you Stop for the School Bus?

Remember a morning you were running late for work. Maybe your children were having an 'off' morning. Maybe you had a disagreement with someone in the household. Maybe you were stressed about forgetting something you needed to do.

We've all had those mornings at some point. You get in your vehicle, somewhat distracted from the morning's activities. A school bus stops in front of you, flashes the red lights, and extends the school bus stop sign. Did you stop or did you continue driving?

There has been an in-

crease in complaints of vehicles not stopping for the school bus when the stop sign was extended. The NS Motor Vehicle Act states, "The driver of a vehicle shall stop the vehicle before passing a school bus that is exhibiting flashing red lights and is stopped on or near a highway and shall remain

stopped until the school bus proceeds". Therefore, a person can not stop and proceed when safe to do so, nor can he/she drive through the lane if the children have crossed the road, drive through another lane in a 3-lane road (i.e. post office), or drive through an intersection when a bus is stopped at one and

exhibiting the flashing red lights.

Also, there have been complaints of impatient drivers not waiting for the sign to be retracted and for the red lights to stop flashing before proceeding. This is also not acceptable and poses a danger to the children within the bus. The bus drivers are required to wait until the passengers are seated, prior to setting the bus in motion. So, please

have the patience to wait until the children are seated, the lights are extinguished, and the stop sign is retracted.

If you are unsure at any time about whether or not to proceed, always stop and wait until the lights are off and the sign is retracted. Remember, it's our children on that school bus. Let's keep them safe.



Veterans of the Week ~ ~ Remembrance 2009



Mr. Malcolm "Mac" Wentzell.

It was a typical October day when I had the pleasure of conversing with Mr. Malcolm "Mac" Wentzell who recalled his days, as a young man trying to enlist during WWII, as if it were yesterday. Mac, (one of four brothers who enlisted) was enrolled on the 6th of November 1940 when the pay was \$1.30 a day. None of that mattered as Mac was a proud and determined young man, trying to be the first in line to have the opportunity to serve his country.

After he signed up, in Middleton Nova Scotia, Mac was selected and sent off to Halifax to become part of the 10th Search Light Battery with the Royal Canadian Artillery (RCA) and was immediately on "Active Service." During WWII he was in England as Infantry reinforcement and remembers very clearly seeing and hearing the V1 and V2 rockets launched from Germany and hit England. Mac also recalls German vessels being spotted off the coast of Halifax and Liverpool.

As a gunner in 1944 he went overseas and recalls the excitement flying over to Holland, only shadowed by the immense sense of pride to be serving his country. After the war, Mac released and returned home to Middleton where he met and wed his lovely wife Claire.

Mac continued to serve the military community, along with Claire, as members of the Legion Branch 33, as they raised their family in Brickton. He served a term as Vice President through his 59 years with the Legion. Claire was a member of the women's

auxiliary, raising funds for veteran activities in Bridgetown and then joined with Malcolm a few years later. Mac has continued to be a member with the Lawrencetown Legion.

Although very modest, about the subject of decorations and awards, Malcolm is decorated with the 1939-45 War Medal and the Canadian Service Volunteer Medal along with several others in his years with the

Malcolm Wentzell is still as patriotic today as he was as a young man proud to serve his country during the war. His sense of Comradeship is evident as he mentions that he remained in contact with the RCA Batter members throughout the years; still visiting one member who resides in Cape Breton.

Through out our conversation, as Malcolm recalls the bombs overhead and mines at sea, he states

"There are some things you never forget! The war was different then as it is now, you knew who your enemy was and where they were. You never forget the trip there or the trip home!'

The Middleton Legion is blessed with one of the most jovial World War II vets alive - Lou Redden. He served in the Navy from 1942 until the which were spent directly

wartime service was spent in convoy operations both at home and abroad, including escorting supply ships from England and Iceland to Murmansk in the high Russian Arctic. This route was fraught with danger as the Germans occupied Norway. Many ships in the convoys were lost to the U-boat infested waters. For his service in these dangerous voyages, he has been honoured by the Russian government 3 times – most recently in 2005.

After the war, he released from the service, working for CIBC until 1949, when he decided to re-enlist. He spent the next 20 years as a supply technician in the RCAF. His favourite posting was a 12 month tour in France, 9 of

end of the war. Much of his in Paris. Afterwards he was posted to Summerside for 3 years, Greenwood for 5 years, and Toronto, from where he retired. He remained in Ontario for 11 more years, working as a Certified General Accountant.

During his years with the bank, he met his lovely wife, Isabelle, whom he married in 1947. In 1980 he and his wife retired to the Annapolis Valley. They have 2 grown children, 4 grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

Mr. Redden is currently the honourary president of the Middleton Legion. He joined this branch 2 times – the first in 1946 and again in 1980, from which time forward he has been an extremely active member serving over the years as president, vicepresident, and treasurer.

the name of almost 1,900 Maritime Patrol Aviators who have made the ultimate sacrifice. But we do not celebrate this fact lightly, for at this very moment, VP crews from around the world continue to perform those dangerous but crucial and largely unheralded tasks, that keep our coasts and territories safe, protect the sovereignty

this book already contains of our territory and that of our allies, and contribute greatly to the collective security of our great nation for ourselves, our families and our neighbours. We have seen the role of Maritime Aviation change dramatically in scope over the last few years, with VP crews from around the world embracing new technology and new taskings.

For us here at 14 Wing, whether supporting land forces in the Middle East, operating Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) over Afghanistan, or preparing to provide support to perhaps the largest ever domestic security operation at the Vancouver 2010 Olympics, we do not forget from where it is that we came, and the brave VP aviators for whose loss we still mourn.

VPI was originally formed in 1966 at Comox, British Columbia by Wing Commander Herb Smale, as the Neptune P-2000 Club. Reformed as VPI in November 1970, following the retirement of its namesake, the Neptune aircraft, VPI welcomed into its fellowship Maritime Patrol aviators from around the world. Today, VPI which is headquartered at 14 Wing Greenwood, has over 5,500 members worldwide, with Wings located in over 20 countries. VPI's mission is to "maintain an organization of aircrew to foster goodwill and fellowship among long range maritime patrol and reconnaissance flyers through the promotion of understanding and recognition of maritime patrol operations and of their impact on military aviation."
