Taking Care of Your People - Part 1

Chief Warrant Officer Jardine and I both agreed that what we wanted to be known for at the end of our tenure was our attention to personnel matters...often described as 'taking care of your people." We hear this and similar phrases a lot these days and bet that it means different things to different people. To convey what it means to us (and to keep it relatively brief), we've divided it into two separate dimensions – at work and at home.

As applied in the workplace, for us, taking care of your people means ensuring they have a clear idea of what their job is and the expected

of us experience during a Personnel Development mission success and stay safe. Review briefing. This alone is not enough though, and everyone should have a good understanding of what they are working toward, be it a task, goal, objective, a vision or an end state; what their role is in achieving that objective; and why it is important. A good example is Master Corporal Oake at Readiness Training Flight, who understands that his job is not simply to deliver readiness training to deploying personnel, but to make sure they are prepared to effectively deal with the potential dangers they might less with less...lest we

> An important part of taking care of your people involves setting the conditions for their success. This requires making sure our people have the resources they need to do the job they have been asked to do...be it equipment, training, a safe workspace, aircraft, personnel, and yes...money. This can be challenging at a time when we're expected to do more with less. In this kind of environment...if the conditions aren't right... sometimes (depending on the mission) taking care of our people can mean doing



push our folks too hard to feedback for those whose accomplish the impossible. Your Commanding Officers know this all too well and we talk about the balance nearly every day.

A critical part of taking care of your people involves giving them feedback on their performance and recognizing excellence. In terms of feedback, it can be positive feedback for a job well done, constructive criticism on areas that need improvement (communicated clearly, honestly and respectfully) or, in some cases, a bit of firm

performance continues to fall short of expectations. We believe that everyone wants to do a good job and it is our job to bring out the best in our people. Sometimes that can mean being a bit more firm and taking care of your people doesn't mean being soft or shying away from confrontation. In our business, the stakes are often too high.

In terms of recognition, it need not involve any paperwork - a pat on the back, a handshake or a public acknowledgement for a job well done go a long way in letting your folks know that their hard work is appreciated. Great organizations recognize and acknowledge excellence. The Canadian Forces is a great organization and we have many ways to recognize the incredible things our folks accomplish. The most effective ways of doing this are often the easiest. There is much more that could be said on this subject...but I'll close it there.





Thanks to Joe McBryan (of Buffalo Airways, who still fly many radial engine aircraft all over northern Canada), we were able to acquire another centre section. On Monday

September 21, 2009, the two components were happily married.

Once again the staff of the Mobile Equipment section, notably Master Corporal (MCpl) Brewer, MCpl Winfield and Corporal Porter, brought the right equipment and expertise to the party, and as the pictures will show, the union has been completed. Yet, as all good marriages go, there is still plenty of work to be done before we can call it a complete success.

Stay tuned as much more work is needed before #665 will become a static display at the Museum's air park. There it will join the Lancaster, Neptune, Argus and T-33.



MSE Safety Corner - Safe Driving During the School Season

With the start of another school year, MSE Safety would like to remind drivers of their responsibilities when driving through school zones and with school buses operating on provincial roads. Drivers are urged to be more vigilant during the peak periods of school bus operation, generally from 7:00 - 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 -4:00 p.m.

· When driving through a school zone, no person shall drive a motor vehicle at a speed in excess of 50

kilometres per hour on any portion of a highway designated as a school area when children are present. Fines for an offence in a school zone can be doubled.

 Always stop for a school bus when its red lights are flashing and the mechanical STOP sign is displayed. The lights will flash until all the children are either safely loaded on the bus or have safely crossed the street. Drivers are to stop and stay

no closer than 20 meters away until the school bus starts moving again.

- Children are still learning to pay attention to the world around them. If they are playing with friends or riding bikes it is unlikely that they are aware of your car, so be extra cautious when driving in areas where children are present, expect the unexpected and be prepared for sudden moves.
- Later in the fall it may still be dark as children head to

the school bus stop. Drive with extra caution when visibility is reduced.

