413 Squadron (Sqn) Cormorant Flight Has Productive Boat Camp!



413 Transport and Rescue Squadron deployed to Prince Edward Island (PEI) from 24 May until 27 May 2011 for a boat camp. The Sqn sent two CH-149 Cormorant helicopters to Charlottetown to focus and exercise its boat hoisting capability. Approximately 30 persons were involved in this concentrated training and Captain Trevor Pellerin was the officer in charge for this very successful deployment.

Hoisting to and from a vessel is by far one of the most challenging sequences flown by helicopter search and rescue (SAR) crews. The intent of the boat camp was to provide our helicopter crews with intensive exposure to live boat hoisting prior to the busy summer season. The training was done in collaboration with the Canadian Coast Guard (CCG) and the Auxiliary Canadian Coast Guard (ACCG).

The CCG and the ACCG were able to provide numerous vessels to support both day and night training. The variety of vessels available made this training invaluable as it accurately

represented the harsh conditions faced by SAR crews on real missions. Some of the fishing vessels used during the boat camp were actually the same type commonly used for fisheries in the Maritimes. PEI provided a centralized location to minimize the transit time for the helicopters. It also provided excellent training to CCG and ACCG sailors not commonly involved in boat hoisting due to the distance from the unit

Holocaust Survivor Book Signing at 14 Wing



Mr. Philip Riteman was a prisoner at Auschwitz-Birkenau and still lives with the constant reminders of the camp by having the number 98,706 tattooed on his left arm. Although the gray numbers have faded, the nightmares and horrific memories of the Holocaust have not.

After over forty years of silence, Mr. Riteman has dedicated the last twenty years to speaking to the next generation so they can learn what happened in hopes that this type of evil does not occur again. As a result of his tremendous work, Mr. Riteman has received honorary degrees from Memorial University and St. Thomas University. Plus, he has received the Order of Nova Scotia for educating the next generation and keeping the memories of those who perished alive.

"Millions of Souls is told in three parts. First is Philip's account of life in his hometown and as an eyewitness to the struggle for survival in the concentration camps. Second is the story of Philip's exodus to Newfoundland after the war, where he discovered that there was still some humanity





"What a great start to the season," said Lieutenant-Colonel Maryse Carmichael, Commanding Officer of the Snowbirds. "I'm proud of all the pilots, technicians and support staff of 431 Squadron for all their hard work over the past several months in preparation for this moment."

The acceptance show is an annual event in which the Snowbirds performance is given the stamp of approval for the season by the officials of 1 Canadian Air Division.

The 2011 show is comprised of more than 50 different aerobatic manoeuvres during the 30 minute performance, including the newly created "Kaleidoscope" and "Hero Split" manoeuvres - dedicated to Canadians everywhere who contribute to our national pride.

"I'm very happy with the effort put on by the pilots and technicians over the course of the winter training season, and now we get to do our job, by putting on our show for

the public right across North America," said Major Chris Hope, Snowbird #1 and team lead.

The event was even more special as he was recognized for achieving a flying milestone at 19 Wing Comox, B.C. recently: 5,000 flight hours in the CT-114 Tutor.

The Canadian Forces Snowbirds will perform approximately 50 shows in 31 locations during the 2011 season. Upcoming air shows include North Bay, Ont., on June 1 and Sydney, N.S., on June 4 and 5.


