The guest speaker for the evening was Mr. Robert Wright who is the Executive Director of the Child and Youth Strategy of the Province of Nova Scotia. Mr. Wright shared same of his own volunteer experiences before focusing on why volunteers are the "heart of the community." OTTAWA - At approximately 4:00 p.m. Kandahar time, 23 April 2009, a Canadian Forces member was found dead in her accommodation room, at Kandahar Airfield.

Fire Chief's Corner • Fire Ban

Submitted by: MCpl McCabe, FI, 14 Wing Greenwood **What is a Fire Ban?**

A fire ban is an order issued by the provincial government to restrict the use of fire in areas of high hazard. The order describes what types of fire are allowed or may in fact entirely prohibit the use of any fire.

As the wildfire hazard climbs in areas of the province, local wildfire management areas make recommendations to the Minister of Sustainable Resource Development to initiate an order to implement a fire ban. This is a tool to attempt to minimise the risk of accidental wildfires resulting from human activity. The ministerial order is a temporary law in effect until it is revoked when the wildfire hazard has sufficiently lowered.

What is an area closure?

An area closure is an order issued by the provincial government, which limits the traffic and activity in a designated area. Area closures are issued to protect public safety under extreme fire hazards to eliminate the concern of emergency evacuation in remote locations or concentrated areas of human activity.

If the hazard continues to build to extreme levels the Min-

ister may order an area closure for a particular area affected by the extreme hazard. This is a tool, which manages the number of people in a given area in the event that a wildfire threatens to burn the forest creating the need for emergency evacuation. The main focus of an area closure is public safety.

Usually a fire ban comes into effect prior to an order for an area closure. A fire ban can exist in the same geographic location of an area closure. The fire ban is utilised to restrict the use of fire and the area closure is to restrict access. These are both temporary aws in effect but are no guarantees against the start of wildfires.

Wildfire prevention utilises education, engineering and to get its message out to the public. Increase public support is needed to help in the prevention of wildfires

There are many factors to consider in revoking an order to allow the use of fire or access to an area. Present weather, forecasted weather, geographic location and accessibility to an area must all be considered prior to revoking an order. There is not one set of guidelines to utilise in assessing the

need to implement or revoke an order as every location has a unique set of considerations in respect to seasonal weather, geographic features and accessibility.





On top of the world:

Air Force Becomes Command Authority for CFS Alert

Responsibility for Canadian Forces Station Alert—the most northern, permanently inhabited location in the world—changed hands on April 1, 2009.

The station, previously under the control of the Assistant Deputy Minister Information Management (IM) group, became an Air Force component and unit of 8 Wing Trenton, Ontario.

"We are pleased to receive command of CFS Alert," said David Strong, an infrastructure and projects of ficer with the Alert Management Office at 1 Canadian Air Division. "There are new ideas and new initiatives planned, so we look forward to seeing how things will evolve in the next few years.

The station's personnel gather signals intelligence in support of military operations; operate and maintain radio facilities in support of search and rescue and other operations, and provide support to Environment Canada weather services and Arctic researchers.

The handover of command authority comes on the heels of equipment and process modernization at the station. The modernization reduced the number of personnel needed to manage the station, causing a swing in the

balance of activity.

"As technology advanced, operations at Alert started being done remotely," said LCol Stewart Beal from the Directorate of Air Programmes at the Air Force. "Now we're at a point where most of the military personnel at Alert are support personnel.


As a result, logistics support

that was already being provided by the Air Force became the station's focal area of activity, demanding a formal shift in command authority

Currently, Alert has 55 personnel: 21 are military, 30 are commercial contractors, and four are Environment Canada employees.

The transfer of command includes the handover of certain responsibilities from the IM group to the Air Force. Tasks that now officially fall under the purview of the Air Force include the operation of the station, military facilities and equipment; and management of all agreements, contracts and policies associated with Alert.

CFS Alert is located on the northeastern tip of Ellesmere Island in the Canadian Arctic archipelago, 817 km from the geographic North Pole. It was first settled in the 1950s as a weather station.



« Nous sommes heureux de recevoir le commandement de la SFC Alert », a déclaré David Strong, un officier de l'infrastructure et des projets au Bureau de direction d'Alert à la 1re Division aérienne du Canada. « Nous avons prévu des idées et des initiatives nouvelles. Nous avons donc hâte de voir comment les choses vont évoluer au cours des prochaines années. »

Le personnel de la station recueille des renseignements

l'appui des opérations militaires, exploite et entretient des installations soutenir radio pour notamment les opérations de recherche et de sauvetage, et fournit du soutien aux servmétéorologiques ices d'Environnement Canada ainsi qu'aux chercheurs dans l'Arctique.

