Bikes, brains and helmets add up Greenwood MPs bike patrol passing along safety

A new bike patrol by 14 Wing Greenwood's Military Police is a great "ice breaker," community relations officer Corporal Genevieve Sorel says.

"It's cool, you get to wear shorts, and it looks less serious."

Corporal Luke Osborne is the one with the wheels: two wheels, that is.

"I'm just patrolling, I can reach into the walking trails, interact with the public and talk to children," he says. "We're not just police officers in a

car driving around with the windows rolled up."

While the bike patrols are a secondary duty, the MPs hope they can keep it up into the future. They've already got one great project under their belts – or on top of their heads – directly related to the initiative.

The MPs were given 100 various sized bicycle helmets by peers at the Kentville Police Department, who had a number of helmets to distribute as part of a provincial safety project.

"We watch for helmets on bikes and at the skate park," Sorel says. "We try to make

sure people are wearing them and, if they're not, that they understand for us it's not about fining them or seizing their bike – it's about education and safety."

If they spot someone without a helmet, they ask them to get it – by walking home. If they don't own one, this summer they're in luck: "here you go."

That said, she says the MPs have a lower tolerance for adults not wearing helmets than youth, as adults should be setting the example and would certainly know the laws and safety issues around helmet use.

Making a home homey is one

thing – how about 579 homes? Canadian Forces Housing Agency staff at CFB Greenwood are into a busy summer season

of all the maintenance and repairs a single homeowner would have on their to-do list. Close to \$3.8 million will go into

the base's Residential Housing Units this year. That doesn't even include the regular property maintenance that happens

day-to-day.

"I think about what I'd like to see if I lived here," says housing manager Wanda Munro. "That's

how we should be doing it."

Just a couple of weeks before starting with the CFHA last August, Munro finished

her own home's renovation: she likes to get in there, and has the same approach to her role in Greenwood. There are paint chips on her office wall, graph paper sheets in folders with ideas for re-configured parking areas, back decks and yards and her office is working on building strong relationships with local contractors and also base agencies they rely on, including Construction Engineering, Defence Construction Canada and the residential-run community council.

There are major projects underway this construction season – and all of it is timed around the many in and out posting dates of the tenants: Canadian Forces members and their families. While most of the work is done in housing left vacant to allow it, some

families could be asked to move into other quarters if there are unavoidable project terms. Yearly projects are determined by priority, but also by allocated funding, and that can sometimes change.

Six 1950s-era one-and-a-half storey homes are in the middle of "minor recaps" right now, about \$850,000 worth of work to strip them to the studs, insulate, rewire for modern communications service, change out oil heat to electric and install a heat pump and heat recovery ventilation.

"We had an occupant in one of the C-class units (these style of homes), and he moved back into it after the refit and now says his energy use is one-fifth what it was, and there's a better quality of life," says Grant Sheehy, CFHA's chief technical manager. There have been over 30 mini-rehabs done in the last

couple of years.

CFHA is in the middle of a three-year schedule to switch old windows from 100 RHUs for new, energy efficient installations. Rose Street was done last year; Lilac should be done this year, and Ivy is planned for next year.

There are deck replacements planned around the neighbourhoods where needed

The lodge residences will have new roofs this summer, as needed, and those paint samples on Munro's wall? The Cape Cod-feel colours of grey, yellow and blue will repaint the wood siding. RHU garages that need new roofs are also on the summer list, along with installing man doors and exterior lights.

"We know what the lodges are like, and we want to spruce them up and make them nice," Sheehy says. "It's challenging to make people happy there." Taking away some of the paved

parking space in the centre of the residences will give each unit a green space at the back door, with a deck, a walkway, a clothesline, a fence and, if approved and funded down the road, maybe even a small storage shed. Soundproofing is also on the list.

"These residents will have just as nice as people in the single family homes – people will want to live there," Munro says.

Residents living through the renovations, or coming into the

lodges soon, know the pluses: inexpensive to heat, and easy outdoor spaces to maintain.

