The August 5 change of command ceremony at 14 Wing Greenwood was all about family.

Out-going Colonel Bill Seymour thanked family – “mine and yours,” referring also to his personnel’s families – “first, not last.

“You – we – have asked a lot of our families in the past couple of years. They make it possible to serve our country, and they remind us of why we come to work every day.”

In-coming Colonel Jim Irvine also opened with another, very personal, reference to family.

“My father, who passed away in 1980 when I was 16 – today would have

been his 81st birthday. My father is on parade with me today.”

The ceremony took place with 261 Canadian Forces and other military members on parade. The base’s heavy equipment – from the helicopter and planes to firefighting rigs – lined the back of the square, and both the 14 Wing Pipes & Drums and Brass & Reed bands provided the music. A fly past of the base’s aircraft highlighted the work Seymour has done and Irvine is expected to continue, according to special guest Major-General J.A.J. Parent, Commander 1 Canadian Air Division.

"Colonel Seymour: you were determined to make this wing a better place, and you pushed people pretty hard, but morale appears very high here. Colonel Irvine: you spent a decade here, and you come back to this wing at an exciting time. I expect you to deliver swiftly."

Seymour presented his force to Irvine, but also listed the opening

of a new childcare centre and family medical clinic and \$100 million in infrastructure plans on-line as "an incredible display" of the wing's motto, "Operate as One."

"I leaned on my commanding officers to share the load as well, so the work/ life balance for all of us was more than just a few words."

Still, Seymour said, Greenwood has been the "go to" base for Canadian military actions in recent

years, from unmanned aerial vehicle work in Afghanistan – over 15,000 hours of operations; to "no-fail" search and rescue missions to relief work in Haiti, the Ontario snowstorms, Newfoundland floods and support for the Vancouver Olympics, the G8 and G20 summits and long-range patrol work around Libya.

"Effective, responsive, adaptive. Outstanding," Seymour said.

"You are delivering." In the meantime, 14

Wing personnel maintain day-to-day operations at Atlantic Canada's largest base running, ready for "Operation Next." Strong links between the base, its people and local communities all make Greenwood "the best job I ever had," Seymour said. He begins year-long studies in Toronto later this month at the National Security Studies Program.

Irvine is no stranger to Greenwood: his first operational tour was here in 1991, and he stayed almost 10 years. He was back again in 2008 for two years as the commanding officer of 405 Squadron.

"It's my honour to be the in-coming commander of 14 Wing," he said, "and I pledge to all personnel of this base I will do my utmost to care for you and lead with all the energy I

can muster."

His primary goal is seeing the on-going Block Three Aurora overhaul put into operation "as quickly as possible, and he urged personnel to bring their skills and professionalism to the project.

"Much depends on your individual initiative to succeed. I will guide, lead and help, but we need you."

Hercs in Afghanistan: First in, last out

"We really enjoy flying in Afghanistan and are proud to be part of one of the first operational units here in theatre," said Captain Shane Loder, a CC-130J Hercules pilot with Task Force Canuck. "Our missions continue to be diversified, and the extreme temperatures, mountainous terrain and austere airports that we operate from make the flying here both challenging and gratifying."

Task Force Canuck —

more formally known as the Tactical Airlift Unit — stood up at Camp Mirage in January 2002 as the Tactical Airlift Detachment or TAL Det. Deployed on *Operation APOLLO*, the operation that brought Canada into the international campaign against terrorism, TAL Det began flying into Afghanistan to support the deployment of the 3rd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Battle Group in Kandahar Province. Under various names, the Hercs have been flying throughout

the southwest Asia theatre of operations ever since.

"Our allies know that the Canadian Hercules team is always ready to take on any mission, and they call on us regularly to meet operational flight requirements," said Loder. "We are proud of the reputation we have earned throughout a nearly 10-year period."

