

It has been a while since the Wise Owl scribe has had the chance to put feather to paper!

For such a small unit, 14 SES has a fair share of ongoing tasks. These tasks support current operations and seek to identify how SES will lead the fleet over the next five years while we transition to a Block III airframe.

Currently, the unit is striving to complete the testing of Version 24 software. Being the unit's number one priority, this version will greatly enhance crew situational awareness on the Block II aircraft. Mr. Les Smith and Capt Adrian Matheson are leading this effort.

There is a buzz around the squadron for the Overland Equipment Mission Suite project (OEMS) with Mr Henry Hoeksma being the Senior System Engineer (SSE). This project will soon add new capabilities to the Aurora to enable crews to better fulfil overland missions.

14 SES will be supporting this project in three ways: we will design the computer networks on-board the aircraft; develop the software that integrates the aircraft with the various vendor computers; and, we will test software to make sure everything functions properly. There are seven 14 SES members busily designing and building these components:

Capt Mariano Arruda, Mr. Michael Borek, Mrs. Anne Dort, Capt David Dunwoody, Mr. Tom Eaton, Mr. Henry Hoeksma, and Mr. Jonathan Tweedie.

Everything will start coming together in February with a first flight planned for the spring. By the fall, the OEMS will make the Aurora a more capable airplane for flying the much anticipated overland missions.

Our unit's current third priority task is to continue to enhance the Operational Mission Simulator (OMS) to increase the fidelity of the trainer to match the aircraft. The first phase of this modification was a great success for the fleet, led by Capt Jason Furlong and his team. Now that Phase One is complete, the team, now led by Capt Colin Timmons, is working to increase the communication and navigation capability of the trainer to ensure its viability until the advent of the Block III OMS.



NOTICE TO RESIDENTS

PERSONAL TAX EXEMPTION 2009/2010

The Council of the Municipality of the County of Kings directs, by policy, that an exemption be granted for the taxation year 2009/2010 pursuant to Section 69 of the Municipal Government Act, in an amount not exceeding \$130.00; upon property owned and occupied by a person who is a resident of the Municipality of Kings,

Whose total gross income from all sources for the year 2008, excluding any allowance paid pursuant to the War Veterans Allowance Act (Canada) or pension paid pursuant to the Pension Act (Canada), but including the income of all members of the same family residing in the same household, is less than \$20,000 gross income,

Where property is jointly owned, only one tax exemption shall be allowed and the sharing in such exemption shall be on the basis of ownership in such joint property.

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in **Canadian Aviation Heritage**


Bien que n'ayant été ni conçu ni construit au Canada, le Curtiss HS2-L a joué un rôle important dans l'histoire de l'aviation canadienne. Dans les faits, les premiers HS2-L présents au Canada étaient 12 appareils provenant de la Naval Air Station des États-Unis établie à Halifax qui sont restés au pays à la fin de la Première Guerre mondiale et qui ont par la suite été donnés au gouvernement du Canada. L'ARC a finalement utilisé la plupart de ces appareils, auxquels sont venus s'ajouter 12 autres achetés plus tard, leur confiant divers rôles, comme missions photographie aérienne, de surveillance des frontières et des pêches ainsi que de respect de la prohibition, et ce, jusqu'en 1928, année du retrait des derniers HS2-L

Curtiss HS2-L

Although not built or designed in Canada, the Curtiss HS2-L played a significant role in Canadian aviation history. The first HS2-Ls in Canada were 12 left over from the United States Naval Air Station in Halifax at the end of the First World War and were subsequently donated to the Government of Canada. The RCAF would eventually use most of these aircraft plus an additional 12 purchased later, operating them to perform in various roles, including aerial photography and anticustoms and fisheries patrols until 1928 when the last HS2-Ls were retired.

Laurentide Paper Company requested two aircraft for use in its logging operations. Under what became the Laurentide Air Service, the HS2-L went on to pioneer a number of firsts in Canada including the use of aircraft to spot forest fires and aerial photograph. Perhaps more important was the delivery of mail by air and the first regular passenger service, demonstrating the viability of aircraft performing these services.

