14 Wing CP-140 Aurora Participates on Operation NANOOK

Lieutenant Colonel Chretien, Land Component Commander looks on as a CP-140 Aurora flies over a CH-146 Griffon at Camp Resolute Bay, Nunavut. The Auroras are part of the Air Force contribution to Operation NANOOK 2010.

Operation NANOOK is one of three major recurring sovereignty operations conducted annually by the Canadian Forces (CF) in Canada's Arctic. Planned and directed by Joint Task Force North (JTFN) the whole-of-government operation highlights interoperability, command and control, and cooperation with interdepartmental and intergovernmental partners in the North. Operation NANOOK 10 takes place in Canada's Eastern and High Arctic area from August 6 to 26 and includes two major exercises, Exercise NATSIQ, a sovereignty and presence patrolling exercise of military resources, and Exercise TALLURUTIIT a whole-of-government exercise that focuses on environmental containment and remediation resulting from a simulated fuel spill.

Operation NANOOK 10, as a combined, joint and integrated operation engages personnel and resources (ships and aircraft) from: the Canadian Navy, the Canadian Army, Canada's Air Force and CF Special Forces; other federal government departments to include Public Safety, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the Canadian Coast Guard (central and Arctic region), Transport Canada, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada, Natural Resources Canada, Environment Canada, Parks Canada, the Government of Nunavut; the municipal communities of Resolute Bay, Pond Inlet, Grise Fjord, Iqaluit and Arctic Bay; and internationally the US Navy's 2nd Fleet, the US Coast Guard and the Royal Danish Navy.

The Arctic does not seem to be that challenging a location to work at over a sunny afternoon in August, 2010, but even during the dog days of summer it is not hard to realize that the long and dark winter is quickly approaching for the residents of Nunavut, Canada's newest territory.

A crew of twenty, including aircraft technicians and a full operational crew, joined mission support staff predeployed in Iqaluit to participate in a major joint exercise called Operation NANOOK. Comprised mostly of members from 404 (Long Range Patrol and Training) (LRP&T) Squadron (Sqn), led by Crew Commander Captain Bernie MacDonald, the crew planned to participate in five missions over six days in support of Navy and Army operations in the North.

North. What Does the Aurora Bring to the Table?

For the reader to understand why an Aurora was deployed to Iqaluit, I have to subject you to the obligatory list of equipment and abbreviations. Key to this mission was proving the ability of 14 Wing Operations (14 WOps) to transport and establish the Deployable Mission Support Centre (DMSC) led by Mr Yvan Lachance and Captain Colin MacFarlane and their respective teams. As well, the newly proven Overland Equipment Mission Suite (OEMS) and the chance to use the Tactical Common DataLink (TCDL) were key opportunities to showcase to our defence compatriots what we are now able to offer them with the OEMS modified CP-140 Aurora. The Aurora is a key piece of Canada's Intelligence, Surveillance, Reconnaissance and Control (ISR&C) capability for over land and sea, undersea, and aerospace operations.

In plain speak: the Aurora can now use its powerful camera system efficiently, and while airborne can actually transmit video to a supported unit, this time the HMCS Montreal. What we can see from the air, a tactical commander can see on the ground/sea providing general situational awareness. It is not hard to imagine how this capability greatly adds to the 'big picture' required by operational commanders.

On operations, the Air Component can provide realtime situational awareness of events on the ground, in the air or on the water. This allows the Chain of Command to be better informed during military missions, and is also available in support of civilian law enforcement

agencies, when authorized to see the fjords, straits by the Minister of National Defence. Any such missions are carried out in accordance with Canadian law.

This video link up is complex and requires many system integrations. Its successful employment by 405 and 407 (LRP) Squadrons at OP PODIUM (Vancouver Olympics) and OP CADENCÉ (G20 and G8 surveillance) highlights the flexibility and knowhow that is resident within the LRP fleet, including 14 Software Engineering Squadron (14 SES) and the Project Management Office (PMO) Aurora in Ottawa.

Arctic Surveillance

Not until you fly over the arctic do you realize how expansive, beautiful, and awesome it is. It is inspiring

and bays that challenged Hudson, Franklin and Parry. Until the early 1900's, the Northwest Passage had never been traversed by a ship. With climatic concerns, environmental sensitivities and the escalating arctic resource and territorial claims, the increasing open water months invite strategic and personal (pleasure craft/ adventurer) interest. The ability for our air assets to detect and visually identify all unknown contacts in our arctic archipelago is crucial to exercising our sovereignty.

