"Our Government's modernization efforts, conducted in line with the Canada First Defence Strategy, significantly contributes to the Canadian Forces' enhanced presence and effectiveness in Canada's northern regions,"

said the Honourable Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence.

"This milestone is another demonstration of giving our men and women in uniform the tools they need to do the jobs asked of them.

The CC-177 made its inaugural landing at CFS Alert on April 14, 2010 and has operated regularly in the Arctic ever since.

Canada's four CC-177 Globemaster IIIs, which are operated by 429 Transport Squadron from 8 Wing Trenton, Ont., were delivered in 2007 and 2008 and have given the Canadian Forces unprecedented strategic reach and agility. The aircraft helps with the rapid delivery of troops, cargo, civilians in distress, oversized combat equipment and much more from coast-to-coastto-coast and anywhere else worldwide.

"The CC-177 Globemaster III has been tremendously beneficial to Canada's strategic airlift capability, which now includes the ability to augment and increase the efficiency of critical Boxtop operations," said Major-General Yvan Blondin, Commander of 1 Canadian Air Division and the Canadian NORAD Region.

The Air Force is committed to delivering international, continental and domestic operations, including in the Arctic, in support of the Canadian Forces mission "

Operation Boxtop dates back to the 1950s. The Air Force runs day and night - flying fuel and supplies to the station each spring and fall. Over the last 20 years, the mission has averaged an annual delivery of approximately 294,000 kilograms of dry goods and 2.5 million litres of fuel into CFS Alert.

CFS Alert supports signals intelligence for the Canadian Forces and research for Environment Canada. Due to its extreme northern location, CFS Alert must be resupplied by air, which is done largely through a bi-annual resupply operation called Boxtop. In the past, this mission was accomplished using CC-130 Hercules aircraft.

With its much greater carrying capacity, the CC-177 strategic aircraft can move approximately three times more cargo to CFS Alert on each trip. This lift capability increases the efficiency of the operation, which was underway until Aug.



Soon, we will see our young people going back to school. Activities and programs will begin again at 14 Wing and in Annapolis Valley. Parishes will offer a new season of Religious Education or Sunday School. So many activities, so little time!

For parents, the question is "should I consider Religious Education for my children as an option?" Only you can answer this. But here are a few points that could help and support your reflection.

Speaking about religion is never easy. Especially since this matter is not very "en vogue" today. Spirituality is a more popular concept. Men and women, all along their life journey, will be confronted with the great questions of life: what's the meaning of my journey in this world? What is love? Why do I suffer? Is there a life after life? The spirituality that we develop helps us to give answers to those questions. All religions provide help for their people to develop their spirituality and ethical behaviour.

A need of spirituality is present in all human beings, and children are very sensitive to some dimensions that we lose with age. As children develop their abilities, they are able to begin using a language, learning to read, and making a distinction between what is good or not, they can develop their spiritual life. Some childhood specialists acknowledge six phases of developments of faith from 0 to 17 years old! And at each step he or she develops new skills. For example, when a child learns how to say thank you, he develops his ability to be able, one day, to say thank you for life or to praise God. Spiritual awareness is an early learning process. Daily family life is essential to built effective and emotional foundations. It's also the place where he will develop the tools for a meaningful life.

Religious Education Programs are a complement, or a tool, to support the parents when they decide that spirituality and religious values are important as a part of their legacy to their children. For St. Mark's and Queen of Heaven Chapels, these programs attempt to help children develop their spiritual capacities and ethical behaviours, through the discovery of the Christian message of Love and Forgiveness as well as through a personal commitment in their own religious tradition, Catholic or Protestant. 

We are Married... I Think... Um, what is Common Law?

Well you met someone and they are the love of your life. You can not imagine your life without them so the next logical step to take in the relationship is... you guessed it moving in together as a common law couple. As of 2006, more than 1.3 million same and opposite sex couples lived in common law relationships across Canada. This is a trend that is steadily increasing in families throughout the country and why wouldn't it be... it is easy or so we think.

variety of different reasons which may include: it is cost effective, the couple may not be ready to commit to marriage, and/or someone in the relationship may be separated from a previous marriage but can still cohabitate with a common law partner. Sounds great doesn't it? However this great concept can quickly turn into a nightmare if the relationship breaks down. So often I meet couples in common law relationships who fully believe they are entitled to the same rights as married couples. They are right to an extent; but, what many common law couples

Many people choose to law relationships create their become common law for a own separate set of legal obligations and rights that can be similar or very different then a traditional marriage. The laws relating to custody, access, child support and spousal support are similar for common law couples and married couples. However the laws relating to wills, estates, and property division after a common law separation are very different. One should contact a lawyer to gain understanding as to how these laws differentiate from each other and what you should know before you enter into a common law relationship.

In Nova Scotia most couples are considered common law once they have lived together do not realize is that common for a significant period of

time (typically between six months to two years). There is no length of time during cohabitation that a common law relationship will evolve into marriage.

One common myth being recognized by the base is that in many cases, couples who have self identified their relationship status as common law, truly believe and assume that they are entitled to the same rights as a married couple or a registered domestic partnership. It is really important that if you are living in a common law relationship to fully understand what your rights are; it never hurts to be proactive.

As mentioned earlier the laws between provinces are relating to wills, estates, property division after a common law separation are very different between common law and married couples

Most of us tend to think with our hearts before our brains when it comes to love but before making the decision to enter into a common law relationship by moving in together one must consider the following points:

- Get legal advice before signing anything.
- Consider seeking financial advice before agreeing to a common law relationship
- Consider and research registering for a domestic partnership. Domestic partnerships provide the couple with rights to inherit property in Nova Scotia, to apply for spousal support, and division of property similar to the rights of a married spouse.
- Consider meeting with a relationship coach, social worker, or padre to evaluate and weigh your relationship before taking it to the common law level.

In other words, remember that marriage is a formal

very diverse and the laws sometimes hundreds of witnesses; whereas, common law is based on trust, promises, and usually a verbal non-written contract. Use your best judgement, be proactive, and make informed decisions



Why should YOU be doing Aerobic Exercise?

Aerobic Exercise or Cardiovascular Training is the foundation to being physically fit. It uses large muscle groups rhythmically and continuously and elevates the heart rate and breathing for a sustained period. There are MANY benefits to cardio such as decreasing cholesterol levels and blood pressure, improving muscular endurance, reducing body fat, and making your heart, lungs and bones stronger! The great thing about aerobic exercise is that there are unlimited options at your disposal. If you're having trouble and don't know where to start, find an exercise that you can use as a "go to", sometimes just starting your routine is the biggest hurdle you have to overcome, and starting with something you enjoy can help get you in the right mind set.

Also, remember to keep challenging yourself. After doing the exact same thing for a period of time, your body gets used to the demand being placed on it, and you need to place additional stress in order to see results. The best way to start a cardio program is to begin with something manageable and then gradually adding a little intensity. A Target Heart Rate of 60-85% of your max (220-age X %) is a good guide for your training zone, listen to your body and figure out what works best for you. It's important to warm up, cool down and stretch during every workout. You'll be able to perform better during the workout, and your body will have a faster recovery once you're done.
