Greenwood drivers take road test with honours

Tennis balls flew out from under a bus's tires and a pylon fell over, as a driver tried to navigate a serpentine obstacle at the Canadian Forces Safe Driving Championships, held May 13 to 17 on an abandoned runway at 12 Wing Shearwater.

The four-day local and regional competition includes participants from across Land Force Atlantic Area, including 14 Wing driving staff. Qualified drivers are tested on route discipline, first aid and an obstacle course. The straight line test, forces drivers to negotiate their passenger-side wheels between two narrowing rows of tennis balls without squashing the balls.

"It's a lot harder than it looks. We wouldn't normally put a bus in that tight a situation in the real world," said participant Corporal Scott Henderson, who works at

Canadian Forces Base Gagetown.

The "base shuttle stop" requires the driver to pull up to a curb, where measurements from the curb to the door of the bus are recorded. To add to the pressure in this timed, 10-minute event, drivers lose points for going overtime, knocking over pylons and breaking the rules of the road.

The top three contenders in each category are eligible to advance to the nationals, in Shearwater at the end of August. The competition is open to any qualified driver in the Department of National Defence.

Corporal Gary Spinney, Greenwood, was second in the bus event.

In the heavy load vehicle wheeled category, corporals Kevin Edison and Kyle Pelletier, Greenwood, finished first and second, respectively.

In the route discipline event, privates Trevor Burchell and Jose Pinto, Greenwood, were top contenders.

Wartime pilot revisits his past

Malcolm S. MacConnell, formerly of 97 Pathfinder Squadron, 5 Bomber Group, looked as snappy June 20 as he likely did stepping out with his Lancaster crew in the 1940s.

The retired squadron leader was in Greenwood to reminisce with his favourite aircraft, just ahead of a memorable opportunity to support Queen Elizabeth II as she unveiled a Royal Air Force Bomber Command Memorial in London June 28. A handful of Canadian veterans were invited to witness the commemoration of 10,000 Canadian Bomber Command volunteers.

MacConnell, an 88-year-old Dartmouth resident, was the only Nova Scotian in the Canadian contingent. He flew bombing missions from England from June 1944 to May 15, 1945.

"May 15 stands out – that was my last flight, and I took as many of my ground crew

as I could and we spent six hours flying over bomb sites in Germany," MacConnell remembers.

"That plane was the most responsive, a tough air craft."

MacConnell joined up from a small family farm in New Brunswick, just 18 years old and fresh out of school. He signed up as an aircrew recruit, and ended up as a pilot. After the Second World War, he continued with the military, including two postings at 14 Wing Greenwood with Construction Engineering in 1950 to 1953 and again – as officer – from 1963 to 1966.

"During the '50s, the base was expanding, new squadrons were coming in," MacConnell says. He helped with the construction work around new hangars and the base's heating plant while here. He retired in 1971, and has since wrote a book, "Bomber Boy," about his experiences.

Kingston native joins search, rescue ranks

Following almost a year of some of the most intensive training in the Canadian Forces, Master Corporal Jonathan Pothier, Kingston, has received his Search and Rescue Technician (SAR Tech) Wings and distinctive orange beret.

Pothier joined the Canadian Forces in 2006 as an aviation systems technician and did a tour in Afghanistan in 2009, where he maintained Chinook helicopters. After his tour in Afghanistan, he set out for a new challenge: as a Search and Rescue Technician.

"I want to thank my wife, Julianne, for all her patience and never ending support, as well as my son, Parker, for showing me what this trade is all about," said Pothier.

The road to become a SAR Tech was not a short or easy one. It started with a pre-selection process in Edmonton and Jarvis Lake, Alberta. From a group of 31 hopefuls, only

eight actually became candidates on course.

From there, the real challenge started.

"The most challenging portion of the course for me was the Arctic survival phase," said Pothier. "It was very cold, and I learned to have a lot of patience when working and living on the snow."

Pothier will now be posted to 424 Transport and Rescue Squadron in Trenton.

SAR Tech training is run by the Canadian Forces School of Search and Rescue, located at 19 Wing, Canadian Forces Base Comox. The school prepares SAR Tech candidates to perform life-saving missions throughout Canada, in some of the harshest weather and environmental conditions. Whether they are jumping into surf from a helicopter, rappelling down a cliff, parachuting into Arctic winds or scuba diving into murky waters, SAR

Techs are known for their ability to reach those in need. The CF annually responds to 8,000 incidents, tasking military aircraft or ships in about 1,100 cases. The Canadian Forces'

responsibility for aeronautical and maritime SAR extends over 15 million square kilometres of land and sea – an area one-and-a-half times that of Canada's landmass.

