In a game that went back and forth for 3 periods 14 Wing Greenwood came out on top 4-3. This would set up a rematch to decide who would move on to play the defending champions in the final on Friday.

The semi final proved to be a retake of their round robin meeting. The game was played end to end for 3 periods and a score of 7-7 after regulation time. It was fitting after watching both teams performance that it would go to overtime to determine the winner. Finally 14 Wing Greenwood scored in the sudden death overtime for a chance at Shearwater in the final. Even though Shearwater had beaten them 5-1 in their first game as a team, they and the fans all knew the Championship Game would be different. Greenwood had grown together throughout the championship and were a much better team now.

The championship game started out with Shearwater jumping into a 2-0 lead, Greenwood got one back to bring the game close. Just as the period was ending

Canadian Forces Complete Counter-Narcotics Operation

Feb. 18, 2011

HMCS Toronto and two Canadian Forces CP-140 Aurora strategic surveillance aircraft return today from the Caribbean Sea, where they were busy performing counter-drug operations as part of Operation Caribbe.

The ship, aircraft and their crews return home following a month-long deployment with the U.S. Joint Interagency Task Force South (JIATF-S), during which 68 bales of cocaine, amounting to approximately 1,650 kilograms, with an estimated value of \$33M, were intercepted.

"I'm very proud of the part played by the men and women of HMCS Toronto, and our aircrews, in keeping drugs off Canadian streets," said the Honourable Peter MacKay, Minister of National Defence. "Our sailors and air personnel are a key component of international efforts to interdict cocaine destined for North America."

This historic mission marked the first time that a U.S. Coast Guard Law Enforcement Detachment conducted operations from Canadian Navy ships. The contingent, under command of Canada Command, was operating in direct support to the ongoing U.S.-led, multi-national effort to interdict drug trafficking in the Caribbean Basin and the East Pacific.

"Canadians can be proud of the impressive ability of their

Canadian Forces to seamlessly work together with other nations and agencies to tackle challenges to Canada's security and safety before they reach our shores," said Lieutenant-General Walter Semianiw, Commander of Canada Command. "Our ability to work closely together with the U.S. Coast Guard has enhanced our contribution to the fight against trans-national criminal organizations that threaten our society."

HMCS Toronto, supported by its ship-borne Sea King helicopter and crews, along with the Aurora crews, provided surveillance, logistics and refuelling capabilities to U.S. Coast Guard authorities.

"This mission has provided the crew with outstanding operational training with our U.S. partners in the fight against transnational criminal organizations," said Commander Paul Forget, the captain of HMCS Toronto. "Our primary tasks have been to assist the U.S. law enforcement authorities to locate, track, and intercept illegal activities and our actions contribute to the safety and security of Canadians at home."

Canada and other international partners have cooperated closely in multi-national drug surveillance and interdiction operations in the Caribbean Basin and East Pacific beginning in November 2006. Since its inception, Op Caribbe units have stopped over 1,075 metric tonnes of drugs from entering Canada, the US and other nations.

Programme de déneigement et de déglacage 2011 de la 14^e Escadre

Priorités, responsabilités, points de contact

Il est rappelé au personnel militaire et civil de la 14^e Escadre (y compris aux résidents des unités de logement résidentielles [ULR]) que le déneigement à l'Escadre est le fruit d'un effort conjoint entre l'escadron de transport et génie électrique et mécanique (Esc Tpt et GEM), l'escadron de génie construction (Esc GC) et les administrateurs des bâtiments. Le responsable général du déneigement à la 14^e Escadre est l'officier – Service de la logistique et de l'ingénierie de l'escadre (OSLI Ere).

Priorités

Le comité des services de contrôle de la neige et des glaces (SCNG) de la 14^e Escadre, coprésidé par l'OSLI Ere et par l'officier des opérations de l'escadre (O Ops Ere), fixe les priorités en matière de déneigement à l'Escadre au nom du commandant. Ces priorités sont publiées dans le plan des SCNG de la 14^e Escadre et les modifications quotidiennes de ces priorités sont gérées par l'officier des opérations de service de l'escadre, après consultation de l'officier du contrôle de la circulation aérienne (CC air) de service de l'escadre.