This fall, the 742 class home – a storey-and-a-half-model with super small upstairs spaces – will be looked at. Nine of them are designated to have the top floor removed, then rebuilt into a full two-storey, with four bedrooms and two bathrooms.

Add in some tree-planting projects around RHU neighbourhoods, and a fund tenants

can access for help with things like topsoil, fertilizer and grass seed; and Greenwood looks like a pretty good place to live.

"Our units are in good shape – people call with an issue, and we go check it out," Sheehy says. "People move out, and we have a 30-day period to get in, repaint and check what we can."

"Four years ago, we had 160 vacant units; now, we're 96 per cent full. People want to live here."

The Greenwood neighbourhoods are also well-known nation-wide, Sheehy and Munro say: the development 60 years ago included pathways to popular destinations: the community centre, the pool and adjoining streets; living rooms don't face the road and there is proof past residents enjoyed their stay here in the number of mature trees and shrubs someone took the initiative and pride to plant.

"We're always trying to do the best we can," Sheehy says.

« Nous observons les cyclistes et les planchistes au parc, dit Sorel. Nous essayons de convaincre les gens de porter le casque et, s'ils ne le portent

pas, de leur faire comprendre que nous ne sommes pas là pour leur imposer des amendes ou saisir leur vélo – c'est une question de sensibilisation et de sécurité. »

S'ils voient une personne sans casque, ils lui demandent d'aller chercher son casque à la maison – à pied. Si la personne n'en a pas, elle est

chanceuse cet été : on lui en donne un.

Ceci dit, le Caporal Sorel explique que les agents de la PM sont moins tolérants envers les adultes qui ne portent pas de casque, parce que les adultes devraient donner l'exemple et connaître les lois et les questions de sécurité concernant le port du casque.

Rendre une maison accueillante, c'est facile – mais que dire de 579?

Les membres du personnel de l'Agence de logement des Forces canadiennes (ALFC) et à la BFC Greenwood ne s'ennuieront pas cet été. Que l'on pense aux travaux d'entretien et de réparations qu'un seul propriétaire pourrait inscrire à sa liste des choses à faire... De fait, près de 3,8 millions de dollars seront investis dans les unités de logement résidentiel (ULR) cette année. Et ce montant n'inclut pas les travaux d'entretien courant au quotidien. « Je pense à ce que j'aimerais avoir si je vivais ici », de dire la gestionnaire des logements, Wanda Munro. « C'est dans cet esprit qu'il faut faire ce travail. »

Deux semaines avant de commencer à travailler à l'ALFC, en août dernier, Wanda Munro venait de terminer des rénovations chez elle. Elle aime s'attaquer à ce genre de projet, et c'est avec la même énergie qu'elle assume son rôle à Greenwood. Dans son bureau, on trouve des échantillons de peinture affichés au mur, du papier à échelle dans des dos-

siers avec des idées de reconfiguration du stationnement, de terrasses et de cours arrière. Son groupe s'affaire aussi à établir de solides rapports avec les entrepreneurs locaux ainsi qu'avec les agences de la base sur qui il peut compter, y compris Génie de construction, Construction de Défense Canada et le conseil communautaire.

Cette saison, des projets majeurs sont en cours et tous sont prévus en fonction des dates d'affectation des locataires, c'est-à-dire les militaires des Forces canadiennes et leurs familles. Bien que la plupart des travaux se fassent dans des unités inoccupées, il arrive qu'on doive demander à des familles de s'installer dans d'autres quartiers quand on ne peut faire autrement. Les projets annuels sont établis d'après des priorités mais aussi en fonction du financement qui leur sont affecté, une situation qui peut être appelée à changer sans préavis.

Six unités d'un étage et demi datant des années 1950 subissent présentement des rénovations mineures, ce qui représente une valeur de 850 000 \$ en travaux, lesquels consistent à tout enlever jusqu'à la charpente, appliquer de l'isolant, refaire le câblage en

vue d'accueillir des services de communication moderne, faire le passage du chauffage à l'huile au chauffage électrique et installer une thermopompe et un ventilateur-récupérateur de chaleur.

