Within just a few kilometres of the start of the Greenwood-to-Halifax ride, Boomer's Legacy cyclists were thinking of ways to make next year's event bigger and better.

"They get it now," says organizer Naval Zilka, a 405 Squadron pilot, of the September 10 event, held for the first time outside its British Columbia roots. The ride, now five years old there, is held annually in honour of Andrew "Boomer" Eykelenboom, a Canadian military medic killed in Afghanistan in 2006. Funds raised by riders support international projects for women, children and communities affected by conflict.

"People were thrilled to be a part of it and now

want to see it get bigger – even 200 riders next year. They have ideas on how they could help, what they could do to improve the ride. What we achieved – you can't put a price tag on it. Money raised was secondary to establishing the event and having people know about what we were doing."

Over 50 riders started from 14 Wing's Fitness & Sport Centre first thing September 10. 405 Squadron Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel Jason Major, and his right-hand man, Chief Warrant Officer Al Houston, sent the riders off with best wishes, and even rode as far as Kingston on their own bikes. Accompanied by a police escort all the way to the Royal Artillery grounds in Halifax, the group stuck together at

a 20-kilometre-per-hour pace for most of the route. Rest stops along the way, including one hosted by the Wolfville fire department, kept riders together, energized and on track

"We had some challenges along the route – some people had never ridden that far before, and we had one flat tire – but we sorted them out."

Zilka was totally impressed with the professionalism of everyone involved, from the riders to volunteers at the rest stops to military and other support workers at both ends of the route, at !4 Wing and CFB Halifax.

"People took things on to help us. Everything worked out so well."

Zilka spent months organizing the Greenwood event, having heard of the ride and making the connection between his own past role linking Afghanistan embassy officials with Canadian families - specifically, the Eykelenbooms – in times of injury or death. He knew all along picking up Boomer's Legacy here on Canada's east coast would be a rewarding challenge, but he was moved by what he heard from riders once on the road. The group's experiences, sharing and support took on a "life of its

own" on the road.

"People were riding, saying 'This is beautiful,' and 'I did not expect this,'" he says. While the group rode en masse most of the way, with time to change positions and chat with nearby cyclists, one stretch of the road was more personal for everyone.

'That was a time when you were definitely alone, and it was a chance to reflect on why you were there. You didn't have to look too far to see one reason: every bike had a picture on it of one of Canada's soldiers lost in Afghanistan.'

Argus history comes to life



"The Argus will always have a special place in the hearts of those who maintained and flew her. Stubborn and cantankerous, she was also faithful and formidable. For the better part of 23 years, we operated 32 Argus, amassing some 450,000 flying hours. Much of this time was low-level over the North Atlantic under adverse weather conditions.... Managing editor

Bert Campbell and Cary Baker are a generation apart and from different military backgrounds, but they have one thing in common: an appreciation of the old CP-107 Argus.

The men teamed up over three years ago to write the first book on the plane's storied history with the Canadian Air Force, visiting Greenwood September 10 to launch "The Canadair Argus: The Untold Story of Canada's Cold War Hunter." The book's official launch was in August, as Prince Edward Island opened its Air Force Heritage Park in Summerside.

Baker, living in New Brunswick, is a retired Army major. His dad, though, was an Argus pilot in Summerside at the same time as Campbell, an Argus navigator. In fact, Years later, Baker was building an Argus model from scratch, and he found Campbell's extensive Argus webpage.

"We hooked up, I shared some dimensions and specs and he asked, 'Would you like to work on an Argus book?' I said, 'When do you want to start?" Campbell, now retired in Greenwood, says.

There was no definitive

Argus history book in Canada, and neither man knew why.

'It was a good plane," says Campbell, who flew on them for 12 years. "It had long legs and endurance to carry a large weapon load. When it first came out, it was the most sophisticated maritime patrol plane in the world – and Canada had it.'

Through Campbell's online network, the men put out a call for photos, stories and history related to the Argus.

People were keen to help a lot of resources came in, Campbell says.

The men knew they wanted 'more pictures than text" in their book, and that's what they have. Eighty per cent of the photos are from the Department of National Defense, with the remainder coming from museum and private collections. Campbell admits he learned a few things through the research even he didn't know, including the fact the Argus was tested to carry missiles and rockets, but never actually did.

"The Argus is a nostalgia airplane," he says. "Each airplane had its own distinct personality. I was caught

between a rock and a hard place when she was replaced: it was sad to see her go, but we were looking forward to the new planes.


Now that the men have book in hand and are visiting various communities to share it, they are meeting even more people who appreciate the old plane: "Old guys and young guys come out: there are a lot of people around who had been on them. They're all swapping stories - some of them not fit for print!"







Members of 14 Wing Greenwood, the Royal Canadian Air Force Association, the Royal Canadian Legion and the community gathered September 18 to mark the 71st anniversary of the Battle of Britain at the Cenotaph of the 107 Royal Canadian Air Force Association in Greenwood. Today's airmen and women of the Royal Canadian Air Force continue to demonstrate the bravery, skill and determination shown by the heroes of the Battle of Britain, as they defend Canada and Canadians, and promote freedom around the world.

Ving making headway on water issues

14 Wing Greenwood expects to end its use of potable water supplied from the Municipality of the County of Kings by March31, 2012 upon completion of the final connection and subsequent flushing of the wing's distribution piping.

