Welcome home

Afghan vets thanked, praised for decade of service

A sunny Saturday afternoon of music, kids' activities and a BBQ is a far cry from the "severe conditions of turmoil and danger in the distant land of Afghanistan."

Town crier Lloyd Smith officially opened the local August 20 military appreciation event organized by the national Royal Canadian Legion to welcome home Canadian troops, declaring it his "distinct honour" to do so.

"Most sincere and heartfelt appreciation for their sacrifice with distinction to our country and the Afghan population," Smith said, "and to their families, who have long experienced anxious lives with loved ones far from home."

Kingston Branch #98, Ortona #69 in Berwick and Kings Branch #6 in Kentville co-hosted the event at the Kingston Legion, partnering with the Kingston Lions and the wider community to present music, games, food and more. Three-hundred-fifty

Ten million pounds of gas – and counting

"Lost some receivers, poached some, but offloaded 65K, putting us at 10,040,000 pounds," announced CC-150 Polaris mission commander Captain Mario Gauvin, signalling a new achievement in air-to-air refuelling by 437 Transport Squadron crews and aircraft deployed with Task Force Libeccio on Operation MOBILE.

When you hit 10 million of anything, it's notable. When it's 10 million pounds of fuel pumped *in flight* from tanker aircraft to receiving fighters, it's a major milestone.

From the very beginning of Op MOBILE in March, the CC-150 Polaris (the military version of the Airbus A310), configured as an air-to-air refueller, has been flying continuously from the little Italian Air Force base in Trapani, on the western point of the Italian island of Sicily. This consistent performance is largely due to the efforts of squadron maintainers and the civilian experts from Aveos Fleet Performance, who deployed to keep things running smoothly, both in the air and on the ground.

By now, CC-150 Polaris tankers from 437 Squadron have fuelled every type of

probe-equipped aircraft taking part in Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR, the NATO led effort to enforce the no-fly zone over Libya, and to protect civilians and civilian-populated areas in Libya. As well as our own CF-188 Hornets, receiver aircraft include Italian Tornados and AV8Bs, British Tornados and Typhoons, French Mirages, Rafales and Super Etendards, and sometimes even Mirages from the United Arab Emirates and Grippens from Sweden. The crews get switched in and out of theatre, but the aircraft continues to fly daily to keep the fighters in the air.

July 28, Polaris 15005 took off early with Gauvin as tanker commander, Captain Dana Sponder as first officer, Captain Luc Comeau as flight refuelling specialist and Warrant Officer Vicki Montag as loadmaster. The mission was a 4.5-hour flight to refuel a variety of NATO fighter aircraft, and the 10,000,000-pound mark was reached while refuelling a French Rafale.

"This is a major milestone," said Lieutenant-Colonel Andy Cook, commanding officer of 437 Squadron. "It shows that the Airbus is a significant player in the world of air-to-air refuelling, and will continue to fly missions to help fighters carry out their tasks."

Joyce visits air coordination element

August 11 and 12, less than a week after assuming command of Task Force Libeccio, Brigadier-General Derek Joyce visited Poggio Renatico in Italy to meet the men and women of the task force's Air Coordination Element (ACE), located at a major Italian Air Force radar station about five kilometres out of town.

"I met with an impressive group of Canadian Forces personnel who are fully engaged in planning air operations over Libya and completely integrated

with NATO in Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR," said Joyce.

Joyce felt it imperative he

see the ACE, and meet with the NATO staff involved in directing the air component of Operation UNIFIED PROTECTOR, the NATO-led effort to protect civilians and civilian-populated areas in Libya, and to enforce the no-fly zone and arms embargo authorized by United Nations Security Council Resolution 1973 of March 17.

"Canada is again punching above its weight, making a real and tangible impact through operations to enforce the no-fly zone and protect Libyan civilians," he said.

With more than 400 personnel in Italy, Task Force Libeccio has its headquarters in Naples, co-located with NATO's Allied Joint Forces Command.

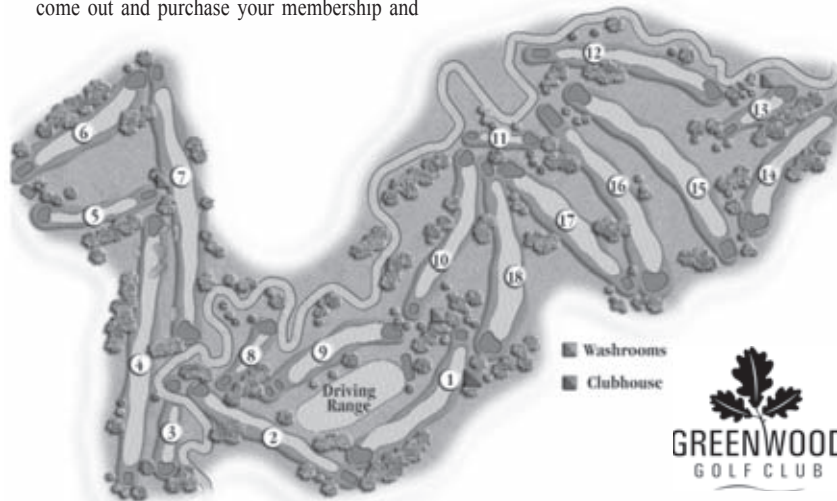

Setting foot on Canada's rooftop

Despite the constant threat of avalanches, the perils of hidden crevasses and relentless gale-force winds, a team of nine Air Force search and rescue technicians (SAR techs) from squadrons across the nation have conquered the summit of Canada's highest mountain.