Despite the longevity of Hercules' operations in Afghanistan, the crews continue to break new ground. During a re-supply mission July 14, Loder and his crew used the Containerized Delivery System to air-drop 20 pallets of supplies — some 26,000 pounds or 11,818.2 kg — to ISAF troops on the ground. It was the largest operational air-drop Canadians have ever conducted from a Hercules aircraft, proving the Hercules crews of Task Force Canuck are willing to test their mettle even as they approach their final months of operations from Kandahar Airfield.

"The airmen and airwomen who contributed to CC-130 operations in the Afghanistan theatre can be proud of all of their outstanding efforts," said Colonel Al Meininger, commander of the Joint Task Force Afghanistan Air Wing. "Throughout the years, the unit has displayed an incredible level of flexibility, always ensuring aircraft and crews

were mission-ready. The Tactical Airlift Unit has earned the reputation as the 'airlifter of choice' within ISAF."

Although the Joint Task Force Afghanistan Air Wing is scheduled to cease operations in mid-August, the Tactical Airlift Unit will keep flying ISAF missions until mid-November.

"Though not the Tactical Airlift Unit's official unit motto, 'First in, last out' is captured on unit badges as no slogan could be more befitting for this team," said Meininger. "They will be the last members of the Joint Task Force Afghanistan Air Wing to operate in Afghanistan as a

formed unit — once again ably representing the Air Force in theatre."

The Tactical Airlift Unit's internationally stellar reputation is reflected in its long list of significant operational achievements. Since the

Canadian Forces commenced operations in Afghanistan in 2002, the CC-130 Hercules team has completed more than 4,100 missions to deliver some 57 million kg of cargo and 207,000 passengers throughout the theatre of operations.

Brigadier-General Derek Joyce August 7 assumed command of Task Force Libeccio during a ceremony held at Allied Joint Force Command, Naples, Italy. The task force will continue Canadian Forces' activities in support of Operation MOBILE.

Joyce was 14 Wing Greenwood's base commander from 2007 to 2009.

Concurrent with the assumption of command Task Force Naples personnel and functions were incorporated into the new structure of Task

Force Libeccio. Task Force Naples was responsible for coordinating the participation of all Canadian Task Forces within Operation MOBILE.

"The task I was given was extremely rewarding in that Task Force Naples worked very hard at providing support and sustainment to the air component of Operation MOBILE, and to Task Force CHARLOTTETOWN, patrolling the waters off the coast of Libya," said Colonel Paul Ormsby, commander of Task Force Naples. "The team here demonstrated its

professionalism, excellence and teamwork everyday and this is why it was so successful.

"As the Task Force Naples team prepares to join Task Force Libeccio in a single, unified Task Force, I know their record of excellence will continue uninterrupted."

"The short notice deployment of most CF personnel on Operation MOBILE is a testament to the professionalism and 'can do' attitude of our personnel, and their leadership has done much to form a cohesive

task force that our coalition partners can depend on - now and into the future," said Joyce. "I look forward to commanding and leading the task force and continuing the Canadian Forces' fine work."

Operation MOBILE is the Canadian Forces' participation in Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR, the NATO-led effort to impose on Libya the arms embargo and no-fly zone authorized by United Nations Security Council Resolution 1973 (2011). Canadian Forces aircraft are currently flying from two

bases in Italy, Trapani-Birgi and Sigonella, on the island of Sicily. Air operations are directed from a third location, the NATO Combined Air Operations Centre, located in Poggio Renatico, Italy. Task Force Libeccio is now located in Naples.

first of its kind in Nova Scotia. Our searches were not just geared to finding DND parts or personnel; we were there for the community, as were our fire hall personnel and equipment.

Refugee Camp in the Heart of the City

This fall, Médecins Sans Frontières/ Doctors Without Borders (MSF) brings its Refugee Camp in the Heart of the City exhibit to Eastern Canada, including a stop in Halifax at the Garrison Grounds September 15 to 18.

