Bristol / Fairchild Bolingbroke

The Greenwood Military Aircraft Museum (GMAM) is now home to a Bristol Fairchild Bolingbroke (Boly) aircraft which flew during World War II. Bolingbroke is Saxon and means "The Home by the Brook of Bullas People."

The major components, gathered from various locations throughout the prairies arrived by truck on Monday the 26th of October, and were unloaded by Museum staff, volunteers and personnel from the Base transport section, and placed in the workshops behind the GMAM.

The Boly is a copy of the Bristol Blenhiem, a twin engine coastal Turkey, Greece, and Finland

Bomber, and 4,422 of various Marks were built and flown by Royal Air Force Squadrons (Sqns). Blenheims flew before and during the Second World War from the United Kingdom and British occupied territory in the Middle and Far East. The Blenheims were the first aircraft to make a reconnaissance flight on September 3rd 1939 into Germany and the next day, bombing raids commenced during the opening stages of the war. Eventually, the aircraft would be part of 70 Sqns at the height of its popularity during the war. Other nations such as

The Bolingbroke, forever known as the Boly, was ordered into production in Canada by the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) and the prototype was shipped to Fairchild Canada in Longueuil, Quebec. The first Bolingbroke Mk I in RCAF livery #702 flew at Longueuil Quebec on September 14th 1939. After a short run of 18 aircraft, constructed to British specs as the Bolingbroke MK I, Fairchild switched production to the Bolingbroke MK IV with Canadian and American instruments and equipment and extra fuel tanks for longer range. De-icing boots and a dinghy were also added and other changes such as two Pratt and Whitney twin Wasp engines instead of the Bristol Mercury VIII radials, were tried with only 15 built. One Mk I was converted to a float plane for a short time in North Bay Ontario, but most of the Canadian production were Mark IV with the Bristol Mercury XV (136 built) or the Mark IV T multi purpose trainer (457 built).

One Canadian Soldier Killed in an Explosive Device Strike

Un soldat canadien tué par un engin explosif improvisé


OTTAWA (October 30, 2009) -- One Canadian soldier was killed by an improvised explosive device that detonated near his dismounted patrol approximately 10 km south-west of Kandahar City at approximately 4:30 p.m. Kandahar Time

Killed in action was Sapper Steven Marshall, from the 1 Combat Engineer Regiment based in Edmonton, Alberta, serving as a member of the Task Force 3-09 Battle Group.

Sapper Marshall was conducting a foot patrol in the Panjwayi District when the incident happened. No other soldiers were injured in this incident.

We are all thinking of the family and friends of our fallen comrade during this sad time and our thoughts and prayers are with them. The commitment and sacrifice of our soldiers and their loved ones are helping to make a difference in the lives of the people of Kandahar Province. We will continue our mission as we remember the lives of our fallen soldiers.

Members of Task Force Afghanistan work with Afghan security forces for the greater good of Afghanistan. We remain focused and determined to bringing peace, stability and good governance despite the challenge imposed on us by the insurgents. We remain committed to Afghanistan.



General Safety News:

Role of the Wing Workplace **Health & Safety Committee**

Submitted by: R.I. Walsh, CRSP, Wing General Safety Officer

This article will outline the role of our 14 Wing Workplace Health & Safety Committee (WWHSC) and hopefully help you understand the key role this committee plays in ensuring a safe and healthy workplace for all at 14 Wing.

The Canada Labour Code Part II, which is the guiding legislation for Occupational Health and Safety within federally regulated workplaces, requires that a Workplace Health and Safety Committee be established for workplaces that have 20 or more civilian employees. Such committees are comprised of both labour and management representation. Management representatives are appointed by the employer, while labour representatives are selected by our respective trade unions.

At 14 Wing, Commanding Officers/Branch Heads appoint their Unit General Safety Officers (UGSOs) who attend the WWHSC meetings on their behalf. Local trade unions appoint Labour Representatives to attend the WWHSC meetings. There should be a quorum of Management and Labour representatives at the table. The committee is co-chaired by a Management Rep, appointed by the employer, and a Labour Rep, appointed by the local trade unions. This committee is obligated, by legislation, to meet at least nine times per year. Your WWHSC performs the following roles:

• considers and expeditiously resolves any health and safety complaints that cannot be resolved successfully at the branch/squadron General Safety sub-committees;

in conjunction with the responsible supervisor, participates in accident investigation concerning disabling injuries to any DND civilian employee and assists in developing appropriate preventive measures to prevent the reoccurrence of similar accidents;

participates in the implementation and monitoring of a program for prevention of workplace hazards;

participates in the development, implementation and monitoring of a program for provision of personal protective clothing, devices or materials:

assists the employer in investigating and assessing the exposure of employees to hazardous substances;

ensures adequate records are maintained with regard to work accidents, injuries and health hazards;

participates in all inquiries, investigations, studies and inspections pertaining to employee health and safety; and

inspects all or part of the workplace, on a monthly basis, so that every part of the workplace is inspected at least

The committee has full access to all government and employer reports, studies and tests relating to the health and safety of employees with the exception of an individual's medical records (without the individual's consent). As well, the committee may request any information that it considers necessary to address work-related hazards.

