Fall Harvest

Ripe, red apples – one of autumn's great joys and one of the Valley's precious offerings. Who doesn't have fond memories of picking a fresh apple from the tree? Only after enjoying the tart "snap" of biting into it, can one with confidence then start filling the bushel basket. Apples, it seems, are good for whatever ails a person. It is said that there was once a fellow who travelled the New World, carrying a sack of apples over his shoulder. He didn't talk much, but he was friendly enough. He made his living doing odd jobs and filled his days chatting with people. Whenever he ate an apple, he made a hole in the ground with his walking stick and, carefully, planted each core in the fertile earth wherever he happened to be at the time. "Johnny Appleseed", people called him with a smile, not knowing what to make of this quiet wanderer. 
We have all been saddened by the alarming number of recent suicides due to homophobia that have been highlighted in the media.



From its inception as a Royal Canadian Air Force (RČAF) Neptune aircraft oriented P-2000 Club at 407 Squadron, RCAF Base Comox, B.C., in May 1966, to its metamorphosis into the world-wide VP International (VPI) Association at Canadian Forces Base Greenwood, N.S., in November 1970, the current and retired military aircrew and commanders responsible for its consistent, professional growth have maintained the mission of the original P2000/VPI Charters.

That mission today is "To maintain a worldwide organization of aircrew to foster goodwill and fellowship through the promotion of understanding and recognition of VP

operations." The term "VP" is accepted by VP International as a military designator applied to fixedwing, Maritime Patrol aircraft, employed in intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance, antisurface and antisubsurface operations. Membership is extended to all aircrew who have graduated from a VP aircrew training program and have been assigned to a VP squadron.

What started as the P-2000 Club, with 21 members some 44 years ago, has evolved into a world-wide fraternity of maritime flyers with over 5800 members in 22 countries.

A pivotal occasion for all VPI nations occurred on 28 September 1997 when the Chief of the Air Staff. LGen A.M. Dequetteville, dedicated the VPI Monument here at 14 Wing Greenwood "in honour of crew members of land-based maritime patrol aircraft who have lost their lives in the performance of their flying duties in all theatres of maritime flying **operations**". That year, in a moving ceremony attended by over 400 members, guests and dignitaries, a record of over 1400 aircrew fatalities from 12 VPI member countries were accepted into the Book of Remembrance which is held for viewing in the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum.

For the past 13 years, VPIHO has continued to hold an annual memorial service to honour fallen comrades. On Sunday, 3 Oct 10, LCol Ron Walker, A/WComd highlighted the important work and historical aspects of VPI for an audience of some 80 current and retired military and civilian guests. Regarding the Book of Remembrance, he charged the President of VPI, Maj Derrick Hotte, with the responsibility "to guard it reverently and update it promptly". In keeping with that commitment, the names of six RAF crew members from 201 Squadron, who died in a Shackleton crash 8 Dec 1965, were read into the Book by F/L Rolf Hippman here on exchange duties with MP&EU. Padre, Capt Robert Lauder assisted in the ceremony and dedicated

the pages of the Book of Remembrance, which now contains 1896 names representing 13 countries. The dedicated work of tracking and compiling all of this important information over the past 14 years has been the responsibility of Maj Norm Donovan (Retd).

He is eager to get on with the many challenges that face this large international aircrew association and his following opening remarks at the VPI Memorial Service on Sunday, 3 Oct 10 reflect that

Presidents Remarks

"LCol Walker, Col Smale, honoured guests et madams' et monsieur's, it is indeed my very great honour to address you this morning as President of VP International.

From its humble roots that date back nearly 45 years, VP International was founded on the goals of fostering goodwill and fellowship among long-range patrol aircrew, and to the promotion of understanding and recognition of VP operations and their impact on military aviation. While the last 45 years have been replete with change, including the blossoming of VPI into a worldwide organization of some 5800 members in 22 Countries, we remain as staunchly committed to our founding goals as we always have been, and it is in keeping with those goals that we gather today to honour those that have given the ultimate sacrifice while in the conduct of shore based fixed wing long range patrol since 1947.

The post Second World War was a short-lived time of peace as a new Cold War period emerged that saw VP crews central to the efforts of maintaining a vigil and defence against the unthinkable prospect of another World War. These efforts were undertaken in secrecy with exceptional professionalism and due to their nature have gone largely unrecognized in the history of the period. Later as the Iron curtain fell, VP aircrew's transitioned to numerous domestic and Peace Support Roles while continuing to maintain Anti-submarine and other warfare skills that might again be called upon in times of crisis. In more recent years, the role of the VP community has evolved yet again as global terrorism has emerged as a clear and present danger to all nations. Through increased focus on National Defence, enhanced surveillance, support to operations in two Wars and a host of other security operations, and continued preparedness for the possibilities of maritime warfare, Long Range Patrol operations remain as important to the nations they serve as they did during the highest points of tension during the Cold War period.

Key to the ongoing success of VP operations will always remain the professionalism and dedication of the crews that fly these operations and to the countless scores of personnel who through their own dedication and professionalism support them. Like the Cold War period, operations are often still veiled in secrecy and so those that undertake them often labour in anonymity.

