The Senate Committee on National Security and Defence (SCONSAD) visited 14 Wing Greenwood on Tuesday, 7 July 2009. The purpose of the visit was to familiarize themselves with the ongoing operations of the Wing, visit an upgraded Block II CP-140 Aurora and to meet with airmen and airwomen during a luncheon at the Annapolis Mess.

The Senators arrived late in the morning and were taken to 11 Hangar to be briefed by the Wing Commander, Colonel Derek Joyce and then had a tour of an Aurora Long Range Patrol aircraft.

Lunch was served at the Annapolis Mess after the Aurora tour for the Senators and some of the non-commissioned members of the Wing. After lunch, the tour went over to 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron where the Senators were given a tour of a Cormorant helicopter.

The Senators were quite impressed with the operations at the Wing and were interested to hear some of the problems facing the Wing and concerns of its personnel. Some of the concerns and problems included trying to recruit enough people into the Air

Force and physicians for military families.

The visit wrapped up towards the late afternoon and the Senators concluded that their tour at the Wing was both productive and informative. The information that they gathered on this visit will eventually be incorporated into a document that outlines the state of the Canadian military.

The committee then travelled to 12 Wing Shearwater and to the Marine Security Operations Centre located at CFB Halifax as part of their continued tour of military installations across the country.

HALIFAX July 10, 2009 - The inaugural Canadian Forces Halifax Rock Fest was launched today onboard HMCS Toronto at 2:00 p.m. CFB Halifax Base Commander, Capt(N) John Newton, spoke to the importance of the concert, taking place August 2nd, 2009.

This concert will be in Halifax, in tribute to the Canadian Forces overseas and at home. While it is typical for troops overseas to be treated to a show tour on location, this con-

cert will carry with it a sense of Canada's support and a glimpse of home for those troops serving away from home.

To help connect those away and at home, video messages will be delivered on stage from troops overseas between songs, as well as a professionally edited highlight reel of the concert will be sent to deployed Canadian troops, which will include messages from the bands, and from individuals attending the concert. In addition, the concert will be broadcast over radio and television for the troops, according to the area in which they serve.

The winner of the Next Great Atlantic Rock Band competition is Pink Thunder (Barbara Cameron, Victoria Cameron, and Olivia Adlakha, from St. Peter's in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia). They were announced at the launch and were pre-

sented a cheque for \$5,000 to play the concert. The band will also receive \$5,000 for a studio-recorded song.

Also during the launch, Christine Reilly was announced as the winner of the Canadian Forces Halifax Rock Fest's Ready to Roll contest. Her prize was a Saturn ION decked out in official concert decals. To be eligible to win, Reilly had to purchase a ticket to the concert and register online by July 7th. Her name was picked by random draw.

The Canadian Forces Halifax Rock Fest 2009 will be a part of the Natal Day festivities over Natal Day weekend. Tim Rissesco, Vice Chair of the Halifax-Dartmouth Natal Day Steering Committee, spoke on behalf of the committee.

OTTAWA, ON (July 16, 2009) — One Canadian soldier died while conducting operations in the Panjwayi District. The incident occurred approximately 17 kilometres south-west from Kandahar City at around 6:00 a.m., Kandahar time, on July 16, 2009.

Killed in action was Private

Sébastien Courcy from 2nd Battalion, Royal 22e Régiment based in Quebec City, Quebec. Pte Courcy was serving as a member of the 2nd Battalion, Royal 22e Régiment Battle Group.

Pte Courcy was evacuated by helicopter to the Role 3 Multi-National Medical Facility at the Kandahar Airfield.

lences go to the family and friends of our fallen comrade.

UAV Management Roles

UAV Training Manager (Canada)

The UAV Training Manager is responsible for all pilot, payload and maintenance training for military customer and MDA personnel. The UAV Training Manager has responsibility for coordinating facilities and resources (simulators and aircraft etc) for theory and hands-on practical training. ILS Manager (Canada)

Responsible for facility management, site setup, sparing and provisioning levels for remote operations, you will coordinate subcontracts and be responsible for logistics support analysis, shipping, and import/export controls with respect to both domestic and deployed UAV (Heron) operations. The ILS Manager is the key customer point of contact for RMA, logistics, tech pubs and training.

