"How's everyone doing? Getting some of that aRRRmy life?"

Colonel Jim Irvine was at Camp Aldershot September 28 checking in on 14 Wing personnel settling into day three of camp life for Operation Blue Foundation, which wrapped October 7.

"Morale is high, I've heard. Is it true?"

"Yes, sir!" answered back a mess tent full of Canadian Forces participants in one of the largest training encampments staged by 14 Wing in recent years.

Greenwood is in the final stages of preparing a contingent of "high readiness" personnel, who could be eligible for deployment over the next 12 months.

To be ready, close to 90 people have been doing fitness training and testing, work adjustment planning and, now, this field exercise.

"We do this mission support training to make sure we're ready for deployment - I'm very impressed with what I've seen."

The 14 Wing personnel tapped into Blue Foundation, being held as part of its annual training by 14 Construction Engineering Squadron's (CEF) Bridgewater, Gander and Pictou flights. Eighty-nine Greenwood and 82 CEF personnel would be in camp by the third evening.

Mission Support Flight Major Andrea MacRae said the operation took in everyone from privates to majors, new members to those with deployment

experience, drivers and cooks to convoy planners to supply techs.

"This is an invaluable experience, to have all these people together," she said.

Planning to make it all happen started in May: floor space in one of 14 Wing's buildings was cleared to start the pile of gear. In total, and taking two days' transport at each end, the operation required two tractor trailers, five seven-tonne flat deck trucks and two sea containers all the way from Cold Lake.

"That's a lot of canvas," Irvine said, touring the site with Wing Chief Warrant Officer Jim Jardine, MacRae and Master Warrant Officer Darrell Frowen.



The mess tents took over 40 people to erect in one big move; the headquarters were set up in several canvas "wings" off Army-innovated hub peak tents. The welfare tent had a dozen computers equipped with rocket sticks to allow members to check their gmail through the exercise. The central firefighting gear – which everyone was trained on within the first day or two, had water and hose to be able to hit any of the outlying tents.

While out, personnel rotated through four training schedules, but also went through trade-specific field exercises. West Nova regiment members assisted with range time, and the Camp Aldershot support team was on deck with everything from boxed lunches until the operation's field kitchen was up and running to site equipment.

"There's nothing like experience as a teacher," Irvine

said. "You're coming together for this exercise to get ready for deployment liability. The extra work to be ready is part of what we do. Where and when? Notwithstanding that, it's our objective to be ready."

Irvine also made particular mention of the exercise's more subtle lessons in bringing a team together. All the different desks, the trades, the jobs: we learn to respect each other's skills and expertise. These are things we don't quantify, but

mean a great deal for what we do in the military."

He passed on encouragement from the entire wing: "It's been a lot of work and extra duties, and everyone on the wing has an understanding of what this involves. I've been talking to all the commanding officers to make sure their expectations are managed while you're here, away from your regular tasks."

"The entire wing is 100 per cent behind you folks."

While visiting Camp Aldershot September 29 during Operation Blue Foundation, 14 Wing Colonel Jim Irvine presented his Wing Commander's Coin to a number of people who made extra efforts to ensure the exercise took place.

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Auroras fly first missions over Libya

Signonella, Italy - The CP 140 Aurora aircraft added to an impressive list of firsts, flying its first mission over Libya and its first strike coordination and armed reconnaissance-coordinator (SCAR-C) mission during Operation MOBILE.

September 22, crew from 405 Long Range Patrol Squadron, 14 Wing Greenwood, flew their first intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) mission over Libyan soil.

"The Aurora is a very capable platform which can be employed in a myriad of roles," said Captain Barrie Ransome, pilot with Sicily Air Wing CP 140 Aurora Flight. "The role of ISR is just an extension of the many other capabilities we can employ. It feels very rewarding to be able bring this capability to the mission, and knowing where these capabilities can take us in the future is very exciting."

It is a future that has been dramatically impacted by the Aurora's unmatched, and continually expanding, contribution to the operation.

Two long range patrol aircraft - one from 14 Wing and the other from 19 Wing Comox - began conducting maritime surveillance to

identify vessels in the embargo zone and relay that information to the NATO task group patrolling the waters off Libya. Demonstrating a combination of unique capabilities and a superior ISR data product, that role expanded to coastal patrols that allowed the Aurora to capture inland imagery of Libya's coastline, highways and command and control centres and then to missions directly over Libyan territory.