Le plan des SCNG attribue des couleurs de priorité aux surfaces des chaussées de l'Escadre : rouge, bleu et jaune. Ces couleurs permettent aux équipes de déterminer les priorités d'affectation de l'équipement et de la main-d'œuvre. À chacune d'elles correspond une échéance à laquelle les travaux doivent être terminés :

- Rouge : terminés dans les 24 heures suivant l'arrêt des précipitations;
- Bleu : terminés dans les 48 heures suivant l'arrêt des précipitations;
- Jaune : terminés dans les 72 heures suivant l'arrêt des précipitations.

Durant une tempête, la piste en service est entretenue en tout temps, tout comme les routes utilisées par les unités d'intervention d'urgence. Bien qu'il soit important que la neige soit enlevée rapidement dans toute l'escadre, ces secteurs prioritaires doivent être déneigés en premier pour le maintien des opérations aériennes et des services d'urgences.

Responsabilités et points de contact

Les responsables de l'établissement des priorités d'intervention des SCNG sur l'aérodrome et sur les pistes sont les Ops Ere. Les points de contact aux Ops Ere pour toute question sur les opérations des SCNG sur l'aérodrome et sur les pistes, stationnement des aéronefs inclus, sont l'officier des Ops de service, au poste 5457, et l'officier du CC air de service, au poste 3205.

Pour accomplir cette tâche, ils disposent de petites souffleuses, de pelles, de balais et de sel/sable au besoin.

À quoi s'attendre après une chute de neige importante

- Pendant une chute de neige importante (plus de 5 à 7 cm) ou un blizzard : Il se peut que les échéances ne soient pas respectées, mais les équipes des SCNG travailleront tout de même 24/7.
 - Le déneigement partiel peut commencer dans les rues et sur les stationnements afin de permettre la circulation sur une voie avant le dégagement complet. Les chasse-neige reviendront plus tard lorsque les zones de priorité rouge auront été déneigées.
 - Si l'objectif est de maintenir les rues dans un état minimal, il est possible que de la neige mouillée agglutinée de manière à former des blocs de glace, de la pluie verglaçante et un gel soudain après une pluie produisent une forte accumulation de glace sur les surfaces. Du sable ou du sel, voire les deux, seront alors répandus pour permettre une certaine adhérence.
 - En cas de chutes de neige multiples, lorsque le temps a manqué pour respecter toutes les priorités, les opérations reprendront dans les zones les plus prioritaires et le système recommencera à zéro.
 - À la suite du déneigement, d'importants tas peuvent se former aux extrémités des allées résidentielles et des places de stationnement. Ce phénomène est particulièrement visible aux endroits où les véhicules sont stationnés des deux côtés d'une route à une seule voie.
 - Les aires de stationnement seront dégagées conformément aux priorités fixées et le gros du déneigement s'effectuera de nuit.

14 Wing Snow and Ice Control Program 2011

Priorities / Responsibilities / Points of Contact

14 Wing military and civilian personnel (including residents of the Residential Housing Units (RHU or PMQ) area) are reminded that snow removal on 14 Wing is a joint effort between TEME Sqn (Transportation and Electrical Mechanical Engineering Squadron), CE Sqn (Construction Engineering Sqn) and individual building custodians. Overall responsibility for snow removal at 14 Wing rests with the WLEO (Wing Logistics and Engineering Officer).

Priorities:

The 14 Wing Snow and Ice Control (SNIC) Committee, co-chaired by the WLEO and the Wing Operations Officer (WOpsO), sets the priorities for snow removal on the Wing on behalf of the Wing Commander. The priorities get published in the 14 Wing SNIC Plan and day to day changes to the snow removal priorities are managed by the WOps Duty Officer in consultation with the Wing Air Traffic Control (ATC) Duty Officer.