Air Vehicle Operators (AVO)/Operations Managers (Afghanistan)

AVO/ Operations Managers will oversee mission planning tasks, assist in the set-up and deployment of the UAV, operate the UAV system and installed sensors, use and maintain operations records and documentation, conduct post-flight debriefings, and serve as MDA's on-site manager when assigned that role.

Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in Canadian Aviation Heritage

Avro Canada C102 Jetliner

Lorsque Avro Canada entame des pourparlers avec les Lignes aériennes Trans-Canada en décembre 1945, le concept d'un avion à moteur à réaction pouvant transporter 36 passagers commence à prendre forme. Le C102 Jetliner d'Avro Canada vole le 10 août 1949. C'est le premier avion à réaction de transport de passagers à voler en Amérique du Nord et le deuxième avion de ce type dans le monde à effectuer un vol, 13 jours après le 106 Comet de de Havilland.

Les essais de l'avion se poursuivent pendant toute l'année 1950, des vols de démonstration ayant lieu aux États-Unis et au Canada en janvier 1951 pour mousser la mise en marché du Jetliner. Air Canada a toutefois décidé antérieurement de ne pas acheter l'avion, Avro n'ayant pu obtenir qu'il soit doté de

deux moteurs Rolls Royce AJ.65 (Avon). À la place, Avro est forcée de monter quatre moteurs à réaction Rolls Royce Derwent de plus faible puissance, lesquels ajoutent aux coûts de maintenance et à la consommation en carburant.

Le Jetliner est spacieux, silencieux et exempt de vibrations, une grande amélioration par rapport aux avions à turbopropulseurs de l'époque. Mais il a aussi ses problèmes, comme une consommation de carburant élevée, ainsi que des fuseaux réacteurs et une configuration de voilure qui produisent beaucoup de traînée. Avro s'efforce de régler ces problèmes lorsque la production du Jetliner est arrêtée.

En effet, en décembre 1951, C.D. Howe, ministre du Commerce, ordonne l'arrêt des travaux concernant le Jetliner,

car il veut qu'Avro se concentre sur le CF100 Canuck, qui est destiné à l'Aviation royale du Canada et dont la construction accuse du retard. Il y a un certain espoir de faire revivre le Jetliner lorsque le millionnaire américain Howard Hughes se montre intéressé à le produire pour sa ligne aérienne, Trans-World Airlines. National Airlines, des États-Unis, s'intéresse également à l'avion, mais finalement tous ces espoirs s'évanouissent.

Le Jetliner effectue son dernier vol le 23 novembre 1956, puis il est donné au Conseil national de recherches du Canada (CNRC). Comme le CNRC n'a pas de place pour l'avion, ce dernier est démantelé à partir du 13 décembre 1956, et seul le nez de l'appareil est conservé.

When Avro Canada began talks with Trans-Canada Air Lines in December 1945, the concept of a jet-engine, 36 passenger aircraft took shape. The Avro Canada C-102 Jetliner flew on 10 August 1949, the first jet passenger aircraft to fly in North America and only the second in the world, 13 days after the de Havilland D.H. 106 Comet.

Testing of the aircraft was conducted through 1950, with demonstration flights in the United States and Canada in January 1951 to assist in marketing the Jetliner. Air Canada, had previously decided not to purchase the aircraft when Avro could not obtain the Rolls Royce AJ. 65 (Avon) engines, two of which would have powered the Jetliner. Instead, Avro was

