Operation Cooking For Soldier On

Operation Cooking for Soldier On is a fundraising project started by a military wife in Cold Lake, Alberta named Jenn Corbett. Jenn and her husband Darrell attended the Army Run in Ottawa in 2009; it was here that they met Jody Mitic. This project was born after hearing his story. Jody was serving in Afghanistan and while on patrol in 2007 stepped on a landmine, resulting in him losing both legs below the knee. After a year of learning how to walk with prosthetic legs and a very intense training routine, Jody was able to do what he dreamed of, run. It was when he participated in the Army Run with his prosthetics that Jenn knew she wanted to do more than just submit a \$20 donation to Soldier On. It took her about a month of brainstorming and after many submitted recipes Operation Cooking for Soldier On the cookbook was born!

This cookbook is made up of 250 recipes from military families across Canada, and is being printed by Rasmussen Company in Winnipeg, Manitoba. All proceeds from the cookbook sales are going to Soldier On, which is a fund set up to help ill and injured Canadian Forces Personnel achieve a healthy and active lifestyle. The first round of orders sold almost 1500 cookbooks and raised nearly \$9000 for Soldier On! We're trying to beat that for this round!

One of the special things about this cookbook is that it really has heart behind it. The military families have contributed recipes that they like to enjoy every day, including special ones that are under the Care Packages

section. All recipes in this section are prepared and will last to send to our troops overseas.

The books can be purchased for a minimum donation of \$12, and all orders must be in by November 12, 2010 for arrival before Christmas. Huh! I Never **Knew That!**

Every year around this time many Christian parents ask: Is Halloween a satanic holiday or merely a secular one? Is it the type of holiday I should allow my kids to celebrate? Year after year the debate rages among Christians of every stripe. Some claim the holiday is designed for having a little fun while others condemn it unequivocally as devil worship. But did you know—as I was shocked to learn—that Halloween, far from being only a pagan holiday, is actually a Christian celebration that began almost 1300 years ago? It certainly did not originate as any form of devil worship, though I won't deny that some in this world may have reconfigured it for their own purposes.

The word "Halloween" is in itself meaningless. In fact, the word is a contraction of "All Hallows Eve," denoting the vigil of All Hallows Day, more commonly known today as All Saints Day. "Hallow," as a noun, is an old English word for saint, and as a verb, means to make something holy or to honour it as holy. All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation, and both the feast and the vigil have been celebrated since the early eighth century, when first instituted by Pope Gregory III in Rome. It is celebrated by a number

of Christian denominations on November 1. "Eve," of course, means the evening before. So, Halloween actually means "the evening before All Saints Day." Today we call that festival Halloween (Hallow's Eve), and we have many fun secular ways of recognizing it as well as religious ones. However, it is important to note that it is a celebration that has a long, positive history in the Christian

Despite concerns among some Christians in recent years about the "pagan origins" of Halloween, there really are none. The first attempts to show some connection between the vigil of All Saints and the Celtic harvest festival of Samhain came over a thousand years after All Saints Day became a universal feast, and there's no evidence whatsoever that Pope Gregory III was even aware of Samhain.

However, many Celtic elements found their way into the celebration, including lighting bonfires, carving turnips (in North America, pumpkins), and going from house to house collecting treats. But the "occult" aspects of Halloween—ghosts and demons and the like—actually have their roots in early Christian belief. Earlier Christians believed (and so do many Christians today) that at certain times of the year the veil that separates earth from Purgatory, heaven, and even hell becomes thinner, and the ghosts (souls in Purgatory) and

demons can be more readily seen. Thus the tradition of ghoulish Halloween costumes owes as much, if not more, to ancient Christian believes as to Celtic tradition.

People of all sorts of races and cultures have remembered their dead and have even held superstitions about death itself. Historically, Christians remembered death itself on All Hallow's Eve. But more importantly, they celebrated Christ's victory over death. During the Middle Ages, Christians would gather in churches for worship and would remember the saints' victories over evil. Likewise, they would put on little displays showing Jesus' victory over the devil, often using unusual masks and costumes to act out the story. In essence, the festivities of All Hallow's Eve were the Christian's way of thumbing his or her nose at death and evil, something we are still invited to do today in certain hope of Christ's victory over the powers of darkness. The Church for centuries has seen All Hallow's Eve not as a glorification of evil, but as a chance to affirm eternal life in the face of the death of our mortal bodies.