For the Birds

Along the Fundy Shore, from Morden to Cottage Cove, Gary Myers and Roger Short saw 31 different species: highlights were Northern Gannets, in flight, Common Eiders, Red-breasted Mergansers, Black, Surf and White Wing Scoters, a Black Guillemot and Loons at Margaretsville, Harlequin Ducks at Port George, Brant Geese and an Immature, Bald Eagle at Mosher's Corner. Gary suggested that the male, Northern Cardinal that has been at their feeders, as well as, Roger and Gwen Short's feeders in Morden is very likely the same individual. Ted Kajdas wrote: "Opened the camp and filled the bird feeders after a 5 month absence; didn't take any length of time for the feathered friends to arrive: Hooded Mergansers, Dark-eyed Juncos, Chickadees, White-breasted Nuthatches, Blue Jays, Purple Finches (m,f), Downy WP, numerous A. Robins feeding along the shoreline, 1 A. Crow. Despite high water and cold water temperature a large hatch of stick caddis was present during the warm afternoons."

In Margaretsville, at 0930 24Apr09, Helen Sharp was delighted to see an Indigo Bunting at her feeders. Helen noted that she had last seen an Indigo Bunting on her property 29May2001. Very strong southerlies with eastern and western components likely brought Helen's Bunting along with Rose-breasted and Blue Grosbeaks that were reported elsewhere in our province. Jackie and Ron Clements, sighted a male, Indigo Bunting at their feeders in Shady Rest Subdivision; Jackie wrote: "Sightings at 9:21am on the 27th along with the finches (AGF&PF); he returned about 15 minutes later and fed again. Each time he may have stayed for 5 minutes." In Nictaux, Debbie Baldwin wrote, "I had an Indigo Bunting in my yard for the afternoon at 9395 hwy#10, Nictaux." Subsequently, Debbie saw two buntings at her feeders.

In Torbrook Mines, Arthur Uhlman has be rewarded for his years of patiently waiting, not just one but two of his nest boxes have been occupied 1 by a Wood Duck and another box has been claimed by a Barred Owl! Congratulations Arthur! Everyone is hopeful that successful broods will result from this very private, first class, accommodation.

A famous golfer reported: "2 years ago I saw an eagle breaking off, then flying away with dead branches from a pine tree at KenWo." Based on further reports from fellow golfers, he is aware that an Eagle's nest is established not far from the clubhouse. He wrote: "I was on the course yesterday and saw an eagle being harassed by a Merlin. We have seen that on several occasions in the past as well. I can say that eagles have not nested on the course for 30 years but they have frequently been around." Barbara and I recently spent the day in the LRYC boatyard where a pair of Merlins were being very vocal and in pursuit of trespassing songbirds.

Near Brian Wilkin's home, just east of Kingston, 100's of A. Crows have been taking turns harassing a Great Horned Owl. Recently, Barbara and I watched a pair of Blue Jays attacking a Raven. Perhaps the Raven was too close to the Jay's nest, or had already raided their nest. Later at home, I could hear a noisy flock of crows; going out for a look, I saw several crows and at least 3 ravens chasing each other in and out of the large pine, maple and oak trees on and near our property: possibly a territorial dispute. Thankfully the Northern Flickers continue their effort to control the ant population in our yard.

The Cedar Waxwing (CW), rescued, from the jaws of a cat by Jennifer Niemi is presently being cared for by Helene Van Doninck, DVM at the Cobequid Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre, RR#1 Brookfield, Nova Scotia. Helene reported: "it's going to be a time will tell thing with CW. He's very bright and is eating for me, but he's also very thin. I suspect he was thin when the cat got him and I also find people can underestimate the amount of food these birds can eat in captivity. On his left wing, at the tip/wrist, there is dried blood/damaged tissue and an area where the tips of his primary feathers are pulled out of the follicles and are resting on the top of the wing. These feathers are obviously no good but my concern is whether the tip /skin underneath is healthy or not. If it is, the damaged feathers will drop off and re grow. If it's not, there can be anything from non regrowth of feathers, up to and including the entire tip of the wing dropping off (this is obviously grounds for euthanasia). So, I'm trying not to disturb the area to give it the best chance for healing, but I suspect I will know better in the next few days."We are at 765-8688, p_giffin@hotmail.



German Navy Atlantique Visits 14 Wing

Some of you may have noticed a slightly different looking aircraft parked beside the Air Movements Unit building earlier this week. On Monday, April 27, 2009 in the afternoon, a German Breguet Br1150 Atlantique aircraft arrived at 14 Wing Greenwood after a long day of flying which originated from their

home base in Nordholz, Germany.

Except for a fuel stop in Shannon, Ireland, Greenwood was the aircraft's first stop as part of the Long Range Experience An Atlantique aircraft from Germany sits parked at the 14 Wing airfield while its crew waits to get on the bus that will take them to their accommodations.

The maritime patrol aircraft and its crew are on a long range experience training exercise and will be spending time in the area until Wednesday.

