

Sharing the road

Once again the weather has turned nice outside. Now it is time to remember that pedestrians and vehicles will once again be sharing the roads more frequently. Many people will hit the streets and sidewalks in the local area and around the base to go running, jogging and marching.

It is especially noticeable heading out towards the base golf course. There are many people using this road for physical activity and now the golf course on the base is open, the vehicle traffic has increased

The 14 Wing Mobile Support Equipment (MSE) Section would like to provide some tips that drivers and pedestrians should follow:

Pedestrians:

- Obey the rules of the road: cross at intersections or in pedestrian safety zones.
- Be vigilant at both intersection and non-intersection locations, especially in urban
- Never run into the roadway from behind stopped or parked vehicles.
- Walk against traffic along roadsides without sidewalks

- or on rural roadways.
- Wear bright or reflective clothing when walking, especially at night.
- Never assume that motorists will yield, even if you have the right-of-way.

Motorists:

- Always be on the lookout for and yield to vulnerable road users, even if they don't have the right-of-way.
- Always obey traffic signals and control signs.
- Pay particular attention to younger children playing on streets and to senior citizens

crossing at intersections.

- Pay particular attention to workers in temporary work
- Be prepared for vulnerable road users to appear unexpectedly at both intersection and non-intersection locations, on both urban and rural roadways.

Motorists travelling on or off the base are reminded to slow down and yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians and marching troops on the roads.


The crowning jewel in the Facility Improvement Plan is the Fitness and Sports Center's new gym floor. Planted at center court, reminiscent of the Canadian Loonie buried at center ice during the hockey final of the 2002 Olympics, is a Centennial of Flight memorial coin which will memorialize the opening of the new floor and 100 years of powered flight in Canada. The installation of this floor involved a company whose credits include installation of the basketball court

for the Utah Jazz of the National Basketball Association. We feel that any design capable of sustaining the health and wellness of seven foot 300 pound basketball players should most certainly meet the varied needs of our military and community customers. The long term health implications of conducting our sports and fitness programs on a forgiving wooden floor with underlay will be significant with a tangible reduction in sports injury and chronic

back, hip and knee problems. The Fitness and Sports Center strength and conditioning and weight rooms have been modernized and tailored to meet the needs of our visitors. The squash courts are outstanding and massage therapy is available on site. New lighting in the pool will brighten an already brilliant aquatic facility which is home to extensive military and family programs. Along and successful partnership with the Greenwood Dolphins Swim Club has been captured and celebrated through the establishment of an aesthetically beautiful polished metal dolphin caricature sign on the facilities interior wall, crafted by Valley resident Marshall Ennis.

Membership in the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Recreation Association has benefits that extend beyond the wonderful facilities. We have a campground at Lake Pleasant, a Horse and Riding Club near the Wing, an 18 hole golf course and an outstanding recreation program with numerous clubs one can join ranging from archery to wood hobby. 





Referring to, "Birds of North America", a Golden Field Guide, Annette thought this individual was most like a Connecticut Warbler although she had not noticed an eye-ring; this species would considered a very rare sighting for NS. We discussed the possibility of it being a Mourning Warbler: without further details we left it at that. Referring to the Mourning Warbler, Richard Stern commented; "We get them in thick, tangled, 2nd

19 May 09 Harbor, and Blomidon Prov. In Kingston, Annette Park. They are usually one of the latest Spring migrants to arrive. They generally stay low, and skulk, and are hard to see." Perhaps this individual was investigating the nest box and area in search of insects which are its preferred food. After capturing an insect the Mourning Warbler removes its wings and legs, then swallows the body whole! Bug Sushi!

In woodland near his cottage at Trout Lake, Gerald Keil was startled when a large bird took off at very close range. At the base of a tree, near the water's edge, he discovered a grassy, nest lined with feathers and down, containing 10, large, white, eggs larger than a domestic, hen's egg. There were plenty of finches, sparrows, one Northern Cardinal, one Bobolink, two Red Crossbills, a Rusty Blackbird, growth, bushy areas on the a nest belonging to a Canada and 50 A. Robins on a

Kingston, neighbours Ross and Jill arrived home at about 2230. In their headlights, in a tree near the end of their driveway, they saw a pair of Owls. Ross returned to his office to get a camera: a 10 minute drive: the owls were not disturbed by their presence or by the camera's flash. The owl's appeared to be kissing. Bernard Forsythe advised us that the "kissing' is part of the pair bonding exhibited by this species which mate for life. It is also possible that the male could have been feeding the female. Nesting takes place this time of year and the female will not leave the nest unless called by her mate to receive food that he has obtained. During the nesting phase and rearing of the offspring, the adult, male's sole responsibility is to gather food for the entire family. Of 18 owl, nest boxes, monitored by Bernard, only 5 have eggs: this is directly

related to the shortage of none of the bone went with food resulting from the depth of snow this winter. The following day, in these woods, we saw a number of Northern Parula, Ovenbirds and a female, Brown-headed Cowbird. At our feeders we had Red Crossbills, Purple Finches, Rose Breasted Grosbeaks, Chipping Sparrows, a White-throated Chipping Sparrow and Common Grackles.