And so, mothers and fathers, take your little ones out for a walk up and down the sidewalks of our town. Let them dress as saints or goblins or whatever else their little hearts may fancy. Let them knock on doors and gather

candies and chips and chocolate bars. Laugh with them. Hold their little hands. Protect them. Love them. And through it all, watch their sugar levels or they'll soon be bouncing off the walls!

Huh! Je ne savais pas cela!

À chaque année, à cette période, plusieurs parents chrétiens se demandent: Halloween est-elle une fête satanique ou simplement une fête séculière? Est-ce le genre de fête que je devrais permettre à mes enfants de célébrer? Année après année le début fait rage entre chrétiens de différentes traditions. Certains déclarent que cette fête en est une pour s'amuser un peu alors que d'autres la condamne unilatéralement comme une œuvre du démon. Mais savezvous – comme j'ai été surpris d'apprendre- qu'Halloween, loin d'être seulement une fête païenne, est aussi une célébration chrétienne qui date de plus de 1300 ans? Elle n'origine certainement pas d'un culte démoniaque, quoique je ne nierai pas que certains puissent l'avoir détourné à leur propres fins.

Le mot 'Halloween' en luimême ne signifie rien. En fait, ce mot est une contraction de à la 'Vigile de la fête de Tous les Saints' (ou Toussaint), fête chrétienne cèlébrée le lendemain. 'Hallow' en tant que nom, est un vieux mot anglais pour saint, et comme verbe, il signifie rendre saint quelque chose ou l'honorer comme saint. Le jour de la Toussaint, une fête d'obligation, aussi bien la fête que la vigile, ont été célébrés depuis le haut huitième siècle, quand le Pape Grégoire III l'institua à Rome. Elle est célébrée par un grand nombre de dénominations chrétiennes le 1er novembre. La veille, bien entendu, renvoie à la nuit précédente. Alors. Halloween signifie littéralement 'la nuit avant la fête de tous les saints'. Aujourd'hui, nous appelons cette fête Halloween (Hallow's Eve), et il peut être difficile de retrouver à travers la fête séculaire le sens religieux. Toutefois, il est important de noter que c'est une fête qui a une longue et positive histoire dans l'Église chrétienne.

En dépit de certaines inquiétudes parmi certains chrétiens au cours des dernières années à propos des 'origines païennes' de l'Halloween, il n'y en a pas. Les premières tentatives de montrer certains liens entre la vigile de la Toussaint et la fête celtique des moissons de Samhain datent de plus de 1000 ans après que la fête de la Toussaint soit devenue une fête universelle, et il n'y a pas de preuve que même le Pape Grégoire III ait même connu Samhain.

Cependant, plusieurs éléments celtiques furent introduits dans la célébration, incluant l'illumination de lanternes, de navets sculptés (en Amérique du Nord les citrouilles), et le déplacement de maison en maison pour cueillir des friandises. Mais les aspects 'occultes' de l'Halloween -fantômes et démons- ont leurs racines dans les croyances du christianisme primitif. Les premiers chrétiens croyaient (et encore plusieurs chrétiens aujourd'hui) qu'à

'All Hallows Eve' –renvoyant certains temps de l'année le voile qui sépare la terre du purgatoire et du ciel, devient plus mince, et les esprits (les âmes du purgatoire) et les démons peuvent être aperçus. Ainsi la tradition des costumes morbides doit un peu, sinon beaucoup, plus aux anciennes croyances chrétiennes qu'aux traditions celtiques.

Des gens de toutes races et cultures se souviennent de leurs morts et ont créé des superstitions à propos de la mort elle-même. Historiquement, les chrétiens se souviennent de la mort ellemême la veille de la Toussaint. Mais plus important encore, ils célèbrent la victoire du Christ sur la mort. Pendant le Moyen-Âge, les chrétiens se rassemblaient dans les églises pour prier et pour célébrer les victoires des saints sur le démon. Entre autres, ils faisaient des représentations montrant Jésus en train de vaincre le démon, utilisant des masques et des costumes pour personnifier les histoires. Pour l'essentiel, les festivités de la veille de la Toussaint étaient une manière chrétienne de faire un piedde-nez à la mort et au démon, ce que nous sommes toujours invités à faire aujourd'hui dans l'espérance de la victoire du Christ sur les forces des ténèbres. L'Église pendant des siècles a vue dans la veille de la Toussaint non pas une glorification du mal, mais une chance d'affirmer la vie éternelle face à la mort et à nos corps mortels.