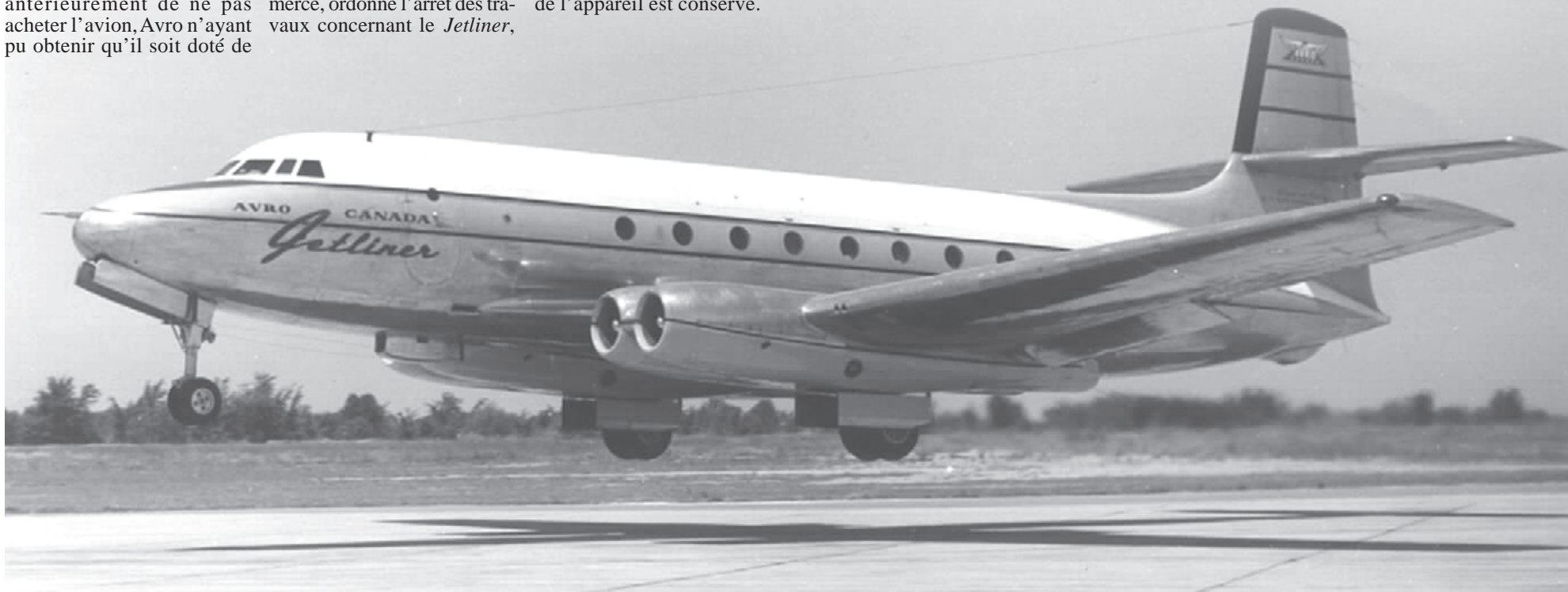
forced to install four lower-power Rolls Royce Derwent jet engines, which added to the maintenance costs and fuel consumption.

The Jetliner was roomy, quiet and vibration-free, a big contrast to propeller-driven aircraft of the time and the 1950s. The aircraft was not without its problems as fuel consumption was too high, and the jet nacelle and wing configuration produced high drag. Avro was addressing these problems when work was halted on the Jetliner.

In December 1951, C.D. Howe, Minister of Trade and Commerce ordered Avro to halt work on the jetliner, as he wanted Avro to concentrate on the CF-100 Canuck for the Royal

Canadian Air Force, which was falling behind schedule. There was some hope that the Jetliner could be revived, as American millionaire Howard Hughes was interested in producing it for his Trans World Airlines; National Airlines of the United States wished to purchase some and the United States Air Force was interested also; however, these possibilities fell through.

The Jetliner flew its last flight on 23 November 1956, being donated to the National Research Council (NRC). As the NRC had no room for the aircraft, it was chopped up starting 13 December 1956, with only the nose being preserved.

The Avro Anson reconstruction crew, lead by Colin Ainsworth and his quiet steely resolve, at no time retreated nor were diverted from the ultimate goal which in the end resulted in presenting, to the Wing Commander, Col. D.W. Joyce, a excellent example of an aircraft with great historical

significance.

When the completed aircraft, in its wartime yellow paint and marking, was displayed in 14 hangar at the recent Mess Dinner, everyone walking into the hangar and seeing the beautiful old bird sitting front and centre, with special lighting, and next to the Silver Dart Replica, it was a jaw dropping experience and reminded everyone the significance of the Centennial of Flight Celebrations.