Flight (LREF). Crew 3 from 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron were there to meet Lieutenant Kiefer and his crew when they arrived. They then dropped their kit off at their accommodations and everyone retired to the VPI lounge for a meet and greet.

The German visitors left on Wednesday, April 29 in the morning for McGuire Air Force Base in New Jersey where they will stay a few days before returning back to Nordholz on the 5th of May.

This was not the first time an Atlantique has visited 14 Wing, however, it may be the last. The Atlantique was the primary fixed wing anti-submarine warfare aircraft for the Germans since the early 1980's, but in 2005 they started replacing their fleet with Lockheed P-3 Orion's, which they are acquiring from the Dutch Navy. Currently there are only 2 Atlantiques, both now used for signal intelligence operations, still remaining in their fleet with the aircraft that visited our base being retired within the next few months and the last planned for retirement by next summer.

Supervisor Training

Basic Relationship Training Program (BRT):

Human Swine Influenza in Nova Scotia

Dear Fellow Nova Scotians:

Public health professionals in partnership with all district health authorities across Nova Scotia continue to monitor and respond to human swine influenza. Nova Scotia has a strong public health system, with highly skilled and caring professionals, and I am confident in our ability to manage this issue.

The information we are providing to you on human swine influenza is likely to change. The situation is evolving rapidly, nationally and internationally, and we will keep you informed as new information becomes available.

If you do not have symptoms, it is important to remember that daily activities should continue as normal. It is safe to go to school, work and socialize. Symptoms to watch for include fever and cough in combination with fatigue, headache and sore throat.

Fortunately, the confirmed cases of human swine influenza in Nova Scotia so far have been mild, with no need for hospitalization. Any additional cases will be thoroughly investigated.

I fully expect the virus to spread, and when it does, we can expect to see more severe cases develop. We will continue to use our established public health practices and our network of health professionals to manage any additional cases of human swine influenza in the province.

If you have influenza-like symptoms, and have recently traveled to an area affected by human swine influenza, like Mexico, or have been in contact with someone who has human swine influenza, it is important to avoid close contact with others for seven days after your symptoms start. This is the time when the illness can be spread to others. Stay home from work, school, public places and avoid social settings. Minimize contact with family members as much as possible. Like any illness, should your symptoms worsen, visit your doctor or a walk-in clinic and be sure to mention your travel history.

If you are experiencing influenza-like symptoms, but have not been exposed to human swine influenza, either through recent travel to an affected area or contact with someone who has it, treat it as you would a normal seasonal influenza. Stay home, rest and drink plenty of fluids. If it gets worse, again, see a doctor.

You should also be aware that the Public Health Agency of Canada has issued a travel advisory urging all travelers to postpone non-essential travel to Mexico until further notice. Those who have to travel to an affected area, and have not received an influenza shot, are advised to get one.


We do not recommend the use of masks by the general population, as they have not been proven effective in reducing the risk of infection. Furthermore, we do not recommend the use of anti-virals such as Tamiflu for treating mild illness or for prevention.

Remember, as always, the best way to avoid illness is through prevention. Wash your hands thoroughly and often, cough into your sleeves and stay away from public places if you are sick.

within the Prevention, Support and Intervention unit at the GMFRC. Often these revolve around more common social issues like relationship breakdown, domestic violence, parent child relationships, and mental health. However, sometimes I am reminded that there are issues that our social setting does not necessarily embrace; and in writing about these I choose to challenge social norms. Over the years I have come to expect that the problem, which brings a person through my door, is seldom the root that they really wish to address. Often it is superficial, a mechanism through which they can assess if I am trustworthy and worthy of their disclosure. This has held true with many clients struggling with identity, sexism and harassment resulting from their sexuality: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transsexual (LGBT)

I have had the opportunity to work with many LGBT clients, and even blessed with some clients who were willing to take the time to teach me about their experiences within a predominantly heterosexual community. However, many of these experiences were specific to urban centres, where LGBT

communities and resources were often plentiful and accessible. The experiences of rural LGBT clients appears very different; often typified by a sense of isolation, lack of community support, lack of LGBT educated and sensitive resources (i.e. healthcare, education, counselling, recreation), culminating in an overall feeling of being "the only one". Becoming comfortable and accepting of one's own sexual identity is complex in the best of circumstances; however remoteness, fear, and lack of community can confound this experience even further.

In my capacity as a Counselling Therapist, I have seen many LGBT clients who identify as "being the only one" in our rural community. My experience conveys another reality, that there is in fact a community, one currently shadowed and quiet, but alive none the less. A community that by virtue of discrimination and harassment has members who are at exponentially increased risk than hetero communities. According to PFLAG Canada, LGBT students hear anti-gay slurs an average of 26 times per day, and 30% of suicides are LGBT individuals. By sitting quietly, we permit intolerance to exist. Courage will allow us to choose equality and embrace basic human rights in the face of discrimination fed by fear. 