Après avoir suivi pendant près d'un an l'une des formations les plus intensives des Forces canadiennes, le caporal-chef Jonathan Pothier, de Kingston, a reçu son brevet de technicien en recherche et sauvetage (Tech SAR) ainsi que le béret distinctif orange.

Pothier est entré au service des Forces canadiennes en 2006 en qualité de technicien en systèmes aéronautiques, et il a participé aux opérations en Afghanistan en 2009 où il a maintenu hélicoptères Chinook. Après son déploiement en Afghanistan, il s'est donné

comme nouveau défi de devenir technicien en recherche et sauvetage.

« Je tiens à remercier ma femme, Julianne, pour sa grande patience et son soutien indéfectible, de même que mon fils, Parker, qui m'a montré toute la valeur de mon métier » a dit Pothier.

La route pour devenir technicien en recherche et sauvetage a été longue et difficile. Tout a commencé par un processus de présélection mené à Edmonton et au lac Jarvis, en Alberta. Des 31 candidats qui aspiraient à former

la prochaine génération de techniciens en recherche et sauvetage, seulement huit ont été retenus pour suivre le cours.

Et c'était là le début de leur véritable défi.

« La survie dans l'Arctique, c'est là où j'en ai bavé le plus, a confié Pothier. « Il faisait très froid; j'ai appris à être très patient en travaillant et en vivant dans la neige. »

Pothier sera maintenant affecté au 424^e Escadron de transport et de sauvetage de Trenton.

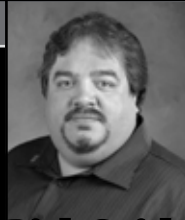
La formation de technicien

en recherche et sauvetage est offerte par l'École de recherche et de sauvetage des Forces canadiennes, au sein de la 19^e Escadre de la base des Forces Canadiennes Comox. L'École prépare les prochains techniciens en recherche et sauvetage à effectuer des missions visant à sauver des vies partout au Canada, dans certaines des conditions météorologiques et environnementales les plus extrêmes. Qu'ils soient appelés à se jeter dans l'eau du haut d'un hélicoptère, à descendre en rappel le long

d'une falaise, à sauter en parachute dans des vents glaciaux ou à plonger sous l'eau sombre, les techniciens en recherche et sauvetage sont reconnus pour leur capacité à aider les gens dans le besoin. En collaboration avec d'autres partenaires canadiens du domaine de la recherche et du sauvetage, les Forces canadiennes jouent un rôle crucial au sein d'un réseau de renommée internationale pour répondre à l'appel de ceux qui

sont dans le besoin. Les Forces canadiennes interviennent chaque année dans environ 8 000 incidents et dépêchent un aéronef ou un navire militaire dans quelque 1 100 cas. La responsabilité des Forces canadiennes en matière de recherche et sauvetage aéronautique et maritime s'étend sur une superficie de plus de 15 millions de kilomètres carrés de terre et d'eau, soit une fois et demie la masse terrestre du Canada.

Tetanus shot a safe summer booster

Spring and summer are the seasons when many Canadians get outside and get their hands dirty – gardening, outdoor renovations or just playing outdoors.

Immunize Canada reminds Canadians of the risk of contracting tetanus, an acute and often fatal disease caused by an extremely strong toxin found in soil and dirt that affects the nerves.

Most Canadians associate tetanus with rusty nails, but infection usually occurs when an individual is exposed to the toxin through a cut or puncture: i.e., a

scratch from a rose bush or a cut from home maintenance or gardening tools used outdoors.

Symptoms associated with tetanus infection include stiffness of the jaw (known as lockjaw) and severe muscle spasms, which usually appear approximately eight days after infection.

“Most people understand the importance of tetanus immunization, but many don’t realize that a booster dose is needed every 10 years,” states Dr. Susan Bowles, chair, Immunize Canada. “Others can’t recall when they had their last

tetanus immunization.”

Immunize Canada asks Canadians to check their immunization records to make sure they are up to date with their tetanus immunizations before they get their hands dirty this spring or summer.

Tetanus immunization is safe and effective. Talk to your family health care provider and ask for your tetanus vaccine during your next visit.

Note – there is no direct charge for a tetanus vaccine.