The climb was awesome – a life experience,” says Master Corporal Brad Nisbet of 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron here in Greenwood. “I was so tired – it was the hardest couple of weeks of my life.”

The team reached the peak of Mount Logan in Kluane National Park, Yukon, June 1 to exemplify the Canadian Forces growing commitment to operating effectively in remote corners of Canada's North. The treacherous journey was an intensive training exercise to augment SAR techs skills and enhance trade esprit de corps. Participating SAR techs included master corporals Mike Neilson and Nisbet of 413 Transport and Rescue Squadron, 14 Wing

Greenwood; expedition leader Sergeant Rob Coates and Master Corporal Jeff Ferguson, 424 Transport and Rescue Squadron, 8 Wing Trenton; Master Corporal Chris Kopp, retired; Sergeant Chris Lamothe, 442 Transport and Rescue Squadron, 19 Wing Comox; Sergeant Joe Managire, 435 Transport and Rescue Squadron, 17 Wing Winnipeg; Sergeant Scott McDougall, 103 Search and Rescue Squadron, 9 Wing Gander; and Sergeant Eric Soubrier, 439 Combat Support Squadron, 3 Wing Bagotville.

“Rescue missions require SAR techs to plunge in to every conceivable weather and geographic condition,” says Coates. “Canada's extreme wilderness attracts elite adventurers from around the world, and if they require assistance, SAR techs need to have the skill level to operate in the same environments in order to affect a rescue.”

Nisbet heard about the climb last fall, and a couple of Greenwood's SAR techs applied to go. Nisbet was counting on his Army experience teaching

mountaineering in Trenton. SAR Techs would all have basic mountaineering knowledge, but this climb would be a “dream trip,” Nisbet says.

The mountain expedition presented several challenges associated with northern and mountain operations and

was intended to improve avalanche awareness, glacier travel and altitude acclimatization. With nearly a year's worth of training and preparations for the climb, the team spent a total of 20 days on the mountain. Some days, the teams would ready camp for the night by building snow

walls by hand in order to break the 80-kilometres-per-hour winds. Melting snow for drinking water, and then digging out washroom pits, added to the daily load. And, as the team discovered, some lessons can be unexpected.

“One member from our team fell into a hidden

crevasse and was down about 80 to 100 feet,” said Coates. “Fortunately, he wasn't hurt and we were able to get him out fairly quickly. This happened at hour 12 of about a 15-hour day, so we were tired by then - but we all made it through.”

The team roped together for glacier travel whenever it was on the move, mostly on skis.

Towering at nearly 6,000 metres, Mount Logan is world-famous, not just for its height but for its tremendous breadth. Supported by the largest base circumference of any non-volcanic mountain, its size is unmatched by any others on earth.

“The feeling once we reached the summit was amazing! I didn't assume we would make it until I had my crampons firmly planted on the summit ridge,” he said. “It was an emotional time for some of us after all the planning and hard work it took to finally get to the roof of Canada. It was a beautiful afternoon, with generally good visibility and light winds. It was just perfect.”

Cadets close out with youthful show of skills

With a little rap, a lot of cheers and even some tears, the 60th year of Greenwood Air Cadet Summer Training Centre programming came to an end August 19.

Over 700 Cadets were on parade, watched by hundreds more family members and special guests. Wing Commander Colonel Jim Irvine was the reviewing officer.

"This parade represents the culmination of some extremely hard work – all remarkable achievements," Irvine said. You've all come together in Cadet spirit to not only stretch your future, but that of Canada."

Irvine told the parade 14 Wing is proud of "our" Cadet training centre, and he

was very impressed with their parade turnout.

"I know you're tired, I know you're hot and I know you are thinking 'Will that old fogey get off the dais,' but I want you to know my Cadet years stood me in good stead and taught me how to lead and follow and work as a team."

Irvine also thanked the parents for their support of their Cadet youth: "the adolescent you saw leave for Cadet camp a few weeks ago is now one step closer to being an adult, and you can be proud."

Tracy Hachey of Moncton was one of those parents, still wiping a tear from her eye as she watched her daughter, Sergeant Toni Hachey, on parade in her fifth year of Cadet summer training.

"I haven't seen her in six weeks, and she looks like a different person on parade. She loves it. Coming home for her is a big adjustment, and she'll be miserable until she gets back into her own squadron."

None of the Cadets looked miserable on parade, though, as the band had audience members clapping and its own musicians dancing and rapping to some pretty hard core dance music – marching band-style. The drill team wheeled, turned and snapped into complex formations, and the fitness team showed some of its skills in a routine that almost looked like they were "popping."

Keeping the Cadet program in tune with youth is key, Captain Doug Keirstead said. He's the public affairs

officer for Regional Cadet Support Unit Atlantic. The Cadet's Canada-wide Flicker website just counted one million visitors, looking at hundreds of images of Cadets flying, drilling, surviving in the wilderness and just having fun in their downtime.

"Social media was a really big program for us this summer, and it shows we're a lot more out there with our activities for young people," he said.

It turns out some of the biggest users of the on-line presence have been the Cadets' parents. Keirstead said he's had parents email along messages asking someone to please have their son call home, as he'd been ignoring their messages!
