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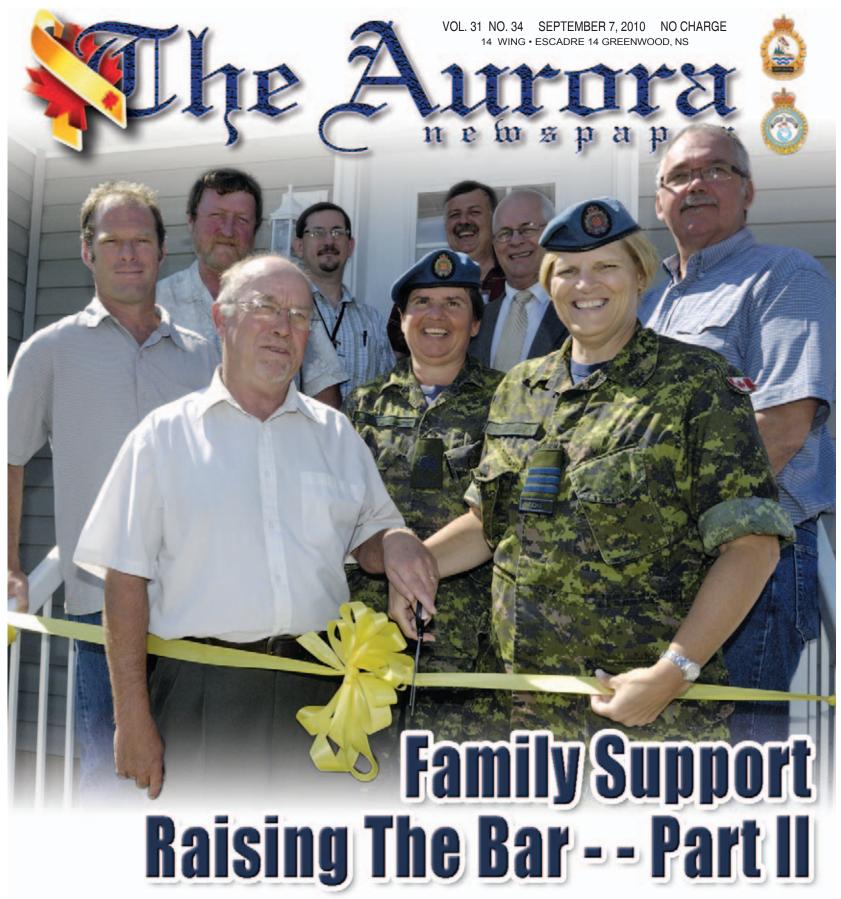

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Family Support - - Raising The Bar - -

Further to the "Raising the Bar" article in the 21 June 2010 edition of The Aurora Newspaper, this article further elaborates on how the Canadian Forces Housing Agency (CFHA) is continuously working towards the commitment of improving the support services provided to the CF family by making substantial improvements in the residential homes in which families live. As

the Wing Commander and Wing Chief Warrant Officer have accurately stated in their article, the Greenwood Residential Housing Units are considered to be some of the best in the country and we will not stop making improvements. They couldn't have been more right.

Like the rest of Canada, our Residential Housing Units (RHUs) are old, and somewhat small, and although they are in great shape, they also need improvement. apply contemporary housing contemporary 942 square

solutions and continue exploring new and innovative ways to meet the needs and expectations of the modern CF family. In addition to the numerous life cycle type projects and other capital projects involving kitchen and bathroom renovations and installation of patio decks and heat recovery ventilators, we have now embarked on one of these innovative solutions – a complete Minor Recapitalization project involving the conversion of To this end, we continue to eight (8) units from a non-

foot three (3) bedroom unit to a contemporary two (2) bedroom unit.