it. Otherwise she is eating up a storm and seems happy

From Trout Lake, Ted Kajdas reports: "Female hummers have arrived. Right on schedule, one week after the males had staked out territorial boundaries we have 4f, 3m, hummers at camp. I suspect there may be more however they won't stay still long enough. At one feeder it appears that a mature female and I suspect last year's sibling feed together. The two feeders on the east side of camp are reserved for females only, while the other two on the south side are for the male species. The male, Purple Finches are in full courting colours. It is interesting to watch one male perform his vaudeville dance for a female friend at one of our platform feeders. The selection and appointment of an Honorary Colonel (HCol), a tradition that began in the Army, is one that takes numerous levels of command time and effort to identify, seek concurrence and recommend a suitable candidate for this prestigious appointment. As the tenure of HCol Byron Reynolds came to a close, Lieutenant-Colonel (LCol) Doug Baird, Commanding Officer (CO) of 404 (LRP&T) Squadron was faced with the task of finding a successor to HCol Reynolds. A submission by a squadron member recommended Mr Lloyd Graham, a retired Air Navigator, as a candidate for this honour. Mr. Graham was officially announced as the new HCol for 404 (LRP&T) Squadron, on 2 Feb 09 by the Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Peter McKay.

Born in Vermilion, Alberta 17 September 1937 HCol Graham completed 35 years service with the Canadian Forces during the period 1958-1993. During his career he had eight flying tours accumulating some 6641 flying hours as an Airborne Interceptor (AI) navigator on CF100 fighters; lead Radio Officer (RO) and an instructor on Maritime Patrol Neptune and Argus aircraft; and Long Range (LR) navigator and instructor on the Argus and Aurora aircraft. Squadron supervisory responsibilities included duties as Flight Commander, Chief Tactical Instructor, Chief Standards Officer, and Chief Simulator Officer on these various tours.

HCol Graham's staff duties included responsibility as Staff Officer Evaluation and Requirements, Maritime Air Group Headquarters, Halifax, NS (1975-1978); Commanding Officer Canadian Forces Recruiting Center, St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador (1982-1986); and Base Operations duties as Ops Center Director and Chief Plans Readiness and Requirements from 1989 until retirement in 1993. Various secondary duties and numerous upgrading, operational and training courses were also completed, including a year at CF Staff College in Toronto, ON. Throughout his career HCol

various awards and decorations are as follows: Appointed as an Officer of the Order of Military Merit - Dec 1989; Canadian Forces deco-

ration – two bars; Base Commander's Commendation – Jan 1993; Honorary Life Member of the Lake George Property Owners Society – 1998;

and Remarkable Senior's Award, Province of Nova Scotia – Jun 2003.

After receiving the authorization of his appointment, the next order of business was to have HCol Graham invested as our HCol during a ceremony held at the Annapolis Mess. On 7 May 2009 at 2 pm, HCol Graham gathered with family, friends and Squadron members, past and present, at the Annapolis Mess for the formal HCol Investiture Ceremony. This was followed by a meet and greet where HCol Graham had the opportunity to officially meet with the current members of 404 Squadron. Following the formal Investiture Ceremony, the festivities continued later that night with a Mixed Mess Dinner held in honour of the recently invested HCol. Approx 200 people attended the event which was a fitting, fun-filled end to an eventful day.

404 (LRP&T) Squadron is honoured to have Mr Graham as our HCol and look forward to his involvement in various Squadron activities





Let's get ready to RUN THE RUNWAY! We don't have much time left before the big event, so as long as you are in good basic health and capable of brisk walking for 20 to 30 minutes without breathlessness, this program will be appropriate for you. This program should be done at least 3-5 times per week. All running should be done at a conversational pace, meaning that you can easily talk while running. During your cardiovascular workout, your heart rate should be within 60% and 85% of your maximum heart rate. You can check your heart rate on your neck or wrist, taking a 10 second count and multiplying by 6. If it is higher than this range you need to work at a reduced intensity. If your heart rate is lower than 60% you will need to increase intensity. Always remember to do a warm up of 5-10 minutes where you gradually increase the intensity

of the intended activity without injury. Also, when you the end. Week four is a perfect way to complete the fun run, taking a walking break every 10 minutes. GOOD LUCK







If you believe you are eligible to vote and do not receive your VIC by May 29, 2009, please contact the Returning Office, at the telephone number below.

If you are on the List of Electors and bring your VIC with you when you vote, the voting process will be easier.

You can still be added to the List of Electors if you are:

- 18 years of age or older on June 9, 2009
- a Canadian Citizen
- a resident of Nova Scotia since November 4, 2008

Personal identification is required.

Contact the Returning Office to find out how to be added to the List and the polling station at which you vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING

Electors can vote by write-in ballot or at the Special or Advance polls, or on Election day. A write-in ballot is a blank ballot on which you write the name of the candidate for whom you are voting, or your party of choice. Write-in ballots are available from your local returning office now. If you are not on the List and want to vote by write-in ballot, you can be added to the List using the application for a write-in ballot and vote by mail or in person at the returning office.
