

Update on the Water Situation at 14 Wing Greenwood

January 25, 2011

14 WING GREENWOOD – Since May 2010, the Wing has been making progress on determining the source of the perfluoroctane sulfonate (PFOS) contamination that was found in the base's water supply early last year, and plans are now underway to make the Wing once again self-sufficient for its water needs.

The results of groundwater testing to date indicate that an area on the base used to temporarily store waste firefighting

foam was the most likely source of the PFOS contamination in the Wing's water supply. An old firefighting training area on the base was identified as another potential source area, but has not impacted any drinking water supplies. The testing also showed the PFOS had not leached off of the Wing's property into the surrounding community.

The Wing has taken every possible step to mitigate the risks from the PFOS contamination in consultation with the Nova Scotia Environment Department and the Health Promotion and Protection Department of Nova Scotia," stated Colonel Bill Seymour, the Commander of 14 Wing.

Meanwhile, new deep water supply wells are being planned for the Wing. These wells are expected to be operational by September-October 2011. The elimination of firefighting foam

containing PFOS is continuing and will be completed by the end of January 2011.

Last May, the precautionary Drinking Water Avoidance Advisory that was put into effect on March 24, 2010, was lifted for parts of the Wing. Some of the buildings not located on the base proper were hooked up to the Kings County municipal water system. The base proper, which is not hooked up to the municipal water system, will continue to use bottled water until supplied by the new wells.

The Wing will continue to work closely with Environment Canada and Health Canada and other departments to effectively manage the substance within its boundaries.

PFOS has been used in applications involving water, oil, soil and grease repellents for fabric, leather, packaging and rugs and carpets, for both domestic and commercial use and as additives in firefighting foams and paints and coatings. PFOS and its salts are persistent in the environment and a potential risk may occur through bioaccumulation and biomagnification of the chemical in wildlife.

# African Heritage Month

Did you know that February is African Heritage Month in Canada?

It originally started as Black History Month when it was founded in 1926 by Harvard educated Black historian Dr. Carter G. Woodson. In the 1970's several Black organizations and community leaders banded together to promote this concept as a month from the original week recognition. In Nova Scotia, the celebration of Black History Month was initiated in the early 1980's through the efforts of the Black History Month Association. It is now in its second decade and is known as African Heritage Month.

African Heritage Month is a time to celebrate the many achievements and contributions of black Canadians, who, throughout history, have done so much

and prosperous nation we know today. It also presents an opportunity for us to appreciate the richness of our Canadian diversity and its proud black Canadian history.

With roots dating back as far as 1609, black Canadians represent just over 2% of Canada's total population and 17% of the visible minority population today. The rapid growth of the black population, and other visible minorities have contributed to Canada's every changing cultural mosaic.

Did you know..... that during World War I, patriotic black Canadians attempted to join combat units but were rejected on the basis of race and/or colour. However. they still contributed to the war effort. In 1916, a segregated battalion made up of black Canadians, the No. 2 Construction Battalion, was formed. It was responsible for





Some might think a museum is a place where dusty old relics are stored and viewed. Not so at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum (GMAM)!

On Wednesday morning, 12 January, the GMAM was abuzz with a busload of students from Pine Ridge Middle School in Kingston. Waiting for them were 24 enthusiastic volunteer instructors, seasoned veterans and serving members of various military careers, recruited to escort students on a tour of the Museum and to pass on their knowledge and experiences to the fertile minds of tomorrow's men and women. This is the kind of education you can't find in a text book!

2011 marks the ninth consecutive year the GMAM, and this dedicated team of Education (FltEd) Program. The course entails a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hour guided tour of the Museum for 60 grade six students from up to eight different schools throughout the Valley area and complements the schools' science course and the subject of flight. flight simulator/trainer; engineering, featuring the *Argus* piston engine and T-33 jet engine; flight controls, ejection seat mechanics and torpedoes; a 2/3 scale model Spitfire aircraft; and a Tutor flight simulator program.

Popular exhibits include sounds from the ocean heard through sonobuoys: ship and submarine propellers, biologics (whale and shrimp noises) and running torpedoes. Another striking exhibit is the cutaway *Argus* engine - as big as a Volkswagen car - with 1000's of moving parts seen in motion. The *Tutor* flight simulator puts the student

virtually in the cockpit of a Tutor aircraft taking off and landing at Greenwood. A surprising comment was heard: "I didn't know Canada had war heroes too!" We sure do! Lots of them!

To date, 3500 students have experienced the course, with teachers and escorts, and a further 500 are expected through 2011. These young people are the future airmen and airwomen, airline pilots, mechanical technicians, engineers, and computer programmers. What thing, story or experience at the Museum might trigger the imagination of a student and influence his/ her career decisions?

Wing Commander, Colonel Bill Seymour, made a special appearance at the initial meeting of the volunteers 5 January, offering encouragement and thanks to the volunteers. The FlightEd Program reflects his policies for connecting with the community and relating Greenwood's historical past and its relevancy today. A warm welcome to the 2011 FlightEd classes, their teachers and escorts!



# Four Wartime Squadrons Celebrate 70th Reunion at 14 Wing Greenwood

Reunions are a fairly common event, but nowhere in Canada will four proud wartime squadrons (sqn) celebrate the formation of their units at the same time. On June 9-11, 2011, the four units will come together and celebrate Rendezvous 2011 (RV2011) at 14 Wing Greenwood in the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia.