Some of the pictures displayed on these pages show what a monumental task this was, and the many hours of labour it took to achieve the end result. The project started when the first bits and pieces arrive at the workshop



behind the G.M.A.M. and later in June of 2007 moved to corner of 14 hangar then 10 hangar, thanks to the generous folks of the 14 A.M.S. and their C.O. Lt. Col. Phil Garbutt. The extra space and availability of specialized equipment and technical expertise found in 10 hangar played a large part in the final push to

complete the aircraft for the Mess Dinner.

On May 20, during Future Flyer's Day, everyone was able to view the completed aircraft at the presentation of the keys and Anson to the wing commander Col. Joyce. Front and centre at this ceremony, were 12 of the proud folks whose workmanship made this finished project possible.

H.A.R.T. Still Struggling to Save Animals!

Since February of 2008, the Homeless Animal Rescue Team (based out of Aylesford) has been going non-stop saving animals, mostly cats and kittens, but occasionally dogs.

To date we have rescued approximately 300 animals, all of which were tested, vaccinated, treated for parasites and spayed or neutered. That's a lot of money! We do not receive funding from the government and rely solely on fundraising, donations and our own money.

Over \$25,000.00 has been spent since H.A.R.T. was founded just over a year ago. Our goal originally was to build a shelter so that we could take in even more animals than we do now. This will require a lot of money, which will most likely come from private donations and some really huge fundraising.

All of the fundraisers we have had to date make only enough money to put towards our never-ending vet bill. The amount of money it takes to run a rescue properly is alarming, to say the least. We do get a lot of our cleaning supplies donated to us from the public, which is a huge savings. People often drop off bottles of bleach, Lysol/Chlorox Wipes, paper towel, rubber gloves, etc. We go through an enormous amount of these items.

From time to time we do receive monetary donations or even donations made directly on our bill at the Port Royal Animal Hospital (532-PETS). Dr. Jody Rice is H.A.R.T.'s veterinarian and best friend! Although some of the costs are absorbed in our adoption fees, we do take in animals that require medical attention that is *not* covered in these costs.

Some of the animals we take in have injuries or are sick. This is where our vet bill can sky rocket. The other costs that are very high are for the food that we use for our rescues. We like to use high quality food to ensure all of the animals get a

good start before they go to their forever homes. We take in many orphaned kittens as well and they require special food from vet clinics that is quite costly. Many of these kittens need to be bottle-fed and the Kitten Formula is *very* expensive.

One of the biggest things the public can do for us, if they cannot afford to give us donations, is to attend our fundraisers. This can generate a lot of money for us. Our next fundraiser is scheduled for Saturday, July 25th at the Aylesford Volunteer Fire Hall from 12:30 - 6:30 p.m. This will be a spaghetti supper (meat and veggie), homemade caesar salad, garlic bread, choice of dessert and beverage! The cost will be \$10.00 for adults and \$5.00 for children 12 and under. At this event there will be kittens that are going to be available for adoption, and as well various items to be raffled off. We are also having a Free Will Flea market at this event!

Please come and support H.A.R.T. so that we can continue to rescue so many animals that are in need. We have stopped thousands of unwanted kittens from being born by spaying and neutering so many cats/kittens.

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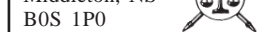

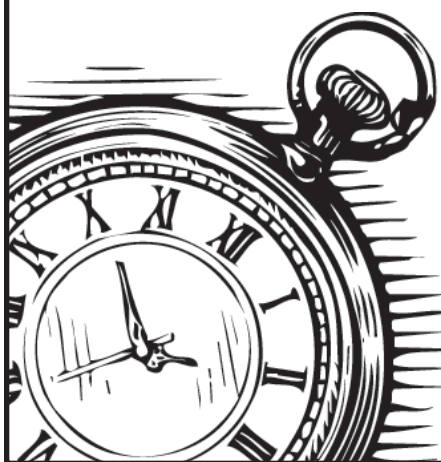
