Golf Atlantics on Greenwood course

14 Wing Greenwood will host the Atlantic Region Golf Championship June 17 through 20 at the Greenwood Golf Club.

Greenwood is the defending regional champ and on course this time around are team captain Warrant Officer Rick Hachey, Sergeant Steve Lake, Master Corporal Larry Youden, Sergeant Dave McDowell, Captain Clark Sollows, Lieutenant Karyne Gelinas and Captain Mary Cameron-Kelly.

Approximately 40 players on teams representing bases and wings in the Atlantic region will take part in this championship. Teams are entered from Shearwater, Gagetown, Halifax, St. John's, Gander, Moncton and Goose Bay.

Competitors arrive June 17 for a 2 p.m. briefing and then a 7 p.m. meet and greet, both at the clubhouse.

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine, or a delegated representative, will officially open the championship at 9 a.m. June 18. Competition gets underway at 10 a.m., continues from 7:30 a.m. June 19 and the third and final round starts at 9:30 a.m. June 20.

Awards will be presented at approximately 1:30 p.m. June 20 at the golf club.



CF camaraderie takes to the open road

The shared language may be "bike," but the links between riders in the Canadian Army Veterans Motorcycle Unit are stronger.

"The likeness of mind, the camaraderie, that we speak the same language," says Bob Peebles.

"I was an independent rider from 1975 – then I joined the club."

2nd CAV Fortress Europe chapter members ride out of Greenwood, but they're part of an international group of serving or retired Canadian Forces veterans who take to the road on two wheels. The local club has been chartered for three years, with over a dozen members on

the roster.

"You have to have a bike to join," says Scot Austin, a Reserve captain at 14 Wing Greenwood, serving now as the base's ethics and harassment advisor. "The only other common bond is the Canadian Forces. People see our crests and they know who we are. A lot of people approach us."

Peebles is a retired Air Force member, with

Greenwood Square's historic cemetery marks final burial

A chapter in an old community's history closed May 28, as a 97-year-old woman was laid to rest in what was once the centre of Greenwood Square.

"'I am the thousand winds that blow...," quoted Reverend Elizabeth Johnson during the service for Norma Milner, who died May 23 and was buried in the former Greenwood Union Church cemetery. "'I am the quiet birds in perfect flight."

Fitting, as a spring breeze and flying birds crossed the 14 Wing Greenwood airfield towards the centuries-old landmark where Milner was taking her place, likely the last to take up a plot.

The cemetery is tucked between the Canadian Forces'

base's airfield and neighbouring hangars, an important connection with a village that had deep roots on this land, long before the military made it its own. In 1961, with a final expropriation of land for the base, the trustees of the cemetery entrusted the plot to 14 Wing - its care and maintenance, and access for family visitors and a handful of future burials. Milner was buried beside her first husband, William, and alongside extended Newcomb (her maiden name), Spinney, Keddy, Magee relatives, friends and neighbours.

"This is a historic moment," Johnson said. "We had a very special bond, and I am pleased and honoured to do this service today."

Johnson knew Milner throughout her 17-year stay at Grand View Manor in Berwick.

Milner left Greenwood Square in 1989, when her husband moved to the manor; she had been born in the village in 1914, grew up on her family's farm and then continued to farm as a married woman. She volunteered in the community's church, as a 4-H leader, taught piano to neighbouring children and helped with the local Red Cross.

"She was an only child and them in the old cemetery.

her dad's 'right hand man,' a seamstress, a committee member - and she gave up her home, as a dedicated wife, when her husband had a heart attack," Johnson said.

"She always had a ready smile, she was a gracious, gentle lady – but determined, a matter of fact person and she spoke her mind. Oh, but she loved people."

Johnson commented on the spring plowing of the Valley's farm fields and the beauty of the greening trees: "Everything is working out as God planned it, and I'm sure Norma is looking down now and saying, 'All is right' as well."

Milner, who once wrote a history of Greenwood Square, is now part of that past. There are no known individuals with designated places waiting for them in the old cemetery.