- Be aware that children may stray onto the road in areas where there are no sidewalks. Avoid uturns or turning around in nearby driveways.
- While dropping off or picking up from the bus stop or school, always have your child exit the car on the side away from traffic.
- Always ensure that your child uses the designated

crosswalk and remind your child that if there is a crossing guard, to follow the crossing guard's instructions.

Prevention is the key to safety. With education and awareness, we can ensure the safe transportation of our children. Take the time to review these valuable rules and tips with all the drivers in your household. By following the rules of proper vehicle operation in school zones and in the presence of school buses loading and

off-loading children, you can help to make this a safe and successful school year.

Hand Washing: Preventing the spread of illness

Hand washing is the most important way to help children stay healthy and prevent the spread of illness. Children should learn to wash their hands often and well as hand washing can prevent the spread of 50% of communicable diseases. Wash all parts of the hands including: the backs, between fingers, under nails and thumbs. To wash hands well:

- 1. Wet hands with warm running water.
- 2. Add soap and scrub for 5-10 seconds.
- 3. Rinse off soap under running water for 5 to 10 seconds
- 4. Dry your hands with a towel
- 5. Turn off tap with a towel. Hand washing should occur:
- Before eating and cooking After using the washroom, playing outdoors, petting animals, changing diapers, coughing or sneezing.





Remembrance 2009 Veteran of the Week

You may recognize his name.

Mr. Oren Foster, B.E.M., spent 7 years with the West Nova Scotia Regiment from 1939 to 1946, and is a regular contributor to The Aurora Newspaper, recreating his military experiences for the Letters to the Editor column. Recently, I had the opportunity and the honour to spend an afternoon with this extraordinary man.

Born in Karsdale, NS in 1912, Mr. Foster spent the first 27 years of his life as a vegetable farmer. On September 7, 1939, as WWII began and Canada declared war on Germany, Mr. Foster, in search of adventure, in search of something different, went to Annapolis Royal and stood in line to enlist.

He spent the next few months waiting, learning some basic drill, securing some equipment and clothing. Weapons were scarce, and some of the weapons he trained on were leftover from WWI, which no one had ever thought would need to be used again. On December 21st, 1939 he boarded a Polish liner for England, among a convoy of other ships, with 991 members of his regiment. A 4-day North Atlantic blizzard made for some brutal travelling and the 10day trip was no pleasure cruise. No one celebrated Christmas that year.

Once he had arrived in England, Pte Foster began some intensive training. His most significant memory of his training - seeing thousands of German bombers overhead, dropping bombs at random, watching as hundreds of British fighters drove them back to Germany. He was one of 8 men selected for a sniper squad, and began a 3-week course at the rifle range, practicing from

(Photo: Capt Tanya Strembiski) dusk to dawn. Again, he found himself practicing on WWI-era weapons before returning to his

He remembers the Battle of Britain, the Italian Campaign, the end of the war. He remembers escorting thousands of defeated German soldiers back to Germany, watching from his vehicle as they marched on foot, cleaning up some of the 'mess they had made' along the way. He remembers fighting in snow, rain, mud to his knees, in the roughest winters of his life. He remembers the 6 years and 3 months he was overseas - the West Nova Regiment was the first allied unit to stay in Europe during the entire war.

Pte Oren Foster received the British Empire Medal from King George XI himself, during a visit to Buckingham Palace. His fondest memory of his time in the military – having a nice chat with the King he calls 'such a friendly guy'.





Historic Aircraft that Played a Significant Role in Canadian Aviation Heritage

Le DHC5 Buffalo de de Havilland

Ayant été conçu en réponse à un appel d'offres lancé par l'armée des États-Unis en mai 1962, le *Buffalo* est essentiellement une version plus grosse et plus puissante du DHC4 Caribou. Lorsque l'offre de de Havilland est retenue, les coûts de mise au point des quatre prototypes sont répartis entre l'armée des Etats-Unis, le gouvernement du Canada et la firme de Havilland.

