteux du champ, s'écrase et se brise.

Le biplan McCurdy s'inscrit dans l'histoire de l'aviation canadienne comme étant le seul aéronef conçu entièrement par le pionnier de l'aviation canadienne, J.A.D. McCurdy, et le premier avion à effectuer un vol interurbain au Canada.

The JN-3 represented the first series production of an aircraft in Canada and a major step towards aircraft production in Canada. When Glenn Curtiss began building aircraft for the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS) in 1915 he built a factory in Canada and opened the Curtiss Aviation School to train pilots. Curtiss began construction of his JN-3 in Toronto in May 1915, with the first Canadian model flying on 14 July 1915, with all aircraft being completed in August that year.

The JN-3 was a standard trainer of the RNAS; however, its American origin resulted in it being received with some reservation at some RNAS stations. In the United Kingdom, modifications were made to some of the aircraft including fitting four-bladed propellers, and some wire braces replacing metal struts in an effort to strengthen the aircraft. The JN-3 also served in small numbers in Australia with their training system. In Canada, the JN-3s were used to train most of the 130 pilots who received their training with the Curtiss Aviation School. Of these, 128 joined the RNAS or the Royal Flying Corps.


A total of 104 JN-3 were built of which 18 were made in Canada -12 for the RNAS and 6 for the Curtiss Aviation School. The Canadian Government expropriated the Curtiss plant in December 1916 and set up Canadian Aeroplanes Ltd. Although the plant proved to be too small, the machinery for the JN-3 was used for production of the JN-4 while most of the employees also transferred. Canadian Aeroplanes Ltd went on to build over 1260 JN-4s in Canada, with the machinery and personnel who built the JN-3s playing a major role in this success

Le Curtiss JN-3

Premier avion à être produit en série au Canada, le JN-3 a contribué à l'essor de l'industrie de la construction d'aéronefs au Canada. Lorsque Glenn Curtiss commence à construire des aéronefs pour le Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS), en 1915, il ouvre une usine au Canada et fonde son école, la Curtiss Aviation School, afin de former des pilotes. M. Curtiss commence à fabriquer son JN-3 à Toronto, en mai 1915, et le premier modèle canadien prend son envol le 14 juillet suivant. En août, la construction de tous les avions est terminée.

Le JN-3 est utilisé comme avion-école de base par le RNAS. Toutefois, il est accepté avec une certaine réticence dans quelques stations du RNAS en raison de ses origines étatsuniennes. Au Royaume-Uni, on apporte des modifications à l'aéronef. Entre autres, on le munit d'une hélice quadripales, et on remplace certains haubans par des contre-fiches en métal en vue de renforcer la structure de l'avion. En Australie, quelques JN-3 sont utilisés dans le cadre du programme de formation de pilotes. Au Canada, on s'en sert pour former la majorité des 130 pilotes inscrits à la Curtiss Aviation School. Parmi ceux-ci, 128 pilotes deviennent membre du RNAS ou du Royal Flying Corps.

Au total, 104 JN-3 sont fabriqués, dont 18 au Canada: 12 pour le RNAS et 6 pour la Curtiss Aviation School. En décembre 1916, le gouvernement du Canada exproprie l'usine de M. Curtiss et fonde la Canadian Aeroplanes Ltd. Même si cette usine s'est avérée trop petite, les mécanismes du JN-3 ont servi à la production du JN-4, et la plupart des employés ont été embauchés par la nouvelle usine. La Canadian Aeroplanes Ltd. a fabriqué plus de 1 260 JN-4 au Canada. Ce succès est attribuable en grande partie aux mécanismes des JN-3 ainsi qu'au personnel qui les a construits.

Helping Children Deal With Catastrophic Events

This topic first came to light for me in the aftermath of the Indonesian tsunami in December 2004; watching my children striving to process the events of this day drove home that I needed to make conscious effort to support them. However, as often does, time passed, and I became immersed in family schedule, and daily responsibility. A few months ago I noticed two of my young children paying attention to the evening news, and soon was left dumbfounded in front of questions like "why do all the soldiers die? When will the bad men come here to get us? How will I know Auntie and Uncle will be okay if they go back there?". As a parent, these are neither easy nor comfortable queries to answer. I wanted to protect my children, and initially resorted to the image of the three little monkeys: hear no evil, see no evil, speak no evil... if they didn't hear it, see it, and I didn't speak it, the fear would not be real to them. I now believe that they deserve more, I owe them the grace, skill and tools of learning to cope with traumatic and catastrophic events, on an age appropriate level.

Some general tips:

ComParrot

- 1. The first thing to be sure of is YOU. Children and adolescents are very much influenced by the moods of their caregivers, kids will pick up on your feelings. This does not mean that you should not feel or express these feelings rather that you must be in control of them. This is an opportunity for you, and the adults around the children, to role model that you can experience overwhelming feelings, without being overwhelmed by them.
- 2. Often traumatic and catastrophic events are sudden, unpredictable, and uncontrollable. Not only is the child unprepared for the event, no one around them is. This perception of adult helplessness often can provoke extreme anxiety in children; the fear is not as horrible as the perception

of helplessness. Therefore, finding ways to create sense of purpose and contribution are very effective tools in supporting children (i.e. writing letters to the deployed troops, participating in a Yellow Ribbon Campaign).

General techniques:

- Establish a routine as soon as possible; this serves to build predictability into the child's or adolescents' life.
- Limit exposure to television or newspaper reports. Young children are very concrete and may not understand that repeated replays of the event are depicting the same one incident; they may believe if they've seen it 5 times then it has happened 5 times.
- Be sure there is a responsible parent/caregiver present and prepared to explain or answer questions when a child does see media stories of the event.
- Help children feel they have the power to make change for the better. Children and adolescents can draw a picture, write a letter, fundraise etc.
- Respond to questions clearly and calmly.
- Encourage children to explain their understanding of the event, gently correct misconceptions and misinformation.
- Do not lie about your own feelings; it is okay to tell your child that you feel sad.
- Be patient. Kids may want to repeat the same story or ask the same questions over and over again, this is their way of processing and making sense of the event.
- Be honest and don't use words which downplay the event.







Sixty years ago, the Royal Canadian Air Force

(RCAF), the precursor to today's Canadian Forces

Air Command (AIRCOM), played a surprising role in



the 1948 Olympic Games held in St. Moritz, Switzerland. Due to strict amateur eligibility requirements, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association (CAHA) could not send a hockey team to the V Olympic Winter Games. The RCAF Flyers, a senior amateur team based out of Ottawa, fit the bill nicely and were bankrolled by the President of the Royal Bank of Canada, Sydney Dobson. Despite some early misgivings by players and experts alike, the team brought home the gold with a record of 7 wins, 0 losses and 1 tie, with an incredible 69 goals for and only 5 goals against.
