

The Wing Commander, Colonel Bill Seymour and Member of Parliament (MP) for West Nova, Greg Kerr were on hand on Friday, September 10, 2010 for a sod turning event at the Wing. The brief ceremony was to mark the start of construction for the new Health Service Centre for military members of the Base. As Colonel Seymour stated, "This is another example of the Government of Canada taking care of its military personnel.

The new facility has been in development for a while and is part of the 90 million dollar infrastructure announcement that the Honourable Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence, made at the Wing last fall.

The building will replace the current one which dates back to 1942 and

will be a two story, 4,473 square meter centre that will encompass all the requirements for medical, dental, mental health and physiotherapy for the Wing. It will be the first time that the Base will have all these services under one roof which will increase the quality of health services to the military personnel of the Wing.

As MP Kerr stated at the ceremony, "Today's event illustrates the Government is committed to following through on its Canada First Defence Strategy commitments to revitalize Canadian Forces facilities. This new health services centre will ensure Canadian Forces personnel continue to receive the first-class medical care they need to stay healthy and perform

their essential duties both here and around the world."

The overall projected cost for the project is 25.4 million dollars with 13.4 million dollars awarded to Pomerleau Incorporated (who are based in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia) for

the actual construction of the facility.

The venture will create over 100 jobs and is expected to be completed sometime in early 2012.



- To enforce conditions of occupancy, as well as the Kings County Bylaws, in the RHU area.

The following is a list of some of the conditions of occupancy which are commonly overlooked:

The occupant must remove snow from steps, walkways.



pathways and driveways located on their RHU lot.

- The occupant is required to keep the lawn cut, watered, and well-tended, and to nurture and maintain any shrubs and trees on the RHU lot.
- Parking or driving of any vehicle on grassed areas is not permitted.
- Married quarters driveways or other RHU properties shall not be used for storing non-roadworthy vehicles or other bulky items
- Recreational vehicles, such as trailers and boats, are not to be parked on RHU property. It is understood that, on occasion, it will be necessary for the occupant to park recreational vehicles near their home for short periods of time. In these cases, the occupant shall obtain the prior written approval of CFHA.
- Pets must not be a nuisance to other occupants or cause damage to property and pet owners must clean up and immediately dispose of any excrement left on any married quarters property by their dog or cat (stoop and scoop).
- When an occupant leaves the RHU for any period longer than 48 hours, they must ensure that the RHU is checked for maintenance emergencies on a daily basis. The occupant shall advise CFHA of the name and telephone number of a contact person.



Battle of Britain Sunday commemorates the great victory won by the Royal Air Force which saved Britain from invasion in 1940 and became a dramatic turning point in the history of World War II. The enemy's objective was to eliminate the Royal Air Force both in the air and on the ground, and to obtain air superiority in preparation for a seaborne and airborne invasion. Many Canadians served in the squadrons of Spitfires and Hurricanes which repulsed the Luftwaffe. In this summer of 1940, the Royal Canadian Air Force received its "baptism of fire.

At the beginning of the struggle, the Luftwaffe had 2,790

aircraft to launch against England. Britain had fewer than 60 fighter squadrons, – some 650 aircraft – and the ground staff had to work sometimes 16 hours a day to keep the machines in the air. Between 24 August and 6 September alone, Fighter Command lost 103 pilots and 128 seriously wounded (including Canadians), while 366 fighters had been put out of action, including Canadians pilots. There were 1495 pilots and crew killed during the Battle of Britain, of which 49 were Canadian. Of 103 Canadian fighter pilots in battle, 23 were killed in action.

In commemorating the airmen who fought in the Battle of Britain, we pay tribute also to those who in later years of the war served in all the Allied Forces at sea, land, and air. Today

we record our continuing sense of gratitude for what was achieved in the darkest moments of war, and we rededicate ourselves to strive untiringly for peace, justice, and freedom in the world.

This commemoration is not about the past. The Irish political philosopher Edmund Burke (1729-1797) said "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing." Let us be proud because we received an inheritance of strength and courage in the adversity. This legacy must stay alive. Today, as our predecessors fought to preserve our rights, liberty and values, do not allow evil to triumph. Do not sit by and do nothing. Stand up and be counted, speak up against evil and speak out against any injustice.


# Greenwood Players