404 (Buffalo), 405 (City of Vancouver or Eagle), 413

(Tusker) and 415 (Swordfish) Squadrons were formed in 1941 in England as a part of the Royal

Canadian Air Force (RCAF) commitment to the defence of

404 Squadron: Now a Long Range Patrol and Training (LRP&T) Squadron, was formed April 1941 at Thorney Island, United Kingdom and the sqn was to spend its entire wartime life in England and Scotland, serving at over a dozen bases and only within Coastal Command. Aircraft flown included the Bristol Blenheim, Bristol Beaufighter and the de Havilland Mosquito. Known during the war as a ship-busting unit, and a key squadron in the feared 'Strike Wings', 404 also suffered the worst single mission loss (55%) when on February 9, 1945, 6 of 11 Buffalo Beaufighters were destroyed at Fordefjord, Norway. The squadron was disbanded in May 1945.

Greenwood in April 1951 and flew the Avro Lancaster, Lockheed Neptune, Canadair Argus and the current CP140 Aurora. The Buffalo Squadron remained an operational unit until 1975, when, due to a climate of fiscal restraint, the decision was made to markedly reduce the size of the air force. 449 Squadron, the training unit, was disbanded and the training


responsibilities passed to 404 Squadron. This was a bitter pill to swallow for a proud operational unit, and with significant effort of unit leadership, command was convinced that 404, along with training, should still conduct operational mission. This decision led to the unique appellation of LRP&T for the unit. 404 is currently the Aurora Operational Training Unit (OTU) responsible for aircrew and maintainer training.

**405 Squadron:** The sqn is now one of two Long Range Patrol (LRP) Squadrons in Canada (along with 407 Squadron in Comox, BC). Formed at Driffield, Yorkshire in April 1941, as the RCAF's first bomber squadron, the unit was equipped with the Vickers Wellington and Handley Page

Halifax. 405 flew the RCAF's first bombing mission in June 1941, only 10 weeks after formation. For a short period, the unit was attached to Coastal Command flying anti-submarine missions over the Bay of Biscay and protecting convoys enroute to North Africa. Recognizing the effectiveness of this proud unit. orders were received moving 405 into 8 Group, to become a Pathfinder unit, leading and marking for bomber forces. This distinction is remembered through the fact that the unit crest shows the eagle facing right - leading the way, while all other unit's crests face left. The unit was disbanded at Greenwood in September 1945, while participating in the Tiger Force preparations to deploy to the Pacific war.

Reformed in March 1950, 405, along with 404 Squadron, flew Maritime Reconnaissance missions from Greenwood using the Lancaster Mk X. The Pathfinders have spent their entire post-war life as an operational sqn employing the Lancaster, Neptune, Argus and Aurora aircraft

413 Squadron: The sqn has had a varied existence. Currently a Transport and Rescue unit, it flies the Hercules and Cormorants. Formed in July 1941 at Stranraer, Scotland, it was the first RCAF unit to employ flying boats, the Consolidated Catalina, an aircraft flown by the Tuskers throughout the war. Quickly moved to the Far East, 413 Squadron was employed flying reconnaissance missions

While flying on one of these missions, Squadron Leader Leonard Birchall sighted a Japanese task force and was able to warn Ceylon military authorities, allowing the repulsion of the attack. The Catalina crew were shot down, becoming prisoners, but Birchall was to be remembered as 'The Saviour of Ceylon'. In February 1945, 413, then in the process of being reformed as a Bomber unit, were disbanded at Bournemouth, England.

After the war, in 1947, 413 flew photographic missions employing the Lancaster and Mitchell bombers from Rockcliffe, Ontario. In 1949 the

searching for Japanese forces. unit changed again, becoming a Survey Transport unit flying the Dakota, Canso and Norseman aircraft. The sqn was again disbanded in November 1950. Reformed a third time less than a year after disbandment, the Tuskers were now a fighter unit at Bagotville, Quebec, flying the Vampire, Sabre and Canuck aircraft. In January 1962, for the third time, the unit disbanded. In 1968, 103 Rescue Squadron moved from Greenwood to Summerside and was renamed 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron flying the Labrador helicopter and Albatross amphibious aircraft. In 1991, along with 415 Squadron, 413 packed up and

still holds SAR responsibilities.

415 Squadron: The sqn also formed at Thorney Island, stood up in August 1941, and flew its wartime career in both Coastal and Bomber Commands. A quick read of the unit's history identifies a unit that was not well treated by wartime authorities with many moves, often to austere airbases. and being subjected to several obsolete aircraft, including the Bristol Beaufort, Handley Page Hampden, and Vickers Wellington. Notably, the sqn also flew the Fairey Albacore, thus earning the distinction of being the only RCAF unit in the Second World War to fly a biplane in combat operations. In 1944, the unit re-equipped with the Handley Page Halifax, and flew bombing missions until being disbanded in May, 1945.

Reformed in 1961, 415 Squadron called CFB Summerside home, flying the Canadair Argus until 1981 when the unit packed up and moved to its new home

served proudly until 2005 when the unit was finally retired, and has housed its unit colours at the Greenwood Military Aviation Museum (GMAM).

**VPI:** The fifth celebration during RV2011 will be the 45th anniversary of VP International (VPI). VP is a designation used to identify Maritime Reconnaissance Air Force units. VPI is a service organization that espouses friendship amongst all allied VP air forces.

From June 9-11, 2011, at 14 Wing Greenwood, these four units will come together to celebrate their service to Canada with a series of events to remember the past and anticipate the future of aviation in Greenwood. Events will include a giant meet and greet, a dinner, industry displays and sqn displays.
