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# Holding on to his hair

Mike Adamson is about the only commanding officer standing at 14 Wing Greenwood with a full head of hair.

As the "head honchos" fell under the razor blade September 14 in the biennial Terry Fox Head Shave, Adamson, a lieutenant-colonel, was overseas with one of his 405 Squadron crews. He knew the razor awaited his return, and the "big day" would be September 18.

That day took a heart-warming turn.

"There were three of us set to be shaved – the chief warrant officer of 413 Squadron, me and my chief warrant officer," Adamson says. The men were ranked at the \$7,000 base-wide fundraising goal, which topped out at \$14,000 for other well-known individuals and leaders: "There was no doubt we were going to do it."

Adamson says he was looking forward to the head shave, as Terry Fox events are something he always likes to participate in.

"Our daughter, Corynne, has Down's Syndrome and, in 2004, when she was seven, she was diagnosed with cancer – leukemia," Adamson says.

"Her hair fell out, and we ended up shaving it off. She relapsed when she was 11 and her hair all fell out again, and it didn't grow back for two years. I was prepared to shave my head then as a show of solidarity."

Corynne is cancer-free now, a 16-year-old student at West Kings, but there are other health issues on her plate, including a kidney transplant after the intense chemotherapy she's had over the years.

"We're survivors; she's a survivor."




### **Battle honoured**

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## People power secret to 14 Wing's success

## Base commander outlines action on local, national priorities

As 14 Wing Greenwood Commander Colonel Jim Irvine reviewed his strategic plans and goals for the base in the months ahead, it was clear his people – the men and women of the Canadian Forces and defence team supporters - were with him.

"Sir, I like work so much, I'd really like to drive 70 kilometres an hour to get there," Warrant Officer Dave Pawulski of 405 Squadron asked in the open session which followed Irvine's September 13 town hall.

Pawulski drew a laugh from the several hundred people in the Annapolis Mess crowd, as personnel who travel to the operations side of the base, through Checkpoint Charlie, have seen speed limits drop to 50 kilometres an hour – and even 35 kilometres an hour - over the past year through construction.

"Ah, speed limits on base...," Irvine said. "It is a source of some irritation for me, too."

Irvine responded base branches involved in safety and construction have recently given him a report on the issue - not just on the operations side, but along various other base routes, and it will be "looked at."

Before this is settled, though, Irvine has some bigger targets to move the entire base and all of its people toward, through a series of base, Air Division, Royal Canadian Air Force and Canadian Forces priorities

"We all have our jobs," Irvine said, "but sometimes, down at the coal face, you wonder.... I want you all to understand, no matter how

"The aims of this wing are all about what we do for Canadians, and this base gets stuff done in an extremely professional way – because of you."

Irvine stressed over the next hour all of his, the commander of 1 Canadian Air Division and the commander of the Royal Canadian Air Force's priorities are "always on operations." The challenge is meeting those priorities through modernization, new fleets and capabilities; continuing to train people and "caring for people."

Of the 10 priorities set by 1 Canadian Air Division, six are on Greenwood's radar, including an increase in air and ground crew production, meeting search and rescue demands, covering the Arctic and being on tap for expeditionary capability.

Irvine extrapolates Greenwood's ability to meet those priorities with a "pretty simple"

tenuous you think your work list of his own, "but complex in Operation Next." execution." There are commitments to NORAD, long range patrol, search and rescue and a mission support flight. The Block 3 Aurora work is top-ofthe-list. Group and individual training for "force generation" that is deployable - faster, more efficiently and more effectively - is a challenge with the day-to-day pace. And, implementing DRIMIS, a new, national record-keeping system; is crucial: without a converted inventory, "widgets" may not make it to the hangar floor when they are needed.

"People are our strengths. Our business is 24/7, so the support we provide is also 24/7," Jette said. "To be proficient at what we do, we need a balance: family is important, our personal life has to be in order, we must train hard and commit to career development."

It can not always be about work, Jette said.

## Sharp eyes on changing speed limits

Speed limits along several CFB Greenwood roadways will change by mid-October.

'As soon as we can make it happen," says Major Andrea MacRae, Transportation and Electrical and Mechanical Engineering Squadron.

"We have to work with the Military Police, Construction Engineering and make it general knowledge there are changes coming.'

Until those happen, motorists are advised to follow existing speed postings.

Among the changes are:

Thunderbird Way - the road to the Greenwood Golf Club is currently 35 kilometres and hour; the speed limit will increase to 50 km/h. TEME reminds motorists to continue to be aware of military personnel using the road for basic fitness training and testing: there are no sidewalks, shoulders or painted road markings on this route.

Ad Astra Way - the road through the base from the open side to the operations side will see some changes in speed limits and zones. To the northeast of the new health centre, the speed will continue to be 35 km/h. Further east, past the former checkpoint, the speed will increase to 60 km/h. As motorists approach the new checkpoint, the speed again adjusts to 35 km/h through the gate; then returns to 60 km/h. Much of this route had been posted 70 km/h, but summer work on the road and checkpoint re-location called for a 50 km/h speed.

A flashing yellow warning light will be placed along Ad Astra Way, in front of the Cadet quarters.

The speed around the **Hornell Centre** on the operations side will be reduced from 50 km/h to 35 km/h, taking into account congestion and obstructions from hedges, a stone wall and multiple access points to nearby parking lots and connector roads.