Even though the weather over our operational areas was 'iffy' (to say the least -200 foot ceilings and frequent 1/8 mile visibilities), the crew managed to use the OEMS, radar, cameras and

find and confirm vessels of interest to other government departments, the Air Component Commander (ACC) at Resolute Bay and the Joint Task Force (JTF) Commander in Yellowknife.

Environmental surveillance was one of the key tasks for the crew. Wildlife spotting and description is a secondary task on all missions (such as spotting and reporting whales on standard coastal patrols). During the deployment the crew spotted and reported Polar Bear, Narwhal, Beluga

old fashioned eyeballs to and Musk Ox. As well, ice condition reporting was crucial for the safe passage of supported naval vessels planning to transit narrow straits and inlets. Though ice accumulation in many places was minimal, other locations had hundreds of icebergs, pans, growlers and 'bergybits'. The icebergs ranged in size from a few feet to 200 feet. Individually these behemoths don't present a challenge to our modern warships, but when the individual bergs, influenced by wind, current and tide,

band together to form several square miles of impenetrable ice, no warship will pass.

Our crew was also tasked to participate in a Search and Rescue (SAR) tasking near Clyde River for a missing helicopter. Working with the Coast Guard vessel Desgroseillers and her onboard helicopter, we were sadly unable to locate the individual. 413 (Transport & Rescue) Squadron confirmed the sad outcome of the missing pilot the next day in close coordination with the Canadian Coast Guard.

The ability to conduct ISR&C tasks and immediately switch to a new mission (in this case SAR) demonstrates the capacity the 30-year old Aurora fleet brings to Canada; crews are extensively trained and absolutely motivated, able to fly world wide.

The Aurora's Future Canada's ISR&C **Capability**

The OEMS modification to the Aurora is not the last step to upgrading the aircraft's capability. Testing is about to commence on the first of the newly-delivered Block III planes. This upgrade will add a new computer, imaging radar, electronic support suite, subsurface acoustic system and a plethora of support systems and trainers. The modifications are a multigeneration update to the sensor systems employed by LRP aircraft and will provide Canadians with a long range and long endurance ISR&C capability both domestically and around the world.

We all know that training tasks through arctic surveillance exercises such as NANOOK, as well as real time operations in the vast north, will continue. The Canadian public expects increased control of our northern archipelago - the CP-140 Aurora will provide the eyes and ears to complete these sovereignty and environmental tasks well into the next decade.



Final application deadline for both categories is 2359 hrs (EST) 9 December 2010.

Once the National Passenger Service Centre (NPSC) starts receiving names, the system will immediately begin to assign seats. The first applicants could receive flight confirmation as early as 20 September.

There is no financial compensation in the event of a flight delay. Every effort will be made to ensure confirmed flights arrive at their destination on time.

"Nearly five thousand members are expected to take advantage of our program this year," said Master Corporal Benita Clemens of the National Passenger Service Centre. "This service is important because it gives all members, especially single





Gateway unveiled while would have to be changed ceiling height. Also, new steel beams had to be installed between existing steel columns to support new joists and new Hangar doors had to be provided on the end of the bays to accommodate wider openings.

The new upgrades to the Hangar will allow 413 San to house their Hercules aircraft in case of inclement weather and for maintenance which will contribute to high availability for any Search and Rescue mission in the future.

Dedicated to Road Safety

Remember: Crosswalks and traffic signals do not stop cars! You have to be alert and ensure a vehicle is stopping before you step out on to the street. Do not trust that because you are in a crosswalk you have the right of way. You might be right, but don't be dead right.

The Stage

By 4 June 1940 the last of the British Army has escaped from France via Ďunkirk along with 123,000 French and a few hundred Belgian troops. They had miraculously avoided the German pincer-like trap, but left tons of their equipment on the beaches of France.

Goring and other high-ranking German Air Command officials wanted to follow what they believed to be a crest-fallen and ill-equipped British Army to England. The Luftwaffe would land paratroops and capture an airfield in Southern England under cover of a massive bombing raid of that area. Junkers aircraft would transport five crack divisions to this airfield while five more divisions stood by in France.

Hitler vetoed this plan - he did not wish to humiliate the British by defeat nor did he want to destroy the British cities and countryside. He was preparing the British terms of surrender. When they came to their senses. he would act the benevolent conqueror. Churchill feigned interest in surrendering but, in effect, was stalling so that invasion defences could be put into place.

By 19 July, Hitler demanded the British intentions and was furious when informed that no such surrender was forthcoming. He ordered England to be bombed with leaflets, informing the British people that the lunatic, Churchill, was leading them to their deaths and their country's destruction.