A major user of the HS2-L was the Ontario Provincial Air Service, which began operations in 1924 with 14 aircraft, eventually operating 20. These aircraft allowed the

Of the 12 donated aircraft, fledgling service to make an accurate survey of forestry resources and subsequently used in many roles, the major one being fire protection operations. Many smaller operators, such as Canadian Airways and Pacific Airways, also used the HS2-L to fly passengers, especially prospectors and surveyors, into remote locations as well as transport high-value freight.

The HS2-L was not an efficient aircraft for bush flying; however, it did prove that the aircraft could be used for myriad purposes in the north and helped pioneer many routes and roles. It therefore retains a unique place in Canadian aviation.



Despite some early misgivings by players and experts alike, the team brought home the gold with a record of 7 wins, 0 losses and 1 tie, with an incredible 69 goals for and only 5 goals

section of the PMQ's before returning back to the Church parking lot.



Many thanks to our readers for their competent, interesting, reports.

Tony Chalk is pleased to see the Common Redpolls at his feeders. He wrote: "They are everywhere on the ground, sitting in the feeders and in the trees and their distinctive chatter is so pleasant to hear. The Chipping and American tree sparrows are still around as are the Downy and Hairy Woodpeckers taking turns at the bird pie even fighting off the Starlings. Barbara and I have watched the Redpolls arrive at a clump of Birch Trees/Bushes, consume all of the Catkins/Seed Pods then proceed to the next supply. This time of year there is likely little food left in the natural environment so your feeders become essential.

Gary Myers wrote: "Monday, Roger Short and I took a drive to the Sheffield Mills area. The eagles were pretty much a noshow, at 1500 the eagles on Dyke Road were nearly outnumbered by the people. We saw a flock of 20-30 Horned Larks on Highway 341 just south of Canning. While we were trying to get a photo of them (strangely heavy traffic kept scaring them up) we were distracted by the sight of a large flock of Canada Geese just east of the Canard River Bridge. On Highway 221, in Dempsey Corner, we saw an unusual, predominantly white, Red Tailed Hawk. He didn't stay long

enough for us to get Roger's scope on him but we did get a look through binoculars. When we first saw him in the air we were reminded of a Snowy Owl. It was definitely a hawk but neither of us has seen one with such a white breast." (consider on's Goshawk, below)

In Aylesford, Ann Young wrote: "The Red Bellied Woodpecker is still here, I hope he stays for the summer. The usual Blue Jays, Red & White-breasted Nuthatches, E. Starlings, Dark-eyed Juncos & American Goldfinches. It seems to me that some of them are starting to get brighter yellow already. I had a few Kinglets, I don't often get them, fascinating to watch them work their way through a spruce tree! I guess my big news is that today is the first day that I have seen a Robin! It was eating Crab Apples from my tree, keeping 1 foot tucked up in the feathers. I certainly hope that it is a sign that spring isn't far away." I expect Ann is seeing Golden Crowned Kinglets as the Ruby Crowned Kinglets should be south this time of year.

Jon Muers asked, "Would it have been possible that I saw Northern Goshawk on my property in South Farmington? It was a big bird, larger than a Red-tailed Hawk, which we see from time to time. The back and wings were a greyish colour and the underside pale, almost white. It flew with a steady wing beat, weaving in and out of the trees. I saw a program on

TV several years ago on Goshawks, and seeing this bird, immediately this came to mind. I haven't seen it since. We do get the usual visitors to the bird feeders and in the trees including the occasional Pileated Woodpecker." I found it interesting to consider Jon's report in conjunction with Laura Lefebvre's report, she wrote, I saw an unusual bird on Feb. 2, in our yard in Margaretville, unusual both seasonally and geographically. An Osprey spent a good half hour perched on a Maple tree in our backyard. It was quite easy to identify due to its size, white chest and black eye bar. We spent many years in the Northwest Territories and saw them up there infrequently. I hadn't really seen one around here before and thought that you might be interested." If we consider statistics collected by Blake Maybank, an Osprey was not reported during a NS, winter in the decade prior to 2009; however, at least one was sighted this year. However, all of the field marks Laura reported also apply to the Northern Goshawk that Jon reported in South Farmington. Our field guide shows details that are common for both species. Briefly, habitats for these species are significantly different, N. Goshawk prefers a forest, the Osprey fishes; however, the Goshawk would be content with the habitat near the Margaretsville Osprey sighting. We have asked Laura to please consider the details pertaining to both these species. Please report to barpat@ns.sympatico.ca