Life-saving defibrillator for Kingston Legion

June 20, the Heart and Stroke Foundation and Medavie Blue Cross unveiled a life-saving defibrillator at the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 098 in Kingston. The automated external defibrillator (AED) was installed as part of the Heart & Stroke Restart a Heart, Restart a Life AED program.

The use of an AED, combined with CPR, within the first few minutes of a cardiac arrest can improve survival rates by up to 75 per cent. Medavie Blue Cross supports the purchase, allocation, training and installation of AEDs in public places across the province.

Between 2011 and 2015, the Heart and Stroke Foundation, through the Restart program, will fund 100 AEDs in communities across Nova Scotia, including the associated CPR and AED training. More than 40 sites have been approved for funding to date. Criteria for determining areas most in need include emergency response times, the potential of higher incidence of sudden cardiac arrests in large public places, and local readiness to support a public access defibrillator program. Communities and organizations may apply for AEDs; the next application deadline is September 30.

AEDs make it possible for non-medical personnel to restore heart rhythm and life. The AED uses voice prompts and text messages to tell the rescuer what steps to take, and delivers an electric shock to the heart. AEDs are safe and effective at restarting the heart and restoring life when used within minutes of collapse.

“Having an onsite portable AED and people trained in its use at the Kingston Legion is a priceless commodity, and for

that we are very grateful,” said Brian MacDonald, Legion president. “We are centrally located in Kingston, and it is comforting to know that, should someone experience a cardiac event at the Legion or close by, we can respond immediately at a time when every second counts.”

Pulling power adds up

It took a lot longer to total off the food and monetary donations gathered this year after the third 14 Wing Greenwood Pull the Pumper challenge.

“That must be a good thing,” says organizer Warrant Officer John Pereira, a 14 Wing firefighter.

“The challenge was definitely met, and the proceeds and food will support local families who need assistance at this time of year.”

Fifteen teams took part in the actual challenge June 22, but the base and community pulled together to gather 2,400 pounds of food and \$1,996.54 through BBQ sales, raffles and personal donations. Pereira was aiming to tip the 2,000-pound mark this year, so he’s pleased with the event’s success.

“This was our third year, so there was more involvement – teams were up by two, and more units were doing their own things.”

Pereira acknowledged this year’s new

efforts to back the event from The Aurora Newspaper, which printed 5,900 food donation bags in advance of the event; Forbes Kia stuffed the trunk of one of its vehicles and 14 Wing Combined Charities contributed the day’s “dress down” dollar contributions.

“I’ve been doing this for three years and, as far as I know, 14 Wing’s contributions are increasing every year.”

All the proceeds were donated to the Upper Room Food Bank in Kingston, a Feed Nova Scotia partner. The first two years of Pull the Pumper were held in the fall; this year’s event was moved to June to help the food bank at a traditionally lower period of support.

14 Wing Fire & Emergency Services organized the challenge once again, which included pulling a 46,000-pound fire truck and a challenging relay competition. Teams of six or more went through the stations competing for the best finishing time. 2012 bragging rights go to Transportation and Electrical and Mechanical Engineering Squadron.

'Flying Banana' home

The Greenwood Military Aviation Museum has a new aircraft restoration project: a Piasecki H-44 helicopter, affectionately known as the "Flying Banana" because of its curved shape.

Preceding the Labrador helicopter in the Canadian military's stable of air-

craft, the H-44 was flown by 103 Rescue Unit based at RCAF Station Greenwood around 1960.

On a visit a few years ago to the Reynolds Heritage Preservation Foundation (RHPF) in Wetaskiwin, Alberta, museum general manager Major Robert Johnson spied the fuselage number and familiar paint scheme of a rescue squadron airframe.

Explaining the 103 Squadron's history of this aircraft type to RHPF chairman Byron Reynolds was enough to convince Reynolds the restoration and display of this airframe should be done in Greenwood.

Butch Fleury, with the assistance of 408 Squadron volunteers, recently loaded most of the airframe and parts needed to

start the restoration, and these were returned to Greenwood on permanent loan June 14. The remaining parts will be delivered next year.

The restoration team is now being assembled for this exciting restoration project, and work should commence this fall. The rear fuselage of H-44 helicopter 592 and the forward fuselage

of a U.S. Army Piasecki (earlier vintage - H-21), plus innumerable parts will be united and restored to make one 103 Rescue

Squadron H-44. On completion, this historic flying machine will bring the Greenwood museum's aircraft collection to 10.