« Un des occupants d'une unité de classe C est revenu dans ce logement après que des travaux ont été effectués. Ils nous a dit que sa consommation d'énergie est le cinquième de ce qu'elle était et qu'il jouit d'une meilleure qualité de vie », a affirmé Grant Sheehy, gestionnaire technique en chef à l'ALFC. Plus de trente projets mineurs ont été réalisés ces deux dernières années.

L'ALFC est au cœur d'un projet de trois ans d'installation de nouvelles fenêtres écoénergétiques dans cent ULR. La rue Rose a été faite l'an dernier; la rue Lilac devrait se faire cette année et la rue Ivy, l'année prochaine.

On prévoit aussi remplacer des terrasses là où il y a lieu de le faire.

De plus, certaines rmaisons auront un nouveau toit cet été. Alors qu'advient-il des échantillons de peinture épinglés au mur de Wanda Munro? Eh bien, on compte repeindre le revêtement en bois dans des teintes de gris, jaune et

bleu Cape Cod. Les garages des ULR qui ont besoin d'un nouveau toit font aussi partie de la liste des travaux d'été, en plus de l'installation de portes piétonnes et de lumières extérieures.

« Nous savons de quoi ont l'air ces maisons, et nous voulons les rafraîchir et les embellir un peu », nous dit Grant Sheehy. « Ce n'est pas facile de rendre les gens heureux ici. » Alors, le fait d'enlever les espaces de stationnement asphaltés au centre du complexe nous permettra de créer pour chaque unité un espace vert en arrière, et de construire une terrasse, un sentier, et d'installer une corde à linge, une clôture et peut-être même une petite remise si le financement nous le permet. L'insonorisation des unités figure aussi au nombre de nos travaux.

Selon Wanda Munro, « les logements de ces locataires seront tout aussi accueillants que les maisons unifamiliales. Les gens voudront vivre ici. Les occupants qui voient évoluer les travaux ou qui viendront bientôt s'installer dans les maisons en rangée savent que le chauffage coûtera peu et que l'extérieur sera facile d'entretien. »

Cet automne, on s'attaquera au modèle 742 d'un étage et

demi, où l'espace au deuxième est très restreint. Dans neuf de ces unités on enlèvera l'étage du haut pour reconstruire une habitation de deux étages complets comptant quatre chambres à coucher et deux toilettes. Ajoutons à tout ça des projets de plantation d'arbres dans le quartier des ULR et un fonds dans lequel peuvent puiser les locataires pour acheter de la terre, de l'engrais et des semences à gazon, et Greenwood a tout d'un endroit charmant où il fait bon vivre.

« Nos unités sont en bon état. S'il y a des problèmes, les gens nous appellent et nous sommes tout de suite sur place pour voir ce qu'il y a », nous affirme Grant Sheehy. « Les gens déménagent, et nous disposons d'une période de 30

jours pour repeindre et voir ce qu'il y a à faire. »

« Il y a quatre ans, 160 unités étaient inoccupées; aujourd'hui, notre taux d'occupation est de 96 pour cent. Les gens veulent vivre ici. »

Greenwood est renommé à l'échelle nationale. D'après Grant Sheehy et Wanda Munro, ce projet de développement il y a 60 ans avait prévu des sentiers qui menaient vers les endroits fréquentés, tels le centre commercial, la piscine et les rues voisines. Autre avantage : les salons ne donnent pas sur la rue. On sait que c'est agréable de vivre ici en voyant les arbres et les arbustes matures que les gens ont eu l'initiative de planter. « Nous faisons toujours de notre mieux », de nous dire Grant Sheehy.

Members of 14 Software Engineering Squadron know something the rest of 14 Wing Greenwood may not: "We control everything," the incoming commanding officer says.

A change of command ceremony July 19 in the Annapolis Mess saw Lieutenant-Colonel Tom Flynn replaced with Lieutenant-Colonel Andre Gloumeau.

"It's a secret we keep close to our chest," Gloumeau said. "I challenge you to get through a single day without using something with software or firmware. Welcome to the 21st Century."