Operations and readiness activities to support operations do not; however, come without a high cost and it is that cost that we mark with today's sombre ceremony.

An initiative was undertaken nearly 15 years ago to pay honour to those in the VP community that had paid the ultimate sacrifice and to commemorate their sacrifice through the establishment of the beautiful monument you see here behind me. As a testament to the principles of VPI, the creation of the monument and ongoing care for the Book of Remembrance that contains nearly 2000 names of our fallen comrades are feats achieved purely through volunteer efforts. Many of the names in the book have been discovered only as a result of meticulous and laborious research by a number of VP International members most notably Mr Norm Donovan who is here with us today and to whom the book of Remembrance is a labour of love.

Of the nearly 2000 names in the book of remembrance there are over 1100 American names, and so it with thanks that I welcome Retired USN Master Chief Herb Parsons and retired USN Senior Chief Pete Lulis who have joined us again this year (from California) to mark the occasion.

As we continue through the ceremony today, we do so with VPI's goals forefront in our mind. We pay homage to our fallen comrades as is fitting in the spirit of fellowship, and we also use the occasion to shine a light on VP operations present and past and to those that conduct and support those operations in order to help promote understanding and recognition. Thank-you all for coming............" Maj Derrick Hotte

What is done here at 14 Wing Greenwood under the banner of VPI is recognized around the globe in the patrol community at large and reflects well on the professionalism we all aspire to achieve. This important ceremony could not possibly happen over the years with out the tremendous interest and support of the Patron, Squadrons, Sections and numerous volunteers on and off the Wing. 



Family Violence Prevention Week

Family Violence Prevention Week (17-23 October 2010) is a CF wide initiative to raise awareness and to encourage military families, personnel and service providers to 'Take a Stand Against Family Violence'. Family violence can be difficult to talk about and so it often goes unreported leaving those that it impacts to cope in silence. Because it is not often spoken about it may appear that it is not a serious concern or that it is not happening in our community. This is most certainly not the case. It is each of our responsibilities to engage in the prevention of violence in our families and in our community.

To highlight some key issues concerning family violence, the following question and answers are presented.

Q: What is family violence?

A: Family violence goes by several names including intimate relationship violence, domestic abuse, and domestic violence. The term captures a wide variety of behaviours including Physical Abuse (hitting, pulling, pushing, pinching, slapping, shaking, squeezing, arm-twisting, using a weapon, and threatening to assault), Sexual Abuse (forcing anyone to have sexual relations against their will), Social Abuse (not giving a person space or privacy, treating them like a servant. controlling what they do, who they see, who they talk to, and where they go) and Emotional Abuse (yelling, intimidation, making a person think they are crazy or stupid, insulting, name-calling, blaming, and overpowering their emotions).

Q: How prevalent is family violence?

A: Based on police reports and other official reporting procedures, it is estimated that approximately 7% of the population has experienced violence in their current or past relationship. However, research indicates that the actual prevalence of family violence is much higher. Not all cases are reported because many survivors can't or won't come forward to disclose the abuse.

Q: Surely this is only happens in certain segments of the population. Could someone I know be impacted by family violence?

A: Family violence impacts us all. Family violence occurs in all cultures and across all socioeconomic backgrounds. Family violence occurs regardless of a person's age, education level, rank or sexual orientation. Additionally, not all perpetrators of family violence are men. In some relationships violence is perpetrated by women or by both partners. In fact, equal proportions of men and women report violence in their relationships.

Q: Are there certain things that make violence more likely in a relationship?

A: Previous history of violent behaviour, relationship difficulties and heavy consumption of alcohol all increase the likelihood of family violence. Nonetheless, violence can still occur without the presence of these risk factors.

Q: Violence only occurred on one occasion. That means it isn't a big deal, right?

A: Violence in relationships tends to reoccur and often escalates. The more frequent the violence the greater the chance that it will escalate into more aggressive forms of behaviour. More than half of the people who reported that violence had occurred in their relationship indicated that it had happened on more than one occasion. There is often a cycle to family violence that will repeat itself over time. There is the building of tension in the person who uses violence, the actual act of violence, and then a period of time that is often referred to as the 'honeymoon period'. During this last part of the cycle, the person who has used violence will often express guilt and remorse and make promises to the victim that it will never happen again. Alternatively, they may also blame the victim for their use of violence or even ignore or deny that it happened. What is also known is that over time, the timing of the phases will begin to shift with the honeymoon phase becoming shorter and the tension building and violence phases becoming more prolonged.

Whether violence happens on one occasion or on many, it is never acceptable behaviour. It is always a big deal and it is never OK to be violent towards another person.

Q: I think my partner may be violent. What can I do?

A: It is important to remember that you are not alone and that there are services in the community to support you, whether you are a victim of violence or whether you are someone who uses violence in your relationships with loved ones.

If you are a victim of violence or find yourself using violence in relationships with loved ones, it is very important that you reach out for support. This is a difficult first step, but is one that could change your life in a positive way.

The following are some examples of services that you could access for assistance. Some people believe that cost is barrier to accessing services. However, it is important to know that many of the services listed below do not have any associated fees.