The SNIC plan divides the Wing's black top surfaces into

3 priority colours: Red, Blue and Yellow. These colours allow the crews to prioritize where equipment and manpower needs to be placed. Each of the colours is assigned an estimated timeline for completion as follows:

- Red: completed within 24 hrs after precipitations end.
- Blue: completed within 48 hours after precipitations end.
- Yellow: completed within 72 hours after precipitations end.

During a storm event the active runway will be maintained at all times along with specified routes used by emergency response units. Although timely snow removal all over the Wing is important, these priority areas must be cleared first in order to maintain flying operations or emergency services for the Wing.

Responsibilities and Points of Contact

Prioritization of SNIC activities on the airfield and runways is the responsibility of WOps. Points of contact at WOps in case of questions or concerns with regards to SNIC operations conducted on the airfield and runways including aircraft parking are the Duty Ops Officer, at local 5457; or Duty ATC Officer, at local 3205.

In general, responsibility for snow removal from 14 Wing runways, taxiways, ramp areas, roads, parking lots and communications installations is a TEME Sqn responsibility using military high speed ploughs, sweepers, large blowers, front end loaders, graders and sand / salt trucks. TEME military and civilian operators work 24/7 during the winter months.

Prioritization of SNIC activities for all vehicle parking areas and for the Operational Support side of the Wing, including the RHU (PMQ) area, is the responsibility of TEME Sqn in accordance with the Wing SNIC plan and effective sequencing of SNIC activities. Normal working hours points of contact at TEME Sqn in case of questions or concerns with regards to SNIC operations conducted in the aforementioned areas are as follows:

Responsibility for snow removal from 14 Wing sidewalks, airfield navigation aids, pathways and other areas where smaller equipment is used is the responsibility of CE Sqn through the use of equipment such as skid steer loaders, tractors and small blowers. Normal working hours points of contact at CE Sqn in case of questions or concerns with regards to SNIC operations conducted in the aforementioned areas are as follows:

- MWO K Clayton, CE Sqn, local 5130, (kevin.clayton@forces.gc.ca); or

Responsibility for snow removal 1.5 m away from personnel doors, steps, sidewalks, and out from the hangar doors (and application of salt / sand) to individual buildings as well as removing snow from buildings' outside garbage and recycling containers is the responsibility of the appointed building custodians through the use of small snow

blowers, shovels, brooms or salt/sand as needed.

For urgent concerns about SNIC operations for every areas of responsibility mentioned above during off duty hours, units and individuals can contact the Duty Ops Officer at 765-5457; the Duty Ops Officer will then direct the question or issue to the appropriate organization as deemed required. When necessary, information concerning snow removal during or just after a storm will be communicated via the 14 Wing Information line at 765-1765 or 765-1494, local 1765.

What to Expect After a Major Snowfall

During significant snowfall events (more than 5 - 7 cms) or in blizzard conditions:

- Timelines may not be achieved, but SNIC crews do operate 24/7.
- "Cut through" (one lane ploughing) may commence on streets and parking lots to allow single lane access prior to full width clearing; the ploughs will return later when Priority Red areas are cleared.
- While the objective is to maintain streets to a bare condition, wet snow packed to ice, freezing

ing rain and sudden freezes after a rain can produce a heavy ice build-up on surfaces. Sand and/or salt will be applied to provide a degree of traction.

- In the case of multiple snowfalls, where there has been insufficient time to complete all priorities, operations will return to the highest priorities and start over.
- Ploughing may result in large piles at the end of resident's driveways and parking stalls. This is evident in areas where vehicles park on either side of a single lane access.
- Parking lots will be cleared in accordance with established priorities and the bulk of the snow clearing will happen at night.

Wing personnel who have concerns over the SNIC program are encouraged to contact their chain of command since all major units on the Wing have a representative on the SNIC Committee. The end-year SNIC wrap-up meeting will be held in late Apr 2011.