Imagery is captured by the Aurora's overland equipment mission suite, which allows the aircraft's crew to record three live video feeds from improved electro-optic infrared cameras. At the end of each mission, the imagery is analyzed and transmitted to the Combined Air Operations Centre (CAOC) 5 in Poggio Renatico, Italy so that they have a clear, precise picture of what's happening on the ground.

"The ISR package that we provide has been held up as the example within NATO for how intelligence reporting should be done," said Major Scott Hale, Deputy CP 140 Aurora Flight Commander. "This is a testament to the professionalism of both the crews who capture the imagery and the personnel who analyze it afterward, and we are extremely proud of the capabilities

they've demonstrated."

Building on these successful overland missions, the Aurora from 407 Long Range Patrol Squadron at 19 Wing flew the first Aurora SCAR-C mission October 1. During typical SCAR-C missions, aircraft fly over a specific geographical area in Libya to detect targets and coordinate an attack by striking fighter jets on the identified target.

"The benefit of the Aurora conducting SCAR-C missions is that we can sit over an area for a long time and build an accurate picture of activities and pattern of life, which allows better target identification and a more precise collateral damage estimate," said Hale.

"The Aurora aircraft is more than proving its worth through flexibility in operations over Libya. Its ability to loiter over an area for hours is critical to better understanding the complex picture on the ground, contributing to effective operations while maintaining NATO's zero tolerance for civilian casualties," said Brigadier General Derek Joyce, Commander of Task Force Libeccio in Naples, Italy.

Air controllers from CAOC 5 flew onboard the Aurora to provide positive identification of the target, conduct the collateral dam-

age estimates, and communicate directly with the fighter aircraft attacking the target.

The CP 140 Aurora will find itself tasked more frequently with this type of mission - fine by them.

"The capabilities of the Aurora are extremely broad and flexible, which we've demonstrated on an international stage throughout Operation Unified Protect-

or," said Hale. "Conducting SCAR-C missions is one more step in the continuing expansion of our role, which is entirely due to the great work of our personnel."

For the CP 140 Aurora Detachment in Signonella, the sky's the limit.

Operation Mobile is the Canadian Forces' participation in Operation Unified Protector, the NATO-led effort, as authorized in U.N. Security Council Resolution 1970 and 1973, to impose upon Libya an arms embargo, a no-fly zone and to protect civilians and civilian-populated areas in Libya. Task Force Libeccio is the Air Component of Operation MOBILE and it is composed of the Task Force Headquarters, based in Naples; the Air Coordination Element, based in Poggio-Renatico; and the Sicily Air Wing, based out of two

locations in Sicily. There are approximately 400 personnel deployed to Italy as part of Task Force Libeccio. Sicily Air Wing is made up of four air operations flights and two close support flights, which include: a CP 140 Flight, based at Signonella, Sicily; and a CF 188 Flight, a CC 150T Flight, a CC 130J Flight, an Operational Support Flight and a Mission Support Flight, all based at Trapani-Birgi, Sicily.

In addition to the support furnished to Operation Mobile by Task Force Libeccio, HMCS Vancouver is currently conducting presence and surveillance patrols under CJTF Unified Protector, through the NATO Maritime Component Commander and Combined Task Group (CTG) 455.01 deployed in the Mediterranean.

Canadian and U.S. military personnel and government civilian agencies took part in the annual training exercise, Frontier Sentinel 11 (FS 11), focusing on maritime security from September 20 through October 5 in the waters of the Northwest Atlantic, all the way to the Great Lakes.

FS 11 is a combined Commander U. S. Coast Guard

Atlantic Area, Commander U.S. Fleet Forces and Commander Joint Task Force Atlantic full scale exercise. This year's exercise is led by the U.S. Coast Guard. The purpose is to conduct a maritime homeland security/ defence exercise in the Northwest Atlantic, Gulf of St. Lawrence, St. Lawrence Seaway and Great Lakes

that enables a coordinated response to mutual maritime threats. This is the first time the location of the exercise extended to the Great Lakes area.

