The flight consisted of seventy-six personnel from 14 Mission Support Squadron (14 MSS), who completed a six month deployment at a forward operating Base in Southwest Asia with the Theatre Support Element in the Persian Gulf region.

Family and friends eagerly awaited the arrival of their loved ones at the Air Movements Unit

and exploded in cheer once the CC-150 Polaris aircraft touched down. After a mandatory stop at Customs, redeploying personnel and family were then emotionally reunited.

The 14 MSS was made up of personnel from a variety of support occupations which included airfield engineers, supply technicians, cooks, resource management clerks and many other specialized technical occupations. The deployment was incredibly busy and challenging for the 14 MSS as they had to deal with several issues such as aircraft maintenance,

regular re-supply flights from Kandahar, visits as well as the various troops that were coming and going from the Base back to Canada and onto Afghanistan.

The six month deployment was in support of Operation ATHENA, Canada's participation in the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) in Afghanistan. Focused on Kandahar Province in southern Afghanistan, Op ATHENA has one over-arching objective: to leave Afghanistan to Afghans, in a country that is better governed, more peaceful and more secure.

Dental Unit Detachment Greenwood

At the intersection of Swordfish and Administration drive is an extremely old, one story "H" hut that houses the 1 Dental Unit Detachment Greenwood. The workforce of twelve provide complete treatment for all Regular Force and B (less than 180 days) and C class Reservists and provide only emergency care for A and B (less than 180 days) class reservists; in the 14 Wing area.

Consisting of six military personnel, one Major (Detachment Commander), one Captain (dentist), Sergeant and Master Corporal and two Corporals (all Non Commissioned Members are Dental technicians) as well as and six civilian employees; one dentist from Calian (a

civilian contractor), two at the Unit. Dealing with dental hygienists, two dental assistants and a receptionist. The parent unit is 1 Dental Unit located in Ottawa to which the Detachment Commander reports to for Canadian Forces (CF) policy and to the Wing Commander for Wing related issues.

Ensuring CF members are dentally fit is the objective as there are no Orthodontists

dental emergencies, cleanings and dental treatment, the Canadian Forces members are fit to do their duties! There is a Regional Specialty Care Center located at CFB Halifax, Stadacona where members are sent when required. Orthodontic work is outsourced to the local area

in the Canadian Forces Dental Services

Suffering with the usual staff shortages due to deployments, augmenting the school in Borden, training with US Navy hospital ships the Unit maintains a steady pace at all times! They administer 1750 patients yearly, maintaining a 90% dental fitness level. Remember to keep your appointment and call if you cannot.

Everyone is eagerly awaiting the new infrastructure that will be collocated with the hospital. The dental facilities will have the same amount of staff but more operatories (rooms/chairs) so that they will be able to continue to provide the same great care to all of us. No wonder there are a lot of smiling faces here



14 Wing Greenwood Participates in the Halcyon RV Exercise

14 WING GREENWOOD The month of June will mark the 100th anniversary of Canada's Navy with the International Fleet Review in Halifax scheduled for Tuesday, June 29, 2010. Just before this major celebration, the Maritime Forces Atlantic

all three components of Canada's military in an exercise called the Halcyon RV that is currently underway and will conclude on June 25. Assets from 14 Wing Greenwood are participating.

The exercise, which involves the United States, Britain and several NATO

different classes of surface and subsurface vessels, and aircraft. Activity is taking place from the Virginia Capes in the U.S. to various Maritime areas off of Nova Scotia, the Bay of Fundy, as well as the Canadian Forces Base in Gagetown, New Brunswick.

Units participating from 14 Wing include 405 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron, 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) Squadron, and the Long Range Patrol Standardization and Evaluation Team. Other Air Force units participating include 407 (Long Range Patrol) Squadron from 19 Wing based out of Comox, British Columbia and 12 Wing Shearwater's 423 (Maritime Helicopter) Squadron operating the CH-

124 Sea King from Canadian warships. The CP-140 Aurora aircraft will fly in direct support of the Navy in such activities as air defence. maritime interdiction and boarding, anti-submarine warfare, electronic warfare, and surface-borne threats. A variety of other military aircraft from Canada, the United States, and Britain, as well as contracted air support, will also be participating throughout the exercise.

