

One Canadian soldier Killed by **Improvised Explosive Device**

CEFCOM NR - 10.008 - May 14, 2010 - OTTAWA — One Canadian soldier soldiers and their loved ones are helping to make a difference was killed when an improvised explosive device detonated during a dismounted night patrol in the Panjwayi district, approximately 15 kilometres southwest of Kandahar City, at 8:00 p.m. Kandahar time on May 13, 2010.

Killed in action was Private Kevin Thomas McKay from the 1st Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based in Edmonton, Alberta. He was serving as a member of the Task Force 3-09 Battle Group.

4 Wing Community Spring Clean-up

Hello again to all the residents of our 14 Wing Community. As in previous years, we will be asking for residents to assist in keeping our community a clean and safe environment.

The annual clean-up will take place at 0930 on 21 May 2010. Personnel will meet at the Morphee Centre at 0915 in dress of the day, or comfortable civilian attire, as appropriate. After a short brief on the morning's activities, personnel will be broken down into six teams, one per Ward. The teams will make their way to starting points within their assigned Ward, and start a sweep of the PMQ Common areas, bagging trash material as they go. As bags are filled, they will be taken to the main streets throughout the Housing area and deposited curb-side for pick up by "Clean-Up Crews" in light duty trucks.

Depending on the number of participants, Clean-Up should be complete within a couple of hours.

Valley Waste Resource Management (VWRM) has a program for supply and removal of large dumpsters/waste bins free of charge when used for Community Clean-ups. The "Clean-Up Crews" will circulate around the Housing area, collecting the filled bags and transporting them to this centrally located dumpster. When the Community Clean-Up is complete, VWRM will automatically remove the dumpster.

During sweeps, there is no requirement for personnel to proceed into individual housing lots, those are the responsibility of the residents and should have already been 'spruced up' during Valley Waste Resource Management's

(VWRM's) Spring Clean Up. The object is to collect material accumulated over the course of last Fall and Winter; no extremely heavy debris or deadfall need be collected. As with all things, the greater the number of participants, the better the end result and the faster it can be completed. This call for volunteers is not restricted to only Military members; any resident of the Community or interested party can choose to help out.

Once again, your Community Council realizes how busy schedules may be at this time of year, but hope you will take time to help us in making and keeping our Community clean and safe, so we can all enjoy summer a little more. Thanks in advance for all your support.

Deployment can be a very busy time for families; a time where new routines and self discovery can take place. It is important that you take time for yourself to practice self care.

Some tips to practicing self care include:

Reward yourself: Find balance between taking care of

yourself and those close to you. Set some attainable goals for things you hope to achieve, personally, for the duration of the deployment. Keep a journal and reflect and reward yourself when you achieve one.

Relax: If you are feeling overwhelmed try stepping back, taking 10 deep breaths that go right into your abdomen, and then go back to what you were doing. This helps you become self aware and in control of yourself and the situation.

Exercise: Pick a day and go for a walk, go along with a friend, go to the park. If you have children wait until they go to bed and bust out a Pilates or yoga DVD. This will help you to relax and will be a nice reward to your mind, body and spirit after a long day.

Talk: Call a family member, a friend or come into the GMFRC to connect with one of our peer support groups, and/ or meet one on one with our social worker.

Remember do not feel you are being selfish; you are truly making a wise investment in caring for yourself.



All-day flight is no poisson d'avril

It was no joke on April Fools Day when the Joint Task Force Afghanistan Air Wing gave the Air Force a birthday present in the form of a new personal best.

The CU-170 Heron

The CU-170 Heron unmanned aerial vehicle broke the record for the longest Canadian UAV flight by staying aloft for almost 25 hours

Aside from surpassing the normal Heron operating time of 18 to 21 hours, the flight was also one of the longest unrefueled flights in the history of the Canadian Air Force, according to Col Christian Drouin, commanding officer of the JTF-Afg Air Wing.

The aircraft provided surveillance for a full 24 hours before landing, refitting

and going back into action in less than three hours. The ground crews -– made up of pilots and intelligence analysts — rotated during the mission to keep fresh eyes on the battlefield, said UAV pilot Capt Kenneth Jones. Capt Jones, who started his flying career with tactical helicopters such as the CH-136 Kiowa and CH-146 Griffon, said he never imagined he would be flying an aircraft from the comfort of the ground. He went on to explain that, despite the obvious fact that the crew is on the ground, the Heron flies much like a manned aircraft

The Heron replaced the CU-161 Sperwer UAV in 2009 to meet a growing demand for UAV support. The aircraft has greater range and newer sensors than the Sperwer, which first

deployed to Afghanistan in 2003. Pushing the envelope on UAV flights means the Air Force will be able to provide that much more support to the mission on land, explained Col Drouin.

"The Heron is like Big Brother watching over our troops on the ground," said Col Drouin. "This milestone... is significant as it opens the door to even more refinement in extending the endurance of this extraordinary capability."

Whether investigating suspicious activity or watching soldiers' backs, that capability can ultimately turn the tide in life and death situations, said Maj Jeff Davis, commander of the Heron detachment.

"Any extra amount of time we can spend conducting [observation] for the troops helps save lives," he added.





Saving Lives During Canada Road Safety Week

May 18 - 24, 2010 will mark Canada Road Safety Week, a national campaign to make Canada's roads the safest in the world.

This week has been strategically chosen, as it is the first "summer" long weekend. More people are traveling and traffic collisions are more frequent. Police vehicles will be stationed at key locations to remind people that safe driving habits save lives and reduce injuries on our roadways.

The focus during Canada Road Safety Week will be on behaviours that reduce risks for drivers, passengers and other road users: sober and alert driving, seat belt use, and refraining from all aspects of aggressive driving. All enforcement agencies across the country have been invited to participate.

'Anyone can become a victim of unsafe driving --- whether by direct involvement or when a loved one is affected," says Sgt. Dan Gaudet. "Police agencies across the country are collaborating on this project because they have seen this kind

of devastation, and because they know that the involvement of the driving public is essential to achieve safer streets and

Here in the Annapolis Valley, there have been 63 deaths and 112 serious injuries over the last four years related to vehicle collisions. These are just numbers, but they represent a lot of pain and heartache for members of our community --- that could have been prevented.

Canada Road Safety Week is sponsored by Transport Canada and endorsed by police and is part of Road Safety Vision 2010, which has a goal of making Canada's roads the safest in the world by 2010. 





Test Session. This wraps up a successful year for club skaters.


Recently, Erika Rice, Gabrielle Crossley and Hayley