The goal of the exhibit is to raise awareness about the plight of the world's 43 million refugees and internally displaced

people (IDPs) uprooted by war and conflict.

The exhibit is an outdoor reconstruction of an actual refugee camp, where experienced MSF staff (doctors, nurses, logisticians) guide visitors through a 40- to 60-minute interactive tour explaining the crucial elements for survival in a refugee or IDP crisis. During the tour, each visitor will learn some of the challenges a refugee or IDP faces in trying to access food, shelter, water and medical care. The 8,000-square-foot exhibit is designed to accommodate approximately 800 to 1,200 visitors per day, and consists of shelter, food distribution and latrine areas; water supply, health, nutrition treatment and cholera treatment centres; and a vaccination tent.

Guided by MSF aid workers, visitors are asked to imagine they are among the millions of people fleeing violence and persecution in, for example, Somalia, Colombia, the Democratic Republic of Congo or Sudan. The exhibit addresses questions, such as will I be safe? What will I eat? How do I find water? Can I get medical care? Where will I live?

The exhibit is free and open to the public. If you are planning to come with a group of 15 or more, please schedule a group visit. Individuals are welcome without reservations.

The Refugee Camp in the Heart of the City was first launched in France in 1995, and has toured countries around the world. For more information, visit www.refugeecamp.ca.

Marking a milestone

Legion celebration chance to thank vets for Afghanistan service

Jim Desmond remembers his days on tour in Egypt in 1978, when he would line up at a ham radio and make contact with his wife halfway around the world in Greenwood.

"If the radio came open, I'd take it and ask the wife how the kids were, that kind of thing," he says.

Desmond retired as a service corps driver, and knows what time away from home and family can mean to a member of the Canadian Forces. Now past-president of the Kingston Legion, Desmond is chairing a committee of Legion representatives from Kingston, Berwick and Kentville branches to host one of the national Royal Canadian Legion's August 20 Afghanistan Veterans Appreciation Days.

"Words are not enough to show how grateful we are," says Dominion president Patricia Varga. "We know

there are many troops still serving overseas in this mission, but we believe that the end of this combat

phase is a great opportunity to recognize and thank our troops for what they've achieved so far."

Afghanistan veterans and their families will be special guests and each veteran will receive a gift and will be offered a free, one-year Legion membership.

Master Warrant Officer Rod Chubbs says the Legion's efforts are fantastic, and should be appreciated by military members and the community. For him, finishing an eight-month tour in Afghanistan in 2009 as the sergeant major for both the international Military Police company and the Canadian headquarters was a different experience than his own past tours in Cyprus and Bosnia.

"The communication is there – unlimited now, but it's just as hard for families. And, all tours are dangerous – the elements are always there, but Afghanistan was a little different," Chubbs says. "Canada has one of the best welfare programs in the world, but you still miss the little things."

For him, it was playing and

watching hockey, helping at home when his wife reported the dryer burning out – and peanut butter.

When the Kingston Legion's 1,000 members heard about the most desired items in care packages heading overseas, they went to work: backing the national Legion's coffee coupons for Afghanistan's Tim Hortons, packing up jars of peanut butter and sending off two dozen folding camp chairs.

"The Legion is the backbone, the place you should be involved in," says Chubbs, himself a 10-year member. He says military personnel benefit from the support of the Legion, not only for themselves, but for families still at home.

"This appreciation event, I feel, is just part of coming home, kind of a recuperation. I lost a lot of friends over there, I came back, I don't brag about it. I just do what I need to do with my family, and life goes on."

Clarke, helping organize the Kingston event, though, says the end of Canada's decade of active involvement in Afghanistan deserves more.

"We have all kinds of dates to commemorate World War I and World War II, Remembrance Day.... These new veterans are carrying on with Canadian traditions, and this is a chance for the public to have the chance to come out and shake the hands of these people."