Of note is the participation June 20-22 of CF-18 fighter aircraft from 425 Tactical Fighter Squadron of 3 Wing Bagotville, Quebec who will provide escort within the context of the exercise and over the water within restricted airspace off the Bay of Fundy and off of southwestern Nova Scotia.

One Canadian Soldier Killed by Improvised Explosive Device

OTTAWA — One Canadian soldier was killed after an improvised explosive device detonated during a foot patrol, about 20 kilometres southwest of Kandahar City, in the Panjwa'i District, at approximately 8:00 a.m. Kandahar time on 21 June 2010.

Killed in action was Sergeant James Patrick Macneil from 2 Combat Engineer Regiment, based in Petawawa, Ontario. Sergeant Macneil was serving with 1st Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment Battle Group.

We are all thinking of the family and friends of our Canadian fallen comrade during this sad time. The commitment and sacrifice of our military and their loved ones are helping to make a difference in the lives of the people of Kandahar Province



\$18.00 a Day Goes a Long Way in the Opp Shop!

In 1960, on the main street

of Kingston, Nova Scotia, in a small brown store with white trim five wives of the RCAF personnel based at 14 Wing Greenwood devised a very unique way of raising funds for Soldiers' Memorial Hospital located in Middleton. They opened a store called the "Opportunity Shop." With a smile from ear to ear they called themselves

the Greenwood

Chapter of the Middleton Hospital Auxiliary. The team consisted of the President, Norma Torontow; Vice President, Ann Polkinhorn; Manager of Opportunity, Peggy Bradley; Recruiting Workers, Goldie Palmer and Dorothy King. From 1960 to 2002 the Honorary President was the wife of the Base Commander. This wasn't like any other store you would see around Kingston. These ladies accepted everything from hairpins to horse collars!

Now having said this you are wondering what the Greenwood Chapter of the Middleton Hospital Auxiliary is. This is a chapter that doesn't get much recognition

and after reading this article you will see exactly why they play such an important part in today's world. These people are very special, without being asked they volunteer to help the Opportunity Shop to stay running. What is an Opportunity Shop? Good question. The one story structure sells a variety of second hand goods at attractive prices. The goods in the shop are donated from sources throughout the valley and the shop was open ten hours a week. Over the years they have bumped it up to eighteen hours a week. The store accepts any donations from the

community and they sell them at a low cost. By doing so, they make a profit and use the profit to donate money community. To date they have donated a total of \$238,203.00 to Soldiers' Memorial

Hospital (Health Centre).
These five RCAF women realized their community hospital was in need of more facilities and opened the shop in September to help them with finances. The women started by sponsoring a pediatric ward and playroom located at Soldiers' Memorial Hospital. The airmen wives realized that twenty percent of all admissions to Soldiers' Memorial Hospital were family members on the base. The shop's biggest seller was clothing and household

items. The Greenwood chapter has accomplished many miracles and their

the shop that they were not able to sell. They then take these items and recycle them. From day to day the shop never knows what kinds of things they will receive. Some things sell very fast and others don't.



The Council of the Municipality of the County of Kings directs, by policy, that an exemption be granted for the taxation year 2010/2011 pursuant to Section 69 of the Municipal Government Act, in an amount not exceeding \$140.00; upon property owned and occupied by a person who is a resident of the Municipality of Kings, and:

Whose total gross income from all sources for the year 2009, excluding any allowance paid pursuant to the War Veterans Allowance Act (Canada) or pension paid pursuant to the Pension Act (Canada), but including the income of all members of the same family residing in the same household, is less than \$30,000 gross income, and;

Where property is jointly owned, only one tax exemption shall be allowed and the sharing in such exemption shall be on the basis of ownership in such joint property.