The scenario revolved around an exchange of narcotics for guns from a U.S. fishing trawler to a private-

ly-owned U.S. cabin cruiser for transit through the St. Lawrence Seaway to the Great Lakes. The exercise challenged participants to develop multiple scenarios involving controlled take-downs both vessels.

Joint Task Force Atlantic organizations involved in

FS 11 include its headquarters staff and the Maritime Forces Atlantic headquarters based out of Halifax, HMCS (Her Majesty's Canadian Ship) *Goose Bay*, a maritime coastal defence vessel, a CP-140 Aurora aircraft from 14 Wing Greenwood, and the Halifax-based inter-gov-

ernmental Marine Security Operations Centre (MSOC).

Frontier Sentinel 12 will be led by Joint Task Force Atlantic in Nova Scotia and along the U.S. eastern seaboard in May. The exercise will include mine counter measure and migrant vessel scenarios.

It is Council's intention to adopt the following proposed amendments to Bylaw 56, the Municipal Planning Strategy and Bylaw 75, the Land Use Bylaw for the Municipality of the County of Kings, which would affect certain areas of the Municipality:

(1) Rezoning a Portion of Land on Aylesford Road, Morristown (File 11-08)

Proposed amendments to rezone a portion of land located south of 6128 Aylesford Road, Morristown, NS (PID 55146831) from Forestry (F1) to Recreational Open Space (P2). The proposed rezoning is intended to legalize the campground use currently on this site.

(2) Greenwood Wellfield Protection Plan (File F-3-142)

Proposed amendments to protect the groundwater, the source of drinking water for the Greenwood area, by restricting land uses that pose a risk of contamination. The location of the wellfield protection area is generally located in the southern area of Greenwood and into parts of Tremont.

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Highway signs honour Hall

Two new highway signs near Hantsport recognize the life and courage of local resident William Hall.

The signs, officially unveiled last fall at the Nova Scotia Legislature, were installed September 15. They

will stand permanently on the William Hall V.C. Memorial Highway, the road previously known as the Hantsport

Connector. Hall was the first Nova Scotian to be awarded the Victoria Cross.

"Nova Scotia is a province of many firsts," says Premier Darrell Dexter. "Mr. Hall was the first Nova Scotian and the first African Canadian to receive this award, and deserves to be celebrated for his courage. He holds a special place in the province's and the country's history."

The province retrieved Hall's Victoria Cross medal from Britain in 1967. It is on permanent display at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic in Halifax.

Getting a flu shot?

What is the best way to protect yourself and your family from the flu? By getting the annual flu vaccine, of course!

In Canada, the regular flu season usually starts in November and runs until April, with 10 per cent to 25 per cent of Canadians getting sidelined by the flu each year until the illness runs its course.

The flu is a highly contagious respiratory infection caused by the influenza virus, spread through the air by coughing or sneezing and on surfaces we touch: doorknobs, countertops, etc. It typically starts as a headache, sore throat, chills and cough. Most often, it also includes a fever, muscle aches and fatigue. The symptoms usually last a week or more. Children may also suffer nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, but these symptoms are very uncommon in adults: if an adult has nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, it is very likely not the flu; rather, a viral gastroenteritis such as a norovirus.

The flu is most easily spread in crowded conditions such as schools, workplaces and public transportation. In addition to getting your flu vaccine, regularly washing your hands, keeping surfaces at home and at work (telephone, countertops and doorknobs) as clean as possible and covering your mouth (with the inside of your elbow rather than your hand) when you cough also help limit the spread of the virus.

The flu vaccine causes your immune system to produce antibodies against three specific strains of the virus in the vaccine; when you are exposed to those strains of the virus, the antibodies will help prevent the infection. The flu vaccine does not – repeat, does not – “weaken your immune system,” nor does it cause the flu, nor does it cause you to be “sick all winter.” It is a dead vaccine and can not

cause the disease. If you are exposed to other strains of the virus (not in the vaccine) you may become infected, but the severity and duration of the infection is normally limited. In other words, you will likely be less sick and you will likely be sick for a shorter period of time.

