Heritage Harvard lifts eyes to old-time skies


You could hear it overhead: the loud engines of the old-time Harvard, a 1952 Mark 4 trainer, flying over Greenwood August 30.

The distinct, yellow-painted plane flew in as part of Canada's Vintage Wings' cross-country, year-long flight tribute to one of the greatest military and industrial achievements in the country. During the Second World War, the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan was an achievement in planning, construction, community involvement and aircrew training that involved every province,

hundreds of small and medium-sized communities and thousands of airmen from Canada, the British Commonwealth and the United Sates.

Greenwood was one of those small communities affected by the BCATP back in 1942, when the bulldozers moved in and carved RAF Station Greenwood, soon to become RCAF Station Greenwood.

"No one in today's Air Force would have flown this," says pilot Robert Erdos, a retired Air Force pilot himself.



brief and dramatic flight. This is a demanding plane."

Erdos, now a test pilot for the National Research Council in Ottawa, got involved in Vintage Wings' mission to "educate, commemorate and inspire" modern aircraft enthusiasts with the stories and realities of "the old planes, the veterans and what they accomplished." Vintage Wings has over a dozen heritage aircraft in flying condition, some gathered from private collections and others that arrived as a "bucket of parts.

"They burn gas, they drip oil... they keep it alive. When I take the old plane to air shows, there are always these old guys who come in and look at them. We get a good reaction."

Arriving in Greenwood from a Summerside air show over the weekend, the Harvard was alone. It was supposed to be accompanied by a restored Lysander but, as Erdos says, "our schedules have had a few bumps.

"But, Vintage Wings is really lucky – we have parts in stock or we can make 'em.

There's no factory support for these old planes anymore, but we have staff and volunteers" to keep the planes in the air.

Volunteers here with the Greenwood Military Aviation Society understand: they've spent years restoring nonflying aircraft for their displays, including the current Anson project. They gathered to meet Erdos and co-pilot and navigator Debbie Wall at the museum and in their own workshop, and later enjoyed Erdos' air show routine over the base airfield.

SAR Tech and the next generation

I met up with my parents for a search and rescue family reunion September 1, fortunate enough to be a part of the Cormorant crew from 413 Squadron sent to Summerside in support of the Para Rescue Association Reunion. Almost 100 people from across Canada and the United States made the trip for this bi-annual event, run by members of the Para Rescue Association (est. 1989) for military and exmilitary SAR Techs, pilots and PJs (para jumpers, US Air Force).

My father, ex-SAR Tech, Chief Warrant Officer Arnie Macauley; and my mother, Darlene, rode their Ultra way from Medicine Hat to

Once we landed in Summerside, our crew was greeted with curious and envious eyes. Many of these ex-SAR Techs and pilots hadn't had a chance to get a close look at the "new" SAR rotary wing asset. tell you it was worth every of the most significant and reknown rescues of 413 Squadron history, Boxtop 22, the Hercules crash at Alert, took place when my father was a warrant officer. He was the first rescuer to parachute into the crash scene from the 413 Squadron Hercules flown by his younger brother, Major Marvin Macauley. I was nine years old, and while, that event shaped a part of many people's lives, it also affected my own.

"I hear you're flying many familiar faces from helicopters," and, "Your father must be proud of you," were other comments I heard during the reunion.

> This reunion was a unique bonding opportunity for me and my Dad. I was able to bring him on board the Cormorant to conduct some routine training, including a hoist sequence with him on the hook. Dad spent 37 years in the Regular Force, 30 of these years as a SAR Tech, and is going on four years as a Reservist. This was the first time he had been hoisted from a Cormorant, and his daughter was flying! We were both thrilled, and we shared a huge sense of pride for each other, our family and our work community.