To advise you of what was entailed to accomplish this feat would be far too lengthy a task; however, suffice to say it involved the complete gutting of the unit and the reconfiguration of the layout to make the unit much more contemporary. This included the creation of an expansive and modern kitchen, enlarging the downstairs bathroom, installing a half bath on the bedroom floor level, installing a new 200

amp electrical service, converting the unit to electric heat, installation of a new hardwood stair system with stainless steel railings, installation of an HRV, new flooring, etc. The pictures below illustrate the before and after look and clearly demonstrate this tremendous transformation - from a cocoon to a butterfly. This work was completed under the guidance of our Chief of Technical Services, Wayne Elliott, under the capable supervision of the Defence Construction Canada

Construction Coordinator, Mr Joe Colp and very professionally completed by Mid Valley Construction Company.

We are so pleased with the results that it is now our intention to complete an additional 13 units this FY. As the Wing Commander and Wing Chief Warrant Officer, we at CFHA are committed to providing our members and their families the best family support possible. Pour faire suite à l'article intitulé « Relever la barre » publié dans le numéro du 21 juin 2010 d'Aurora, le présent article expose plus en détail comment l'Agence de logement des Forces canadiennes (ALFC) s'efforce continuellement d'améliorer les services de soutien fournis aux familles des membres des FC en effectuant d'importantes rénovations dans les résidences où vivent ces familles. Comme le commandant et l'adjudantchef de l'Escadre l'ont indiqué avec justesse dans leur article, les unités de logement résidentielles de Greenwood ont la réputation d'être parmi les meilleures au pays, et nous continuerons d'y apporter des améliorations.

Comme dans le reste du Canada, nos unités de logement résidentielles (ULR) sont vieilles et peu spacieuses et, bien qu'elles soient en bon état, elles ont besoin d'être rénovées. À cette fin,

nous continuons d'adonter des solutions de logement modernes et d'explorer de nouvelles façons novatrices de répondre aux besoins et aux attentes des familles des militaires d'aujourd'hui. Outre les nombreux projets tenant compte du cycle de vie et d'autres projets d'immobilisations, incluant la rénovation de cuisines et de salles de bains et l'installation de terrasses et de ventilateursrécupérateurs de chaleur, nous avons également adopté une autre solution novatrice,

qui consiste en un projet complet de réfection mineur comprenant la conversion de huit (8) unités d'une unité non-contemporaine d'une superficie de 942 pieds carrés comptant trois (3) chambres à coucher en une unité contemporaine comptant deux (2) chambres à coucher.

Décès d'un militaire canadien dans un hôpital à la suite de blessures subies en Afghanistan

OTTAWA – Un militaire canadien, blessé en Afghanistan, est décédé aujourd'hui au Centre médical régional de Landstuhl, en Allemagne.

Le Caporal (Cpl) Brian Pinksen du 2^e Bataillon du Royal Newfoundland Regiment, basé à Corner Brook, Terre-Neuve-et-Labrador, servait en Afghanistan au sein du groupement tactique du 1er Bataillon, The Royal Canadian Regiment. Le Cpl Pinksen a été blessé lorsqu'un engin explosif improvisé (IED) a explosé pendant une patrouille de routine dans le district de Panjwa'i, au Sud-Ouest de la ville de Kandahar, à environ 13 h 40, heure de Kandahar, le 22 août 2010.

Le Cpl Pinksen a été traité sur place et a été évacué par hélicoptère vers l'installation médicale multinationale de rôle 3 à l'aérodrome de Kandahar, pour ensuite être transporté au centre médical régional de Landstuhl, en Allemagne. Il est arrivé à Ramstein, en Allemagne, le 25 août et a succombé à ses blessures plus tôt aujourd'hui au Centre médical régional de Landstuhl.

Nos pensées et nos prières accompagnent la famille et les amis de notre camarade. Nous n'oublierons pas le sacrifice du Cpl Pinksen alors que nous continuons d'œuvrer pour apporter sécurité et espoir aux habitants de la province de Kandahar.

Le Canada, en partenariat avec le gouvernement d'Afghanistan, avec les forces de sécurité nationale afghanes et avec la FIAS, demeurent engagés à améliorer la sécurité pour établir des conditions favorables à la reconstruction et au développement dans la région. 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Canadian Soldier Dies in Hospital from Injuries Sustained in Afghanistan

OTTAWA- A Canadian soldier, who sustained injuries in Afghanistan, passed away at Landstuhl Regional Medical

Center in Germany today.