A new deep water supply well was drilled near the Residential Housing Units (RHUs) on the east side of the base to provide drinking water for the RHUs and the support side of the base. A contract was tendered September 1 to install the necessary water pumping equipment and connect the well head to the existing water distribution system. The final

by the end of December.

A second production well will be established for the operations side of the base. Separate contracts for the drilling of the well and construction of the water distribution system will be tendered this fall and winter. Occupants of buildings on the operations side will continue to use bottled drinking water until the new well and connections are completed, expected by August 2013.

The wing has worked closely on this issue with the Nova Scotia Environment Department, the Health

connections should be in place Department of Nova Scotia, Health Canada and Environment Canada. March 24, 2010, a Drinking Water Avoidance Advisory was issued due to water sampling results from 14 Wing Greenwood that showed the presence of perfluoroctane sulfonate (PFOS) at levels above the Health Canada Guidance Value. The value for PFOS in drinking water is protective of all health effects. based on lifetime exposure. The water avoidance advisory was issued as a precautionary measure, and will remain in effect until PFOS levels are below the Health Canada Promotion and Protection Guidance Value. In May

for those parts of the wing hooked up to the Kings County municipal water system.

PFOS has been widely used in applications involving water, oil, soil and grease repellents for fabric, leather, packaging and rugs and carpets, for both domestic and commercial use and as additives in firefighting foams and paints and coatings. PFOS and its salts are persistent in the environment and may cause bioaccumulation and biomagnifications of the chemical in wildlife. Investigations of the wing's water supply indicate a previous formulation of firefighting foam was the apparent source

groundwater. All firefighting foam on the wing is now tested before use, and PFOS-based foam is being replaced with new, non-PFOS formulations. Any PFOS-based foam found is sent for destruction at an approved facility. A study was completed earlier this year to identify where PFOS-based firefighting foam was stored or used, and the results will be used in assessment and monitoring programs. The results of groundwater testing to date indicate an area on the base where waste firefighting foam used to be temporarily stored was the most likely site for the origin of the PFOS in the wing's water supply. An old firefighting

2010, the advisory was lifted of PFOS present in local training area on the base was identified as another source area, but has not impacted any drinking water supplies. On-going testing continues to indicate the PFOS did not leech off of the wing's property into the surrounding community.

Since January, 14 Wing has conducted well drilling operations and water quality testing in several areas to determine the best location to construct supply wells for both operations and support sides of the base. Minimal flow rates and water quality test results below Health Canada's Canadian Drinking Water Quality guidelines delayed the establishment of a permanent production well.

Team effort behind Greenwood run

14 Wing Greenwood had another successful Terry Fox Run September 18. Close to 90 individuals attended, on what turned out to be a beautiful Sunday afternoon.

Military members, civilians and their families and pets participated in either the fiveor 10-kilometres routes by cycling, walking or running. Wing Administration Officer Lieutenant Colonel Heber Gillam officially opened the event at 12:50 p.m. at the Church Street start. The Terry Fox Run at Kandahar Airfield, a five-kilometre participation race, September 4, attracted 467 dedicated runners from Australia, Canada, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the United States.

Although preparations began very early, by the time the last runner finished, the temperature had climbed to 36 degrees Celsius.

"The fact that (troops in Kandahar) organize and participate in the Terry Fox Run in circumstances that are less than ideal is reason enough to celebrate this unique and memorable fundraising effort," said Breeda McClew, the interim international director of the Terry Fox Foundation. "It is the spirit in which our Canadian troops come together, with other nations, in order to contribute to Terry's dream that reminds us all of the lasting influence of his Marathon of Hope.'

The volunteer force included 21 members of the Mission Transition Task Force (MTTF), led by Major Doris Berscheid-King, Captain Kimberly van Muyen, Stephan Rainville and Jeffery Lauzier.

Preparations for the Terry Fox Run began last July. Volunteers registered runners, collected funds, organized delivery of T-shirts from Canada, obtained prizes, set up the race route with

'Because I've been involved in the past, I know the challenges that are associated with organizing a run of this size - and definitely in a deployed operation," said van Muyen. "It's for a really good cause, and everyone was keen and positive, so it's good to be involved.'

final amount raised to more than US \$5,000.

Lineman Corporal Jean-Philippe Dion of the MTTF Headquarters and Signals Squadron set a personal best for the five-kilometre distance, with a rocket-fast 16:37 minutes.

The run attracted 371 Canadians, and everyone expected to see them. The surprise was the admiration the Terry Fox Run generated among our allies at KAF, many of whom

were inspired by the story of the original 1980 Marathon of Hope. Running across Canada to raise funds for cancer research Fox completed 143 marathons in 143 days - 5,373 km - on a prosthetic leg. He suspended the run September 1, 1980 in Thunder Bay, Ontario, because his cancer had reappeared. He died June 28, 1981, at the age of 22. To date, more than \$550 Late donations brought the million Canadian has been raised for cancer research through Terry Fox Runs in September across Canada and around the world.

"I'm inspired by those who bravely fought, and motivated by those who are still fighting," said participant Paul Lacoursiere, a Canadian civilian working at KAF as the manager of the Joint Contracts Cell. He both volunteered at and completed the run, with the names of relatives affected by cancer written on the back of his Terry Fox T-shirt.


