

Bradley Piggott, age 19, races to an over-all first place finish in the ZX 10 Kilometre Road Race with a time of 33 minutes and 40 seconds. He was also the first place finisher in the Male Junior Runners category.

Last Sunday, April 25, 2010, 14 Wing Greenwood hosted the 31st edition of the Greenwood (ZX) 10 kilometre (km) Road Race and 5 km Fun Run. This annual event highlights the beginning of the running season for runners all across the province. The races were organized by the members of the 14 Wing Cycle-N-Run Club with the support of numerous volunteers and local businesses.

Runners of all levels gathered at the 14 Wing Fitness & Sport Centre to participate in one of the two events. Mother Nature showed up right on time for the race, pushing the rain away and leaving in its place a sunny, scattered sky which created perfect running conditions. Wing Commander Bill Seymour and Chief Warrant Officer Mike Whitman started the events at 10:00

a.m. and there were 239 runners with ages ranging from seven years old to seventy-nine years old!

This year, the event went international! The ZX 10 km had a parallel edition at a camp located in Southwest Asia. The outstanding initiative of Master Corporal Brian Milligan allowed 14 Wing Mission Support Squadron personnel currently deployed at the camp to take part in the local event via Skype while away from home. Twenty-nine participants took the start at the same time as the Greenwood's participants even though their weather was thirty-one degrees Celsius!

Nineteen year old Bradley Piggott was the first to cross the finish line in Greenwood with a time of thirty-three minutes and forty seconds. He was followed closely by his brother, Matthew Piggott, also nineteen years old, who took the second place with a time of thirty-four minutes and nineteen seconds. The third place overall went to twenty-seven year old Tyler Reddy who had a time of thirty-five minutes and thirty-five seconds.

The Road Races were once again a great success! Runners in Greenwood were able to talk with the runners overseas throughout the event

using the video chat system installed in the Fitness & Sport Centre. Run Nova Scotia members were able to accumulate points toward the Timex Series and the Run Nova Scotia Series, which will allow the top runners to represent the province in the National Championship.

An event of this magnitude would not have been possible without the amazing work and the numerous hours of all the volunteers. 

I – Involve: Have the whole family help out. You should not be the only one responsible for cleaning up. If there are projects or tasks that you can't do, or know you won't do without help, then ask for it. If everyone in the home is involved, they will be more likely to help keep it up.

N – Needs: What are your needs versus your wants? You may need to clear out your overflowing closet, but want to wash the windows. Work on your needs first, then when you have more time work on the wants. Set your priorities for each space in order of importance and time available.

G – Goals: Set goals for how you want your space to look and feel like. When you

accomplish a task that takes you towards your goal, reward yourself. It feels great when you can cross something off your list. Celebrate that!

How to do it

Now that you know, what you want to do focus on one area of the room at a time. Pick up an item only once and make decisions quickly. It is KEEP, DONATE or TOSS. If you're unsure about an item and are not quite ready to let it go, put it in a box to SAVE. Pack it away for 6 months and see if you go looking for the item. If you haven't needed it in that time frame, time to let it go. Start a regular donate box that you can add to as you find things in your home you no longer need. When the box is full, drop it off at a donation

Everything in your home should have a purpose and a destination. That means that you need a reason to have it and a place to keep it. Store items where they make sense for you. When you are looking for something what is the first spot you think it would be? That's where it needs to stay. It should be logical and accessible. The key is to be consistent about putting things back in that destination so that you'll be able to find it quickly and easily when you need it.

The key thing to remember is that your life is constantly changing, and so is the "stuff" in it. You will periodically have to review what is working and what's not. Then you can revise it to better suit your needs at the moment.

Get in the Organizing Habit!

If you want to change your space, you need to change your habits. You cannot change others, but by changing your habits and routines, you will rub off on them and theirs will change as well. Your space did not get disorganized overnight and it won't be easy to change your habits to get organized, but it will be well worth it. Need reminders? Leave yourself sticky notes inside cupboard doors, in your drawers, under the sink... You'll get used to doing them... and then won't need reminders to keep you on track. Organizing is about making things easier and simpler to manage.





Should this precautionary step not have been executed, the prop assembly would otherwise have been built up, re-installed on an aircraft and failed the dynamic balancing check. Cpl White's innovation and determination directly identified the root cause, led to successful closure of the FS, reduced 3rd line cost, and averted significant unproductive person hours, quickly returning an aircraft to operational status.