Ainsi, papas et mamans, prenez vos enfants et marchez sur les trottoirs de votre ville. Laissez-les s'habiller en sains ou en gobelins ou en ce que leur cœur peut imaginer. Laissez-les frapper aux portes et ramasser des bonbons, des croustilles et du chocolat. Riez avec eux. Prenez-les par la main. Protégez-les. Aimez-les. Et à travers tout cela, surveillez leur taux de sucre sinon ils vont traverser les murs!

- 1. Don't touch matches and stay away from lighters and
- 2. **Don't play with electrical cords.** And don't place anything into an electrical socket.
- 3. Don't play around in the kitchen. If you want to cook something, be sure to check with a grown-up first.
- 4. **Don't touch radiators or heaters**. Ask a grown-up to turn a heater on or off for you. Don't stand too close to a fireplace or wood stove, either.

After Jr. Sparky was done giving his Tips he also wanted to remind everyone just like his dad Sparky Sr. that if your clothes catch fire don't forget to STOP, DROP and ROLL.



Rear Admiral Gardam, Commander of Maritime Forces Atlantic and Joint Task Force Atlantic Visited 14 Wing Greenwood 17-19 Oct 2010

14 Wing Greenwood had the honour of hosting Rear Admiral (RAdm) David Gardam, Commander of Maritime Forces Atlantic (MARLANT) and Joint Task Force Atlantic (JTFA) from the 17th to the 19th of October 2010. The Admiral was appointed as the Commander of MARLANT and JTFA in August 2010.

14 Wing shares a unique relationship with MARLANT and JTFA. While it goes without saying we belong to 1 Canadian Air Division, MARLANT is allocated a number of hours per year to task the CP-140 Auroras for maritime operations, such as area patrols, naval exercises and operations. These missions and exercises form a close bond between 14 Wing Greenwood and MARLANT.

As the Commander of JTFA, Auroras, Cormorant and Hercules support him on behalf of Canada Command. Canada Command carries out such domestic support missions and operations as flights with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada and the recent Operation Lama, the Canadian Forces joint response to the devastation by Hurricane Igor to southern and eastern Newfoundland on 21 September 2010.

The purpose of the visit was twofold. First, Greenwood hosted the JTFA Off-Site visit on 18th of October. The purpose of the visit was for the senior JTFA leadership to meet and get to know the new Commander JTFA and other recently arrived JTFA personnel. Furthermore, this event gave the attendees the opportunity to review decisions from the 2009 Off-Site visit, discuss the progress made thus far and determine the way ahead.

The second purpose was to tour 14 Wing Greenwood, the units and the people. Accompanying the Admiral was Chief Petty Officer First Class (CPO1) Bertrand Lafontaine, Acting Chief Petty Officer of MARLANT. This was a critical visit for RAdm Gardam, as the newly appointed Commander of MARLANT and JTFA, and for CPO1 Lafontaine to understand and discuss with the units and people of Greenwood what support and resource the Wing is able to provide MARLANT

The Admiral and CPO1 began their day with a visit to 413 (Transport & Rescue) Squadron (413 (T&R) Sqn). Lieutenant Colonel (LCol) Atkins, Commanding Officer (CO) of 413 (T&R) Sqn, escorted our guests through the CH-149 Cormorant and the CC-130 Hercules. RAdm

He remarked that when a SAR tech's son or daughter asks "what does my daddy do?," unlike other trades, it is a very easy question for them to answer.

the Admiral and CPO1 on the Overland Equipment Mission Suite (OEMS). The OEMS is a system that allows the transmission of real-time video images from the CP-140's MX-20 Electro-Optic/Infrared Camera. The OEMS was critical during Operation LAMA by relaying images of damaged areas and destroyed roads to the people on the ground. The Admiral's response to seeing the capabilities of the OEMS was a strong desire to fly with that system and see it in action. It was evident

the OEMS is a capability the Admiral can put to good use.