Health Canada recommends the flu vaccine for the following high risk people: children aged six to 23 months, adults and children with chronic heart or lung disease (asthma, COPD, etc), anyone living in a nursing home or chronic care facility, people 65 years of age or

older, people with chronic conditions (diabetes, anaemia, cancer, immune suppression, HIV or kidney disease, etc), children and adolescents on long-term acetylsalicylic acid (ASA) therapy, healthcare workers, other caregivers and household contacts capable of transmitting influenza to the above “at-risk” groups; pregnant women, in any trimester.

The Canadian Forces surgeon general strongly recommends anyone who wants to protect themselves and their family from the flu get the influenza vaccine. Since the H1N1 season in 2009, Nova Scotia recommends the flu vaccine and has been providing the vaccine free of charge to all interested in protecting themselves and their family from the flu.

In the local area, the flu vaccine will soon be available for civilians through your family physician – check with your doctor’s office to obtain more information. For military members, the vaccine is provided through the immunization

clinic at 26 Canadian Forces Health Services. Aircrew are reminded they are grounded for 36 hours after all immunizations. Everyone who receives any vaccines, including influenza, are reminded they should remain in the medical clinic for 15 to 20 minutes afterwards to ensure they have access to medical attention should they have an adverse reaction. For military members, the flu vaccine is now available at the immunization clinic during normal immunization clinic hours: Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Starting October 11, the vaccine will also be available each Tuesday afternoon

until the end of November between 1:30 p.m. and 3 p.m.

It is intended primarily for veterans, but in some circumstances may also be awarded to non-veterans. Nominations may be submitted at any time and are reviewed annually by an advisory committee.

Summerside, P.E.I. – From September 26 to October 1 Search and Rescue (SAR) crews from across the country and the United States gathered in Summerside, in order to participate in 413 (Transport and Rescue) Squadron’s annual Search and Rescue Exercise (SAREX).

Crews from 413 Squadron, 103 Squadron (Gander), 39 and 304 Rescue Squadron (USAF RQS), Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA), the Canadian Coast Guard (CCG), and Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary (CCGA) met to train and exchange best practices.

SAREX is an annual 413 Squadron exercise that tests the unit’s deployability in response to a major search and rescue incident. Both CH-149 Cormorant and C-130

Hercules fleets deployed, along with their maintenance crews and headquarters support staff.

SAREX is an excellent opportunity for crews to take part in challenging training scenarios - this year was no exception. Thanks to the great support of the CCGA, crews were able to participate in valuable cross training during the day and at night, as helicopters hoisted personnel on and off ships at sea and Hercules aircraft provided top cover and flare illumination.

“The tremendous efforts from CASARA and the CCGA were crucial in making this year’s SAREX the success that it was” says Lieutenant-Colonel Guy Leblanc, commanding officer of 413 Squadron.

“This week’s training was a great opportunity for 413 Squadron to demonstrate its ability to operate as one with its partner organizations, and its readiness to respond to the needs of those in distress.”



Judy McCool is pretty confident in the future of libraries.

"I don't think libraries will ever lose their serviceability," the 14 Wing Greenwood librarian says.

McCool can point to over 40,000 resources under the community library's roof in the Morfee Annex – more, once you tap into the library's internet connections. There are DVDs, CDs, audio books, magazines, a growing French collection – and books, of course.

"We're a hidden jewel," McCool says.

October is the best time to find out more about what the Greenwood library offers: it's Canadian Library Month, and this year's theme is "Your Library, a Place Unbound/ Votre bibliothèque: un peu, beaucoup, a la infini."

"We have lots of families coming in for storytimes every Wednesday, the kids like the life-size Woody and Mr. Potato Head figures,

we'll see people come in looking for research for courses they're taking, or aviation history.

"Who comes in? We have a membership of about 1,200 people," McCool says.

"We let kids stamp out their own books, usually the music is playing – in fact, it's way too quiet in here

right now!"

A library membership is just \$5 a year, or \$10 for

a family. All of those fees turn into new books for the shelves.

McCool also depends on the year-and-a-half old Friends of the Greenwood Library group, about nine people who have volunteered to support the library's programs and purchases.

"They're a very small group, but they do the work of giants! They raise money, look for donations from service groups and track down grants – and they're definitely open to new members."

Celebrate Canadian Library Month in Greenwood as the library hosts an open house October 18, 10 a.m. to noon. There will be free tutorials on how to use the library's on-line card catalogue October 18, 2 p.m. to 3 p.m., and October 28, 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.




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