Your WWHSC is a "corner stone" of the 14 Wing General Safety Program and plays an integral part in ensuring the health and safety of all DND/CF personnel. Names and contact numbers for your WWHSC members should be displayed on your unit/squadron General Safety Board. In closing, thankyou to all of our WWHSC members for the excellent work they do in helping to keep all DND/CF personnel safe and

A Story of Remembrance

In the early summer of 1938 my step-mother, Mary, 2 sisters, Jean, age 17, and May, 5, and I, 9, after a harrowing journey by double-decker bus and train from South Darenth, Kent, to Belfast, Ireland, a trip that took all day from early morning to late night, with luggage in hand, for a five-month visit to Montreal to visit relatives.

On arrival at the dock-side we were informed the small freighter, SS. Kenbane Head, 5,225 tons, was at anchor in mid-

stream. A definite problem now arose as to how to get there, amidst a melee of drunken Irishmen on a Irish holiday weekend we succeeded in finding a small-boat skipper willing to take us to her, on arrival alongside an officer onboard advised us we could not come onboard until the following morning at 8:00 a.m. Mary pleaded with him to allow us to board as we had no place to spend the night ashore, he finally agreed, and lowered a jumping ladder over the side, clambering up this vertical ladder with wooden steps and rope handles proved to be quite a challenge for landlubbers like ourselves, with a gusty wind blowing, in the dark, we eventually reached the deck, baggage and all, breathing a deep sigh of relief. Prior to this the small-boat skipper insisted on a payment that we definitely could not afford, once again poor Mary had to plead to accept what payment she could afford and he too, reluctantly agreed.

The Kenbane Head could only carry 12 passengers, any more and it would have been necessary to carry a doctor according to the marine laws of the time. We were shown to a cabin with 4 bunks in the after end of the vessel to get settled in, washed up, stow our gear, and then go to the dining-room and have a lunch, which under the circumstances was most welcome as we had very little to eat during the day.

The next morning, at 9:00 a. m., on a full tide, K.H. commenced our slow voyage of two weeks across the North Atlantic, this old coal-burning vessel could not travel at any greater speed than 12 knots to preserve the tons of coal that

Seasickness was a problem for May and I, and the smell of the dining-room was more than we could stand, so we remained in our cabin much of the time, luckily, we had been presented with a 5-lb. box of Peek Frean's digestive biscuits and we would munch on these occasionally, and occasionally, the Captain would send a steward to check on us, eventually, we could enter the dining-room and have something more substantial.

During the voyage the crew could not do enough for us, and treated us most royally, even to playing games with us to keep us amused.

Finally, we arrived at our destination of Montreal after frequent choppy seas that would break over the decks and cause more sickness. The Irish crew-members could not have been more generous with their unbending assistance during the entire voyage.

On November 5, 1940, in Convoy HX-84 enroute from Halifax, NS. to Britain, HMS Jervis Bay, an Armed Merchant Cruiser, fitted with WW1 6 in. guns, was the sole escort for 38 merchant vessels when the convoy was spotted by the Admiral Scheer, a German pocket Battleship, equipped with up-to-date 11 in. guns. The Jervis Bay's Captain, Fogarty Fegen, knowing it was to be a one-sided battle ordered the ships to make smoke and make their escape at high speed, he then advanced at full-speed towards the enemy Battleship and opened fire with all guns blazing, at the same time the Admiral Scheer had fired salvoes that were exploding on Jervis Bay, finally she was burning fore and aft, with one final massive explosion she tore apart and went down in a blaze of fire. This action had lasted 25 minutes. With a loss of 190 crew, 65 survivors were picked up by the Swedish ship, Stureholm.

Captain Fegen, was awarded the Victoria Cross, posthumously, but his action saved 33 of the 38 ships in the convoy, the German vessel continued to chase them until dark.

The Kenbane Head was sunk, with a loss of 24 of her crew. Mary's nephew, Patrick Leo Ross, Ordinary Signalman, RCNVR, age 20, on his first trip to sea was 'lost at sea' in HMS Jervis Bay.

"Live at Five" Broadcasts from 14 Wing Greenwood!

It was "lights, camera, action" at 14 Wing Greenwood on Thursday, October 29, 2009 as CTV out of Halifax came to the Wing to broadcast "live" their "Live at Five" show.

The Wing was one of the sites chosen by CTV as part of a location fall tour shoot to highlight various military Bases and the Coast Guard across the Maritimes. 