26 years under his belt. Paul Turmel was in the Army for 24 years, in the armoured corps then as a materiels tech. Three years ago, he quit smoking and bought his first bike as a reward. Del Goodwin was in uniform for a total of 39 years. Dave "Doc" Hollawav. a 23-year Army veteran, has been on a bike for 30 years. His wife, Sue, is a CAV supporting member: the pair make a fivehour round trip every week from their home in Barrington to join up with the local CAV. They are the only crested CAV members on the South Shore.

Rob Gallant "never left" Greenwood after wrapping up his 20 years in the Air Force. He came back to bikes after a 33-year absence: "Bikes in my teens, yes – then muscle cars took centre stage. Last year, I was looking for a Chevelle on Kijiji, and a Honda Shadow came up." He passed his motorcycle license last year.





Play safe

As we all watch work progress on the new playground beside the Greenwood Community Centre, it is prudent to keep some playground safety tips in mind for the June opening.

Supervising children at play can help prevent injuries by ensuring equipment is used properly and rough housing or unsafe behaviour is avoided. Children sometimes have difficulty judging dangerous situations; it is our responsibility as guardians to help keep them in check. Also, with an adult nearby, first aid for any injuries can be administered swiftly.

Teach your kids to use the equipment properly: sliding feet first and sitting on the swings are two examples. Never push or rough house. Make sure other kids are not in the way before jumping off equipment. Leave backpacks and bikes away from the equipment. Sweaters with drawstrings and hoodies can become a choking hazard; they should be removed before entering the playground equipment.

Wood that is splintering or cracked, metal equipment that is rusting, broken or worn out equipment or foreign objects can all pose a danger to our little ones. A simple walk-around of the playing area before letting your children begin play is a safe practice.

Jouez prudemment

Au moment où nous surveillons tous les progrès dans la construction du nouveau terrain de ieu à côté du centre communautaire de Greenwood, il serait prudent de garder à l'esprit quelques conseils de sécurité en prévision de l'ouverture en juin.

Superviser les enfants qui jouent peut aider à prévenir les blessures en s'assurant que l'équipement est bien utilisé et que l'on évite les comportements non sécuritaires ou les chamailles. Les enfants ont

parfois de la difficulté à évaluer les situations dangereuses; il est de notre responsabilité en tant que gardiens de les surveiller. De plus, si un adulte se trouve à proximité, il peut rapidement prodiquer des premiers soins en cas de blessure.

Montrez à vos enfants comment bien utiliser l'équipement en leur rappelant par exemple ces conseils : toujours glisser avec les pieds devant; s'asseoir sur les balançoires; ne pas pousser les autres ou se chamailler; vérifier qu'aucun autre enfant n'est là avant de sauter de l'équipement; laisser les sacs à dos et les vélos loin de l'équipement. Les chandails avec des cordons et des capuchons peuvent aussi entraîner des risques d'étouffement; ils devraient être enlevés avant d'utiliser l'équipement du terrain de jeu.

Le bois craquelé ou craqué, le métal rouillé, l'équipement brisé ou usé ou les objets étrangers peuvent tous poser un danger pour nos enfants. Une bonne habitude consiste simplement à inspecter brièvement les lieux en marchant autour du terrain de jeu avant de laisser ses enfants commencer à jouer.

Fire chief's corner **Summertime fun**

School is almost out, and and never at night. that means summer is in!

Take some time to read up on some summer safety tips - in fact, share them with your friends.

Scooters, bikes and skateboards

A helmet should be worn every time you ride a bike, scooter, skateboard or in-line skate. Wear a comfortable, properly fitted helmet – always fasten the safety strap.

Be sure safety gear (wrist, elbow and kneepads) fits properly and does not interfere with movement, vision or hearing.

Learn the proper hand signals and use them when you turn or stop. Come to a complete stop before entering driveways, paths or sidewalks, then look left, right and left again for bikes, cars or pedestrians heading your way.

Water safety

If you're planning on going swimming, it's a good idea to take swimming lessons. Never swim alone: always swim with a grown-up or, if you are older, swim with a buddy (in an area supervised by a lifeguard). Wear a PFD (personal flotation Always ride in safe areas. device) when you're on a boat,



The Aircrew Trophy was taken by 407 Squadron, with its aircrew earning the highest overall score from both the overland flight and operational mission simulator scenario. 407 Squadron also won the O'Brien Trophy, awarded to the air and ground crews with the highest overall score from all competition events.
