

A full color party of members from the Royal Canadian Legion and various military personnel from 14 Wing Greenwood, gathered at St. Mark's Chapel on May 2, 2010 to remember the sailors of the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN), the Merchant Marines and Squadrons of the Royal Canadian Air force during the Battle of the Atlantic.

"We need to remember what they (the fallen) have given up for us and pass this history on to the next generation so they may understand", comments the Chapel Life Coordinator, (Captain) Padre Gordon Poley, during his opening remarks.

Padre Poley also spoke of what vigilance sailors went through while carrying out over 25,000 crossings of the North Atlantic to England and back carrying over 181 million tons of supplies during the Second

World War and how their sacrifices in this battle have secured our freedom today.

This exceptional service included two vocal performances; "For the Beauty of the Earth" and "Alshlosha D'Avarim" from the Kings Chorale Childern Chourus, directed by Shannon Patterson.

This annual event was even more poignant for remembrance as this is the 100th anniversary of the Navy.

The Royal Canadian Navy lost over 2,000 dead and twenty-four warships to this contribution of the war and more that 900 Royal Canadian Air Force and Canadian Army personnel were also lost.







Drinking Water from Private Wells: Potential Health Impacts

A recent article published in the CMAJ (Private Drinking Water Supplies: Challenges for Public Health by Jeffrey W.A. Charrois, PhD) outlined the potential health threats from private drinking water supplies(http:// www.cmaj.ca/cgi/rapidpdf/ cmaj.090956v1). Given that approximately 40% of Nova Scotians obtain their drinking

article has a great deal of local relevance.

The maintenance and testing of private drinking water wells in Nova Scotia is primarily the responsibility of the owner(s). This responsibility must be taken seriously as there are many factors that can lead to microbial or chemical well contamination. These include inadequate wellhead and ground water protection, improper construction and maintenance, natural sources of contamination and malfunctioning onsite sewage systems.

Microbial contamination

of the drinking water can lead to serious bacterial enterotoxigenic E coli), viral (Hepatitis A) and protozoal Giardia) infections. Chemical contamination of groundwater and drinking water wells can be caused by naturally occurring arsenic or uranium or from substances related to human activities.

Unfortunately, bacterial contamination of private drinking water wells in Nova Scotia does not appear to be rare. A Cape Breton survey of drinking water test results (2006) revealed the presence of total coliform and E. coli in 40% and 5% of wells

respectively.
Wells in agricultural areas can have high levels of nitrate. Use of this water to mix formula or supplement breast milk can pose a risk for methemoglobinemia or "Blue Baby" syndrome in infants. Surveys in Kings County have shown nitrate concentrations exceeding the Canadian Drinking Water Quality Guideline in 15% to 21% of wells.

Improper use and disposal of chemicals and pesticides can contaminate

water wells over a large area. Perchloroethylene (a dry cleaning solvent) has contaminated ground water and drinking water wells in areas of Hammonds Plains (2001) and Greenwood (2004). Such contamination can be persistent and cover wide areas.

Owners of private wells should test their drinking water for bacteriological quality at least every 6 months and for chemical quality every 2 years. Additional testing is recommended if there are concerns about flooding or runoff from heavy precipitation, malfunctioning onsite sewage systems or chemical spills. Owners should also ensure that their wells are properly constructed and well maintained. More information on well testing and actual testing kits are available at regional Nova Scotia Environment offices.

Nova Scotia Environment provides support to private drinking water well owners. It has developed pamphlets and booklets about water quality (e.g. The Drop on Water series) and well maintenance

Promotion and Protection. They are available at the Nova Scotia Environment offices and website (gov. ns.ca/nse/water/privatewells. asp) and offices. Nova Scotia Environment also administers regulations for the installation of drinking water wells and onsite sewage systems.

The province's water is a critical resource that must be responsibly protected and managed. Nova Scotia Environment is presently leading the development of a Provincial Water Resource Management Strategy. The Strategy is being developed in consultation with other government departments and agencies at the federal, provincial and municipal levels, a broad range of stakeholders and the general

The Strategy identifies 7 key actions:

- To protect the quality and quantity of water
- To increase the understanding of and value placed on water
- To plan and build with water in mind
- To enhance the manage-

ment of drinking water and wastewater systems

- To encourage water efficiency and conservation
- To improve access to information about waterresources
- To support community water-stewardship efforts

Two public consultation documents about the Strategy have been circulated since 2008. A final consultation document will likely be distributed in the spring or summer of this year.

Physicians can play an important role in protecting the health of their patients (and especially new parents) by reminding them about properly maintaining and testing their wells. When providing care, health care providers should be alert to the possibility that an illness could be caused by a waterborne microbial pathogen or chemical contaminant from the patient's well. Finally, physicians, both as individuals as well as through organizations such as DoctorsNS, can add their voices to the development of the Water Resource Management Strategy.