Personal invitations have already been sent to 350 Afghanistan veterans to attend the August 20 event with their families. The community is also encouraged to attend, with things getting underway at 2 p.m. There is a BBQ, children's activities, music all afternoon, draws for prizes, gifts for veterans and an evening adult street dance. Dignitaries will be on hand, and there will be a moment of silence to recognize the fact there are Canadians who did not come home from this mission.

Camp Aldershot received support from other Army units in the Land Force Atlantic Area, as well as from the Navy,

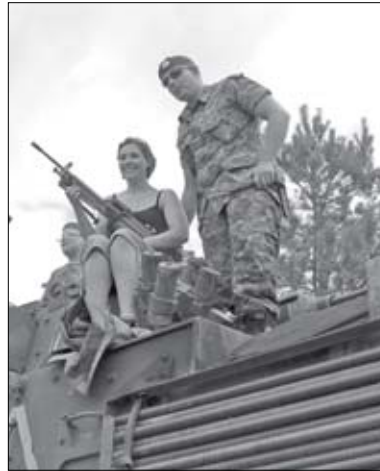

Bantam bronze

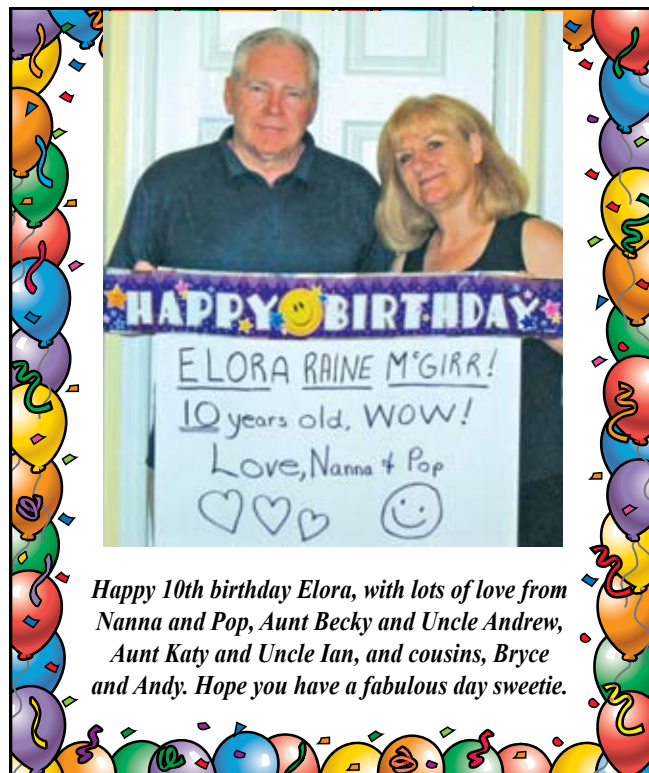

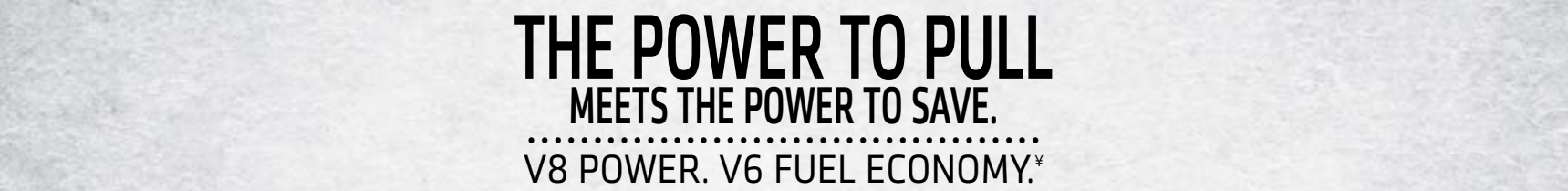

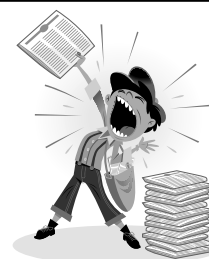