Following the briefing with 405 (LRP) Sqn, RAdm Gardam and CPO1 Lafontaine meet with several members of 404 (LRP & Training) Sqn (404 (LRP&T) Sqn) and the Simulation Office, which included Maj Davison, Acting CO, and Mr. Ward, Chief Simulator Officer. They toured the Aurora Full Flight Simulator (FFS) at the Thorney Island Building. The Admiral took control of the aircraft and took to the simulated

skies. The FFS's realism impressed both the Admiral and the CPO1. The Admiral concluded his flight with a simulated engine failure and an emergency landing. 404 (LRP&T) Sqn is happy to report that both the FFS and the Admiral survived the rough, but successful, landing.

The Admiral and CPO1

followed the tour of the FFS with a visit to the Operational Mission Simulator (OMS). RAdm Gardam expressed his interest and the need to



focus on using simulations as an effective training tool, both to save costs and to conduct training that the units and aircrew cannot do in the real world. To that end, the Admiral discussed with 404 (LRP&T) Sqn and the Simulations Office, the importance of linking 14 Wing simulators with those at 12 Wing Shearwater and at CFB Halifax. He emphasized how both the Air Force and Navy are meeting the same challenges and the only way to overcome them, is to work together.

In the afternoon, RAdm Gardam and CPO1 Lafontaine met with LCol Chouinard, CO of 14 Wing Operations (14 W Ops) for a briefing on the current state of anti-submarine warfare (ASW). The Admiral was particularly interested in ASW as he stressed many times how critical ASW is in the 21st Century, even more so then in the last century. Despite the end of the Cold War and the threat of the Soviet Union, the threat of submarines is very real. The Admiral and the ČO of 14 W Ops discussed in detail how 14 Wing is training and preparing to meet the challenges of ASW in the new century. They talked about the importance of bicoastal efforts between 14 Wing and 19 Wing Comox and of the importance of international exercises and competitions, such as Fincastle, in maintaining our skills in ASW. These

discussions were a good segue into the Block III CP-140 Aurora.

Maj Defer, the CO of the Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit (MP&EU) highlighted the capabilities of the Block III Aurora in a presentation to the Admiral and the CPO1. The briefing focused on the Synthetic Aperture Radar, the Electronic Support Measure Systems, the Modular VME Acoustic Signal Processor and the timeline for testing and evaluating the Block III. Throughout the presentation, Maj Defer emphasized that these new capabilities are a leap forward beyond

anything we, or our allies, have seen to date. He accentuated that these capabilities are only the beginning as MP&EU has only scratched the surface of the true capabilities of this new aircraft. How the Block III aircrew would manage this flood of new information was of prime concern to the Admiral because the Navy is facing the same challenge of information management with the Halifax Class Modernization Project. Again, RAdm Gardam stated the importance of the Air Force and Navy working together to solve the problem of information overflow.

Following the briefing, RAdm Gardam and CPO1 Lafontaine took a guided tour of the CP-140 Aurora 108, the first Block III aircraft delivered to 14 Wing. Members of MP&EU activated the systems and demonstrated the new technology. The new Block III interface, touch screen displays and information organization impressed the Admiral.

Before returning to Halifax, the Admiral had the honour of personally presenting the Commanders Coin and Bravo Zulu to 26 CF Health Services for the outstanding work they did during Operation Laser to fight the threat of an H1N1 Pandemic. Maj Drab, CO of 26 CF Health Services and the staff were on hand to accept the presentation.

Prior to departing, RAdm

Gardam remarked that he greatly enjoyed his time in Greenwood and was impressed with the new construction of the Wing Fire Hall and the Wing Hospital and the new technologies and capabilities coming to the Wing. Most of all, he was impressed with the excellent morale and drive of all members of 14 Wing Greenwood, especially in this time of transition.

Many of you have been inquiring about the changes. We want to invite you to stop by for a peek anytime. If vou would like to bring your child for a visit before we open, please feel free to do so. We are confident you'll be pleased with what you see. A visit will also afford you the opportunity to pick up a Parent Handbook to review the Centre's policies & procedures. As well, you can pick up the paperwork required on each child who visits the

Centre & have it completed and ready prior to your first visit after we officially open our doors. The GMFRC & our Wing partners are so excited to be able to offer this exceptional service to our 14 Wing defence team families. We just can't wait to show you the new Centre, because we know you'll share in our excitement.