One Canadian Forces Member Killed by Improvised Explosive Device

CEFCOM NR - 10.007 - May 4, 2010

OTTAWA — One Canadian Forces member was killed after an improvised explosive device detonated during a dismounted operation, about 25 kilometres southwest of Kandahar City, in the Panjwayi District, at approximately 4:40 p.m. Kandahar time on 3 May 2010.

Killed in action was Petty Officer Second Class Craig Blake a member of Fleet Diving Unit (Atlantic), based in Shearwater, Nova Scotia. He was serving with Task Force 1-10.

We are all thinking of the family and friends of our Canadian fallen comrade during this sad time. The commitment and sacrifice of our military and their loved ones are helping to make a difference in the lives of the people of Kandahar Province.

Together, Afghan National Security Forces and Joint Task Force Afghanistan continue to maintain the initiative in Kandahar Province. Canada in partnership with the Afghan government and ISAF remain committed to improving the security situation in order to set the conditions for reconstruction and development in the region.

Comforting the Crying Baby

Coping with a baby's crying can be very frustrating. Because your baby can't talk, crying is one way which they communicate their needs to

for food or a clean diaper, however sometimes their cries are for comfort. As soon as crying begins, try to figure out what is wrong. If you respond quickly to your crying baby then he/she learns to trust you. Babies do not cry because they are mean or because they are trying you. Usually the cries are to annoy you. The best way

to deal with a crying baby • Take your baby for a ride is to know what to do. The first thing is to ensure that your baby's basic needs are met: does their diaper need changing, are they hungry, thirsty, warm, cold or sick.

A few simple tips to on how you can calm you're crying

- Try and stay calm, babies can sense tension.
- Gently walk, dance or rock
- in the stroller or for a drive in the car.
- Check the baby's clothing make sure it's not too tight or that fingers and toes are not bent.
- Lay baby tummy down on your lap and gently rub or tap her/his back.
- Turn on music, run the vacuum, hair dryer or water – babies like consistent rhythmic noise.

• Wrap the baby in a soft, warm blanket.

Sing to your baby.

If nothing else works, then put baby in the crib and close the door for a few minutes. Go to another room and calm vourself down be sure to check on baby every few minutes. Remember to ask for help – it is okay to have someone come over to watch baby while you take a break. Babies do not follow your schedule, so what works one day to comfort your baby may not work the next time.

The GMFRC has a Casual Childcare Service available for times just like these. Parents can call and book a time for their child. If you think your baby has colic, a fever or is sick then contact your health care provider and have baby checked right

Never Forget Who We Are

We are a group of Canadian Army, Air Force and Navy personnel retired or still serving, who have been deployed at least one time under the United Nations (UN) or North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) command

Any person wishing to wear the veteran's patch must meet this criterion. Our goals are, primarily, meeting and reminiscing and most importantly remembering those soldiers who never made it back home or did make it home but were wounded physically or emotionally. Wearing this patch is to represent the good name of the CF and to make the public aware of what sacrifices have been made. As a patch member, you will also share the responsibility of passing the knowledge and importance of the meaning behind these patches.

Rules of engagement:

Veterans: We don't have any structure and we will never have one.

This group of service and ex service members was created so that members can find old friends, stay in touch, share and mainly, remember our brothers and sisters at arms who have fallen in combat or who risk their lives in each mission that they participate in.

We will have an official reunion each year (not mandatory). A mission is considered after a medal is awarded. We will wear our crests with pride because they represent who we are.

No criminal affiliation will be accepted, no motorcycle club (MC) or one per cent crest will be part of our colours. Even though eight out of ten members own a motorcycle, we are not a MC nor an association.

Your crest and patches belong to you and will be worn by you only because it is your personal identity. You should never forget that when wearing your crest, you represent a family of brothers and sisters. When wearing

the crest, no bad behaviour or conduct will be tolerated.

> Other memberships: Ladies: only a veteran's spouse and daughters may wear the ladies' crest and it is the veteran's responsibility to present the crest to the ladies.

Supporter: to become a supporter, the person has to be referred by a veteran member and the veteran is responsible for his supporter.

h. Veteran support: a Canadian citizen who served a mission with UN or NATO, or served with another military organization from another country or any soldier who served as an attaché under CF Command during a UN or NATO mission and has received his or her medal.

The Veterans UN/NATO Group is not in any way affiliated with DND, Veterans Affairs Canada, the Royal Canadian Legion or any other veterans' organization.



The move to 10 Hangar had been delayed as the allocated space for the helicopter's re-assembly was needed for higher operational purposes (the preparation of Sea King helicopters for shipment out West in support of the recent Winter Olympics). Weather delays