Le Buffalo remporte un succès immédiat grâce à sa grande capacité d'emport de charges utiles et à ses excellentes performances en matière de décollage et d'atterrissage courts (DAC). Après son premier vol le 9 avril 1964, les premiers acheteurs du *Buffalo* sont l'armée des États-Unis, l'Aviation royale du Canada (ARC) et le Brésil. Le premier cycle de production permet la construction de 59 avions et

en 1974, l'intérêt soulevé par cet appareil à l'étranger entraîne le redémarrage de la chaîne de production avec des clients comme l'Équateur, le Kenya, le Soudan et le Zaïre.

Au Canada, l'ARC achète 15 Buffalo en décembre 1964, et ces appareils entrent en service en juillet 1967, au sein du 429° Escadron nouvellement reformé. Le CC115, comme on l'appelle, est équipé de moteurs plus puissants que sa version américaine. Entre 1974 et 1979, trois de ces avions servent outremer avec la 116e Unité de transport au sein Force d'urgence des Nations Unies. Le 9 août 1974, l'un d'eux est abattu par trois missiles sol-air syriens, tuant les neuf Canadiens qui se trouvent à bord.

Au pays, à compter de 1970, cet avion joue des rôles de transport et de sauvetage du transport de passagers.

au sein du 413°, du 424° et du 442° Escadron ainsi qu'un rôle d'entraînement au sein du 426e Escadron. En 1975, le Buffalo devient strictement un avion de recherche et sauvetage. Le Buffalo est encore en service de nos jours au sein du 442^e Escadron, à Comox (Colombie-Britannique), mais un programme visant son remplacement a été lancé.

Dans les années 1960 et 1970, le *Buffalo* a mis en valeur la technologie aéronautique canadienne en faisant la preuve qu'une petite entreprise pouvait mettre au point une technologie du contingent canadien de la de calibre international et se tailler un créneau dans le marché. Même si la production du *Buffalo* prend fin en 1986, après la construction de 129 appareils, la firme de Havilland poursuit le développement d'ADAC, mais plutôt dans le domaine

De Havilland DHC-5 Buffalo

Originating as a result of a US Army competition of may 1962, the Buffalo was a larger, more powerful version of the DHC-4 Caribou. When de Havilland won the competition, the cost of the four prototypes was shared between the US Army, the Canadian Government and de Havilland.

With its larger payload and improved Short Take-Off and Landing (STOL) characteristics, the Buffalo was an immediate success. First flown on 9 April 1964, the Buffalo was initially bought by the US Army, the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) and Brazil. The initial production run was 59 aircraft, ended in 1972: however, interest from foreign customers resulted in the production line being reopened in 1974 with Ecuador, Kenya, Sudan,

and Zaire being among the purchasers.


In Canada, the RCAF bought 15 in December 1964, which entered service in July 1967 with the newly reformed 429 Squadron. The CC-115, as the aircraft was known, had more powerful engines than the American version. Three aircraft served overseas with 116 Transport Unit as part of the Canadian Contingent to the United Nations Emergency Force between 1974 and 1979. One was shot down by three Syria surface to air missiles on 9 August 1974, killing all nine Canadians onboard.


Domestically, the aircraft served in the transport and rescue role starting in 1970

with Nos. 413, 424 and 442 Squadrons and with 426 Squadron in a training role. In 1975, the Buffalo became strictly a search and rescue aircraft. It continues to operate today with 442 Squadron in Comox, BC, although a program is underway to find a replacement.