14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine acknowledged the work of 14 SES technicians: "simulation software could be our Achilles' heel in the transition to the Block III Aurora, and Tom Flynn faced an uphill battle to ensure the critically valuable role of training."

just paperweights with wings."

Irvine credited all of 14 SES for one of its best years, with personnel showing "fantastic initiative, hard work and, often, blood, sweat and tears" to back a successful program

"14 SES has moved the yardstick forward" as far as linkages with industry partners go, and in software trouble shooting.

"Tom Flynn has also worked

hard to get recognition for you folk, punching way above your weight."

Irvine welcomed Gloumeau back to Greenwood, previously a standards and training flight commander at 404 Squadron and then commanding officer of the Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit.

"All experience which sets him up well to be CO of 14 SES," Irvine said. "We have gained a commanding officer who can continue the work of his predecessors and take the unit into the future."

Gloumeau credited Flynn's work as well: "dedication and efforts along a steady course, with many accomplishments during a period of transition," he said.

"To the squadron, we will continue to build on and main-

tain the course Lieutenant-Colonel Flynn has set. I challenge you to set the example, and be the model for development of software for the Air Division, the Canadian Forces and even our Allies."

Flynn is now posted to Air Division in Winnipeg, where he told his personnel he will "diligently occupy my cubicle."

"I will continue to watch 14 SES with pride. My job here was actually quite simple: provide leadership of a highly trained team, and watch them work."

He did not forget to "thank those who feed and pay you," passing on appreciation for the work done in 14 Wing's other branches to support his own people day to day. He was "curiously" surprised to have gone through three administrative assistants and three chief warrant officers during his 11 months with 14 SES, and then worried he apparently was given command of 500 people in his career – but "couldn't control one grandchild," as his granddaughter, Alexis, followed him to the podium. Flynn was emotional leaving Greenwood a year earlier than expected, and after two command experiences back-to-back.

"It's always a difficult challenge to put into words all the feelings you have at this moment. Mission success and profound accomplishments? You've delivered. Every day of the week."

July 6, 14 Wing Greenwood Wing Operations personnel witnessed the change of command ceremony between out-going Commanding Officer Lieutenant-Colonel Steve Chouinard and the in-coming Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel S.C. Latter in the Annapolis Mess.

Chouinard joined the Canadian Forces in 1986 and was first posted to 415 Squadron in Greenwood in 1994. During his first tour on the CP140 Aurora, he was employed as navigator-communicator, tactical navigator and crew commander. He took part in numerous NATO-led anti-submarine operations in the North Atlantic. In 2000, Chouinard was posted to the Maritime Proving and Evaluation Unit in Greenwood as project officer in charge of tactical system evaluation for the Aurora. Qualifying as test director and standards officer, he was part of the crew that accepted the first AIMP Block 1 aircraft from modernization, beginning a process still underway today. He was fortunate to be qualified as one of the first UAV mission commanders on the Predator B (Altair), and trial findings paved the way for the operational use of tactical UAVs in the Air

Force. Promoted to major in 2003, he remained at MP&EU as project control officer and senior navigator. He was appointed deputy commanding officer in 2005; in 2006, he was posted to the Directorate of Air Requirements in Ottawa as the Aurora requirements officer. Promoted to his current rank in 2009, he attended le Collège Interarmées de Défense in Paris and completed his Command and Staff College with the French Armed Forces. He took command

as the 14 Wing Operations officer in August 2010. He is now posted to the Canadian Embassy in Washington DC as the assistant air attaché.