Goring's Plan

Hitler gave Goring permission to proceed with his plan to conquer Britain which would be accomplished in three phases. The Luftwaffe would -

Phase one - sink all British Merchant shipping and attack all naval ships, bases and installations in the English Channel and destroy all aircraft which interfered. The Channel would also be heavily mined by aircraft at specific locations.

Phase two - neutralize the RAF by destroying all British airfields and aircraft factories.

Phase three - cover and assist in the invasion of Britain.

September if he were to commence phases one and two on 10 August 1940. He also reckoned that in defence of phase one all Allied naval ships would appear in the English Channel, where his Luftwaffe would destroy them.



Battle Status

The Luftwaffe had 824 Fighters (mostly Me 109s and some Me 110s). They also had 1, 191 bombers of which 316 were Stuka dive bombers.

Britain had 640 combat-ready Fighters, mostly Hurricanes and Spitfires and some Defiants (these carried a gunner with rear firing guns only - much to the sorrow of the Luftwaffe pilots who mistook them for Hurricanes).

The Luftwaffe had many battle experienced pilots (Spanish Civil War) while Britain had none. British aircraft were somewhat superior despite their lack of injector carburators, and, of course, the highly manoeuvrable Spitfire which could get on the tail of a pursuer who a moment before had been on its tail. At the time Luftwaffe aircraft were operational well above 20,000 feet, while the British counterpart was virtually useless at such altitudes.

Early Battle Strategy

As luftwaffe Fighters could do little damage to ground installations, the British strategy was to ignore them. Bombers were a different situation however, their massive

England (Phase 3) on 15 formations were constantly attacked and broken up into small groups and sent down or home. Naturally, dogfights with escorting enemy fighters were unavoidable, but it was considered unnecessary risks for Allied pilots and machines. Allied fighters guarded against being lured away by Luftwaffe fighters. Should he be coaxed to follow, an Allied fighter seldom returned from the skies over France for he was bound to be pounced upon by several enemy fighters.

The Battle

Many will argue the start of the Battle, for many a dogfight was seen prior to Goring's date of 10 August 1940. Actually, due to weather, this date had been repeatedly postponed to the afternoon of 13 August. Many too will argue as to the date of its finale. The date proclaimed as Battle of Britain Day is 15 September, 1940, for on that date 185 Luftwaffe aircraft were shot down, the highest daily toll in the action. This period was certainly the turning point in Britain's favour. British losses were a fraction of these figures damaged aircraft proportionately less. As the battle raged over England and the Channel, many Allied pilots bailed out and lived to fly again, while most surviving Luftwaffe aircrew spent the remainder of the war as POWs

The German Me 109 had a flight endurance of 80 minutes which meant that to climb over to England took 30 minutes, another 30 minutes to get home, leaving a bare 20 minutes in escorting time. As a result, and despite efforts to provide fighter escort in relays, Luftwaffe bombers often found themselves without escort and therefore relatively easy prey to British fighters.

By 30 September 1940, Luftwaffe fighters remained safely above 20,000 feet and came down only for the most lucrative targets. Luftwaffe bomber raids were now of smaller formations, with lighter and faster bombers. Still later, nightly bombing raids replaced the daylight raids. One such terrible raid took place on 29 December 1940 when the city of London was mercilessly bombed by wave after wave for more than six hours, the firelit target of the first wave readily showing the way to those following.

Hitler had decreed that the city of London proper was not to be bombed, but when two of his lost bombers dumped their bombs over London (perhaps by accident), the British seized the opportunity to show the people of Berlin that the propaganda saying this could never happen was false. Soon both cities were being bombed every night when weather conditions permitted, although the nightly bombings of London diminished significantly by 10 May 1941. German Air Squadrons were by then moved to her Eastern Frontier and on 22 June 1941 German Armies marched on Russia. The Battle of Britain had been won and the German plans to invade England never took place.

The British Advantage

Early in WW II, Britain's radar system was improved to the degree that all aircraft rising from French airfields showed as blips on the screens. As a result, WÂAF operators tracked and reported the number, speed, altitude and course of the enemy force to Allied Fighter Command enabling accurate interception. The Luftwaffe were unsuccessful in knocking down the radar scanning towers and for some reason did not strafe the little wooden camouflaged shacks near their base, where the WAAFS would have been sent scurrying and their sets destroyed. Airborne radar installed in British night fighters were also most successful in pin-pointing the quarry.

Even more miraculous was the well kept secret of Britain's decoding machine which informed them of all data for a proposed Luftwaffe raid even before enemy aircrew manned their aircraft. Many an enemy aircrewman wondered how it was that Allied fighters and anti-aircraft installations were always waiting for them

In commemoration of the anniversary of this historic battle, a chapel service and a parade are held mid-September each year here at Greenwood. We do this to honour the members of the Air Force who gave the ultimate sacrifice of their lives during this significant Battle and other battles fought by the Air Force.