The Buffalo was a highlight of Canadian aircraft technology in the 1960 and 1970s, demonstrating that a small company could develop world-class technology and carve out a niche in the market. While production ended in 1986 with 129 aircraft built, de Havilland continued development of the STOL aircraft but next in a passenger role.







that flexible!" The Windsor cooler than normal May and sewage treatment ponds are available almost twelve months of the year. Access from the 101 highway, when heading towards Halifax, is via the first Windsor ramp. Turn right at the bottom, proceed until the ponds are in sight, and then choose whatever access suits you best. see: http://www. windsorwesthantsplanning. ns.ca/docs/maps/windsor.pdf then view the ponds from either Trecothic, Park, or Lagoon Dr.

Birders have noted that they are seeing more than the normal number of Blue Jays this year. Simultaneously, they ask where have all the Common Grackles, European Starlings, and "Wooly Bears" have gone? In the natural world much can be explained if we are able to determine, for example, anomalies pertaining to the availability of food. When we realize that these three species share a common diet, I suggest, the answer is provided in the details contained in the question itself. When we consider the life cycle of these three species we see that the poor weather at the beginning of this year, for example, the

extraordinarily wet and cool July would be detrimental to the Grackles and Starlings breeding & brooding season. Wild life are not as inflexible as many would believe, therefore, given the unsuitable conditions in their regular latitudes it is very likely that these species would choose breeding and roosting grounds further west and south leaving the Blue Jays without competition at Nova Scotia feeders. Too simple? We can take it a little further; the cooler/wetter July resulted in fewer insects this year reducing the variety of food available: this forced the Jays to spend more than the usual amount of time at backyard feeders. As for the Wooly Bears, that is, the larva stage of the Isabella Tiger Moth, the cold wet weather would interfere with their life cycle too, no dessert for a number of our flying friends! 



Our goal is to provide CF families with the tools & resources you need to prepare for the challenges & emergencies this unique lifestyle may bring. In order to support the CF member's ability to be available for operational duty, the family's needs must be acknowledged & identified so we can prepare ourselves for emergency situations. For those CF families with children, Emergency Childcare Services will offer you the resources you need for emergency preparedness.

This childcare plan is *not* the same as the "family care plan" form you are required to have on file with your unit. Our Childcare Plan requires more information- is used as

Submitted by: Kim Dixon, GMFRC Coordinator of Child a tool in preparing for the family's emergency childcare • arrangements- and is kept on file with the GMFRC. We maintain a list of screened, qualified emergency childcare providers who will provide childcare to our military families in the event that your childcare arrangements are not working. Specifically, we will provide care for the following situations:

- When the CF member is employed/deployed away from home and the spouse/caregiver is unavailable due to illness or any other family emergency
- When the CF member is required to report for duty on short notice and the spouse/usual caregiver is unavailable
- When a single parent or both parents are CF members and they are unable to access the regular childcare provider in a deployment or emergency situation
- When there is illness of a child that would prevent a parent from accessing regular childcare arrangements for care at a time when the CF member's presence at work is critical to the military operation
- When there is a need for respite childcare due to the total family situation- including the CF member's work commitments
- When there are other circumstances not covered above and childcare is believed to be the solution to the problem (in these cases, approval must be given by the GMFRC Child Youth & Parenting Services Coordinator in consultation with DMFS)






Here are some creative healthy treat ideas to serve:

- Mummy fingers baby carrots with one end dipped in catsup
- Blood and guts sandwiches strawberry jam or cherry preserves, mixed with diced fresh fruit. Use as a filler for whole grain sandwiches
- Easy eyeball ice cubes can also be made by peeling almost all of a radish, reserving enough of its red skin so that it resembles the veins of a bloodshot eye, and hollowing out one end of it to hold the 'iris' - a pimento stuffed olive. Place each radish eyeball into an individual cube of an ice tray, fill with water and freeze.
- Scary spiders it's best to make these on a plate. Peel a kiwi fruit and cut it in half to make your spider body. Use currants for eyes, pressing them into the kiwi, and lay four strips of cucumber on each side of the body to make the legs.