Corporal (Cpl) Brian Pinksen from 2nd Battalion, The Royal Newfoundland Regiment, based in Corner Brook Newfoundland, was serving in Afghanistan with the 1st Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment Battle Group. Cpl Pinksen sustained his injuries when an improvised explosive device (IED) detonated during a routine patrol in the Panjwa'i District, southwest of Kandahar City at approximately 1:40 p.m., Kandahar time on 22 Aug, 2010.

Cpl Pinksen was treated on scene and evacuated by helicopter to the Role 3 Multi-National Medical Facility at Kandahar Airfield then subsequently moved to the Landstuhl Regional Medical Centre in Germany. He arrived in Ramstein, Germany on 25 August and succumbed to his injuries earlier today at the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the family and friends of our fallen comrade during this very difficult time. We will not forget Cpl Pinksen's sacrifice as we continue to bring security and hope to the people of Kandahar Province.

Canada in partnership with the government of Afghanistan, the Afghan National Security Forces and ISAF remain committed to improving the security situation in order to set the conditions for reconstruction and development in the region. Joint Task Force Afghanistan, continues to be fully engaged in an initiative that serves to gradually enhance security, to strengthen governance and to expand the government's authority in key areas of Kandahar Province.

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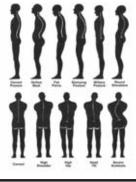

Here's your opportunity to save lives! It is once again time to roll up your sleeves and take the time to give blood. Canadian Blood Services will continue to hold *two day donor clinics* as a result of the outstanding support from our local communities. Let's respond and take advantage of this opportunity by filling up two full days with appointments. If we can double our one day attendance, over both days, Canadian Blood Services may be able to collect enough donations to save over a thousand lives!

The next *two day donor clinics* will be held at the 14 Wing Greenwood Community Centre on Wednesday September 8th and Thursday September 9th. Donors can either give during the 1:00 p.m. – 3:00p.m. time slot or the 5:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. evening slot on Wednesday the 8th or Thursday the 9th. If you are interested in giving blood, please ensure that you bring identification with your full name and signature or full name

and photograph. New donors are welcome!

With the clinic being after the long weekend, optimum collections are most important. It's a short week and a long weekend - which translates into the blood supply needing to last longer. Canadian Blood Services is aiming to collect 130 units at 14 Wing, each day, and in order to collect 130 units, 220 donors have to walk in or book an appointment. Every 60 seconds, someone in Canada requires blood or a blood product, and we are currently only booked at 76% (Wed.) and 67% (Thurs.) of capacity, so please try and take the time to donate on either day.

Please note that if you get a flu shot, you must wait 2 days after the shot before donating blood.

An End to a Great Summer

Over 1000 cadets will have to wait another year to return to a summer full of fun challenge and friends. The final graduation parade and ceremony at Greenwood Air Cadet Summer Training Centre (GACSTC) provided the perfect backdrop last week in marking the official end of a great summer for cadets and staff.

GACSTC, which has trained approximately 60,000 air cadets since its establishment in 1951, offers a variety of dynamic and challenging courses to youth between the ages of 12 and 18 during the summer months. While this year's graduates are surely eager to spend the rest of their summer vacation with friends and family before classes start, they take with them fond memories, new friendships, and wealth of worthwhile skills and life experiences. From brand new cadets to the more seasoned staff cadet leaders. GACSTC helps develop in cadets valuable life and work skills such as self-confidence, self-esteem, teamwork and respect for others while having fun and building lasting while learning transferable life skills, such as teamwork, leadership and decision making, which will benefit the cadet no matter what career they choose.

The General Training Course (GTC), which introduces cadets to the Cadet Summer Training Centre (CSTC) environment and exposes them to CSTC program areas of interest gives the cadets the opportunity take familiarization flights, construct a model space capsule, marshaling, operating a wind vane and anemometer, sports, perform a drum line routine, take part in team-building activities, model rocketry, field training, and marksmanship. From there, cadets have the opportunity to focus on an area of interest by taking more advanced courses relating to a specific area. The Basic Leadership Course prepares cadets to perform the role of a peer leader while building upon the leadership and drill and ceremonial knowledge. Basic cadets participate in community service activities, perform roles as peer seniors, lead peers through leadership taskings, lead team-building activities, and participate in marksmanship and summer biathlon activities.