There is a reason why the Battle of Britain has been selected for symbolic honouring of the dead heroes of the Air Force. It was entirely an air battle and was one of the most decisive battles in all history. In a brief span of raids during the spring and autumn, 10 July to 31 October of 1940, our Commonwealth Air Forces defeated the German Luftwaffe. It is almost certain that Great Britain would have been invaded if the Battle of Britain had been lost. The RCAF is proud of the active part it played in this historic battle. Of 103 Canadian fighter pilots in battle, 23 were killed in action. Another 200 fought with the RAF's Bomber and Coastal Commands. An untold number served as ground crew, keeping the fighters, bombers and patrol aircraft flying. These Canadian pilots and crews distinguished themselves, not only in the Battle of Britain, but also in later battles.

regardless of their target.

German propaganda backfired, for Hitler and his top officials had convinced the German people that the Luftwaffe had ample and superior aircraft for the short conflict with Britain. Despite his severe losses, he was now loathe to step up replacement aircraft production. On the other hand, during July 1940, Britain turned out 496 fighters and the number was increasing.

Thanks to the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, British aircrews trained in the safety of Canadian skies. When Britain and her Allies went on the aerial offensive, they shot down as many aircraft as possible including trainers, making aviation training in Nazi held countries perilous

Canadians serving with RAF Squadrons during the Battle of Britain, several RCAF Squadrons as well as those from other Commonwealth Air Forces fought alongside the RAF. #1 Fighter Squadron RCAF (renumbered #401 in England) was Canada's most famous and highest scoring Squadron with 196 enemy aircraft destroyed. The Squadron Commanding Officer, Squadron Leader McNab and two of his Flight Leaders, Flight Lieutenant MacGregor and Flying Officer Russel, were the first RCAF pilots awarded DFCs during World War II. During August and September 1940, this Squadron destroyed 31 enemy aircraft and damaged 28 others.

Epilogue

Perhaps Goring was unaware of the similarity of the mottos of the RAF and the other Commonwealth country squadrons to that of the RCAF -"PER ARDUA AD ASTRA", Through Adversity to the Stars.

We owe our sincere and everlasting gratitude not only to those gallant young men, but to the millions, in uniform and out, that, under conditions of danger, destruction, and death played supporting roles in bringing about a victory in the Battle of Britain.







Pte Mark Beer, another 14 Wing Fire Department member who competed with the Canadian Forces Fire Marshall National Firefit team, posted a personal best time of 1:28!



GMFRC - Employment and Education Services

Another invaluable service that is provided at the GMFRC is Employment and Education services. For the past two years, Stephanie Townsend has been the Coordinator and their mandate is the education and employment of Military spouses and families, and extended families (grandparents).

Interest from the Wing has doubled in the time she has been in this position, seeing 100 to 150 clients per year. Coming from a military family she has the experience and a strong desire to support the Military families with their unique barriers and frequent moves that still create biases by some employers. Stephanie recently returned from maternity leave and her temporary replacement during that time, Kristen Lawson, brought in more business contacts for post positions through the GMFRC. Basically people need or want to get into the workforce, some even require retraining because they're "over qualified"!

Responsible for seven Bases/Units throughout Nova Scotia, including Greenwood, Aldershot, Yarmouth, Bridgewater, Cornwallis, Employment and Education services puts a positive spin on the military spouse (dispelling all the negative connotations), by providing assistance with cover letters, resumes, interviews, job searching and networking. Once that information is specified, it is up to the individual to take that information and put it all together. Then the individual then comes back to make sure it is correct and uses those skills to get themselves a job.

The Job Search list goes out every Monday and it is relevant to the individual's field of qualification. While there are still some uninformed employers that are leery about hiring a military spouse because of their transient nature, a new project called "Hire a Military Spouse" is a website offering access to jobs where local area employers see the benefits of hiring Military spouses or family members.

a few These are less expensive for Canadian Forces (CF) families and they receive preferred treatment (course loading). There are also craft workshops to aid in the interaction of family members to get to meet others in a similar environment.

Employment and Education services deal with all Universities and Colleges. They act as a liaison between some and as an invigilator for exams for distance learning courses for others. As well, they have CF recruiting-information, offer some youth work with Secondary education facilities, and work with the Community Centre for resume workshops. Their annual participation in the Education and Employment fair in conjunction with the Second Career Assistance Network office and the Personnel Selection Office is yet another venue they have to offer!


