

Over the past month Keith Brenson, Ernie Killen, and Mike Dandurand finished the fuselage woodwork and the rigging of the aileron control cables. Brian Handley finished sandblasting and painting the engine fire bottles that will be installed on the engine firewalls. These will be fitted in the near future. Al Sheppard, Peter Miller, Butch Fleury, and I spent most of time manufacturing the two port and starboard wing navigation light assemblies. On a recent visit to Ottawa I managed to make a drawing and

a cylindrical tube attached
to the leading edge with the
red and green navigation
lights attached to the tube.
Al Shepard and I checked
out the two electrical
harnesses and then

"Annie" was a mixed bag of metal trusses, fabric and wood, requiring skills and knowledge that was fast fading from the air force; flaps were raised and lowered hydraulically by means of a hand pump, the afore mentioned mechanically-operated undercarriage that gave little trouble other than its operation, and pneumatic brakes which did.

Snow clearance from tarmacs and runways became routine but sudden thaws and freezing rains were another kettle of fish. The Charlottetown airfield was built on land sloping down to the hangars. A



taxiing aircraft with locked wheels and spinning propellers, sliding on a sheet of ice presented a scary sight to the ground crew on equally unsure footing. When being tailtowed in such conditions, care had to be taken to avoid jack-knifing, with damaged to the elevators as a result of contact with the

tractor. Salt was not an option, so liberal use of sand and manhandling were employed when necessary.

An experiment to fit one of our Anson's with skis was tried. Beautifully made of highly-varnished wood, they proved too heavy for the retraction gear. This, plus surface-adhesion

(even to taxi), extra drag, and doubts that the Cheetahs could get her airborne, led to its abandonment - to the immense relief of the designated crew!

OTTAWA (le 31 janvier 2009) – Un soldat canadien a été tué lorsque son véhicule blindé a heurté un engin explosif improvisé à environ 40 km à l'ouest de Kandahar City, dans le district de Zharey. L'incident s'est produit vers 14 h 45, heure de Kandahar, le 31 janvier 2009.

À été tué en action le Sapeur Sean Greenfield, membre du 2e Régiment du Génie de combat basé à la BFC Petawawa. Le Sapeur Greenfield faisait partie du 24e Escadron du Génie de campagne et servait avec le groupement tactique du 3e Bataillon, The Royal Canadian

Regiment.

One Canadian soldier killed in Afghanistan

> OTTAWA (January 31, 2009) — One Canadian soldier was killed when his armoured vehicle struck an improvised explosive device about 40 km west of Kandahar City in Zharey District. The incident occurred at approximately 2:45 p.m., Kandahar time, on January 31, 2009.

Killed in action was Sapper Sean Greenfield from 2 Combat Engineer Regiment based at CFB Petawawa. Sapper Greenfield was a member of 24 Field Engineer Squadron and was serving with the 3rd Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment

The remaining members of the vehicle crew underwent a medical examination as a precautionary measure and were subsequently returned to duty.

All members of Task Force Kandahar are thinking of the family and friends of Sapper Greenfield during this difficult time. We will not forget his sacrifice as we continue to bring security and hope to the people of Kandahar Province.

While, we the West Novas were in England in the late summer of 1940 the Battle of Britain seemed to taper off some; that is when Hitler was preparing to attack Russia.

There was a lot in the English newspapers about the exploit of R.A.F. night fighter pilots, which was quite interesting. There was a lot about what they had to go through, high

above England. There was France usually flying in a special mention about one called (Cats Eyes) Cunningham who shot down sixteen Nazi bombers. He flew alone trailing enemy bombers by their exhaust glow only, as there were no lights. There was always the danger of collision but he lived through that when many did not.

Late in the fall of 1940 our fighters started to make sweeps across

pairs, and finding plenty of good hunting for them. The Nazis were starting to strengthen their defences along the coast as an invasion was expected. The R.A.F. fighters used their machine guns on anything that looked like enemy. When they ran out of ammunition they headed for England. A few

of them never made it, they got shot down. A few which got shot down and were lucky to land by parachute and taken prisoner.

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in **Canadian Aviation Heritage**

The Curtiss Canada was with a Sperry-designed autothe first twin-engine aircraft built and flown in Canada. At the start of the First World War, the Royal Navy was impressed with the Curtiss H-4 "Small America" flying boat, and requested a landplane version. As the Curtiss Company in New York was too busy designing new aircraft and building war orders, the signed before the characterresponsibility for modifying the flying boat to landplane, to be known as the "Colum-

Work on the "Canada," as the aircraft was renamed when the work was transferred, began in Toronto in May 1915 with the first flight in late-July that year. The aircraft was accepted by the Royal Naval Air Service (RNAS) in September and was shipped to the United Kingdom, with test flights being made in November. Unusual for an aircraft of the time, the "Canada" was fitted