Not all training activities take place in Greenwood. The

survival training site, located in Cloud Lake, offers two survival courses. Basic Survival Course cadets participate in a wide variety of activities, including providing first aid in a field setting, assembling an emergency survival kit, constructing improvised shelters and signal fires and campfires, making ground-to-air signals, collecting and purifying water, constructing fishing equipment and snares, identifying and collecting edible plants, operating a stove and lantern and hand-held radios, executing ground search and rescue, and determining distance on a route and following a bearing. The more advanced Survival Instructor Course (SIC) focuses on instructional and leadership abilities and advanced theoretical and technical skills required to assist in the delivery of survival training. The highlight for most SIC cadets are the solo exercise, which gives them the opportunity to apply all the skills they have gained over the summer

The Basic Fitness and Sports Course develop personal fitness and healthy living skills. Cadets learn to perform the duties of a fitness and sports assistant, attend a local sporting event, lead warm-up and cool-down sessions, assist with organized recreational team sports, participate in a recreational summer biathlon activity, orienteering, design a ensemble, conduct, and do band

tournament, and participate in a tabloid meet. What would an maintenance facility.

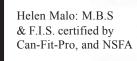

During a meeting on April 2, 2008 initial discussions at 14 Wing Greenwood transpired between interested stakeholders resulting in the formulation of the first partnership with 14 Wing Greenwood, Village of Kingston and Greenwood, the Municipality of the County of Kings and the Province of Nova Scotia.

Shortly after the partners entered into an arrangement to hire a Consultant study with the goal of determining the need and viability of an arena / curling complex, responsible to serve the needs of the Village of Kingston and Greenwood as well as 14 Wing Greenwood.

The Consultant's final report in March 2009 conducted that a new arena and curling facilities were needed and the concord of a partnership involving 14 Wing, the Village of Kingston and Greenwood, the Municipality of the County of Kings and the Province of Nova Scotia was viable. The Final report includes detailed implementation recommendations outlined in stages.

We have created an Implementation Committee, which is co-chaired by the Municipality of the County of Kings and 14 Wing Greenwood. Members sit on this committee from all stakeholders.

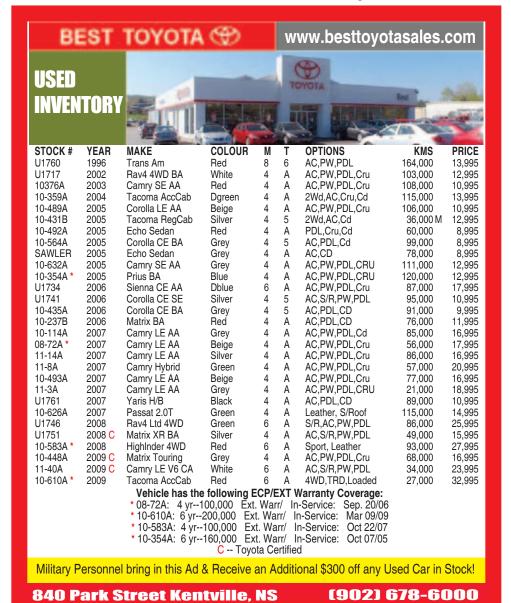

When Lights and Sirens Approach

We all share the responsibility of knowing and practising proper driving behaviours. One of the most important "rules of the road" deals with yielding the right of way to all emergency vehicles.

What Drivers SHOULD DO?