Latter enrolled in the Canadian Forces in 1987 and graduated from navigator training at CFANS Winnipeg and was posted to 405 Maritime Patrol Squadron in Greenwood in 1989. Upon graduation of the OTU in 1990, he completed a tour at 405 Squadron, in various roles. This was followed by a tour at 404 Squadron as a TACNAV instructor and standards officer and a tour at Maritime Patrol and Standardization Team as TACNAV standards officer. Promoted to major in 1999, he was posted to the Canadian Forces Maritime Warfare Centre in Halifax as a CP140 tactics officer and ASW operational analyst. Returning to Greenwood in 2003, he completed two years at 415 Squadron as a TACNAV and crew commander before

the squadron's closeout in 2005. This was followed by a year at 405 Squadron as the standards flight commander, which provided the incredible experience as Det Commander for Exercise Noble Manta in 2006. An unexpected return posting to 404 Squadron followed, and he was employed as training flight commander, acting commanding officer and deputy commanding officer. Wing anniversary welcomes Vintage Wings Canada

14 Wing Greenwood marked its past and present during a 70th anniversary display of the aircraft that started at the base during the Second World War, and some of today's fleet.

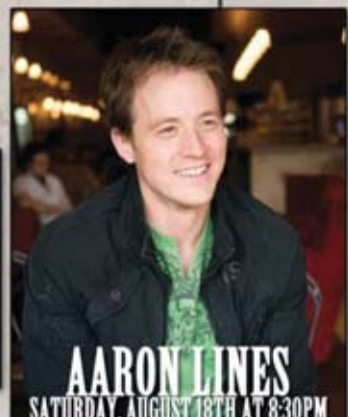

De Havilland DH-82C - Tiger Moth and one of the directors of Vintage Wings, said the aircraft, including the Anson and Mosquito, have great ties to what was then Royal Canadian Air Force Station Greenwood. 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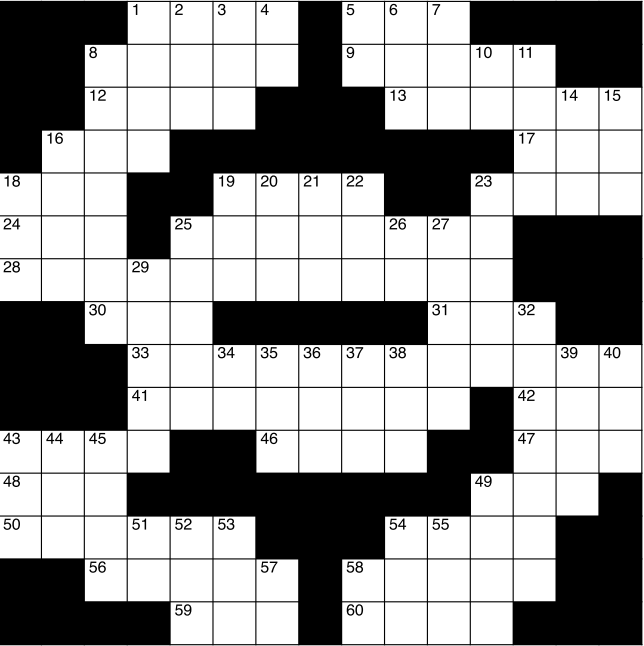

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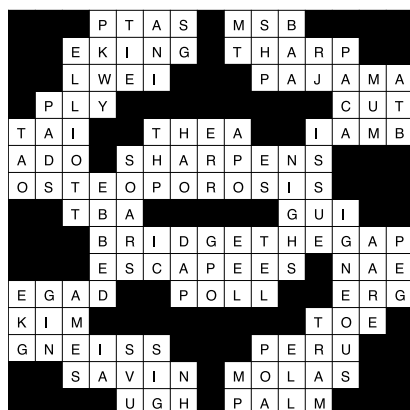
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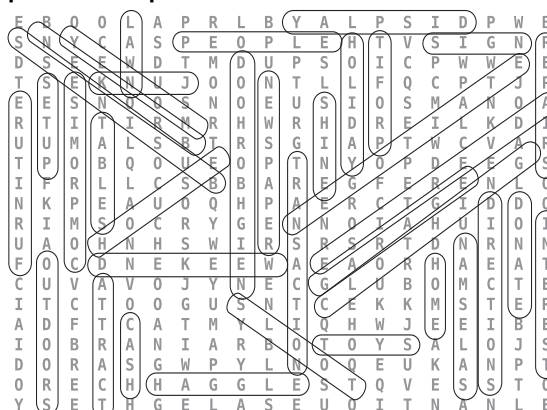