In the meantime, we are getting lots of inquiries from families on the new full-day Childcare service so we'll offer up a Q&A over the next couple of weeks to share some of the highlights. about? We have changed from a part-day service to a full-day Casual Childcare Centre. The main difference is in the hours of operation. We are now open every weekday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., including the lunch hour. There are some major differences in licensing requirements when you offer full-day service. Most notably is the requirement for 2 separate rooms to accommodate the different age groups. This continues even to the outdoor play space. Each age group requires specific age-appropriate play equipment. It required the addition of a specially-equipped kitchen on-site. It required the addition of a nap room to accommodate 8 cribs. We could go on, but we'll let you see for yourself when you visit just how fabulous this new Centre will be for your children!

What is the difference between Casual Childcare & Full-time Daycare?

Full-time daycare is required by families typically where all primary caregivers work outside the home. Our Childcare Centre is not an option for full-time daycare. Our service is a Casual one – that is, it cannot be, nor is it intended to be, your fulltime childcare arrangement. All MFRCs are mandated to ensure Casual Childcare is available to defence team families. However, this mandate does not include a requirement to offer Monday to Friday care. Fortunately, for families at 14 Wing, our Wing Commander, Col WF Seymour, has made a commitment to respond to identified needs of families to provide an expanded Casual Childcare Service. As a result of our Wing Commander's

Casual Childcare every weekday, including over the lunch hour. Casual Childcare offers parents and caregivers the opportunity to run errands, attend appointments, or simply enjoy some free time; you can take advantage of community services (gym, classes or workshops, etc), or spend a worry-free day shopping. For part-time workers, the Centre may be able to offer childcare options, but please keep in mind that as a Casual Service, there may be times when the Centre may not accommodate your needs.

How many childcare spots are available?

The Casual Childcare Centre will be licensed to accommodate 25 children every day. In our "infant" room (ages 3-17 months) we can accept a maximum of 8 children. In our "multi-age" room, we will be able to accept a maximum of 17 children aged 18 months to

12 years. What are the hours of operation?

The GMFRC Casual Childcare Centre will be open Monday to Friday from 8am to 4pm (and yes, we are open through the lunch hour).

How much does the service

The cost for a full-day of childcare (8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.) is \$24 for children aged 18

support, we are able to offer months and older, and \$30 for a child under 18 months of age.

For any 4-hour (or less) consecutive period of time, the rate will be \$12 for 18 months and older, and \$15 for under 18 months old. The 4 hours can be any 4-hour block of time during the day (cost is the same whether it includes lunch or not).

Is there an hourly rate?

I'm sure you can appreciate that it is difficult to run a Casual Childcare service such as this one because of the uncertainty of the number of children who will visit each day This reality, impacting staffing & ratios, must be taken into consideration when offering this service. As such, to make it work for both families and the Centre, we encourage you to book a block of time. We will offer an hourly rate of \$7.00 per child if requested, but as you can see, if you book only 2 hours, you would then pay more (in the case of a child aged 18 months or older) than our 4-hour rate of \$12.00 (in this example, of course, you would be charged \$12, not \$14). The point is, the nature of Casual Childcare allows us to reduce the cost of childcare if families book a block of time, as opposed to attempting to staff an hourly service.

Is there a discount if I have more than one child?

If you are booking 2 children or more for the same period of time, each additional child (after the 1st) pays ½ the rate of the first child. So, if you are booking a child aged 12 months & another aged 3 years for the day, you will pay \$30 for the 12-month old, but then only \$12 for the

How far ahead may I book a spot for my child?

While the service is "casual", we welcome you to use it on a regular basis. For example, if you plan to spend a couple mornings each week at the gym, you can book those spots up to a month ahead, just to ensure availability. We will guarantee your spot when you book for the month. So, you can always be booked for 4 weeks

ahead of time. Next week we'll answer more FAQ about provincial licensing requirements, staffing, Centre closures, and the menu. We'll also offer an update on our grand opening. Remember, it's coming soon, & if you just can't wait for more answers, our Childcare Programs Director will be happy to receive your call. Take advantage of our offer to stop by & see for yourself just how great our new Childcare Centre will be for your child. The GMFRC is open Mondays to Wednesdays from 8am to 9pm, and on Thursdays & Fridays from 8am to 4pm. You are always welcome at the GMFRC!