- Remain calm and move your vehicle appropriately. Don't panic!
- Pull to the right and come to a stop.
- · When on a high-speed road or when there is no room to stop, slow down as much as possible
- When in the left lane, pull over into the right lane as the traffic in the lane to your right moves over
- If you cannot move to the right because of an obstacle such as a car to your right, simply stop. Your prompt action will let the driver of the emergency vehicle know what you are doing; it will allow the driver to anticipate where to drive.
- When an emergency vehicle approaches you from behind while you are stationary at an intersection stop sign or red light, do not move unless you can pull to the right
- When on a one-way street, pulling to the right is still the best, but sometimes due to traffic, you may pull to the left curb and yield to the middle lane(s). This is the one appropriate exception to the "pull to the right" rule What Drivers SHOULD NOT DO?
- Don't stop in the middle lane when there is room to pull

- Don't drive through a red light or stop sign when an emergency vehicle approaches from behind
- Don't turn quickly to the left into a driveway or street
- Don't race ahead to get through a green light or turn before the emergency vehicle gets there
- Don't disregard the presence of the emergency vehicle by continuing to drive on

The drivers of all emergency vehicles are thoroughly trained and tested. They are taught to drive with due regard for the safety of others. Their intent is to never force other drivers off the road. This supersedes a natural desire to get to the scene

• Don't pull to the left in the centre yellow lane or left turn lane of an accident or fire by driving as fast as possible. Drivers of emergency vehicles know that they cannot help anyone if they don't get there! Generally, drivers should try to move to the right, if possible. Emergency vehicles will usually try and move to the left. Sometimes, due to traffic conditions, it may be also be necessary for emergency vehicles to travel in opposing lanes, against the flow of traffic. This is why it is very important for all vehicles to respect responding emergency vehicles by moving to the right and/or stopping.

When you or someone you care about requires the help of an emergency responder, you will be thankful for the drivers who didn't impede their safe and prompt arrival.

Three West Kings Graduates Serve on Humanitarian Mission

A humanitarian mission in Southeast Asia has brought together three former West Kings District High School students on board the American

hospital ship USNS Mercy. Lt.-Col. Paul Charlebois (Class of '87), Lieut. Julia Morash (Class of '91) and Master Cpl. Leah Boyd (Class of '80) were all part of a 17 member Canadian Forces (CF) team that has been on a two month deployment with Pacific Partnership 2010.

Pacific Partnership is a humanitarian and disaster relief exercise that brings health care services to remote and underserved areas of various Southern Pacific nations. It is a joint mission, with resources being provided by the United States Armed Forces, militaries of other partner nations including Ĉanada, Australia and New Zealand, as well as a number of non-governmental organizations.

Master Cpl. Boyd is a medical technician from 1 Field Ambulance in Edmonton, Alta., and has been working both on board Mercy as well as being sent ashore in support of the medical missions. Her parents

Lieut. Morash is a nursing officer with 11 Field Ambulance in Victoria, B.C. She has been working in the wards on board Mercy as well as in the busy patient discharge office.

"Being part of the Mercy mission has been a great military and medical experience," she from your home town with you says. "This has opened many

doors to professional growth and has left me with memories that will last a lifetime.'

Lt.-Col. Charlebois is a specialist in Internal Medicine from Halifax and is the senior member of the Canadian contingent.

"We can be very proud of the work our team has done here,' he says. "Canadians have been a strong part of the Pacific Partnership team, and our contributions are appreciated by those we serve.

Pacific Partnership uses the American hospital ship USNS Mercy as the main platform for the work of over 1,000 healthcare providers. The Mercy is a huge floating hospital, with 12 operating rooms and the capacity for up to 1,000 beds if required. Local patients are brought to the ship for operative procedures and other teams are sent to shore on Medical Civilian Action Programs to provide care in communities throughout the countries visited. The mission is supported by helicopters, a small flotilla of boats and hundreds of professionals from the host nations.

The team also has the use of two Royal Australian Navy Amphibious Landing Craft, the HMAS Labuan and the HMAS Tarakan, which are used to ferry medical teams to remote locations. A small stretch of beach is all that is required for these crafts to dock, meaning that a lack of large docking facilities in the countries visited does not limit the ability to provide care. The landing craft can simply deliver the medical teams and all of their supplies directly to dry land.

This contingent of CF members is the second group of Canadians on the Pacific Partnership mission. A previous group carried out similar work in Cambodia and Vietnam from May to July. The current team has been working in Indonesia and Timor Leste during July and August. They have completed their work and will be returning home to Canada in early September.
